A copy of the list has long since been lost by the organization leaders, and several copies are now being made.

Mrs. Jewell Brown Schrader passed on information about the class of 1913. There wasn't a graduating class that year as public school was changed from 10 to 11 grades and an extra year added to requirements.

A list of members of the Class of 1949 is being compiled so that a reunion may be planned for next year -- the 25th anniversary. It will probably take 12 more months to get correct names and addresses for the 38 class members.

The Santa Anna Mountaineer football team had trouble with the Baird passing attack and fumbles Friday night and went down to a 21-6 defeat by the Bears. The non-district game was played at Baird.

Santa Anna dominated the first half of play and kept the Bears to only three yards on the ground and scored a touchdown on a 64-yard run by Scott Bowker. The PAT attempt by Mark Shambeck failed.

A pair of touchdown passes in the third period of play put Baird ahead, and a fourth quarter score and bonus kick added the final 21-6 tally.

Baird is defending bi-district champion and now has a 2-1 record for the season. Santa Anna now stands at 2-2.

Grant Approved For OEO Work In CenTex Area

Congressman Omar Burleson has announced approval of a \$33,372 OEO Administration and General Community Programming grant to the Central Texas Opportunity, Inc. with headquarters at Coleman, serving Callahan, Coleman, Concho, McCulloch and Runtels Counties.

The grant is effective November 1, 1973 to run for three months and will provide for the administration and management of the community action agency, job placement services, pre-vocational and vocational training classes and needed referral and outreach services. In addition, youth councils will be organized and a community awareness of housing problems will be promoted.

Immunizations Will Be Given On October 15

Pre-school and school-aged children will be given free immunizations at the Mountain City Day Care Center on Monday, October 15, starting at 10 a.m.

John Black from the Abilene Health Center will be on hand to supervise the immunizations, and Mrs. Edna Wells RN, School nurse, will give the inoculations.

Immunizations include polio, measles, diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus. These are the compulsory immunizations for public school pupils, and all children lacking any of these immunizations should be available on that day.

Rainfall Total For September Is 3.65 Inches

Three Santa Anna city employees will be honored Thursday night (tonight) upon their retirement. The dinner and get-together will be held at the Mountain City Center at 7 p.m. The three to be honored are Mrs. Pauline Garrett, City Secretary, Jim Lovelady, nightwatchman and City Marshall, and Lonnie Bledsoe, city employee.

The three will retire to part-time status, working about ten days per month at their former jobs.

Mrs. Garrett started work for the City of Santa Anna in October of 1957, replacing Miss Bettie Blue. Her duties include managing the City Hall and being in charge of billing and bookkeeping for the city. She has missed only one day or work due to illness while employed by the City. Mrs. Donnie Clifton has been named City Secretary, to replace Mrs. Garrett.

Mrs. Garrett plans to keep house and visit relatives and friends upon her retirement. She has four children, Mrs. Bobra Boan of Memphis, Tenn., Mrs. Sue Hart of San Angelo, Mrs. Pam Anderson and Ben J. Garrett, both of Santa Anna.

Jim Lovelady has been employed as nightwatchman and City Marshall since 1954 with the exception of two years when he

was on the Coleman City Police force. Part of the time he has worked seven nights a week, and will now be working each weekend to relieve Ray Owen, new city nightwatchman.

Mr. Lovelady cites discontinuing the time-clock system as helping prevent burglaries in Santa Anna, and break-ins have been at a minimum since that system was discontinued several years ago.

Mr. Lovelady's wife, Fredda, is a patient at Ranger Park Inn nursing home. The couple has three daughters, Mrs. Jeannette Winstead of Coleman, Mrs. Carolyn Haynes of St. Louis, Mo., and Mrs. Alice Anna Smith of Hawaii.

Lonnie Bledsoe has been with the street department and Sanitation Department since 1970 and worked for the city on a part-time basis before that. He calls himself the "general flunky" for the City. He plans to fish and hunt and says he has his fish hooks all ready to go.

