Congressman Omar Burleson has announced approval of a \$33,372 OEO Administration and Geneeral Community Programming grant to the Central Texas Opportunity ,Inc. with headquarters at Coleman, serving Callahan, Coleman, Concho, McCulloch and Runnels Counties.

The grant is effective November 1, 1973 to run for three months and will provide for the administration and management of the community action agency, iob placement services, prevocational and vocational training classes and needed referral and outreach services. Food Stamps Set In Coleman Co. Starting Nov. 1

The new food stamp program will be open in Coleman County on November 1.


Coleman County food retailers will have to be authorized before they can accept the Department of Agriculture food stamps. All the local grocery stores have made application for the authorization.

Under the program needy families are certified by the State Department of Public Welfare. They pay a certain amount of money each month for the food stamps. The amount depends on the family size and income. In addition to the food stamps they buy they are given free coupons to increase the amount of food they can buy. The food stamps are used like cash at the stores authorized to redeem them. Retailers redeem the stamps for cash at the bank.

The new food stamp program is replacing the former commodity distribution for low-income families.
