Senior Class Vacationing In Monterrey

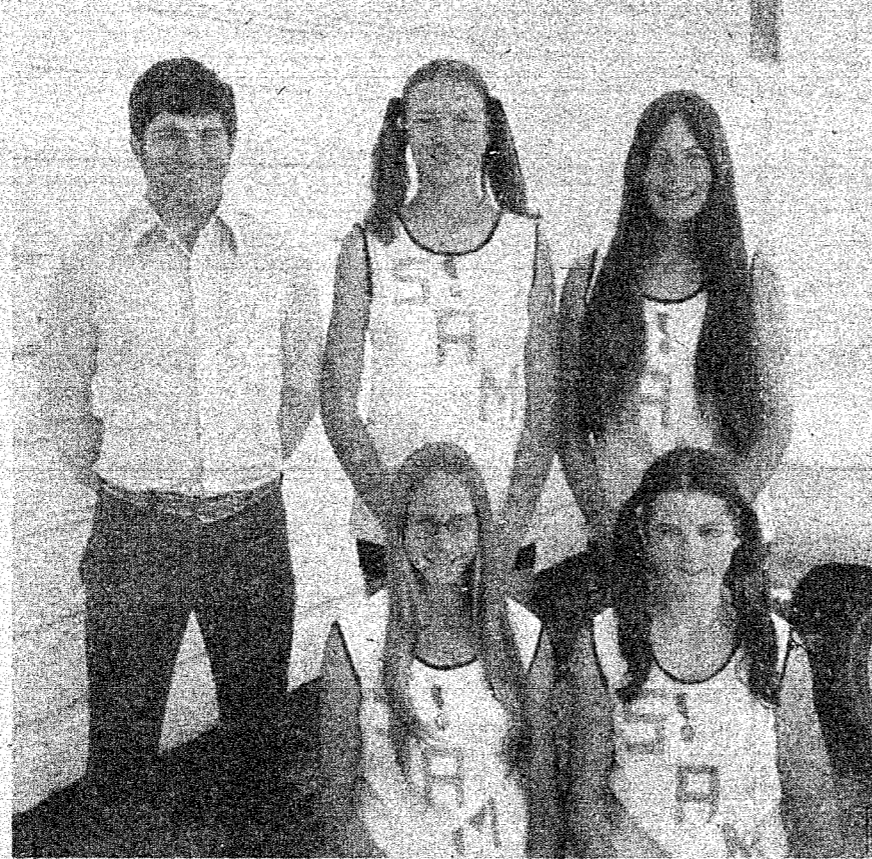

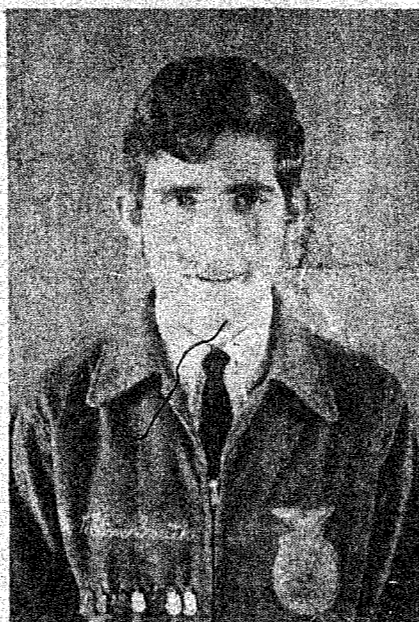

SA FFA Members Gets Honors At Recent Area Convention

Santa Anna Future Farmers of America were given recognition and received honors recently at the Area FFA convention at Tarleton State College in Stephenville.

Lane Guthrie, son of Mr. and Mrs. M. L. Guthrie, Jr., was elected Area IV vice-president for the coming year. Ronnie Daniel, David Horner and Randy Long were given area approval for their Lone Star Farmer awards, and Cline Smith was awarded the Red Davison scholarship as an outstanding FFA member.

Lane, a junior student at SAHS, is vice-president of the Coleman District FFA organization. He was chosen district and area Greenhand Farmer in 1971 and Coleman District Chapter Farmer the following year. His FFA projects include steers, lambs, breeding cattle, swine and poultry. He has participated in FFA leadership activities as well as being an honor student and participating in athletics and other school groups.

Guthrie will attend a leadership training session at Possum Kingdom Lake in June which will be for all Area IV officers.

