S-Anna Native Named to Head Dallas VFW Post

A Santa Anna native, Robert Edmond Perry, was recently elected as Commander of the coming year of Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 7471 in Dallas.

Commander-elect Perry is a life member of V. F. W. Love Field Memorial Post 7471 and has served his Post as Junior Vice-Commander, Senior Vice-Commander, House Committee Chairman and as Building Committee Chairman. As of V.F.W. tradition he was Chairman of Community Activities during his year as Post Junior Vice-Commander and was leader in organizing and presenting both Loyalty day and Memorial Day programs which were very successful and acclaimed to be some of the best programs of their kind in all of V.F.W. Department of Texas.

Perry is a four-generation Texan who was born in Santa Anna in March 1923 and grew up in the Leedy Community south of town. He will be remembered by some as a class-mate who attended the first seven years of school at the old Leedy School.

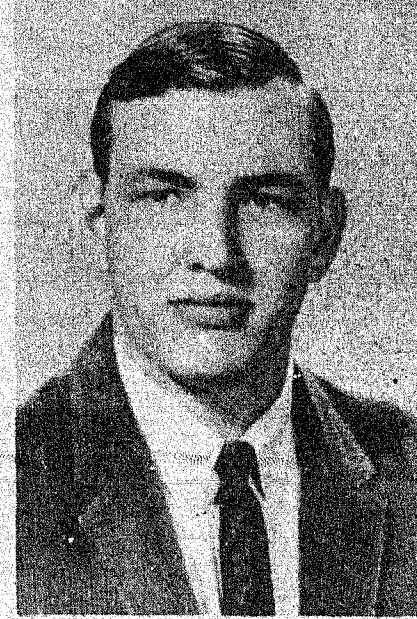
He also attended Santa Anna High School.

Perry enlisted in the U.S. Navy in April 1943 and served aboard the Aircraft Carrier U. S. S. SUWANNEE as an Aircrewman with Aircraft Squadron VC 60 in the Pacific War Theater during 1943 and 1944. During this wartime tour of sea duty the U.S.S. SUWANNEE participated in nine major engagements from Tarawa Island to the Philippines. Being under enemy attack many times with only minor damages, luck finally ran out and the SUWANNEE was severely damaged by enemy bombs and suicide planes during the Battle of Leyte Gulf in October 1944. Perry was severely wounded.

Coaches, Commercial Teacher Selected for Santa Anna Faculty

Three new faculty members have been named this week for Santa Anna High School. A head coach, assistant coach and commercial teacher have been hired by the board of Trustees for the coming year.

Swim Classes Now Underway For S.A. Kids

The annual "Learn to Swim" program started Monday morning for Santa Anna children. There were 32 children enrolled the first day of classes.

Children and their sponsors are going by bus to the Coleman pool each weekday for the sessions. Classes are from 9: to 10:45 a. m.

The bus leaves the school campus at 8:45 each morning and returns by about 11:15. The cost is 25 cents a day which includes both instruction and transportation.

Children are divided into two groups, non-swimmers and beginners. Two certified lifeguards, Debbie Bowker and Carol Kingsbery are instructing one group, and Sandra Fitzpartick and Belinda Aldridge are instructing the other group. Linda Pearce will also assist with the instruction when needed.

Children from seven through 12 are invited to attend the classes and may join the group at any time. There is no class for advanced swimmers, so those who swim well should not attend.

Classes will continue each weekday through July 13, except for Wednesday, July 4.

Turkey Farm, Sheep Raisers Suffer Losses

Poultry and livestock owners surrounding Santa Anna have been having problems with dogs killing their animals in recent weeks. The greatest loss has been 1000 turkeys at the Isenhower Turkey Farm just south of town.

Estimated at over \$1,000, the turkeys were killed on five nights.

Four fat lambs belonging to Sharon McCreary were killed at the M. L. Guthrie farm last week.

The Guthrie place borders the turkey farm. Two larger lambs were hurt by the dogs but are expected to recover.

