Wright M. Price New Pastor For First Baptists

Rev. Wright M. Price has accepted the pastorate of the Santa Anna First Baptist Church effective June 3. He was elected to the position last Sunday morning after speaking at the morning worship service.

Rev. Price is currently serving as pastor at Flat, Texas near Gatesville. He has been pastor there for the past three years.

A native of Cameron, Price has been in the Baptist ministry for the past 11 years. Prior to that time he was in business in Tahoka and Hamilton, and for six years was an industrial arts teacher at the Mountain View State School for boys near Gatesville.

A former pilot in World War II, Price has attended school at Kilgore Junior College, Texas University and Criswell Bible Institute. He has the equivalent of a master of military science degree from Texas University. He has served two terms as trustee of the Heart of Texas Baptist Encampment at Lake Brownwood and has been a board member for the Tri-Rivers Association and a director of evangelism and stewardship for the Coryell Baptist Association. He has been taking post graduate work in pastoral counseling.

Rev. Price and his wife are the parents of five children, three daughters who are married and away from home, and two sons, Nathan, 18, and David, 5. Nathan will be a spring graduate of Gatesville High School and will enroll at Howard Payne College from which his three sisters have their degrees. Mrs. Price (Verna) is also a Cameron native. Dr. Joe McClain, professor of Bible at Howard Payne College, will continue as interim pastor until Rev. Price moves to Santa Anna.

Rainfall for the month of April amounted to 3.85 inches, according to Ray Owen, official rain reporter. The measurements were made in the official gauge in the east side of town.

Rainfall was recorded on six days, the greatest amount being 1.30 inches on Monday, April 23.

The April measurement brings the total for 1973 to 10.30 inches, well above the same four-month total for the past two years. The April total is also above any one-month total this year.

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In Our Opinion

CONSUMER BOYCOTS have never been very successful and they will not be so in their fight against meat prices. Instead of worrying about meat prices they will probably have to start worrying about meat at any price.

For this is still a free country and no one is going to force a farmer or rancher to raise a beef or hog if he can't make a profit out of it.

Recently Norman Fisher in his column in the Brownwood Bulletin, made a good comparison of the percentage that meat has increased in comparison to other products and services, and meat come out smelling like a rose.

For 20 years the cattle business has been, at best, a marginal proposition. This is a fact that few Americans understand because most of them have little knowledge of what it takes to produce food from the land. Taxes have continually risen and the investment in equipment has taken a leap beyond what anyone could realize. Fencing alone, in some cases, costs what a whole farm used to cost. In fact it takes a lot of money to just get into the farming business.

Time was when land owners were looking for someone to farm their land, and if a man didn't have enough equipment, the owner would furnish it. He would finance the operation and at the end of the year they would settle up, with the farmer and land owner each taking a share of the profits.

Now very little of that goes on, as most farmers have to own the land to even hope for some profit. In fact many have to have some kind of outside income even to stay on the farm. However the increase in on-the-hoof prices of beef cattle has finally put him into a position where he can possibly make a living for a change, and we consumers hit the ceiling about prices.

Just stop and compare what the increases have been in everything else we buy. Manufactured goods have taken as great a jump in price, some even more, than meat. Services have increased fully as much percentage-wise as meat prices, and yet, after a little grumbling, we pay for them and think no more about it.

True, meat prices hit those with fixed incomes hard. But so does every price-rise in anything else. Yet we still buy what we need and we can't remember there being such a stink raised about the increase in other things.

Let's stop discriminating against the farmer and if we got to raise thunder about prices—let's hit the whole shebang. If price-ceilings are put on meat, they should also be put on the things the farmer has to buy. Fair is fair.

STATE **Capital NEWS**

AUSTIN—Gulf Coast and South Texas newspaper publishers kicked off an investigation into the "newsprint crisis" last week that could become a nationwide issue.

Last week in San Antonio a probe was launched into the causes of the current newsprint

shortage in the United States. A resolution requesting a "Congressional investigation" of the current newsprint crisis was adopted at the joint board meeting of the Texas Gulf Coast Press Association and the South Texas Press Association.

Publishers speaking for the

resolution asked the Texas Press Association and National Newspaper Association to "investigate the problem at all levels" including "price fixing" and the "reported nationwide newsprint shortage."

The resolution asked the press associations to report their findings to their memberships so that "publishers can make necessary plans and adjustments for the future months and years."

Several weekly newspapers recently have converted to daily publication because of the growth of their cities, and are having problems getting more newsprint for their publications.

The regional press associations also asked that the Texas Congressional delegation be alerted to the problem and requested "assistance in working toward solutions for an adequate supply of this resource which is so vital to our industry."

Other state press associations in the southwest and midwest have received copies of the resolution, and have received requests for

action by their officers at future board of directors meetings.

The newsprint manufacturers in the United States have told publishers that shortages have been caused by paper mill closings in some states because of "environmental problems." Wet weather has kept timber in the forests and away from the mills, newsprint officials have said.

