The Santa Anna Mountaineer football team will have a practice scrimmage with the team from Hawley High School on Friday night, August 30, at the local football stadium. The practice session is to start soon after 6:30 p.m. and all local football fans are invited to attend.

The Mounties were at Wylie High School last Friday night for a practice session. Coaches Gene Williams and Jerry Allen reported that the team did a good job against the Wylie team although there were many improvements to be made. Wylie, with 54 boys out for football, was unable to score against the Mountaineers, and the Mounties did not score against the Bulldogs.

Allen is working with the line, and Williams is working with the backfield. Both coaches praise the cooperation, effort, and good attitude of the team members. Although there are only 21 boys out for the team this year, the Mountaineers are expected to have a good season and be good representatives of the school and community.

Community Activity Set

The town of Santa Anna is expected to hum with activity Saturday as the Central Texas Art and Craft Festival is held during the day and the Professor Strumaline Medicine Show takes place Saturday evening.

The art and craft displays will be in the patio of the Mountain City Apartment building.

The Junior High Pep Squad will have a snow cone stand in operation during the day, and the FFA and FHA will have a refreshment stand in operation.

The musical production which includes a cast of about 30, will begin at 8:30 p.m. The open-air stage is located in the downtown area just north of the Santa Anna National Bank. The street will be blocked off and bleachers and chairs placed for seating for the audience.

The Santa Anna group has received much publicity from the musical show and art and craft festival. Director Jimmy Benton and a group from the show were on a television program in Abilene Monday to promote the production.

Advanced tickets are on sale at several locations in town for \$1 and 50 cents. Tickets at the door will be slightly higher.

Everyone in the area is urged to attend the big musical and see the hometown people as they

perform. Also good attendance is urged at the art and craft show during the day.

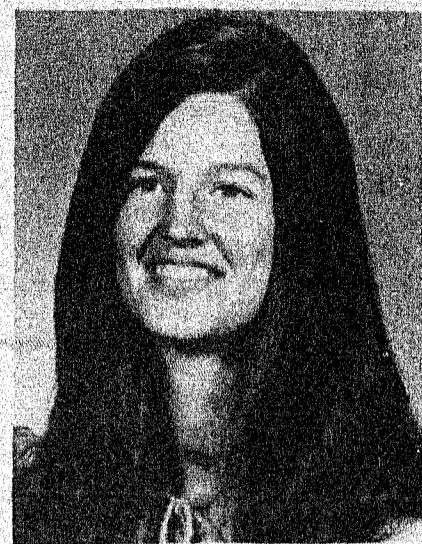
The meal will include a choice of chicken or beef spaghetti, salad, garlic bread, dessert and drink. Cost will be \$1.25 per person.

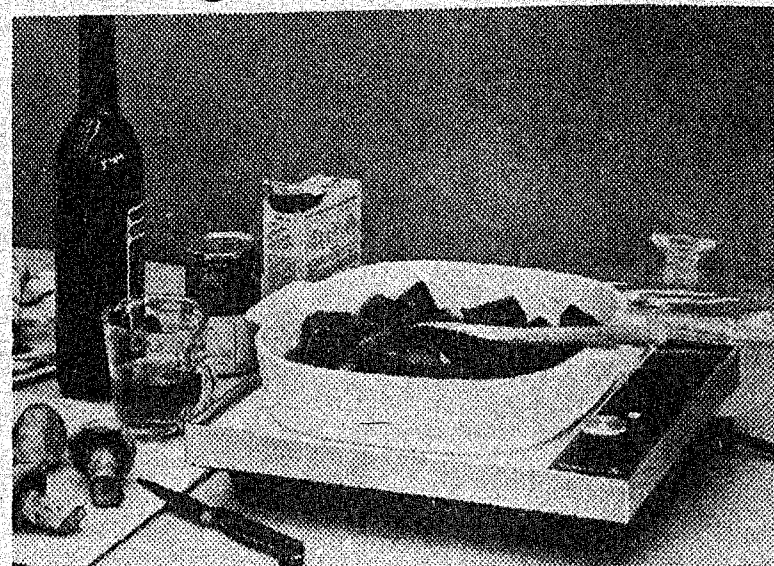

Visitors at the meeting included James Maedgen, a guest of Bob Burton; Van Kinnard and Charles Sheppard, guests of Thomas Wristen.

