It is hoped that nearly everyone in the community will take part in some way in the project.

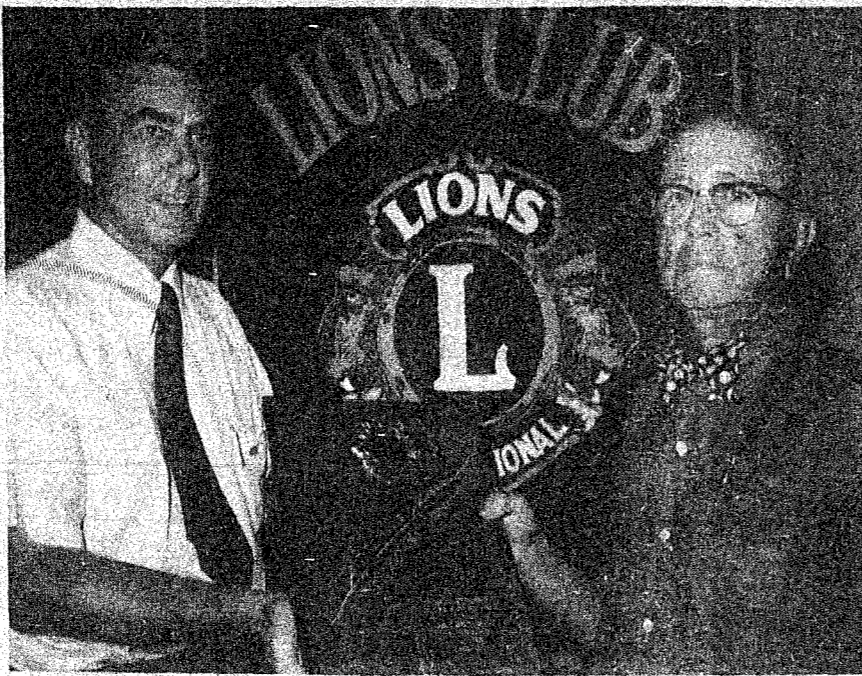
VACATION HERE

A two-vehicle collision last Thursday night in Santa Anna took the life of a Santa Anna man, James Vernon (Buddy) Campbell who was pronounced dead on arrival at 11:15 p.m. at the Coleman hospital following the accident.

According to investigating officers, the automobile which the young man was driving collided with the back of a truck at the Coleman-Rockwood highway intersection as the truck was preparing to make a turn onto the Rockwood highway. Campbell was alone in his car, and no one was injured in the other vehicle.

Funeral services for the young man were held at the First Baptist Church Monday, July 16, at 4:30 p.m. Burial was in the Santa Anna Cemetery under the direction of Henderson Funeral Home. The funeral was held on the young man's 24th birthday.

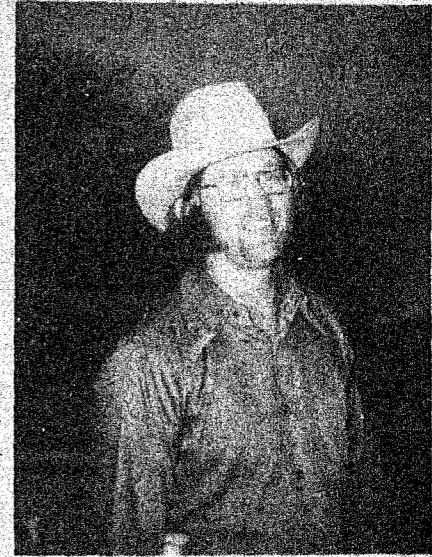

Unusual Hand-Carved Chair Enjoyed By Santa Anna Woman

The Grandmother's chair belonging to Hannah Collins isn't antique but a very rare chair.

When the four grandchildren in San Francisco, whom she had raised, began thinking of something for her birthday last year, they thought a special chair would be just right. Someone suggested a little old man on a lonely street in the Bay area who did fancy hand carving, he was an Italian and had only made two of these chairs in America and agreed to make one for them.

Seems he had gotten inspiration for these chairs from the grandfather's chair story by Nathaniel Hawthorne. You may recall the chair was made of an oak tree which grew in the Park of the English Earl of Lincoln centuries ago. When his daughter, the Lady Arabelle, married a certain Mr. Johnson, he gave her the chair, as they agreed with the Puritans in their religious opinions they left England April 1630 for America, landing at Salem in the month of June, bringing the chair with them.

Mrs. Collins chair is wood—probably California Redwood—the back headboard has her name carved on it and the names of the grandchildren, Sonnie (Roger Collins), Donnie (Donald Oliver Collins), Robbie Burk and Barbara Nell Mitchell. The ten small rounds composing the back fan out to the floor and the rockers are of very unusual shape. The grandson upholstered the arms with green crushed velvet, adding pockets on the side for her sewing, books, papers and snuff bottle.