Canadian mills—another big source of newsprint in this country—have not been contacted by the publishers, but will be asked to report the reasons for current shortages, the press association officials said.

Some publishers have inquired about newsprint supplies in other countries, and "pool purchases" of newsprint from overseas markets.

Recent price increases by the newsprint companies have sparked part of the controversy also.

"We cannot understand why the price of newsprint is the same in the states with newsprint mills—close to the source of supply—and in areas hundreds of miles from the manufacturing plants," one publisher pointed out.

GOVERNOR SUPPORTS SCHOOL FINANCE AID—Gov. Dolph Briscoe threw his support behind a stopgap school finance aid measure to provide \$39.7 million in enrichment grants to the state's 113 poorest districts.

He spelled out his recommendations at a rally arranged here by San Antonio and Crystal City residents to

dramatize the case for overhaul of inequities in educational funding.

Briscoe pledged additional legislation will "set into action a process of altering our entire funding system so that state funds will be allocated to all school districts, based on the financial resources of each."

While the governor didn't say exactly what he meant by the latter, aides said a "complete review" of tax capabilities of districts across the state will be ordered.

Briscoe, committed to avoiding a tax bill this year, found it difficult to accept far-reaching overhauls of the school finance system which will cost \$500 million to \$800 million for implementation.

The legislation he backs, with Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby's and House Speaker Price Daniel Jr.'s support, would require each district to report its taxable assets to the state comptroller on specified forms by January 1, 1975.

Data will aid in fixing true market value of the property for school tax purposes, aides said.

The governor's office would also be made responsible for coordinating work of legislative committees and other official agencies in working out a plan for overhauling the school finance system by 1975.

Briscoe told the demonstrators a court case from San Antonio's Edgewood district pointed up inequities and "we must move to correct them."

MAJOR BILLS ADVANCE—Texas' first state-supported adult basic education program received final legislative approval and was sent to the governor.

Meanwhile, a bilingual education plan for the first six grades of public school also cleared both houses.

House and Senate adopted a conference report on legislation (HB 185) to extend collective bargaining rights to Texas policemen and firemen.

Rival House and Senate versions of the 1974-75 appropriations act wound up in the hands of a conference committee for adjustment after the House finally completed action on its bill in seven days of debate.

The House launched into another long debate over drug law reform, including lowering of the penalty for first offense possession of marijuana to a misdemeanor.

SPEAKER CANDIDATES EMERGE—Candidates for House Speaker have begun to emerge, meeting deadlines fixed by state law for reporting their campaign expenses. (Few have any expenses to report.)

Reps. Carl Parker of Port Arthur, James Nugent of Kerrville and Fred Head of Troup joined Reps. Bill Clayton of Springlake and DeWit Hale of Corpus Christi as officially-declared candidates. Head issued the most optimistic announcement, claiming he had 67 supporters.

Other possibilities included Reps. George Preston of Paris, Dave Finney of Fort Worth and Chris Miller of Fort Worth.

Farmers are reminded May the first was the beginning date of the NON-GRAZING period for set-aside acreage.

Producers may graze or hay their set-aside acreage provided they file an application before any grazing or haying takes place.

The charge will be sixty percent of your feed grain payment rate per acre on the number of acres of set-aside you graze or hay. This fee can be deducted from your payment.

The final date for planting cotton under the program is June 15. Farmers, signed up in the 1973 program, must plant in order to receive payment and cotton history. Also you must have the land properly prepared to plant and farm the crop in a work-man-like manner throughout the growing season. Failure to carry out these requirements can result in loss of payment and history credit. As much as ninety percent of your allotment must be planted in order to be paid on the full allotment.

The final date for planting feed grains under the program is June 1. This acreage must be farmed in

the same manner as described for cotton to protect the history and to hold the base.

Farmers are reminded cotton, feed grains and set aside must be certified on or before July 1. As soon as your crops are planted, we urge you to come to the ASCS office and report and certify your cotton, feed grains and set-aside. Early certification may help us in getting your check sooner.

Storage of the present small grain crop may become a problem if crop conditions are favorable through the remainder of the growing season.

The County Committee may approve a loan to farmers for building farm storage on the farm. The amount of storage is

based on one year's production of eligible crops.

An application must be filed before the storage is purchased. Interest rate at six percent is charged on the unpaid balance of the loan.

A loan up to eighty five percent of the total may be approved. Four equal installments over a five year period can be set-up.

He has served on numerous fund drives and is a director of the First National Bank.

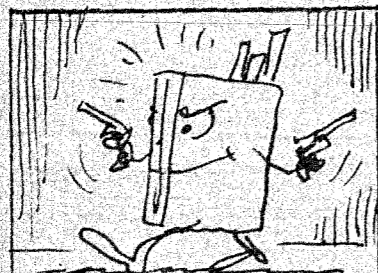
