Santa Anna Native Named Head Of Cumberland Presbyterians

Dr. Thomas H. Campbell of Memphis, Tennessee, a Santa Anna native, was elected recently as moderator of the national organization of Cumberland Presbyterian Churches. Dean of Memphis Theological Seminary, Campbell was elected by acclamation by the 400 delegates attending the 143rd annual meeting held in Fort Worth.

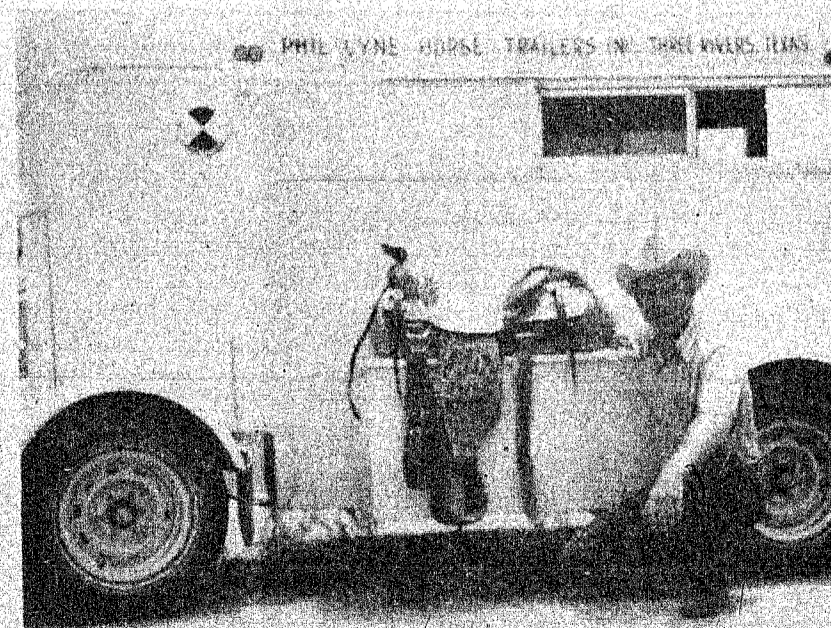
Dr. Campbell will be titular head of the church for the next year, succeeding Rev. Claude Gilbert of Idabel, Oklahoma, a missionary to the Choctaw Indians.

Building and reinforcing the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in Texas is to be one of the main efforts of the new moderator. Several new churches have been formed in the Fort Worth area. The church is

centered in Tennessee and Kentucky.

A graduate of Santa Anna High School, Bethel College in Tennessee and Southern Methodist University, Dr. Campbell pastored churches in Texas and Louisiana before entering the teaching field at Bethel College in 1944. He will retire as dean at the seminary in August to become pastor of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in Harrison, Arkansas.

The son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Henry Campbell, Dr. Campbell and his wife, a native of Fort Worth, have four children, all grown and away from home. Dr. Campbell has been one of the honorees of the Santa Anna Ex-Student Association, being named Ex-Student of the year at the homecoming several years ago.

Nice Rainfall
Last Sunday**

Santa Anna received a good rain Sunday afternoon when a hard shower fell about mid-afternoon. The official measurement was two inches, at the gauge in the east part of town. Unofficial measurements had as much as 2.6 inches.

The rain did not extend very far in any direction, with only a trace of moisture noted a few miles south of town. Coleman had one inch or more.

Another light shower fell in town Friday afternoon which measured .20 inch.

June rainfall in Santa Anna was an official one inch, giving the six month total of 12.35 inches. The six-month total in 1972 was only 8.85 inches, and the 1971 amount was a meager four inches for the first six months of the year.

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ASCS NEWS

Coleman County farmers who have certified compliance with 1973 farm program requirements are reminded to continue to carry out their commitment for the remainder of the year.

Rankin McIver, Chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) County Committee, says that ninety-nine per cent of the farmers in Coleman County had certified compliance with this year's farm program by the July 2 deadline. Certification amounts to a pledge by the farmer as to his program acreage, his acreage set aside from production, if any, and that he has complied with all program provisions.

