## SAHS Distributive Ed. Class Has 15 Students Enrolled

The newly former Distributive Education class at Santa Anna High School now has 15 students enrolled and taking part in the active vocational training program and employed part time in local businesses.

As members of a democratic society we are aware of the ever changing economy, and youth in the new training program are being taught skills and attitudes in the world of work and gaining experience in the business world. The flexible schedule and curriculum is developed to meet the needs of the students while furnishing the vocational education for the students enrolled.

The local board of education, administrators, teachers, parents and community have cooperated to make the program a success from the very first day. Caskey Livingston, a former Distributive Education teacher in Comanche, is now in charge of the

class here and supervises the daily classroom projects as well as giving supervision and help to the students when necessary.

Several farmers are expecting their cotton to be ready for harvest in a few weeks. There has been no cotton ginned yet at the Echo Gin.

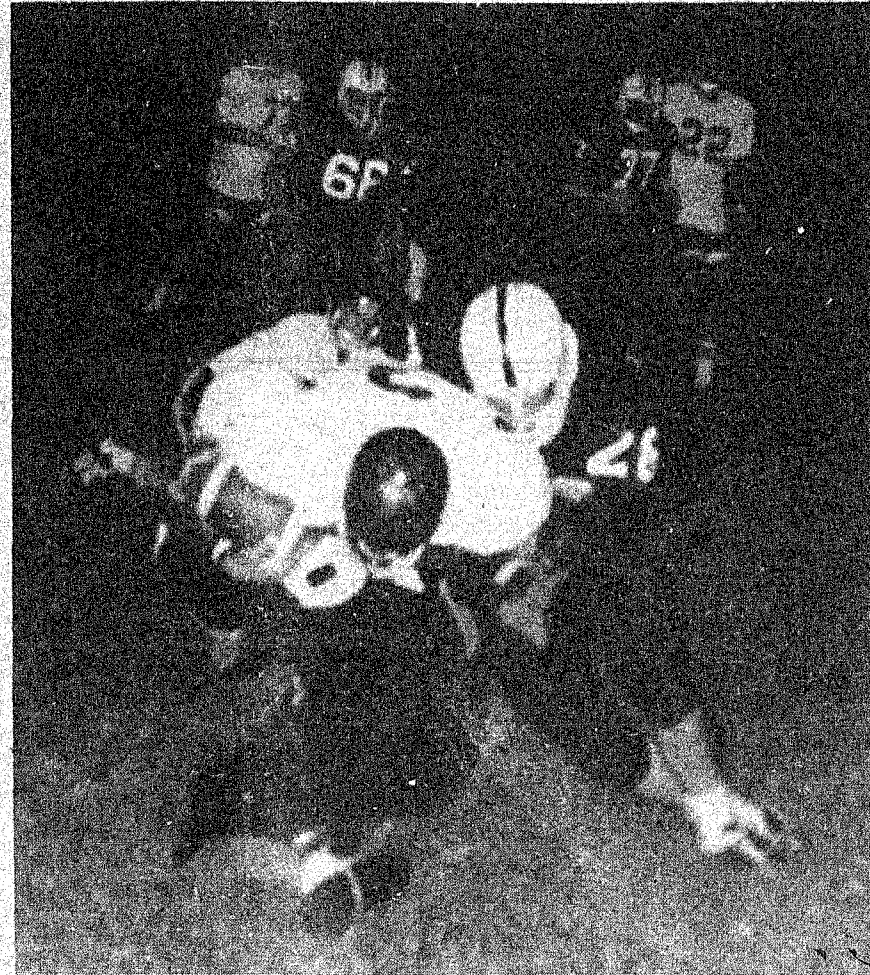
## Revival Set This Weekend At S.A. Church

anniversary celebration, depicting this life. The cake weighed 32 pounds, was 18 x 22 inches and 8 inches high.

A resume of the program of 1961 follows: The invocation was given by the Rev. Bruce Hornell; Mrs. Anzo Steward read a poem she had written and dedicated to "Uncle Bob", and Mrs. John Hunter gave a brief biographical sketch.

