S-Anna Schools Show Increase Over Early Enrollment in 1972

Enrollment is up about 10 students in the Santa Anna schools during the first week of classes, according to Supt. Cullen Perry.

Enrollment is down about 6 in high school with a first-day total of 113 students on Monday.

The elementary school has shown an increase, Perry said, with larger classes than last year. Total for the two schools on Monday was 340.

A full day's classes were held on Monday, and the lunchroom and rural buses were in full operation.

Plans for the coming football season were discussed, and all members urged to support the Santa Anna football team in any way possible. The first scrimmage of the season will be at Wylie High School on Friday evening, August 24, starting at 6:30 p.m.

It was also announced that reserved seats are now available for the football season.

The group will meet each Monday night following a Friday night football game for the rest of the season, and everyone is invited to attend.

John Skelton Resigns For Crockett Post

John Skelton, Coleman County Tax Assessor-Collector for the past 17 years, has resigned the position effective September 1. The veteran county officer has accepted the position as Tax Office Supervisor in Ozona serving under Sheriff Billy Mills, Tax Assessor-Collector for Crockett County.

Skelton started in the Coleman County post in 1957 and was re-elected to another term last year, his resignation was accepted by the Commissioner's Court on Monday and they are already taking applications for the position.

A Tax Assessor-Collector will be appointed by the County fathers to serve until January of 1975. A replacement will be elected in the May election next year and start serving the elected term on, January of 1975.

Mr. Skelton and his wife plan to keep their home in Coleman and will be returning here often.

The school staff is complete with the hiring of Mrs. Rodney (Sybil) Dean as library clerk. Mrs. Dean has worked as teacher aide and is also driver of one of the rural buses.

A few more students are expected to enroll during the next few days, and the official total is usually based on the number of students enrolled at the end of the first six weeks of school.

Santa Anna C of C Holds Meeting Last Tuesday

Directors of the Santa Anna Chamber of Commerce met Tuesday and voted to join the Texas Forts Trail Association which is promoting tourism in the central Texas area. Local events and points of interest will be publicized by the group in brochures and newsletters to all news media.

Members of the group volunteered to help with the community musical show on September 1 and made suggestions on promoting ticket sales.

Thomas Wristen reported on the proposed Plains to Port Highway which is to run from Amarillo to Houston. One proposed route would bring the four-lane thorough-fare through Coleman County and be a major boost in the area's economy.

Season reserved seats for Santa Anna team's home football games are now on sale at the high school office. Tickets for the six games will be \$1.50, or 25 cents a game.

Those attending the games will pay general admission at the gate for each game.

Records of the seating arrangement last year are not available, so those wanting the same seats as last year should go by the school office and choose from the seating chart if they do not remember the row and seat number of their 1972 season tickets. Those wanting tickets may also make necessary arrangements by phoning the school office.

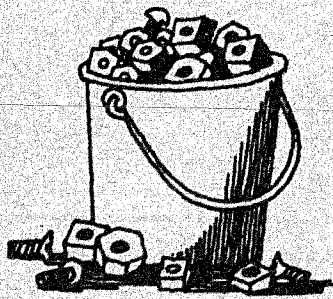

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In Our Opinion

ON NOVEMBER 6 citizens of Texas will again face a group of constitutional amendments. In fact there will be nine proposed amendments on the ballots.

As has become usual in the last few years, a pay raise for the Legislature is among them.

The amendment is a joint one, calling for annual sessions as well as an increase of their annual salary from \$4,800 per year to \$15,000.

This has become a regular hassle every session of the legislature and they hope that it will finally be presented in a manner that voters will approve it.

Their argument is that serving in the legislature is no longer a part-time job, and that any one who serves does so at a sacrifice. They say that most members of the legislature have to serve on interim committees and consequently do not have any time left for other business interests. Also they claim that many who would run if the salary were commensurate with the time involved, will not, or cannot afford to do so because they must make a living. Under the present salary and allowance schedule, a legislator must engage in some outside interest to live, consequently he possible could create a conflict of interest situation.

