Heads Company Opening Here June 1

Manufacturing Firm To Open In Santa Anna in Early June

A newly-organized company for the manufacture of portable hunting blinds has been announced by Dennis Harris, president of the enterprise.

Maranatha Industries, Inc., will open its first plant in Santa Anna on June 1. Immediate expansion plans are to have a work force of 30 employees and a yearly capacity of 50,000 blinds. Tim Harris will serve as vice-president and plant manager.

"Eventually we hope to add other related hunting gear to the production line," Harris said.

A second plant is being planned to be located in Brownwood. A national marketing campaign is also being readied.

Unique among corporations is that nine of the 11 board members are sports-minded ministers who are pastoring churches in Texas. Profits from the corporation will go to finance the coast-to-coast religious crusades of the Dennis Harris Evangelistic Association.

The current Maranatha models include a blind to accommodate two or four hunters. The smaller model is designed to accommodate a single hunter.

The blinds are made of camouflaged heavy-duty nylon.

The larger blind weighs 11 pounds and folds into a backpack.

Representatives of the company have been interviewing and employing workers for several weeks and will be conducting interviews this weekend at the Mountain City Center. Work has also started on the plant location at the former Corner Drug building downtown.

A total of 421 voters appeared at the polls in Santa Anna Saturday for the Democratic primary election. All contests were decided on the local Democratic ticket except County Judge which will place Pete Skelton and Charlie Hunter in the run-off election on June 1.

Santa Anna voters followed the trend in all the state contests with the gambling referendum being defeated here 230 to 120.

In the local races, incumbent Jake McCreary, commissioner, and Ben J. Garrett, justice of the peace, were unopposed. Other total local results are as follows:

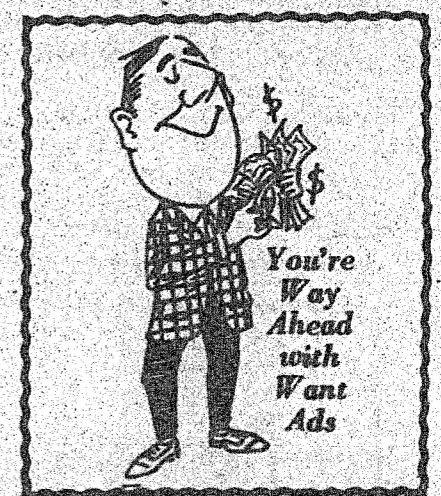
DISTRICT CLERK: Louise Thompson- 153; G. A. Hensley- 250.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Lyndell Williams

AUSTIN, Tex. — With the primary elections out of the way, the race for House Speaker is getting hotter by the day.

At least three candidates for the speakership claimed legislative races May 4 turned out in their favor, and they are now in the lead.

One, Rep. Fred Head of Troup, contended he already has the speakership won with 80 votes. During the last week, he released names of 19 representatives backing him.

Rep. Carl Parker of Port Arthur laid claim to having gained seven votes in the primaries — enough to give him a total of about 55.

Rep. Bill Clayton said his pickup in the primaries "clearly established" him as the leader.

Rep. David Finney of Fort Worth hit all the claims as "phony bandwagon publicity," and urged support of his candidacy as a modern compromise.

Rep. Jim Nugent of Kerrville said he doubts outcome of the first primary appreciably changed the order of the candidates, and he maintained the race remains wide open.

The big four candidates — Head, Parker, Clayton and Finney — already have received more than \$100,000 in contributions and spent about \$62,000 on their campaigns.

Head raised and spent the most, \$38,875 in contributions and \$32,045 in expenditures. Clayton is second with \$30,000 in donations and \$10,208 in expenditures. Parker has raised about \$20,000 and spent about \$10,000. Finney \$13,000 and \$10,000.

INCUMBENTS FAVORED — The May 4 Democratic primary was a great day for incumbents.