Other losses in the same vicinity have been three sheep belonging to Mrs. Nap Watson which were attacked in a high-fenced pen. Seven other sheep were severely chewed and may have to be destroyed. Other people in town have also had turkeys and chickens killed by dogs.

Last spring several sheep raisers near town had high losses from marauding dogs.

Some citizens are suggesting stricter dog ordinances requiring dogs to be penned or on a leash at all times. Dogs are currently allowed to run loose if properly vaccinated and tagged.

Immunizations Available Here At No Charge

Free immunizations will be given local children at the Mountain City Day Care Center on Friday, July 6. This is the second time the free inoculations have been offered to Santa Anna and area children.

A registered nurse will be on hand from 4 to 6 p. m. that day to give immunizations for DPT (diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus), measles, and rubella.

Parents interested in getting the free immunizations for their children should have them at the center that afternoon.

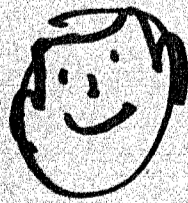

ASCS NEWS

Coleman County farmers are reminded they should report immediately any critical farm fuel shortage to the ASCS county office. Joe K. Taylor, executive director of the Coleman Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office, reports that in addition to using fuel conserving methods in their farming operations, farmers have also been asked to report critical fuel shortages to ASCS.

Taylor said that if a fuel supply problem cannot be resolved locally or at the state level, the shortage will be reported immediately to Washington, D.C., where it will be brought to the attention of the Office of Oil and Gas (OOG), U. S. Department of Interior. The OOG OPERATES Under the Authority of the fuel

If any farmer cannot obtain fuel needed for his farm operations, he should make this fact known to ASCS. Farmers should do everything they can to obtain supplies before requesting assistance. Farmers should not buy more fuel than they need for the near future, as equitable distribution is necessary if all farmers are to have enough fuel through harvest.

Some suppliers have not been able to meet farm customers' needs fully, partly because independent and cooperative fuel producers and marketers have not been able to obtain enough supplies.

The national concern over fuel is based on two problems: supply and distribution. Demand for fuel has increased steadily while supply has not. And, some areas are near the end of major

petroleum distribution systems, making equitable distribution difficult.

A primary reason for the fuel problem in farming areas is the greater need for farm products. The country's farmers have been encouraged to plant about forty million additional acres of food and feed crops this year.

The gasoline supply and demand situation was cited as an example. Gasoline demand has risen at an annual rate of about six percent during the past two years, while crude oil processing has risen only three percent annually. We use nationally an average of forty seven million barrels of gasoline weekly, while we produce only forty-three million barrels.

Both state and federal agencies have been working on the problem and several actions have been taken to increase supplies. In the meantime, ASCS will offer the critical shortage reporting

service for farmers as long as it is needed.

ASCS is handling this monitoring service for all farmers in the county regardless of race, color, religion, sex or national origin.