Rankin pointed out that following certification, certain farms are picked at random for a spot check of program acreages. The accuracy of the certification is determined by comparing actual acreages with those certified by the producer. Mr. McIver warned that producers found out of compliance could lose all or part of their program payment. Spot checks will continue throughout the remainder of the year.

Reports compiled from other areas indicated that some producers have failed to meet the minimum size and shape requirements of set-aside acreage, and are subject to loss of payments. Rankin said. Generally, a set-aside area which is less than an entire field must be at least five acres in size, with a minimum width of 132 feet.

He also reminded producers who graze or hay set-aside acreage that they must notify the county ASCS office.

If a producer feels he does not understand the rules for set-aside acreage or other program provisions, he should contact the county ASCS office immediately.

Three fourths of all program drafts have been mailed to producers who have complied with the program. The remaining checks will be written in the county office. The computer failed to record a number of transfer cotton allotments and producers who decided to graze.

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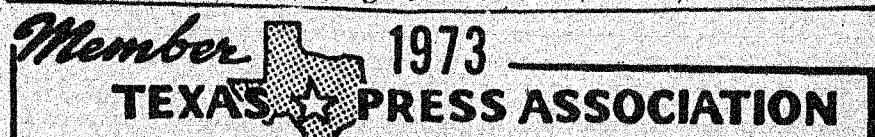
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In Our Opinion

AFTER SO LONG A TIME we have a new director of the FBI. And if all indications prove true, he should be of similar caliber of J. Edgar Hoover.

Clarence M. Kelley is a veteran law officer and has been police chief in Kansas City for about 12 years. He has a reputation of vigorous enforcement of the law, but with a fairness and equality for all. That is the kind of man we need to head the nations largest law enforcement body.

One thing that impresses us about Kelley is that he promises that there will be no politics and no favoritism shown in his department. That is the way he should be.

This country went for many years with the FBI under the direction of a man who was above political pressures. J. Edgar Hoover made it plain to all that he showed no difference in people or political parties. It is our belief that he lived up to that reputation.

Kelley has the same reputation, and it is our hope that he, too, will live up to it.

The country has seen some highs and lows as far as law and order are concerned. There is much that the FBI can do to suppress the outbreaks of lawlessness that have been seen in recent years. Of course, they are hampered when it comes to crimes that do not come under federal jurisdiction. That is not a fault of the department, but of the law. Some crimes are in the jurisdiction of the states and unless federal law is broken in some way, the FBI cannot enter the case.

That has advantages and disadvantages. In countries where the federal law enforcement agencies has full power, there is always the possibility of a police state if those in power want it.

None of us in this country would be interested in having a federal policeman wake us in the middle of the night and take us off to jail. That is what has happened in Germany and some other countries where the federal police had the power to do so.

That is why, with all its difficulties, this is still the greatest country in the world. No one tells us what to say, what to think, nor what to do as long as we stay within the laws of the land.

We are happy with our new chief, and hope that he proves to be just as good as he seems.

Coleman County Oil Industry Is Significant

The petroleum industry in Coleman County played a significant role in 1972 in helping to satisfy the unprecedented demand for Texas crude oil and natural gas.

Coleman was one of 190 of Texas' 254 counties which produced oil and gas valued in excess of \$100,000 in a record production year for the state's No. 1 industry, according to figures compiled by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

The county ranked 140th in the state in the value of petroleum produced, \$3.4 million. The sale of crude oil brought \$2.5 million; natural gas, \$861,000.

But despite this record year, due in large part to nine months of production at 100-percent of the maximum efficient rate, the nation's largest producer of petroleum could not produce enough to satisfy demand.

"To further stimulate production, we need a restoration of the open market force," said Robert A. Buschman of San Antonio, president of the Association.