Cline, son of Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Smith, is out-going Area IV vice-president and has also served as a district officer. He was Star Greenhand Farmer and

Star Chapter Farmer during his first two years in FFA, and was selected Star Lone Star Farmer of the Coleman District last year.

As an area officer, Cline was chosen for the Courtesy Corps for the last FFA state convention and has served as the state officer from the Coleman District. He participated in leadership activities on local, district and area levels and was elected to attend a conference last year in which FFA leaders from the southern United States discussed and suggested changes and revisions in the FFA organizational structure.

FFA projects of the SAHS senior have been swine, cattle, sheep and poultry.

The \$700 scholarship will be used at Abilene Christian College where Cline plans to enroll this fall.

City Employee Is Certified For Water Work

The official State Health Department's certificate of competency for the oldest ecology oriented profession in Texas has been awarded to Tommy F. Blanton of Santa Anna. Mr. Blanton works for the City of Santa Anna.

As an ecology worker, he has been taught effective ways for producing safe drinking water and treatments to make wastewater into clean streams for public use.

This training from the Texas Water Utilities Association, the largest water and wastewater training school in the United States, has produced clean streams and better operated water facilities than any other section of the country.

To receive the certificate Blanton has completed both a formal and a specialized education, accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience, and passed the examination given by the State Health Department's Sanitary Engineers.

Santa Anna Native Retiring From Texas National Guard

M-Sgt. O. Lenton Oakes of May will retire next Tuesday, May 22 after nearly 41 years in the Texas National Guard. A formal dinner is being planned in his honor Saturday in Brownwood where the Santa Anna native has resided in recent years.

The veteran National Guardsman signed up October 19 1932 with the 142nd Infantry of the 36th Division then stationed in Santa Anna. The 36th Division was mobilized November 25 1940 for active duty. Oakes was sent from Santa Anna to Camp Bowie where he stayed until February 1942 when the 36th Division left for Camp Blanding, Fla.

Sgt. Oakes was in the thick of World War II, landing on Oran, Algeria in April of 1943. He was in the first unit to invade the European mainland in September, 1943.

Sgt. Oakes saw lots of the world while he served with the 36th Division. It included Italy, France, Germany, Austria and North Africa. He spent 126 days on the front line before being relieved for Christmas, then returned for 90 more days.

Sgt. Oakes was discharged from active duty in 1945. He rejoined the National Guard in 1948 when it was still the 36th Division. It has since been

reorganized into the Third Battalion, 112th Armor.

Although retired from the TNG, Oakes plans to attend the annual 36th Division reunions and to visit his children, Robert, in Mississippi and Mr. Lenda Hughes of Daleville, Alabama.

Sgt. Oakes is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Oakes of Santa Anna and a brother of Mrs. J. W. McClellan and Mr. Norman Walters.

Title 1 Funds Are Granted For Coleman Co.

Congressman Omar Burleson announced last week a \$93,444.08 Office of Education grant to the State of Texas for 668 children in Coleman County, age 5 to 17, all of whom are in low income families.

This final allotment of funds has been made available for fiscal year 1973 under the provisions of Part A of Title I, of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act which provides special programs for educationally disadvantaged children.

These funds are providing services for children residing in low-income areas who have need for special educational assistance in order that their level of educational attainment may be raised to that appropriate for children of their age.

The local school districts portion amounted to \$17,867 which is being used during the last semester this year.

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In Our Opinion

ALMOST EVERY DAY someone asks, "How did this country get in the shape it is in?" The answer is simple—we let it get that way.

The recent Watergate scandal is just one among the many that have been happening to us in the last 30 or so years.

The gradual trend toward liberalism has been growing gradually since the time of President Franklin D. Roosevelt, and each administration has become a little more liberal through the years.

This always appeals to some people because they smack their greedy lips and wonder "how much of the dole can I get?"