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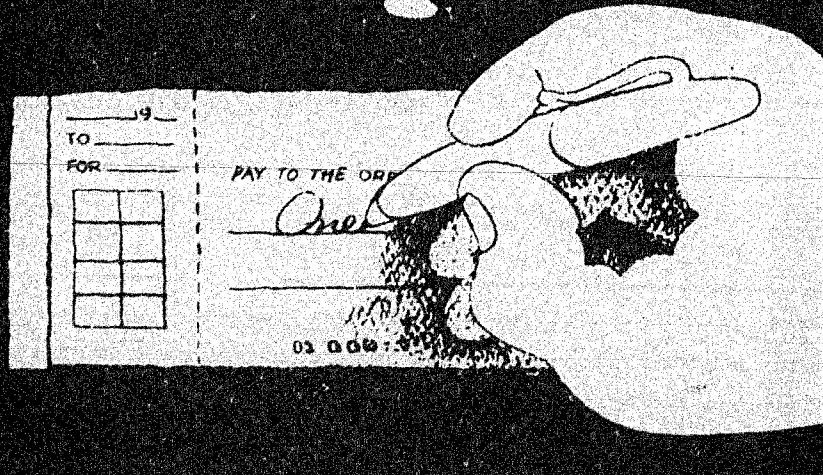

MONDAY MORNING AT 12:01 A.M. 18-year-old citizens of Texas became adults, legally.

Whether they are adult in actions is another thing. Some 18-year-olds are mature, but some 40-year-olds are still immature. So age actually cuts no ice in determining who can and cannot act as an adult.

Of course the line must be drawn somewhere and probably 18 is as good as any. So now 18-year-olds can have a mind of their own—they can drink, legally, sign a contract that will stand up in court, have an abortion, and serve on the jury.

Some youngsters seemed to look forward to this law becoming effective but we wonder how many will take advantage of their rights. No doubt, at first, there will be considerable activity from the younger set, but we can't help but wonder if they will not slack off as they did when they were given the right to vote. There were a small number of the 18-21-year group who really took advantage of the voting privilege.

To begin with, a lot of 18-year-olds will probably jump at the chance to buy alcoholic beverages, but that, too, will probably become old hat after a while. Some will probably appreciate the opportunity to be able to contract for goods or services on their own, but we doubt that many will look forward to serving on the jury. However, with rights goes obligations, and one cannot expect one without the other.

Only time will tell the real story as to whether the majority of 18-year-olds can and will act as mature adults. We hope they accept their responsibilities as grown-up citizens and make us glad that the law passed.

NEW INSURANCE LAWS allow the companies to set automobile rates either lower or higher than standard rates. The idea is that competition will keep the companies in line and premiums down. Whether this will work or not, we will see.

Most people are not well versed enough in insurance lingo to know how two competing policies compare and will not really know whether they are getting a bargain or not. When one reads the fine print, he may find that the less expensive policy does not give the coverage that the other does. Another thing is how much trouble he will have in getting a settlement in case of a claim. That aspect is not covered in legislation, and certainly varies from one company to another.

One thing we know—they will have to make money if they stay in business. What we don't want is that they make too much.

Scott said that up to twelve hours could be taken by a student, and that the college's low state tuition rates would apply. Costs, including fees, are: Three hours, \$46.75; six hours, 57.50; nine hours, \$89.25; and twelve hours \$109.00

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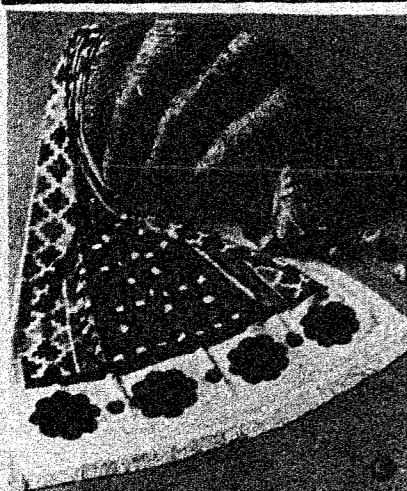