Mr. Bledsoe and his wife reside on Avenue D. A grandson, Mike Permenter, makes his home with them and attends school here.

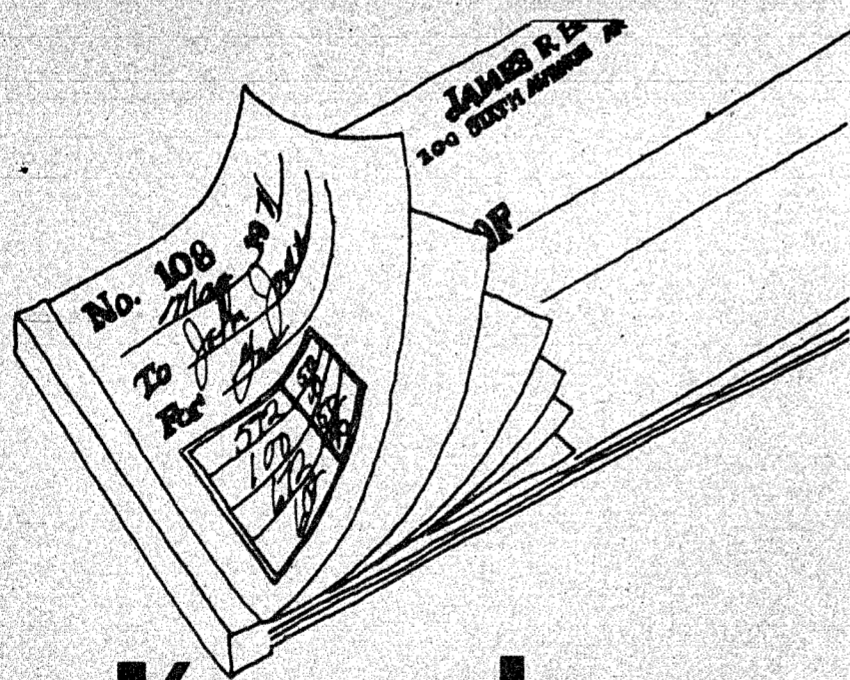

In Our Opinion

WHEN EXPERTS DIFFER ON EXPERT OPINIONS, it sorta shakes you up, says Cong. Omar Burluson.

That is just exactly what is happening among the so-called experts on the economy of the country. One group says we are facing a recession with rising unemployment and continued inflation, while the other group sees a levelling off and a continued good economy.

This optimistic view of the future economy of the nation is partly responsible for our inflation problem. Because they want a continuation of heavy government spending, more for welfare and a continuation of high prices.

The pessimistic view is probably a lot gloomier than things really are and the optimistic view is probably a lot more glowing than we can expect.

With the increased demand for farm products from foreign countries, it should look good for the farmer, however as we have said before, the law of supply and demand will have the final say in prices and that probably means higher food prices for the American consumer.

It looks like the prime interest rate is likely to drop some, and lately the stock market has shown some life, so hopefully, we can expect some levelling off.

This year, however, is the year for labor negotiation, and if wages are raised, we can expect a price increase in most commodities. The cost of production has to be kept in line with prices if one is to stay in business, and labor is a major cost in production. It would look like there should be a happy medium where both could stay within reason, but it hasn't happened yet. One gets a raise, then the other—so the first wants another raise.

It's a vicious cycle and we have come to the conclusion that there are no experts to offer an expert opinion. They just guess with us.

Food Stamps Set In Coleman Co. Starting Nov. 1

The new food stamp program will be open in Coleman County on November 1.

Coleman County food retailers will have to be authorized before they can accept the Department of Agriculture food stamps. All the local grocery stores have made application for the authorization.

Under the program needy families are certified by the State Department of Public Welfare. They pay a certain amount of money each month for the food stamps. The amount depends on the family size and income. In addition to the food stamps they buy they are given free coupons to increase the amount of food they can buy. The food stamps are used like cash at the stores authorized to redeem them. Retailers redeem the stamps for cash at the bank.