Hannah was born July 26 1890 at Kosse, Tex. and married William Wallace Collins February 29 1907 in Madison Co. They are parents of eight children. She is a member of the New Hope Baptist Church and lives with her

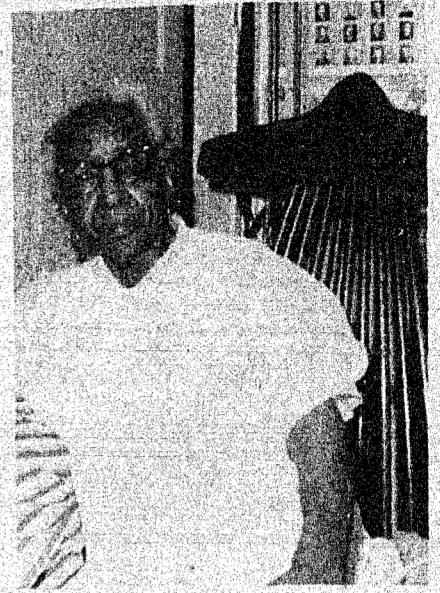

In Our Opinion

ACCORDING TO A recent Gallup Poll, Edward Kennedy is the most popular possible candidate in the Democratic party for 1976.

We don't know where they got their information, but we will bet it wasn't from Texas.

To begin with, we will predict that should the Democrats nominate Kennedy for 1976, there will be another four years of Republican administration, despite Watergate or what have you. No doubt he is popular with the ultra-liberal element of the party and no doubt they have pretty well taken over in the Democratic administration, but people have stopped worrying about party lines any more.

One thing, people still remember Chappaquiddick even if it was four years ago. Most believe that there was far more to that incident than ever came out, and Americans wouldn't be interested in "moralizing" about Watergate from someone involved in that coverup.

The Senator from Massachusetts made some overtures to the South when he appeared, along with Gov. George Wallace on a program in Decatur, Ala. this month. However, he wasn't received with much enthusiasm and the mail sent the Alabama Governor since that time has been mostly critical of Kennedy.

Many politicians believe that there will be pressure for new faces in both parties for the '76 campaign, as a result of both Watergate and the Chappaquiddick incident.

The problem, of course, is selecting someone who could merit the public trust, and is also well enough known to carry votes from an ill-informed public.

We believe that the vast majority of voters are influenced by publicity from the news media, and a lot of that is either slanted or incomplete. It is just a normal reaction for a writer to slip in his views regardless of his effort to be objective in his reporting. He will leave something out that might be detrimental to one he supports, but will tell all the good things.

It is the same reaction this writer gets from his readers. Those who agree with our views think the editorials are good, but those who disagree will be the first to admit that we can't write worth a hoot.

But we are grateful that we live in a country where opposing views can be written, voiced, and published without any fear of governmental interference.

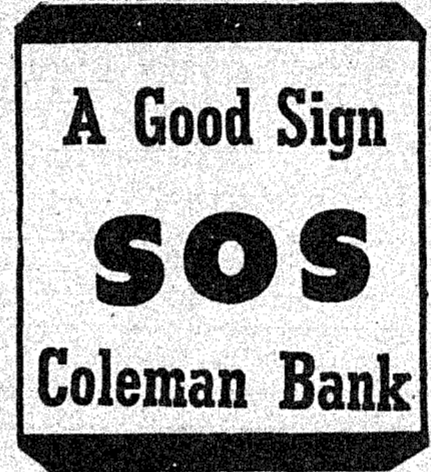

We expect to receive program checks for farmers some time during the month of July. The 1973 estimated wheat certificate rate is sixty-eight cents per bushel. This is seventy-five percent of the difference between the estimated five month average wheat price of \$2.40 per bushel and July projected parity of \$3.30 per bushel. The sixty-eight cent pay rate is used in making 1973 preliminary wheat set aside payments.

Beginning in July the County Committee will meet only twice a month. Their meeting dates will be the first and third Wednesday of each month. They will meet for one half day beginning at one o'clock P.M. Producers wishing to see the County Committee are requested to arrange for their meeting with the Committee accordingly.

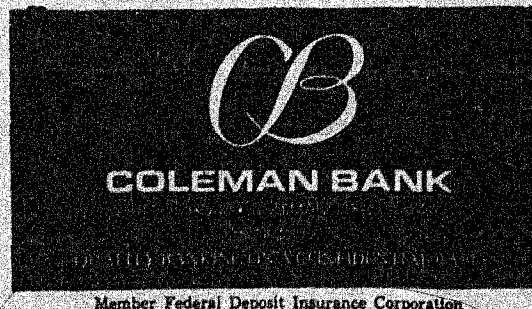
