Grain Harvest Now Underway In Community

Grain harvesting got underway in our area this week, and two grain elevators are now operating in Santa Anna.

The Continental Grain Elevator oprated by Jack Dockery andsons and the former Santa Anna Co-op Elevator operating under the name of Central Texas Grain Forwarding Co. both opened Monday.

At the Continental elevator the first grain was oats from the Arthur Casy farm in the Red Bank community. The oats were heavy and themoisture content good.

John Dockery reported that theyeild should be better than earlier anticipated, and the harvest will possibly be better than last year.

Doyle Evans had the first oats brought into the Cen Tex elevator, and the first sample tested 40 pounds per bushel. Wheat from Hilburn Henderson's farm tested 61 pounds.

Grain prices are higher than last year and farmers are pleased with prospects for the harvest.

Some farmers cut and baled their oats for winter feed insteadof combining.

THE TEXAS LEGISLATURE ended its session Monday night at midnight after ignoring the long Memorial Day holiday and working almost around the clock to try to finish all it was supposed to do.

It is a funny thing but it seems the Texas House and Senate never get in a hurry until the session is almost over, then they have to work day and night trying to get something accomplished.

A lot of people are like that. We procrastinate until evening. Sunday the Wilie the deadline nears and then have to push ourselves to the limit to try to finish our job.

The Ethics bill finally got passed, however it was disappointing to some and surprising to others. It ended up stronger than many people felt it would, but not as strong as some would have liked. At least it is a start in the right direction. One who enters politics automatically subjects his life to public scrutiny.

A big argument arose on the school financing bill that resulted in its death for this session. Some Ethel Johnson and Sherrie argued that it did nothing to solve the problem of equality for school districts and proponents claimed it was a step in the right direction. It ended up in a 70-70 tie in the house and Speaker Price Daniel, Jr., after some deliberation delcared the bill failed to pass. The Senate had passed the bill.

> Both houses passed a compromise drug bill which would reduce the penalties for possession of marijuana in less than four ounces to a misdemeanor.

> Most of us are ready to criticize our state legislative bodies at the drop of a hat, and no doubt they deserve some criticism, but most of us don't realize the pressure they are under in legislative session. They are hit from every angle on about every bill that comes up, and it would take a genius to make the right decision on every one.

> As long as they vote like we want them to, they are doing a greta job, but if they disagree with us, they are stupid. That is human nature, we suppose, but we must remember that every question has two sides, and we are not altogether infallible. It is not very hard, usually, to find some place of agreement among a small group, but when you get as many together as we have in the legislature, then that is something else. Sometimes we decide that a question has more than two sides.