Not only did Gov. Dolph Briscoe win a landslide victory over Frances "Sissy" Farenthold (by nearly 70 per cent of the disappointingly-light vote of 1.5 million), but there were no upsets of any officials in statewide or congressional primaries.

Further, only three state representatives and a single state senator were defeated in 77 House and eight Senate contests.

Republicans will make their most-determined statewide bids in the governor's race, with Dr. Jim Granberry, 41, of Lubbock as the nominee. Ex-Prisoner of War Nick Rowe is the GOP nominee for comptroller who will take on Democrat Bob Bullock.

CRIME FIGHT PLANNED — Gov. Briscoe announced a public information campaign to draw neighborhoods together to prevent burglary and other crimes.

The project is part of a continuing crime prevention program in Abilene, Amarillo, Beaumont, Corpus Christi, Odessa and Waco.

Goal of the pilot program is to reduce incidence of burglary by 18 per cent in each of six participating cities.

Publicity used in the campaign suggests that police crime-prevention specialists be invited into citizen's homes to demonstrate crime-prevention techniques and teach them to recognize potential criminal activities and report them to police. Texas ranks second in the nation in the number of trained crime

prevention officers, with 57 graduates of the National Crime Prevention Institute.

About 220 officers will be trained in new preventive techniques about the end of the summer.

COURTS SPEAK — The State Supreme Court turned down a damage suit arising from the electrocution death of a Navarro High School football coach during goal post raising.

The Supreme Court directed a Wichita County company which does not do engineering work to stop using "engineering" in its firm name.

A mother is entitled to collect on death insurance policies covering her son who drowned in a bathtub after an epileptic seizure, the high court held.

A paint fume sniffer didn't violate terms of probation in a theft conviction, the Court of Criminal Appeals held.

APPOINTMENTS — Cloyd D. Young of Dallas was appointed to the board of regents of East Texas State University, succeeding the late E.G. Pharr of Lubbock. Briscoe appointed Kenneth Decker of Austin

and reappointed Dr. Bobby Gene Smith of Arlington to the Crime and Narcotics Advisory Commission.

B. L. Parker of Bastrop has been named chairman of the arrangements committee for the Texas delegation to the national Democratic mini-convention in Kansas City, Missouri, next December.

State Rep. Pike Powers of Beaumont has been picked as president-elect of the Texas Junior Bar.



CONGRESSMAN POAGE THANKS VOTERS — NOT INVOLVED WITH HEARNE CHECK

TO MY FRIENDS OF THE 11TH CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT:

For the 20th time I am privileged to thank you for your loyal support which has enabled me to represent you so long. For this support and confidence I have always been appreciative. You have honored me, I hope that I can serve you creditably.

In view of the effort of my recent opponent to insinuate that I was connected with the unhappy situation involving City of Hearne finances, I am especially grateful to the friends (more than 80 percent of the voters) who have reaffirmed their confidence in me. Your confidence means much more to me than votes in an election. It means the maintenance of the respect for which I have worked my entire life. Naturally I have resented the slurs and suggestions (never quite emerging as clear cut charges) that have been directed against me. I felt they should be answered but I did not want anyone to feel that I was discussing these charges from a political angle. The election is now over, and I hope I can speak without being misunderstood.

The newspapers and other media have, of course, given substantial publicity to these charges. This was but proper news reporting, and I have no criticism or resentment. The media has tried to be fair. I only hope they will consider the statements of all of the responsible officials who had any connection with this transaction to be as important and as newsworthy as the statement of the bookkeeper in the Hearne City Office who stated that while she had no personal knowledge, she had been told that the check in question had gone to a congressman. I believe that in the present state of the record, this is the only shred of evidence that in any way attempts to connect me with this unfortunate situation. Let me, therefore, outline the events and the public statements of those who might know if I were connected.

On February 28th, a representative of TV Station KTRA in Houston called my Washington office and reported that he had learned there had been a check for \$12,000 issued to a non-existent engineering company by the City of Hearne sometime in 1971, that there was no supporting documentation and that it was reported that this money had gone to me or to my campaign account.