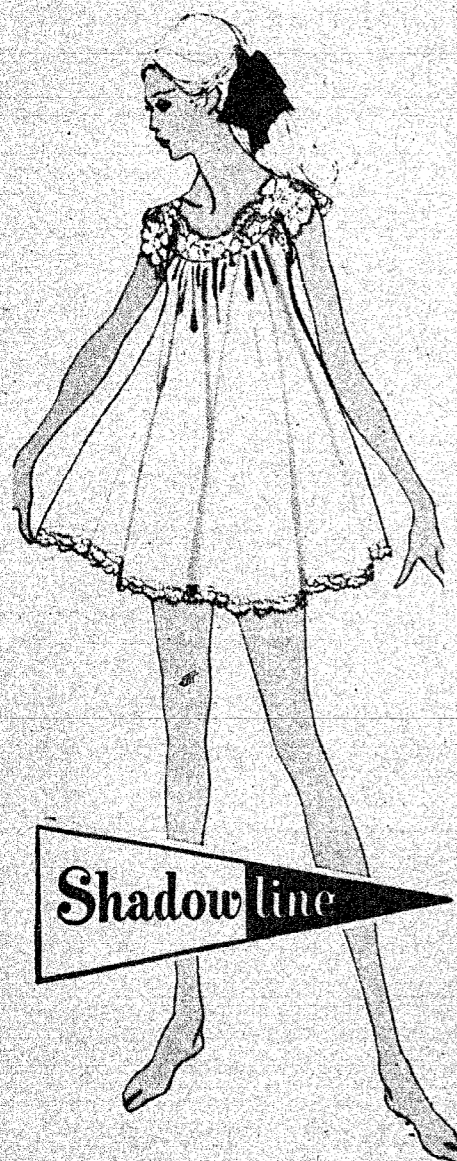
But the day of reckoning is coming and the sad thing is that with it comes the collapse of a country.

ORDINANCE NO. 177
AN ORDINANCE FIXING AND DETERMINING THE GENERAL SERVICE RATE TO BE CHARGED FOR SALES OF NATURAL GAS TO RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL CONSUMERS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF SANTA ANNA, COLEMAN COUNTY, TEXAS, AND PROVIDING FOR THE MANNER IN WHICH SUCH RATE MAY BE CHANGED, ADJUSTED AND AMENDED.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF SANTA ANNA, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. Effective with the first gas bills rendered from and after thirty (30) days from the date of final passage of this ordinance, the maximum general service rate for sales of natural gas rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Santa Anna by Lone Star Gas Company, a Texas corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as follows:

First 600 cu. ft. \$1.933 Gross; \$1.74 Net

Next 400 cu. ft. at \$1.378 per Mcf Gross; \$1.24 per Mcf Net

Next 20,000 cu. ft. at \$1.211 per Mcf Gross; \$1.09 per Mcf Net

Next 2,000 cu. ft. at \$1.1556 per Mcf Gross; \$1.04 per Mcf Net

Next 5,000 cu. ft. at \$1.1000 per Mcf Gross; \$.99 per Mcf Net

Next 5,000 cu. ft. at \$1.0444 per Mcf Gross; \$.94 per Mcf Net

Next 5,000 cu. ft. at \$.9889 per Mcf Gross; \$.89 per Mcf Net

All Over 20,000 cu. ft. at \$.9333 per Mcf Gross; \$.84 per Mcf Net

No gas bill will be rendered to any residential or commercial consumer served under the above rate not consuming any gas during any monthly billing period.

ADJUSTMENTS

The amount of each net monthly bill computed at the above-stated rates shall be subject to the following adjustments: Plus or minus the amount of any increase or decrease, respectively, above or below the 42.5 cents per Mcf level in the intracompany city gate charge as authorized by the Railroad Commission of the State of Texas or other regulatory body having jurisdiction for gas delivered to Lone Star Gas Company's distribution system for sale to residential and commercial consumers where such changes are caused by increases or decreases in the cost of gas purchased by the Company; plus an amount equivalent to the proportionate part of any new tax, or increased tax, or any other governmental imposition, rental, fee or charge (except state, county, city and special district ad valorem taxes and taxes on net income) levied, assessed or imposed subsequent to April 1, 1972, upon or allocable to the Company's distribution operations, by any new or amended law, ordinance or contract. Each gross monthly bill shall be adjusted proportionately. Company, at its option, may forego the application of any adjustment if such adjustment would result in an increase in the monthly bill; however, failure of Company to apply any adjustment shall not constitute a waiver of Company's right from time to time, or at any time, to make any adjustment, in whole or in part, in any subsequent current monthly bill that may be applicable to such bill.

Net rate shall apply to all bills paid within ten days from monthly billing date; gross rate shall be applicable thereafter.
