# SAHS Grid Season Starts

The Santa Anna Mountaineer football team, champions of District 10-A last season, open the official 1973 football season with a non-district game with Richland Springs on Friday night. The game will be played at Richland Springs starting at 8 p.m.

Coach Gene Williams and assistant Jerry Allen have 12 returning lettermen on the squad this year including five offensive and four defensive regulars.

Among the members returning for action are back Danny Valdez (170), guard Steve Beal (230), end

Marty Warnock (150), and tackle Robbie Drake (177).

Other starters back are two-way guard Duane Aldridge (150), backs David Huggins (160) and Scott Bowker (147), and tackle Mark Shambeck (165).

Others to be mainstays on the team are guard Lane Guthrie (193), center Mark Wagner (234), quarterback Jody Day (135), ends Albert DeLeon (130) and Hank Wise (180), and back Lee Wristen (150). Others on the team this year are:

Underclassmen are expected to hold down 11 of the 22 starting

positions, and six of those slots could go to sophomores including Jody Day who will be the team's number one quarterback.

Much improvement was shown at the Friday night scrimmage with the team from Hawley. The Mounties scored several times during the practice session and held the Hawley boys scoreless.

The 1973 schedule includes six home games, the first of which is to be on September 14, with the Wall HS gridders. The district competition will begin on October 19.

Team captains are being named each week by the coaches, and team members will choose the permanent captains for the district games. Those to serve as captains this week are David Huggins, Robbie Drake and Duane Aldridge.

All football fans are urged to attend all the games this season and support the 1973 team and coaches. Pep rallies will be held each Friday afternoon prior to a football game, and the public is also invited to be present starting at 3:40 p.m.

Season reserved seat tickets are still on sale at the school business office and are \$1.50 each. General admission will be paid at the gate for each home game.

Something over 50 years ago Dr. S. P. Mathews opened Santa Anna's first drug store in a small building in the Gap. Like most enterprises on the frontier, it was small, but Santa Annawas proud of its enterprise.

With the coming of the railroad Dr. Mathews moved the building and the contents to the new townside, locating on the corner now occupied by the Santa Anna National Bank.

At a later date the Doctor moved the drug store to a frame building about where the present Phillips Drug Store now stands.

There were only frame buildings on that side of the street in those days. Later he sold the drug stock to Aldridge Brothers, who in turn sold to E.L. Leppington, uncle of Roy Stockard.

In turn it passed from Leppington to Dr. Mathews, to Mathews and Phillips, then to Dr. Phillips, who had worked for and learned the trade from Dr. Mathews.

Following the death of Dr. Phillips, Mrs. Phillips sold the drug store to the present owners who have continued the name of Phillips Drug Store.

The present front of that popular establishment is a far cry from the original frame building in the Gap. Of green and tan glass brick, with white and cream trimmings, lighted at night by green neon lights, the building makes an impressive appearance. It is the latest of the modern style buildings.

Under the able direction of Miss Ruby Harper, aided and abetted by Miss Elsie Lee Harper, Buddy Weaver and Jim Riley, the establishment has paced the advancement of the town.

## In Our Opinion

**AUTO MAKERS** face negotiations with the unions this year which may create another round of inflation.

However, the "hottest" item on the agenda in the negotiations is voluntary overtime. The union wants the contract to call for overtime only on a voluntary basis. If a worker does not want to work overtime, he would just refuse it.

The management argues that this would create a production problem for them, that there are times when overtime is necessary and the decision for overtime should be left to them.

Over the years the union has assumed more and more control of production through their assumption of rights normally left to management and it is getting to the point where they can dictate even the amount of production a manufacturer can produce.

We have always felt that the guy who signs the pay checks should have the right to direct the operation of his business, whatever it is, and that the worker is there to produce and give a day's work for a day's pay and not to tell the boss how to operate his business.

Maybe we are just old fashioned, but we believe that is the way it should be. If the union is going to run the business, maybe we just don't need management.

Although wage increases are not a major item in the negotiations, fringe benefits are, and as is obvious, they will also cost the company, so we may as well be prepared for more price increases. And as the auto industry goes, so will steel and other major manufacturers and that means, in the end, that the consumer will foot the bill.