"This would produce two much-needed effects; First, it would channel the state's petroleum products to the most efficient and highest priority uses; second, it would help provide part of the capital needed so desperately to build refineries and superports and to carry on expensive exploration and production activities," Buschman added.

This study by the Association also shows that production last year in Coleman County resulted in the payment of \$416,000 to royalty owners.

The state of Texas received \$178,000 in production taxes from county wells; \$114,000 on crude oil output and \$64,000 from natural gas production.

Oil and gas producers and developers spend \$1.3 million drilling 48 wells in the county last year, with \$321,000 of that figure lost in 19 dry holes.

According to the Texas Employment Commission, 94 oil and gas industry employees worked in the county in 1972 and shared a payroll of \$474,000.

Accent on Health

Each year approximately 200 children die and several thousand others are crippled by a disease most of us know little about. The disease? Lead poisoning.

Its victims may suffer blindness, cerebral palsy, kidney disease, mental retardation and other permanent brain damage, say state health officials.

Some 400,000 children are poisoned annually in this country by repeated intakes of lead-based paints, with 4,000 of this number receiving permanent damage. The tragedy of this silent, man-made threat is that it is preventable.

While most instances of lead poisoning in children is traceable to flaking paint on old houses, other sources also are suspect. These include automobile exhausts, innocent-looking

playthings, and lead-glazed ceramic ware.

Americans are beginning to realize the potential danger that lies hidden in lead-based paint—an unforeseen legacy from pre-World War II days. Even after the war, many paints were pigmented with durable white lead. Even though manufacturers of paint now must meet stringent regulations for indoor paints, millions of children throughout the United States still are exposed to existing toxic paint—in addition to the cloud of lead-laden exhaust fumes covering many cities and metropolitan areas. Research is underway now to determine the defects of automobile exhaust fumes on city dwellers.

Lead poisoning occurs when children eat the sweet-tasting

chips and flakes of lead-based paint from the walls and other surfaces of old houses. Most of the victims are between ages of one and six years.

The first nationwide survey of blood lead levels in children indicates that almost any city with decaying housing has youngsters in danger of lead poisoning. Investigators found high blood levels of lead in 85 percent of the communities tested. Studies indicate that 10 to 25 per cent of children in high-risk areas have blood levels indicating they are eating paint and absorbing dangerous amounts of lead. However, only two or three per cent actually display symptoms.

Experts say children eat paint chips because it has a sweet taste with a sort of alcoholic aftertaste. But even if paint had a bad taste, children probably would eat paint chips for their crunchiness, say health experts.

An underlying reason for eating chips of leaded paint—and such things as paper, cigarette butts, crayons, matches and clay—may be that children have "pica". Pica is a little understood but compulsive urge to eat strange things even when a person is not hungry.

Lead poisoning can be

prevented. Parents and others living in homes where leaded paint may be a problem should be warned of the dangers. Children should be prevented from chewing on painted articles or picking up chips from the floor.

Mass education and information is being focused primarily on residents in deteriorating housing—such as ghetto areas. Although lead poisoning isn't limited to poor people, they are most likely to be living in such buildings. But even better-quality homes may have been painted with lead-based paints. Also important is the

matter of toys and atmospheric lead from pollution.

Public health nurses, sanitarians, parents and others need to be on the lookout for early symptoms of lead absorption. These vague symptoms include irritability, poor appetite and chronic constipation. While symptomatic of other problems as well, these are indications that medical advice should be sought.

Is there hope for a lead-poisoned child? Yes say state health officials if the malady is detected soon enough. Laboratory analyses of blood and urine can detect lead's presence. Another ingenious method of finding lead—by a process called spectrophotometry—is in a snippet of the victim's hair.

Lead poisoning can cause severe handicaps and be a costly malady. Health authorities estimate that a moderately brain-damaged child needs about 10 years of special education and care at a cost of \$1,750 per year—or \$5.6 million for 3,200 of the children who are annually afflicted by lead poisoning. The other 800 children permanently damaged require life-time, institutional care costing some \$4,000 per year—or \$3.2 million during their life spans.