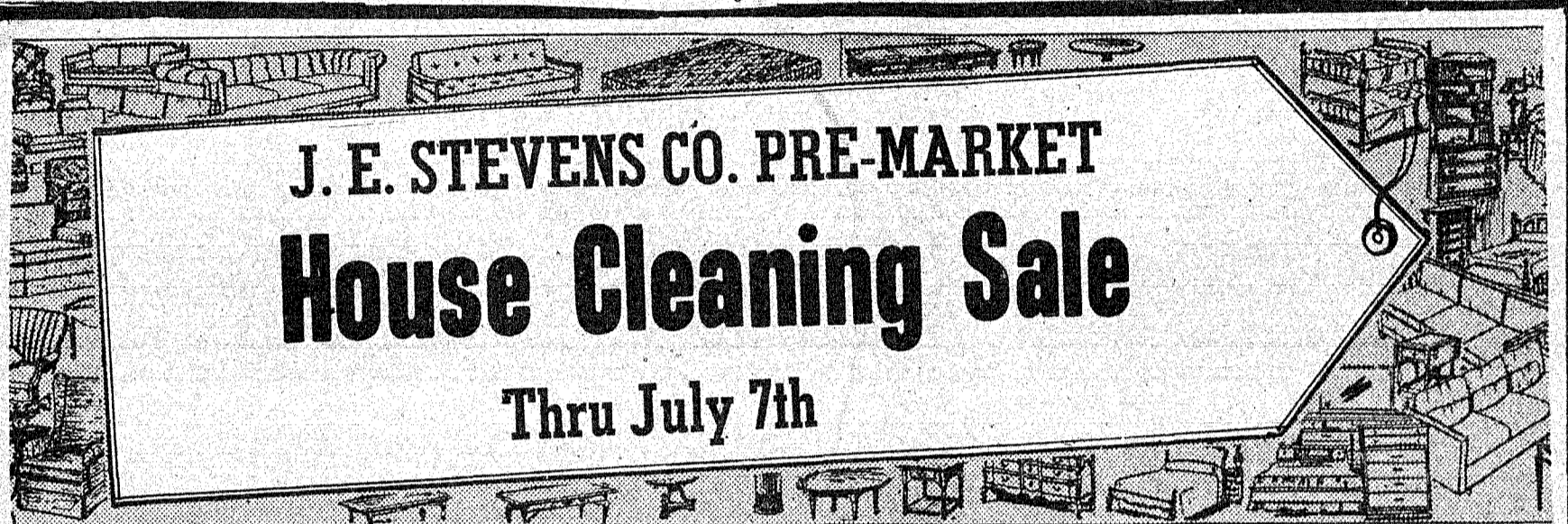
S-Annan's Kin Funeral Held Last Thursday

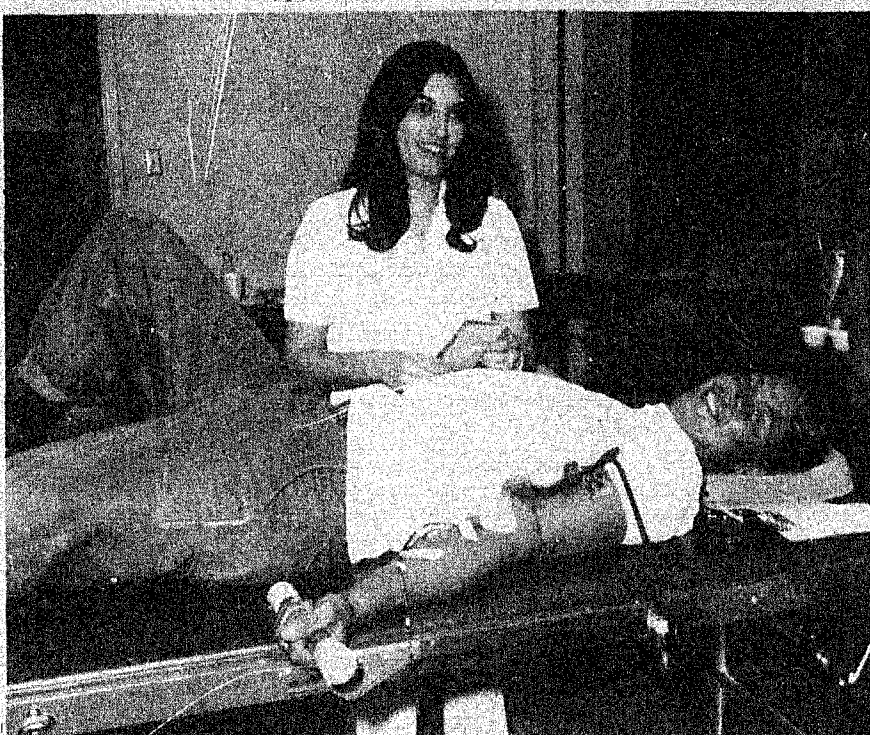