With all due regard to higher prices in food, clothing, and other commodities, one just calls for an increase in another and so the spiral goes. In the long run the increase in what the wage earner takes home is taken care of by the increase in what he buys, so who gains anything?

As Major Bowes of the "Amateur Hour" used to say when he spun the "wheel of fortune," around and around she goes, and where she stops nobody knows.

## ASCS NEWS

The Agriculture and Consumer Protection Act of 1973 provides for a four-year program for Upland Cotton, Feed Grain, and Wheat. The Major provisions of the Upland Cotton Program for the 1974 crop were announced on August 27.

The Program provisions are as follows:

The National Base Acreage Allotment is eleven million acres for 1974.

There are no set-aside requirements for 1974.

There are no conserving base requirements for 1974 through 1977.

There will be no preliminary payments. Any payment due will be made after January 1, 1975.

Any program payments to be made will be based on the target price of thirty-eight cents per pound for 1974. If the average market price received by farmers during the 1974 calendar year is at or above thirty-eight cents per pound, no deficiency payment will be made. However, if the average price is below thirty-eight cents, the producers will receive a payment which will be the difference between thirty-eight cents and the higher of the average market price or the loan level.

The planting of cotton is still required in order to be eligible for payment, except that the allotment acreage not planted because of drought, flood, other natural disaster, or condition beyond the control of the producer is eligible for payment.

A farm may qualify for a special payment if any part of the allotment was prevented from being planted or the farm does not produce two-thirds of the farm's expected production because of drought, flood, other natural disaster or conditions beyond the producers control.

The 1973 Act limits the total payments to any one person under one or more of the annual programs for Upland Cotton, Feed Grains, and Wheat to \$20,000. This limitation does not apply to loans; however, it does include both the deficiency and special payments.

A preliminary loan rate of 25.26 cents per pound, applicable to middling one-inch upland cotton (micronaire 3.5 through 4.9) net weight, at average location in the United States. The preliminary loan rate may be adjusted downward if world prices should decline.

The method for establishing State, County, and Farm allotments remains unchanged. The ninety percent planting provision and loss of allotment are the same as under the 1970 act.

The new Act authorizes transfers by lease, sale or owner to non-allotment farms.

Producers may substitute any non-conserving crop (excluding marketing quota and sugar crops) to protect the allotment and may also protect the allotment with a conserving crop used for hay or for grazing.