Often the symptoms of lead poisoning go completely unnoticed. But lead, like other metals, accumulates in the body. State health authorities estimate that it takes only two or three paint chips little bigger than a fingernail, chewed daily over a period of some three months, to cause severe illness.

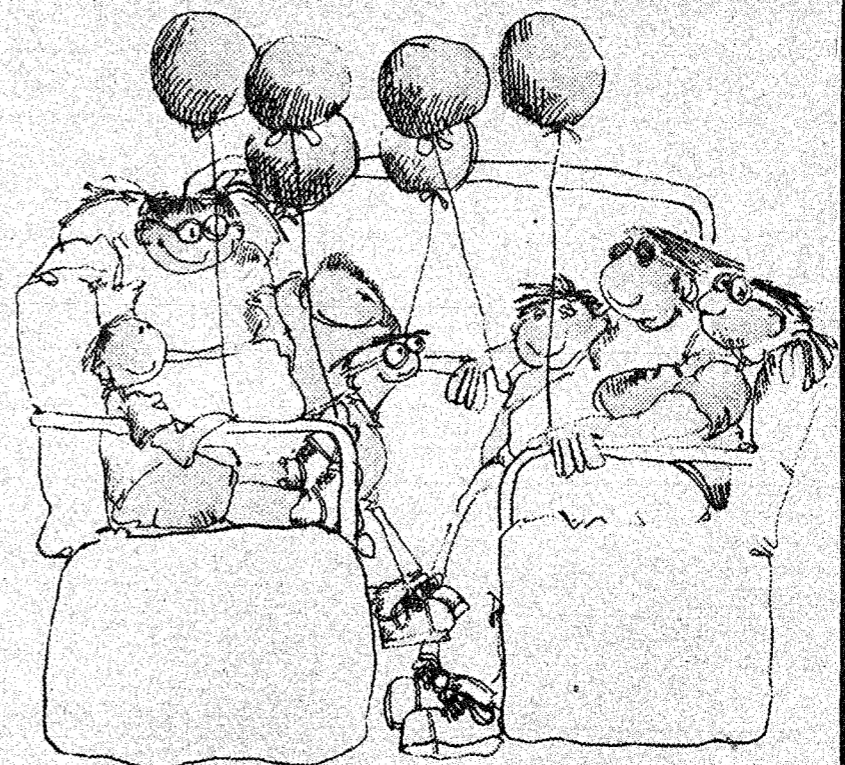

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STATE Capital NEWS

By BILL BOYKIN

AUSTIN — Annual public hearings to determine auto insurance rates were held here this week (July 10) amid predictions that premiums will drop again this year.

Insurance Board Chairman Joe Christie expressed hope that evidence will bring a reduction for insurance buyers in most of Texas' 40 statistical rating territories.

This year's hearing was conducted against a backdrop of new legislation and a price freeze which applies to insurance as well as the usual review of accident frequency, claim cost and inflationary factors.

Laws which must be considered are comparative negligence, repeal of the guest statute, personal injury protection and the new deviation or competitive rating plan.

Texas Safety Association will also ask additional credit for persons completing the defensive driving course. Board rules now allow a 10 per cent reduction in auto insurance rates for those certified as having taken the course.

Meanwhile, House Insurance Committee Chairman Rep. Ben Bynum of Amarillo predicted the average premium will drop 10 to 15 per cent when new rates are set this fall.

Competitive rates may mean drops of as much as 20 to 30 per cent for drivers with good safety records, Bynum said.

"Nobody can definitely state what the final rates will be until the statistics and the impact of new insurance laws are weighed in detail after the hearing," said Christie.

REVISION SCHEDULE SET — The Constitutional Revision Commission will meet here July 27-29 to review policy presentations of its seven standing committees on specific areas.

Commission members will hold briefings for the press during the three-day meeting. Members of the Texas Press Association and Texas Association of Broadcasters will meet with commission members on Friday, July 27.

