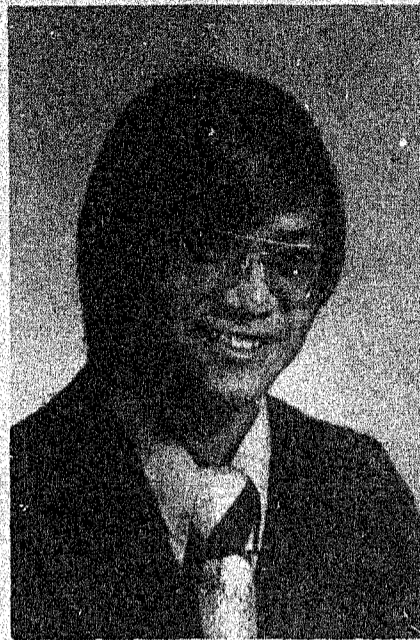

Piimer Wayne Cabansag, age 17, has been notified recently that he is to be featured in the seventh annual edition of Who's Who Among American High School Students for 1972-73, the largest award publication in the nation.

Students from over 18,000 public, private, and parochial schools throughout the country are recognized for their leadership in academics, athletics, activities or community service in the book. Less than 2 percent of the junior and senior class students, nationwide, are awarded this recognition.

May Rainfall Totals 1.05

Official rainfall report for Santa Anna for the month of May gives a total of 1.05 inches, according to Ray Owen, reporter. The moisture is measured at the gauge at the county precinct barn in the east edge of town.

The largest amount of rain during the month was .50 inch which fell on Wednesday, May 23. Moisture was recorded on five other days during the month giving the 1.05 total for May and 11.35 inch total for 1973.

The first five month total for 1971 was only four inches, and the rainfall for the same period last year was 6.60.

A good shower fell in the community Sunday, June 2 which measured .80 in Santa Anna at the official gauge and up to 1.5 in the surrounding areas.

Darwin Lovelady Certified For City Water Work

The official State Health Department's certificate of competency for the oldest ecology oriented profession in Texas has been awarded to Darwin E. Lovelady of Santa Anna, Texas.

Mr. Lovelady works for the City of Santa Anna. As an ecology worker, he has been taught effective ways for producing safe drinking water and treatments to make wastewater into clean streams for public use.

This training from the Texas Water Utilities Association, the largest water and wastewater training school in the United States, has produced clean streams and better operated water facilities than any other section of the country.

To receive the certificate, he has completed both a formal and a specialized education, accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience, and passed the examination given by the State Health Department's Sanitary Engineers.

The growing need for clean water has made the water ecologist one of the most important workers in his community. Most of his work is not seen by the public he serves; but the effects are used daily everytime someone uses water.

FLAG DAY, June 14, is a time for us to fly "The Stars and Stripes" and prove that the spirit of liberty under representative government is still alive and that the sacrifices millions have made over the years were not in vain. Most Americans don't realize how good they have it. Few know the hopelessness of real, grinding poverty—even our poor live more comfortably than those of most other nations. Americans have never lived through the hell of air raids and bombings in their own country which gut entire cities and tear families asunder. True, we have our problems, but thanks to the strength of the American system we, the people, can tackle them head-on and decide our own fate through our representative form of government. *The good things in life may all be traced back to this on basic foundation stone, the American system.*

So if you feel something tug at your heart at the sight of "The Stars and Stripes" fluttering majestically in the crisp morning breeze, don't apologize. It is that kind of love of country and its freedoms that will one day turn this world into the peaceful home for mankind that it was meant to be.

TALES OF TORTURE and brutality brought home from North Vietnam by American prisoners of war should confirm, as nothing else could, that liberty is a fragile and privileged condition of life. It exists only for the strong. For nearly 200 years, U. S. citizens have been sheltered within a system of government and economic opportunity that have guaranteed a degree of both political and economic liberty such as no people on Earth have ever before enjoyed. Blood and treasure have been sacrificed to defend our shores and our system. Many in late years have questioned whether that sacrifice has been worthwhile. The patriotism from which sacrifice springs has actually been held up to scorn.

The tales coming back from North Vietnam illustrate what can happen when men must bow in defenseless humility before the arrogant power of an enemy. It is a safe bet that those returning from Vietnam have no illusions about what could happen if America were to become weak in convictions and in physical strength. If returning American prisoners of war have one message to give that stands above all others, it is simply that America must be kept strong at all costs—that eternal vigilance remains the price of liberty.