The gentleman from the TV station came to Washington and interviewed me the next day March 1st. He played a tape on which a bookkeeper in the City Office at Hearne stated that she had made out such a check and given it to a member of the City Council. She said that she... had been told... that the check had gone to a Congressman and that Congressman was W. R. Poage. She did not claim to have any personal knowledge to this effect. The tape also contained an interview with the then Mayor of Hearne, who refused to answer questions and stated that he "took the fifth."

The TV representative advised that after the recorded interview was completed, the Mayor said he supposed the money had gone to Congressman Poage because Hearne needed a lot of Federal help and Poage had gotten it for them.

When I was apprised of the charges, I contacted the Department of Justice, on March 2nd, and asked that the FBI make a complete investigation. Receipt of my request was acknowledged by letter of March 5th. I understand this investigation has been completed and a report is now moving through the various review points. Indeed, on April 18th, the Cameron Herald stated, "an agent of the FBI told the Herald that his office... had determined that there is no federal violation in this case." This statement means that the FBI found no involvement on my part because were a Congressman involved, there would be a federal violation.

I trust this report will be made public in the near future, but I don't believe it is necessary to await the report in view of the statements of the parties who have personal knowledge of the case.

On March 5th MAYOR repudiated the statement made by the bookkeeper and voluntarily sent me a wire stating that he had just been released from the hospital for a third heart attack and that while he was somewhat confused, the statement attributed to the bookkeeper was inaccurate. This was followed by a letter in which he denied that he told the bookkeeper that any money went to me and in which he expressed his apologies. The Bryan Eagle had, on March 2nd, quoted the Mayor as stating, "As far as I know, he (Poage) never received a nickle of the money."

The CITY COUNCILMAN, who allegedly took the check from the bookkeeper and deposited it in a Bryan bank, is quoted by the Cameron Herald of March 21st as saying, "... I don't think any of it went to Congressman Poage."

A few days later, an ATTORNEY in Hearne, who had returned the \$12,000 for a client whose name he was not privileged to divulge, indicated that he knew I did not get the money but, because of the confidential relationship with his client, he could not state who did get it. The Temple Telegram, on March 22nd, quoted this attorney, who is possibly the only person who knows who got the money as stating, "I think the investigation shows that none of the money was given to Bob Poage."

On March 28th, the local judicial process resulted in a number of indictments at Franklin. After hearing the Grand Jury proceedings, the DISTRICT ATTORNEY is quoted in the Killeen Herald of March 21st as stating, "There is no evidence to connect U. S. Representative W. R. (Bob) Poage of Waco with the \$12,000 taken from Hearne city funds."

Naturally, after 50 years of public service without a charge of dishonesty, this sort of thing is distressing, especially so since it is of such a nature that any irresponsible publicity seeker can make a charge, but I cannot refute the charge except to state my innocence. If the church in your community were burned tomorrow night and someone said he "heard" that you burned it, how would you prove you did not do so? I cannot say what happened at Hearne, because I know as little as you do about the check. I have furnished all the information requested by the authorities, and I am pleased that every party to this transaction, who might have personal knowledge of the truth or falsity of the charges, has stated that he knows of no connection on my part.

I am not a rich man in worldly goods, but throughout my entire life I have been rich in a good reputation and loyal friends, and I don't intend to allow anyone to take these from me, whether his acts are for political gain or simply for publicity. I have confidence in the people of Central Texas, and I intend to give them all the facts that they may judge this thing for themselves.

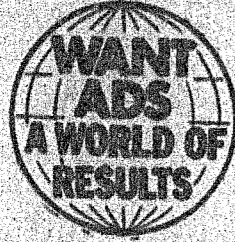

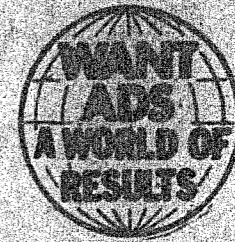