They also argue that the regular session is not enough time to handle the affairs of the state, as they have out-grown the provision for a 140-day session every two years.

Opponents to the raise say that a raise to \$15,000 would not make that much difference, because of the high cost of campaigning for office, a member still has to raise campaign funds and would find himself obligated to those who helped elect him.

There are good arguments both pro and con, however, with inflation what it is today, there is no question that one cannot serve in the legislature depending only on the salary and per diem allocated for him. As a part-time job it requires the member to maintain two places of residence at least a part of the time, and he can't maintain one on \$4,800 a year.

Whether a \$15,000 annual salary would entice better men to run for office or not is questionable. With politics what it is today, many good men stay away from it and wouldn't seek office at a salary four times that. However there is no question that it would seem to entice more to run.

With a \$15,000 salary and a per diem of \$18, there would be no excuse for having outside interests to compensate for lack of a living salary. That would mean that lawyer-members of the legislature would not need to practice law, or that other members would need to take time to operate some other business or profession. Maybe that should be added to the bill.

On the other hand, the way the amendment is written, it would place to restrictions on member's activities, so there you are. They could engage in as many outside activities as they have before.

Either way, it will still depend on the man we send down there.

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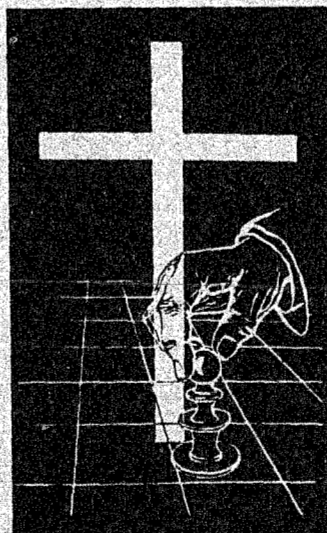

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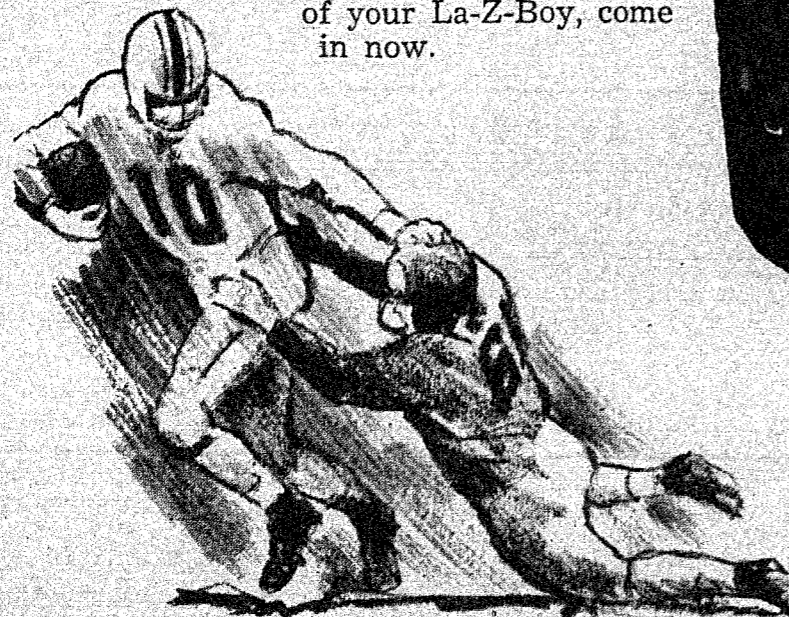
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S-Anna Air Force Man Hires Lady Bouncer at NCO Club