Mr. Bob was born in Butler Co., Mo., October 16, 1870, and he and all of the "old timers" are in our memory as we come together for another Homecoming.

## Preserver Laws To Change Oct. 1

Austin--As the October 1 deadline draws near, confusion seems to be mounting in regard to the new personal flotation device (PFD) regulations for recreational boats, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials.

On boats 16 feet or longer, each person on board or on skis will now be required to have access to either a Type I, II, or III (wearable) PFD. Additionally, there will have to be at least one Type IV (throwable) PFD on board.

Boats less than 16 feet long and all canoes and kayaks will not be affected by the new regulations. These still must be equipped with one Type I, II, III or IV PFD for each person on board, including skiers.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has printed a generous supply of wallet-sized cards which explain the Oct. 1 change in regulations. These cards may be obtained free of charge by writing the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, Water Safety, John H. Reagan Building, Austin, Texas 78701.

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## Day Care Center Raises Charges On October 1

Due to the increase in costs, charges at the Mountain City Day Care Center will be raised on October 1. Cost for keeping children at the center on a regular weekly basis will be raised from \$1.50 to \$2 per day, and the cost of keeping "drop in" children will be increased from \$2.50 to \$3 a day.

The charges for child care include a hot meal at noon and two snacks during the day. Children receive constant supervision and have creative activities, outdoor play periods when weather permits, and naptime.

Mrs. Violet Walker is supervisor of the center and has one fulltime helper and two part-time workers.

Any local pre-school children may be cared for at the center which is open Monday through Friday from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m.

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## Mrs. M. D. Bryan Buried Sunday At Rockwood

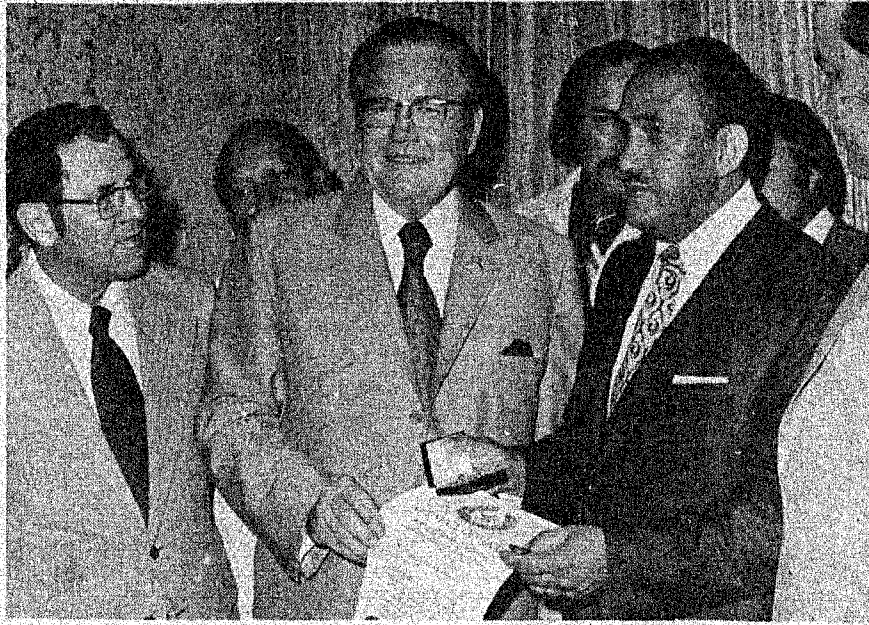

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## In Our Opinion

**CONGRESS FAILED** to override the president's veto of the minimum wage bill which would have raised the minimum wage to \$2.00 an hour next year and to \$2.20 in 1975.

We have always opposed a minimum wage because we felt it was detrimental to the worker in that it discriminated against those who had less skills and were possibly less efficient, while at the same time possibly more needy.

A minimum wage is bound to reduce employment opportunities of the less efficient people. An employee must be worth what he is paid if an employer can keep him on the payroll.

A youngster just out of high school with no work experience is practically unemployable if he has to be started off at \$2.00 or \$2.20 an hour. There is no way that he can give his employer that much return in work in most places of employment.

