The adopted legislation permits motorists to turn right at a red traffic light after stopping (and yielding to traffic). Municipalities may prohibit the right-on-red turns by posting notice at intersections.

The new ruling is supposed to permit traffic to flow more smoothly, and we with our one and only signal light can now legally turn right on a red light!

## Annual Swimming Program Gets Underway On Monday

The annual "Learn to Swim" program for Santa Anna children will begin next Monday, June 25, and continue for the following three weeks. The classes will be held at the Coleman Pool from 9 to 11 a.m. each week day morning.

Transportation will be provided for the children from Santa Anna school campus. The bus will leave in time to get to the pool at 9 o'clock and return to school after the lessons.

Carol Kingsbery and Debbie Bowker, certified lifeguards, will teach one group of children, and Sandra Hosch, a teacher last year with the program and Belinda Aldridge will teach the other group. Classes will be given for non-swimmers and beginners. There will be no advanced classes this year.

The cost is 25 cents a day which will pay for both the transportation and instruction. The classes this year will be one hour longer than in past years, so the children will have more time to enjoy the daily swimming.

Elder Justin was born in West Pakistan and Mrs. Justin in East Pakistan. Since there is war between the two sections of Pakistan, the West would not accept Mrs. Justin as a citizen and the East would not accept his citizenship. Because of this they found it necessary to leave that country.

Since they had several relatives in the United States, the couple chose this country. Because of their acquaintance and association with Dr. Carrie Robbins, they went to Menard where Dr. Robbins practices.

A third-generation Seventh day Adventist minister, Elder Justin worked as chaplain of the hospital in Pakistan and also pastored churches in the area. He also taught nine years in the Pakistan Union School operated by the Adventist in that area.

# Accent on Health

Vacation time is a happy time, but it also can be a time for tragedy, says the Texas State Department of Health.

Spring and Summer weather go hand in hand with recreation in Texas, which has something to offer for everyone—from seashores and lakes to forests and rugged mountains.

In most cases, recreation is associated with water for swimming, boating and fishing. While great for recreation, water poses a serious threat to the safety of young and old alike.

Last year, for example, 601 persons lost their lives in water-related accidents in Texas.

Not all of these drownings involved swimmers and boaters. In far too many cases individuals fell from a place of presumed safety—say a dock or river bank—into the water and were drowned. Children are most susceptible to this type of incident. A good safety rule is to put a life jacket on a child playing near the water—just in case of a sudden, unplanned dip.

Two children drowned this year in the Colorado River near

Austin after being warned of the treacherous nature of the river bank on which they played.

What can you do to make vacation or a weekend trip a happy, safe one? The State Health Department and Texas Safety Association have some lifesaving pointers.

First, make swimmers out of all children and adults. The Red Cross throughout Texas offers free swimming instruction. Or, you may enroll for swimming lessons with a private instructor. Being able to swim is your best insurance for coming out of an accidental dunking alive.

Always swim in marked areas if possible, and never swim alone. If you get into trouble, your companion could toss you a life jacket or rope or extend a pole to help you reach safety. Never swim when chilled, overtired or overheated. Stay out or off the water if a thunderstorm threatens. Rough water and lightning take their toll.

Always supervise small children constantly. They need your protection.

Boaters should make certain their boats are in perfect shape and meet safety and state regulations—which include having a Coast Guard approved flotation device on board for each person. Many of these devices are cushions which could float away if a boat overturns. If there are children aboard, make them wear a life jacket or ski belt. If you're on the water at night, you must have running lights.

Certain regulations apply only to larger boats, so don't get caught short, says the State

Health Department.

Rough weather and overloading are particular hazards for boaters. If you're on the water when a storm threatens, head for the dock immediately. Even the best of boaters and swimmers have perished in foul weather. If your boat should capsize, stick with it—chances are that it will stay afloat.

When pulling skiers, boat drivers should be aware of swimmers, other boats and obstacles above and below water. Don't be a showoff on the water. Life is too precious to lose.

Skiers have safety rules, too, including the wearing of a flotation device. Even good swimmers can be dazed by a hard fall while skiing.

A good procedure is to have at least two persons in the ski boat—one to drive and the other to watch the skier. Learn the arm signals prepared specifically for skiers—and use them. It's hard to hear above the noise of a motor, but a hand signal can get the message across. For instance, a skier who falls should raise an arm to signal he's okay.

When a person is entering the water, being picked up or having a towrope moved into position to grab, the motor should be in neutral. Whirling propeller blades kill several people every year.

If you're in the water, be on the lookout for other boats. If one approaches, raise a ski into the air as a signal. It's much easier to see this signal than the head of a person bobbing in the water.

Summer is a time for fun, and there's enough recreational pursuits for anyone. So when you're planning your outing, the State Health Department says, put a little thought and planning into safety.

### Secret Atheist

"I am a believing, God-fearing Christian," George assured Kathy repeatedly during their courtship. But after the wedding, he confessed that he had been lying. He had been an atheist all the time.