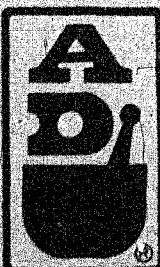

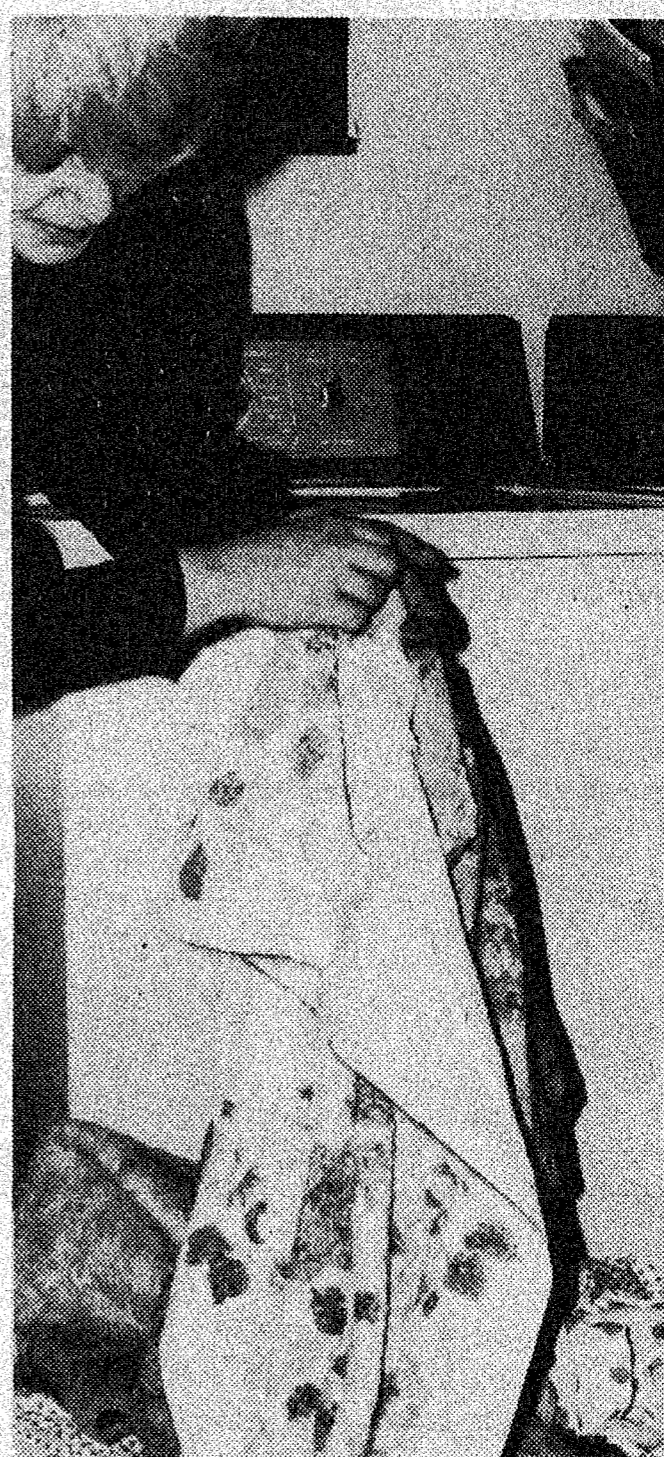

## Electrification- Short Course To Be Offered to Area Farmers

A farm Electrification Short Course for adult farmers will be held September 10-13, under the sponsorship of the Santa Anna High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Mr. Cullen Perry, Superintendent, and Mr. Billy Riley, Teacher of Vocational Agriculture.

Mr. Cleve Walkup, Farm Electrification Specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A&M University, will do the instructing in the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University.

Mr. Walkup holds a B.S. Degree in Industrial Education and a M.Ed. Degree in Agricultural Education.

The Short Course at Santa Anna is scheduled to begin September 10 at 7:00 p.m. in the Vocational Agriculture Building. Other meetings in the series of four will be held September 11, 12, 13. During the dates the Short Course is in progress. Mr. Walkup will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to Mr. Riley.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call the superintendent of schools, Mr. Billy Riley. An entry fee of \$5.00 will be charged. Farm Electrification Short Course

Certificates are to be presented to each farmer who attends all the training sessions.

Mr. Walkup states that the short course can be adjusted to wishes and interests of the farmers enrolled, but that he expects to cover such subjects as safety, how to properly choose wire sizes and install motor circuits, how to choose, protect, and ground electric motors, how to reverse and change motors from 120v to 240v, and how to calculate the cost of operating electrical equipment. Demonstrations will be given and class enrollees will have the opportunity to perform the skills demonstrated.

Short courses in Farm Electrification, as well as in other areas, are now available to farmers throughout the state under the new cooperative program between the Texas Education Agency and Texas A&M University.

This cooperative program is designed to make the services of specialists available to conduct short courses under the supervision of public schools. Such a program will enable teachers of vocational agriculture to provide improved educational services to farm people.

Specialists are now available in the fields of beef cattle, farm management, farm electrification, farm arc welding, swine production, tractor maintenance, dairy science, oxy-acetylene welding and pasture.

## Screwworms Still Hazard Over State

300 cases of screwworm infestation confirmed in Texas livestock during the last ten days of August brought the year's total to 1410, say officials of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Screwworm Eradication Program.

The preponderance of these cases were in the South Texas region. Brooks County led the list with 144 recorded cases, followed by Kenedy County with 67.

Other South Texas Counties recording screwworm action were Jim Hogg, Starr, Kleberg, Hidalgo, Duval, Willacy, Jim Wells, Zapata, and Live Oak.

Elsewhere in Texas, scattered cases were reported from El Paso, Hudspeth, Zavala, Jeff Davis, Haskell, Bosque, Stonewall, and Gonzales Counties.

Intensive sterile fly release procedures are in effect in several counties in an effort to control the problem.

Dr. M. E. Meadows, veterinarian-in-charge of the Screwworm Eradication Program urges livestock owners to carefully watch their animals for signs of screwworm infestation and submit samples of larvae found in wounds for identification. Both Coral and Korlan are USDA approved sprays for screwworm prevention and owners are urged to spray their herds where possible.