The new food stamp program is replacing the former commodity distribution for low-income families.

A program on mums will be given by Mrs. A.C. Sparks and Mrs. Turney. Mrs. McDonald will display the artistic arrangement using mums.

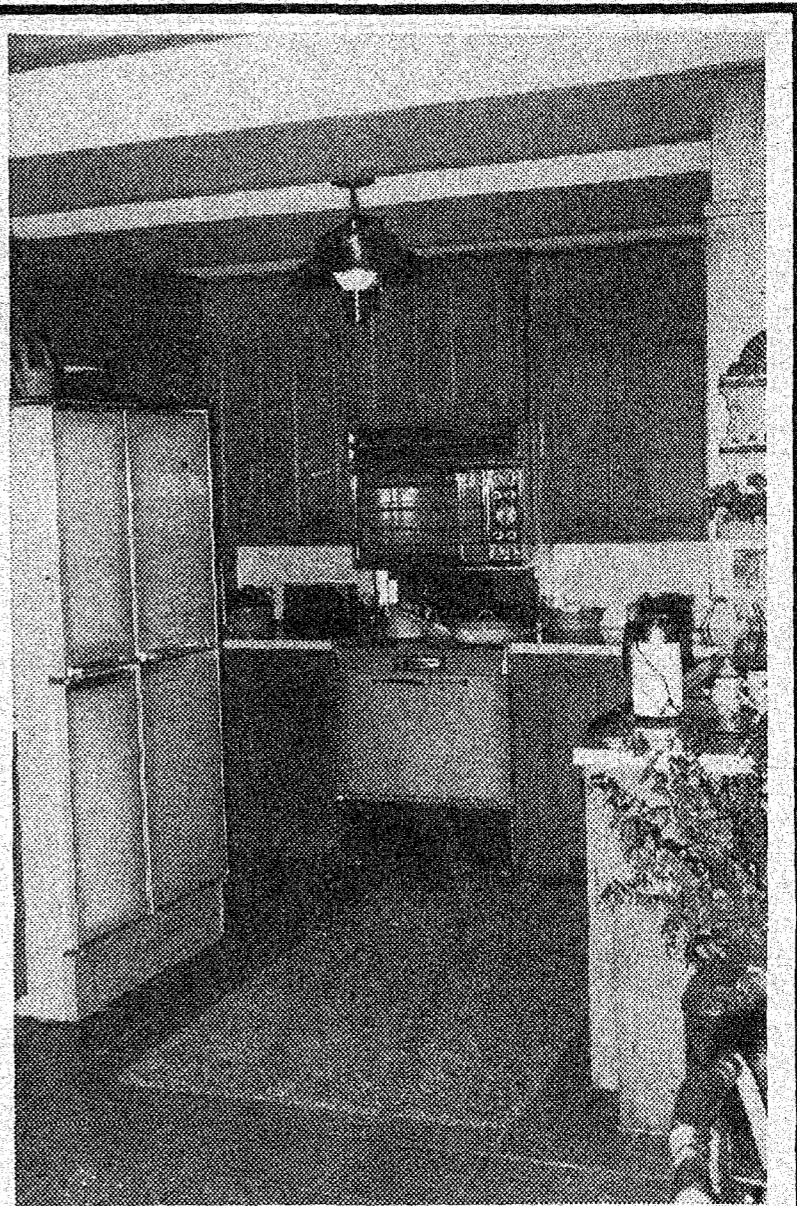

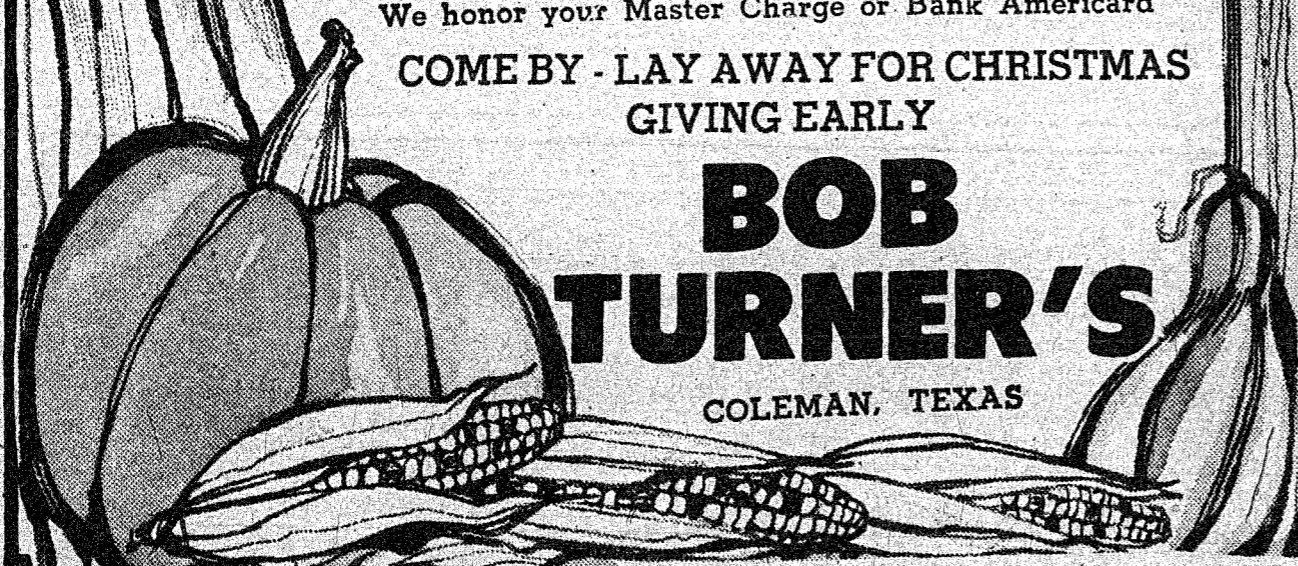

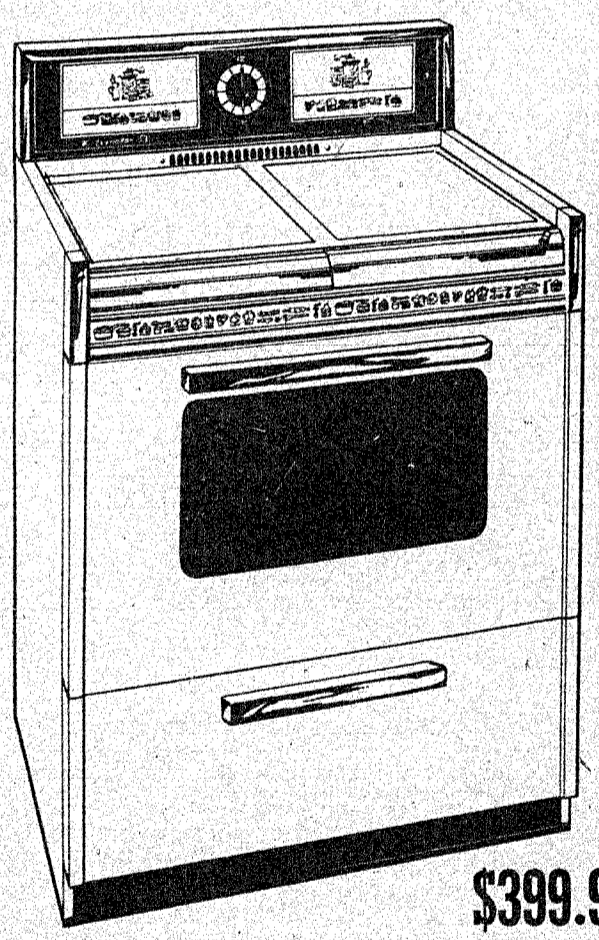