To Kathy, a devoutly religious woman, the situation was unbearable. As soon as possible she went to court for an annulment, and the judge granted her a decree. The judge said the marriage lacked the "meeting of the minds" that was essential to make any contract binding.



While the law will tolerate a reasonable amount of "salesmanship" in courting, it will not tolerate deception that strikes at the heart of the marriage relation.

However, not every statement connected with religious matters is considered to be that vital.

Take another case in which the bridegroom, having promised to go through a church wedding after the civil ceremony, failed to carry out his promise. For five months he managed to find one excuse after another for staying away from the church.

At last his wife filed suit for an annulment. But this time, the court turned her down. The court reasoned that if she was willing to put up with her husband's excuses for five months, the religious ceremony could not have been so important to her after all.

Of course, the more firmly the marriage is established, the more reluctant the courts are to annul.

A number of cases have been based on the premarital consent by one spouse to have the children raised in the religion of the other spouse. In this situation, even if the consent turns out to be fraudulent, courts have generally refused to find enough grounds for an annulment.

Reason: with the couple having dwelt together for years as husband and wife, and with children already in existence, it is very late indeed to declare that the marriage had been invalid from the start.

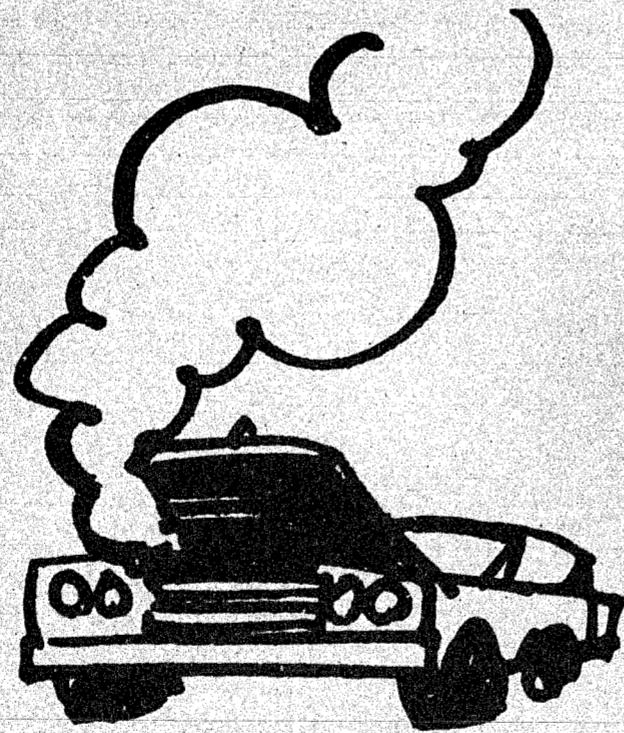

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## In Our Opinion

SOMETIMES MANY things come to mind when we try to write editorials, and it is hard to stay on one subject.

This week we may just ramble around and hit several things that we feel ought to be brought to mind.

Many of us don't realize the full effect of inflation. We want higher wages to counteract the higher prices and it becomes a vicious circle of a raise here and raise there. An example of how inflation hits us is given by the Tax Foundation, Inc. A man who earned \$10,000 in 1966 subsequently got raises totalling 30 per cent, until 1972, he was earning \$13,000 a year. The sad thing is that his 1972 salary bought him \$119 less than his \$10,000 in 1966. Those in the higher income brackets took a greater loss in purchasing power.

Speaking of taxes, A. W. Tewksbury, writing in the Oregon Voter Digest, informed us that the federal government now has 1400 advisory boards and commissions. They cost the tax payers \$25,215,882 in 1972. It looks like an economy-minded government might be able to eliminate a lot of this fat. However before they get through with Watergate, we may spend that much on it. A lot of Congressmen are for economy as long as it don't affect their district. Or their free publicity on television.

We just have to get back on the postal service now and then. Government authorities have predicted, and they should know, that by 1984 postal rates will be two or three times what they are now, and service may well be worse. Everyone who reads or writes is well aware of the deplorable state of the mail service and there is only one reason mentioning it. It provides a good moral for people to remember when they hear politicians advocating more government in business, in medicine, in housing or any other endeavor. Government has its place and should be kept in its place, along with the public servants hired by the tax players to run it.

With all our gripes and complaints about this country, there are some redeeming features. East Germany is said to have the highest living standard of any Communist country. Recently a travelling editor for U.S. News and World Reports described what this really means. Of six million homes in East Germany, only 2.5 million have private toilets, fewer than 600,000 have central heating, about 40 per cent of the East German homes have no private baths, and a million have no running water. Also, he said, new housing is a rarity, and there is no evidence anyone has used a paint brush in 25 years.

This may come as a shock to we Americans who would consider a vacation trailer with a perfume-scented chemical toilet medieval. This comparison between the so-called American way of life and other countries is a testimonial to the success of the free enterprise system and representative government.