We agree that a man with a family needs that much money to live, and in most cases they make that much already, and in many cases if they don't make that much their income is supplemented by some form of welfare. So why add to their burden of getting or holding a job by pricing them out of the employment market.

The same thing can and has happened to manufactured goods by employers being forced to pay high wages. They must pass the cost on to the consumer and in some cases their product has been priced too high to sell.

Also the consistent raise in wages just adds to the inflationary spiral, and in the long run the raise in wages is lost in price increases of the necessities of life. In turn, it presents a terrific burden on those who are on a fixed income in that they, too, are hit with rising prices with no way to increase their income.

It all boils down to that fact that government controls are seldom any help to the American economy and in many cases they do more harm than good.

Recent events have impressed that fact on all the people.



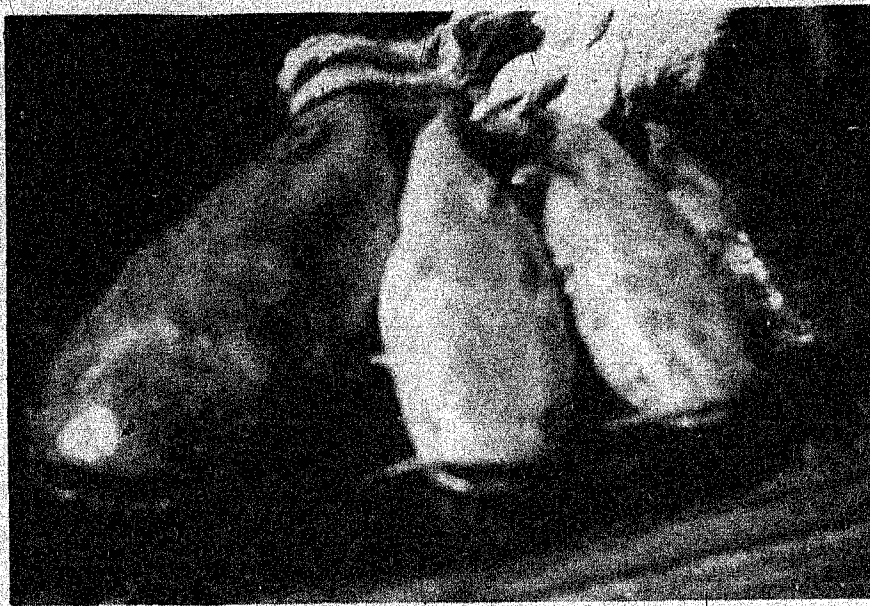
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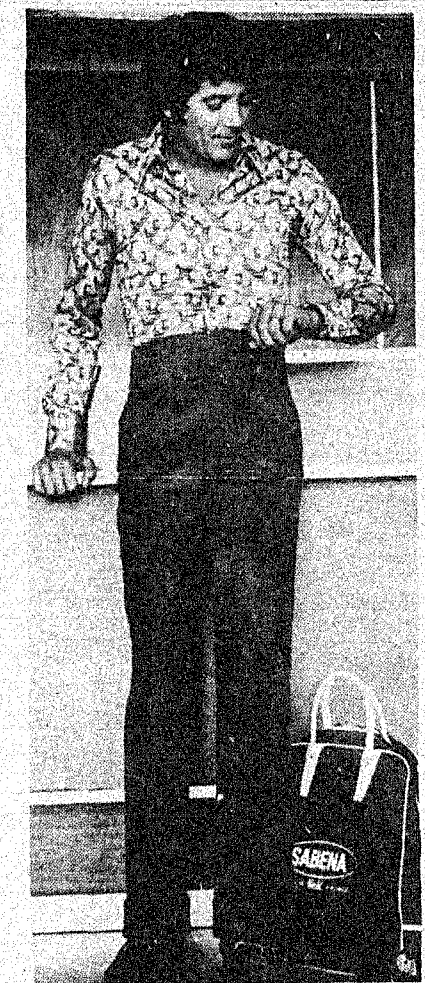
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## 46 Years Ago ... in The News

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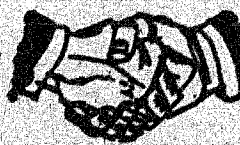