Commission action on the committee reports will be taken September 6-8 and 13-15.

Consideration of the final document is slated for meetings September 20-22 and 27-29, and the presentation, together with supporting reports, November 1, followed by briefing of legislators in December.

Commission members bogged down at a recent meeting here on adoption of basic guidelines for their mission and postponed consideration of a statement of principles until their July 27-29 meeting.

Instead, they agreed tentatively to write a "revised" constitution — the minimum assignment of voters last November 7 when they directed wheels be set in motion toward overhauling basic state laws. Two members thought even that non-specific commitment was

premature. House and Senate committees, meanwhile, have been named to make preliminary plans for the January-May constitutional convention, draft rules and agree on procedures.

14 MORE GAS SUITS FILED — Atty. Gen. John Hill has filed 14 more suits to recover full market value of royalty gas produced from state lands. The first such suit was filed May 18 against Exxon Corporation.

The state contends it is not limited by long term contracts, nor to any regulated ceiling prices promulgated by the Federal Power Commission.

Defendants, according to state allegations, are selling gas at about 20 cents per 1,000 cubic feet, or less, while the market value is around 45 cents per 1,000 cubic feet.

Suits now filed cover about 80 per cent of all lease contracts involving gas royalties, Hill said.

COURTS SPEAK A four-year prison term assessed Amarillo former State Rep. Walter Knapp for using \$1,200 worth of state-issued postage stamps to buy a used pick-up truck was affirmed by the Court of Criminal Appeals, on a three-to-two split vote.

The same court reversed and remanded conviction and 20-year sentence of a Mineral Wells man for alleged delivery of heroin because of testimony concerning beatings by police officers.

AG OPINIONS — Law requiring finance reports by House speakership candidates is clear as to who may and may not contribute, the amounts, extent of expenditures allowed and other matters, Attorney General Hill held.

Department of Public Safety, Hill said in another opinion, is governed by statute which requires certification of accuracy of seller's invoice in purchases through the State Board of Control. Other purchases requiring disbursement by the comptroller form the operator's and chauffeur's license fund must be accompanied by the vendor's certification of the invoice's

accuracy in the usual manner, Hill continued.

APPOINTMENTS — In a major reshuffling, Gov. Dolph Briscoe appointed William T. Keenan of Houston executive director of the Governor's Committee On Aging, replacing Mrs. Carter Clopton of Austin.

Briscoe, at the same time, named Alton O. Bower of Austin chairman of the Committee of Aging.

Other recent appointments by the Governor include:

J.R. Taylor of Amarillo and John Biggs of Vernon to the Animal Health Commission.

Dr. Margaret Cigarroa of Laredo to the Board of Mental Health and Mental Retardation.

Dr. Richard Hooker of Austin as gubernatorial school finance advisor.

J.R. Porter of Dallas to Texas Mass Transportation Commission.

ROAD CONTRACT LETTING OFF — Monthly state highway contract lettings scheduled July 24-25 for 18 projects costing about \$22 million were cancelled due to failure of Congress to approve a federal aid bill.

Texas Highway Engineer Bill DeBerry said the state had no alternative. Highway aid bills have been tied up in conference committee after the U. S. Senate and House passed different versions. Dispute is largely over diversion of highway trust fund revenues to urban mass transit.

The Highway Department in recent months has been financing all highway construction with state funds under an interim congressional action calling for reimbursement at a later date when the congressional bill is passed.

Better Eating Promised By Current Research

Tomorrow's consumer will probably find his beef more tender and his pork a lot leaner as the result of animal technology now being developed.

Research is currently being centered on crossbreeding and other genetic modifications to improve the cutability and feed conversion in beef cattle.

And breakthroughs already are being made with selective crossbreeding in hogs to produce pork with a lower fat content. In the past 25 years, the amount of fat on a hog carcass has been cut by 15 to 20 pounds. Further reductions are expected between now and 1985 as technological improvements continue to be made in every aspect of American agriculture.