# STATE Capital NEWS

**AUSTIN**—Texas state government may see far-reaching new changes in budgeting techniques, hopefully to save money and curb a tax increase.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe expressed enthusiasm for the Georgia "zero base" budget methods inaugurated by Gov. Jimmy Carter two years ago.

Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby and a delegation of Texas budget experts, including Sen. A. M. Aikin of Paris, visited Georgia last week for a briefing by Carter's aides.

When the officials returned, Briscoe said he expects to "be proceeding with implementing (changes) very shortly."

Hobby is chairman of the Legislative Budget Board, which ramrods the Texas budget process. Briscoe said he will instruct his own budget office to take the Georgia system as a model in preparing the executive department's spending recommendations.

Under the "zero base" system, all agencies are instructed to start "from scratch" in drawing up their appropriations requests rather than taking present levels of spending as their beginning point.

Governor Carter asked all Georgia agencies to detail how they would operate under existing revenues, a 15 per cent cut and a slight increase. He also insisted that they list their own priorities of programs as a guide to the legislature in directing economies.

Briscoe has emphasized repeatedly that he proposes to follow that procedure in weighing the value of existing educational programs, as he maps his recommendations for revision of the public school finance system.

**LEADERS CHALLENGED**—One of the top leaders in the National Democratic Party was in Austin last week. That's a unique political position for a head of the nation's largest corporation.

C. Peter McCollough, chairman of the board of Xerox Corporation, told top business executives in the capital city that social problems in the United States have become problems of business and industry and challenged the Austin leaders to quit treating symptoms of problems instead of causes.

Businesses must become less resistant to change. American institutions must examine all fundamental values in the 1970s and establish a new framework to come to grips with new problems.

**EDUCATION STUDY ORDERED**—The State Board of Education agreed to go along with Governor Briscoe's request for a complete restudy of the school system after some griping that the job already had been done.

Some board members claimed they had gone over the system with a finetoothed comb since the initial Rodriguez case decision in 1971 faulting present finance methods for public education.

Briscoe, meanwhile, said he isn't asking for "just another study." What is needed, said Briscoe, is to determine the fair market value of each school district. A fundamental change, he insisted, is necessary in methods of evaluating wealth of a district. There will, pledged the Governor, be no sacred cows in his coming study.

"It would be unfair to commit the people of Texas to another spending increase measured by billions without taking every step to first correct the crumbling

foundation of public school finance," said the Governor.

**ENERGY CRISIS STEPS ORDERED**—State agencies have been called on by the Governor to cooperate in fuel supply and energy-saving plans, including travel curtailment and use of car pools.

Brig. Gen. Jame Rose was named to coordinate energy conservation efforts among state agencies.

At the same time, it was announced bids on the state's annual fuel contract will be three cents a gallon higher than at present for gasoline and four cents more for diesel fuel. The State Board of Control was able to contract for about the same amount of gasoline and slightly less diesel fuel, although consumption usually increases about 10 per cent per year.

The agencies, directed the Governor, must not only keep fuel consumption within given allotments but attempt to build up reserves due to uncertainty of future supplies.

**COURTS SPEAK**—The Court of Criminal Appeals held the state's 1967 law against incitement to riot unconstitutional.

The State Supreme Court affirmed a Potter County

commissioners' decision that a dead man's name can legally appear on an election ballot.

The High Court ordered release on bond of a Carrollton lawyer pending a June 20 hearing on a contempt of court order in which a Wichita Falls judge accused the attorney of unprofessional conduct following a divorce action.

**AG OPINIONS**—A person under probated sentence for violation of narcotics laws can be granted another probated sentence for a later felony violation of the same act, Atty. Gen. John Hill held.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded: School districts should receive their pro rata share of any county permanent school fund distribution based on their resident scholastics of free school age. The money does not alter entitlement to state funds.

The Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation cannot use appropriated funds to pay back wages to employees unlawfully terminated under discriminatory practices rulings, but legal adjustments can be made.

There is no authorization for a pawn transaction in excess of \$2,500.

Commissioners courts may authorize payments of accrued vacation time and other earned compensation but may not authorize payment at death of

other benefits not previously earned or accrued.

A person who owns the land at the time an oilwell is abandoned is the legal "landowner" liable for cost of plugging if operators do not fulfill their obligations.

**APPOINTMENTS**—Reagan Houston, San Antonio attorney and banker, was designated by Governor Briscoe as State Highway Commissioner chairman.

Briscoe named as judges of new courts Robert T. Pfeuffer of New Braunfels (the 207th serving Hays, Comal and Caldwell counties); Ira Sam Houston of Lewisville (211th of Denton County); Joe Evins of Edinburg (206th serving Hidalgo County); Andrew L. Jefferson Jr. and Frank C. Price of Houston (District courts 208 and 209).

Dr. R. M. Inglis the new superintendent of San Antonio State Hospital.

Jose R. Coronado is assistant director of the new Veterans Administration Hospital in San Antonio.
