Mozelle Boys, Santa Anna Girls Win A. D. Donham Relay Titles

The Mozelle High School boys and the Santa Anna High School girls won top honors in the A. D. Donham Relays held here last Friday afternoon. Mozelle compiled a total of 77 points with Richland Springs, last year's winner, having a close 75.

The Santa Anna girls, coached by Larry Steele, had a total of 150 points. Rising Star was second with 115½ points. It was Santa Anna's second consecutive year to take the girls title.

Others in the meet in the boys division were Cross Plains, 71; Bangs, 68; Santa Anna, 65; Rising Star, 54; Menard, 52; Blanket, 28; and Talpa-Centennial, 6.

In the girls division the other teams were Menard, 81½; Blanket, 78; Mozelle, 29; Richland Springs, 11; and Talpa-Centennial, 14.

Hardman of Richland Springs was high point boy of the meet with 30 points. He also set a new record in high jump with 6 feet, one inch. The high jump record was the only event record broken this year in the boys division.

Ruthie Wilson of Rising Star was high high point girl with 36 points. Elizabeth Morris of SAHS was runner-up with 28 points.

Every record set by the girls last year was broken Friday including all three relays won by the Santa Anna team members.

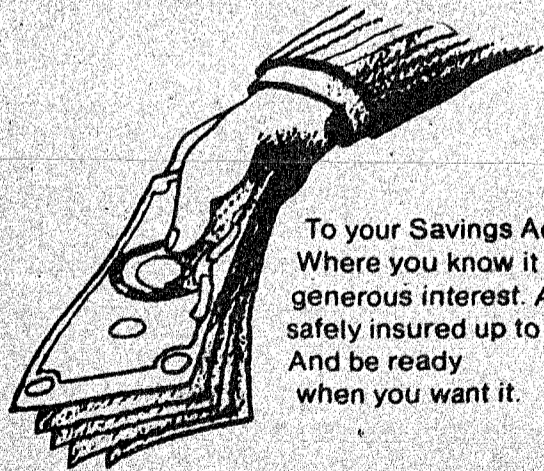

In Our Opinion

TERRORISM seems to be the order of the day. Every where we turn some one is terrorizing someone else in an effort to get what he wants.

The Khartoum incident is one of the most brazen acts in recent years, and three lives were lost for no reason. The animalistic savages who call themselves the Black September commandos deserve nothing less than death before a firing squad, just as they did away with their two American and Belgian hostages.

The Communist countries, as well as some others have passed judgement on Israel for shooting down a Libyan air liner, and, no doubt, their motives are questionable, but the deliberate kidnapping and execution of diplomatic officials which was planned in advance, deserves no consideration from any quarter, and an outraged world should see to it that they get what they deserve. We will just have to wait to see what the Sudanese government does with them.

While this was going on, we had a similar but less bloody incident happening right here in the United States. In Wounded Knee, South Dakota, a group of young Indians held hostages in trying to get what they want from the federal government. Just what they want is not clear, but they claim that the Indians have been mistreated and demand some action from the government. There is no doubt that Indians in this country have been mistreated, along with Blacks, Latins, and most other minorities. Not many years back the Irish in New York could claim the same thing, and in the west the Chinese were treated like animals with no rights at all in the early days.

What it doesn't do is make violence right. Sometimes events would lead one to believe that it is the only way to achieve a goal, but it only slows down the progress that they want so badly.

If this country, as well as some others, is returning to the rule of the gun, then we haven't made much progress in the last century.

Maybe they should re-read history and see what gains Mahatma Ghandi made for India without offering any resistance. He was certainly mistreated by the British, but public opinion eventually gave him what he wanted—freedom for India.

But mankind seems to never learn from the past. We just continue to believe that force is the only way to gain any objective and we are hard-headed enough that we will listen to no one.

Also, As Cong. Omar Burleson reminds us this week in his column, we are about to face similar problems in Panama. Have we lost so much prestige that we cannot claim that which rightfully belongs to us without fear of criticism? We say keep the canal, and let the chips fall where they may. If it wasn't for the canal, the Panama would still be a nothing. We spent our money, we built it up and I say, we keep it.

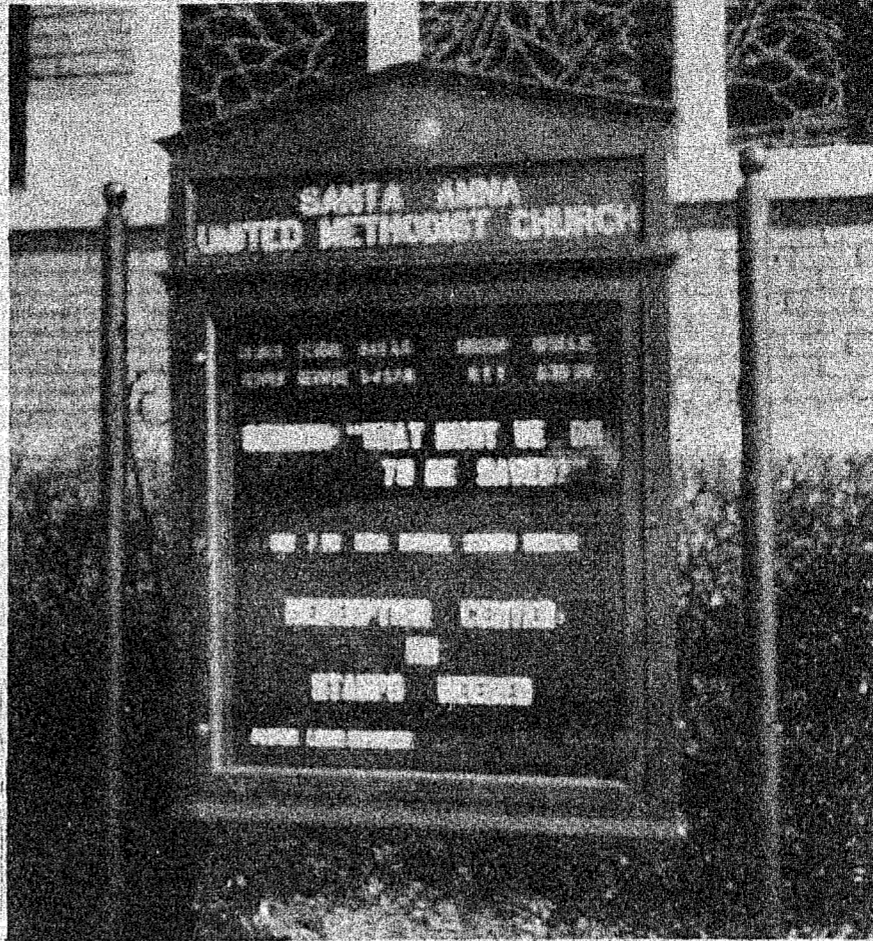
