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Infestations Of Screwworms Start Again

SAN ANGELO Screwworms continue to increase slowly but surely along a U.S. line roughly parallel to the Rio Grande.

Officials confirmed Tuesday, May 29, the 9 latest cases: two in Brewster County and one each in the counties of Brooks, Crane, Hidalgo, Jeff Davis, Jim Hogg, Medina and Zavala.

Dr. James Novy said Tuesday that, with the exception of Brewster and Medina, the other counties had reported their first 1973 screwworms. He is director of field operations at the Mission, Texas headquarters of the USDA Screwworm Eradication Program.

"We had expected this buildup," said Novy, "and we are airdropping an enormous number of sterile screwworm flies on the Coahuila side of the river.

"Even so, such preventive measures are not enough. We urgently need for livestock producers to mail us samples of what may be screwworms. In case of confirmation, we can then quickly hot-spot (air-drop sterile flies at the very spot where the worms are found).'

Although dry weather is helping some, those areas much susceptible are FAR West Texas, Transpecos, Hill Country and confirmed in week ending May 26 in the church annex. were 5 in Mediana, 2 in Hidalgo, and 1 each in Glasscock, Brewster and Starr counties.

County extension agents in the areas are working with producers evening service. to check the worms as much as possible, and are mailing samples to Screwworm Laboratory, Box 969, Mission, Texas 78572.





SOME PEOPLE MIGHT be surprised if they knew that it has been estimated on good authority that the Watergate hearings have already cost the tax payers of this country \$2 million.

Those of us who are tired of seeing it and hearing it on television are somewhat perturbed that the government would spend that much money on something that, on the surface at least, indicates it to be purely political.

The whole thing seems to be that some people want to "get the President" and from most sources it is indicated that they will fail.

If we don't get more statesmen and less politicians representing us in Congress, our future is certainly questionable.



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
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

Sponsored by WTU from this area were Mr. Floyd Marshall, science teacher at Santa Anna High School, and Susan Newman, a student at SAHS.



ASCS NEWS

The policy of collecting loan service fees was established many years ago. These fees are used to pay for costs incurred in disbursing loans to producers.

A study has been made concerning loan service fees as they relate to the cost of disbursing loans. The study revealed that over the past several years collections and expenditures have not been nearly equal in amount. Collection rates have not changed in several years, however, expenditures for salaries, travel. and other county office cost have steadily increased. To keep fees more nearly in line with actual cost of processing commodity loans, it has now become necessry to raise the loan service fees on commodity loans.

On farm storage loans the fee is \$10 per loan for loan quantities up to two thousand bushels of hundredweight, plus one half cent perbushel or one cent per cwt. for each bushel or cwt. over two thousand bushels or cwt, not to exceed twenty five dollars per loan disbursement.

On warehouse storage loans the the fee is six dollars per loan with single receipt plus one dollarfor each additional receipt.

Commodities stored on the farm should be placed in bins that are considered suitable for storage. It should be reasonably protected rom rats, birds, mice and other contaimination, and it should be sufficiently tight so the grain can be fumigated. The grain should be adequately protected from weather including floods. The stucture shouldbe so located that is would lessen the dangers of fire or theft.

Cotton loans documents prepared by the County Committee will be \$1.50 per loan plus twenty-five cents per bale."

Farmers are reminded that certification of cotton, feed grain and set-aside is necessary before a payment can be made. July 2 is the final date for certification.

Payment this year may be a little later thanlast year. The data processing machine at Kansas City is not furnishing correct data on farmers information submitted for payment.



But to single out just one of our two parents and omit the other is the most grievous insult imaginable."