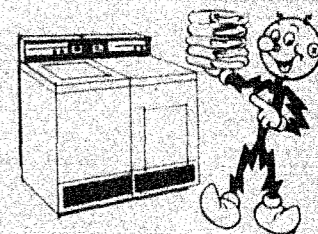

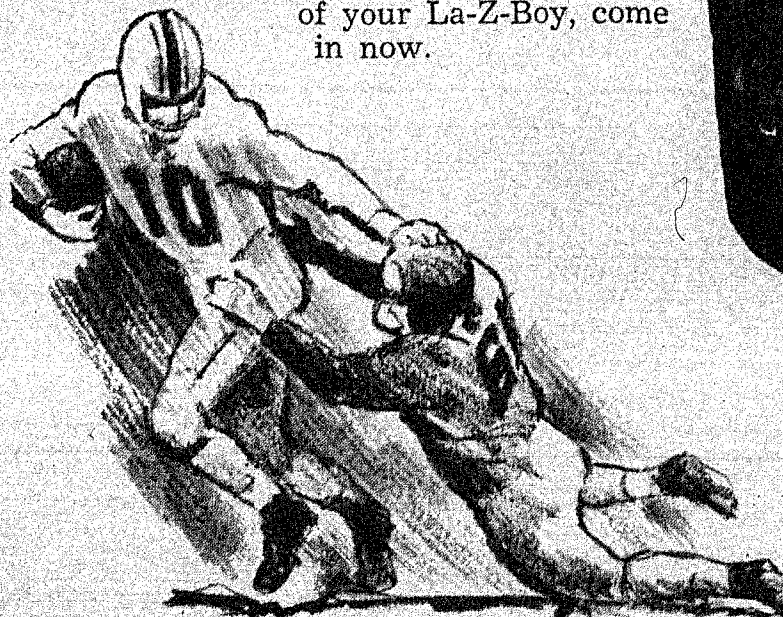

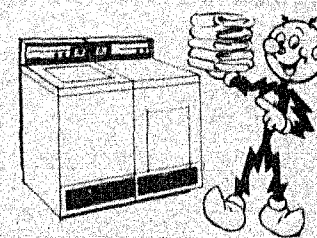

Rain Records For 18 Years By Local Lady

Mrs. Clif Switzer will be moving soon to her new home at Cross Plains. The Switzer farm east of Santa Anna has been sold and she will make her home nearer her family. The place has been sold to T.W. Foster of Lake Brownwood.

The move to another community will end the precise record of rainfall which Mrs. Switzer and her late husband have kept since 1955. Monthly totals and yearly totals have been recorded for their place for the past 18 years.

The first yellowed record is for 1955 through 1969, and shows the largest yearly total to be 46.6 inches of rain in 1957, the least amount for a one-year period was 13.8 inches in 1956. The largest monthly total was 13.2 inches which fell in May of 1965.

Screwworms On Increase In This Area

With the peak season of the year for screwworms infestation in Texas livestock fast approaching, officials at the U.S. Department of Agriculture Screwworm Eradication Program urge extreme caution on the part of all livestock owners.

One confirmed case of screwworms was reported in Coleman County last week, and at least one other suspected case is awaiting confirmation from the Santa Anna community.

There has been an increase of number of cases in nearly all areas of the state, especially where there has been shearing of sheep and goats.

Comal, Irion, Menard and San Patricio counties each recorded their first cases the week ending August 11 making a total of 140 reported cases in that week.

The usual procedure, when samples submitted are confirmed, is to "hot spot" the infested premise. This involves dropping 100,000 sterile flies per week on that area for at least three weeks. Free spraying of animals in the infested herd is also available after confirmation of screwworms.

Check sites of infestations indicated 29 percent were in navels of newborn calves. The other 72 per cent were in external wounds, most of which would have been prevented by a regular spraying program.

Livestock owners are urged to watch their livestock carefully and report immediately any suspected case of screwworms.

The mishap occurred near Lake Brownwood State Park when Nancy lost control of her new auto when she braked suddenly to avoid hitting a slow moving vehicle. The car went out of control, crossed the highway and came to rest off the road, narrowly missing two trees.

Nancy was most seriously injured having lacerations on her neck and chin from broken glass.