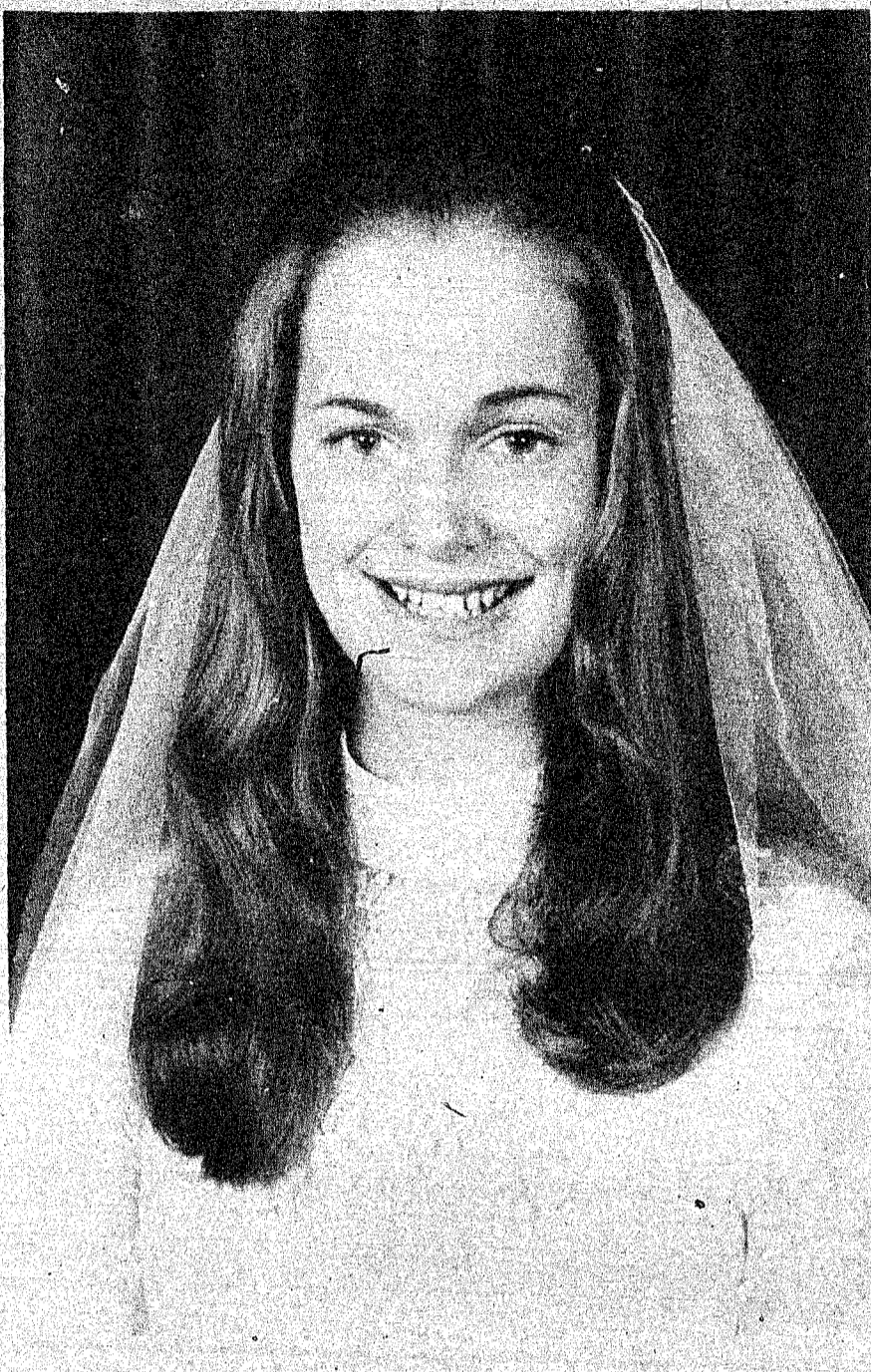

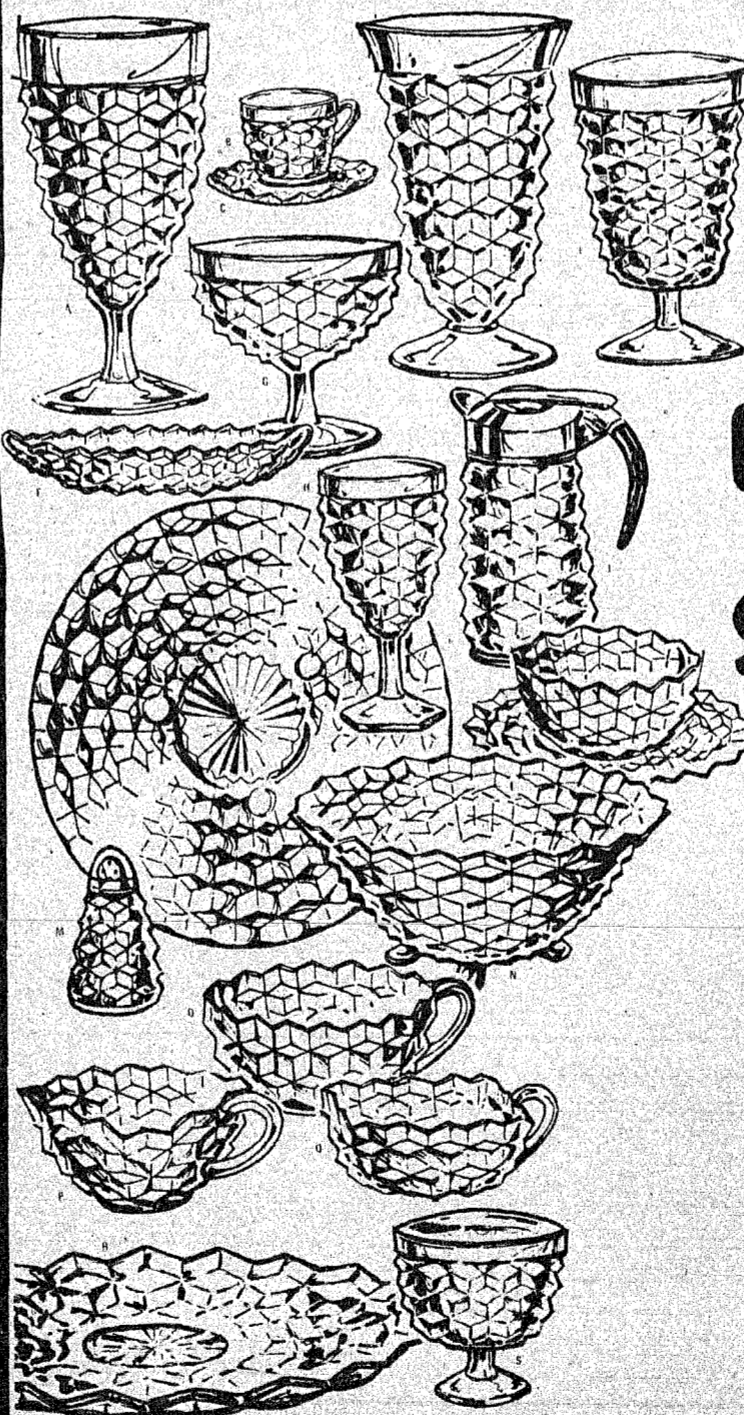

U.S. Farm Exports Up To Neighboring Countries

U.S. farm exports to Western hemisphere countries hit a new high of \$1.59 billion in 1972.

The record was due chiefly to rising sales to Canada and Latin America, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Bigger sales of cotton, fruits, and vegetables were made to Canada, along with increases in wheat and other food products, plus animal and poultry feedstuffs to Latin America.

Additional rises in certain U.S. farm exports are expected in these same areas in 1973, the USDA said.

ASCS NEWS

The Agriculture and Consumer Protection Act of 1973 was approved on August 10. The new Act provides for a four-year program for feed grain, wheat and upland cotton. Under authority of the new Act, the Department has announced details of the 1974 wheat program which are designed to encourage all-out production.

There will be no set-aside requirement for 1974 and no conserving base requirement for the four-year program.

A target price of \$2.05 per bushel for wheat is established. If the price average for wheat is below the target price, producers will receive the difference between the target price and the five-month national average price received by farmers. If the average price is at or above the target price, producers will receive no payment.

There will be no preliminary payment. Any payment due will be paid after December 1, 1974. If the average price is under the target price (\$2.05 per bushel) for the July through November 1974 period, a producer would be paid on an amount of bushels determined by multiplying the farm allotment times the projected yield established for the farm.

The national allotment is set at 55.0 million acres. Thus, on the

average, each farm allotment will be about three times the 1973 allotment.

The total payment for a person under the wheat, feed grain, and upland cotton programs is limited to \$20,000.

The national average loan rate is established at \$1.37 per bushel. This is an increase of 12 cents over 1973 crop loans.

The requirement that processors purchase marketing certificates is eliminated.

Producers may substitute any nonconserving crop (excluding marketing quota and sugar crops) in order to preserve their wheat allotment without loss of payment or may preserve it with a conserving crop used for hay or for grazing without loss of payment.
