Santa Anna had a rain shower last Friday. It covered a small area right in town but game about one half inch moisture.

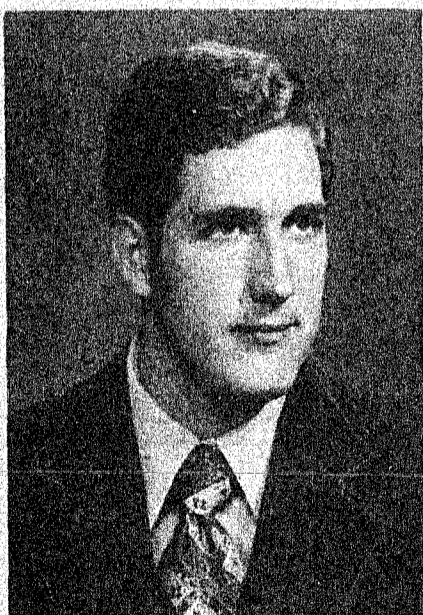
Many farmers are harvesting their maize crops or farming their cotton. However most of them would welcome a good rain.

New Training To Be Offered In High School

Beginning with the fall term, Santa Anna High School will offer courses in distributive education and pre-employment lab.

Distributive education is a vocational work experience program designed to provide the knowledge and skill needed by high school student for entry into employment in retail sales, wholesale sales and service selling occupations. It is offered to juniors and seniors, 16 years and older. The program to be offered is a combination distributive education and pre-employment training lab.

The pre-employment lab will be open to sophomores and juniors, 15 years and older.

Students will receive one credit for pre-employment lab and two credits for distributive education.

Those interested in either of these vocational programs are urged to enquire about them at registration.

T.C. Livingston, formerly of Coleman and Comanche, will teach distributive education and pre-employment lab and will have at least ten students enrolled in the state-financed working training program.

Mountaineers Start Season With Practice

The 1972 Mountaineer football team has started practice sessions this week under the coaching of Gene Williams and Jerry Allen. Late afternoon practice session will be held through Thursday, and the boys and their coaches will be at the field Friday morning and evening.

About 20 boys reported for the team this week and more are expected after school starts Monday.

The first scrimmage is planned for Friday evening, August 24, at Wylie High School, and the second practice game will be at the local field with the Hawley team on August 31. The first regular season game for the Mountaineers will be at Richland Springs on September 7.

School Opens Monday

The Santa Anna public schools will open for the 1973-74 school year next Monday, August 20. Supt. Cullen Perry expects enrollment to be approximately 350 this year, about the same as last year.

High school students have been pre-registered and will have a full day's classes on Monday. Elementary school students will register for the new term at the beginning of school Monday. The school lunchrooms and rural bus

routes will be in operation on the first day of school.

There will be ten new staff members at the local school this year. Included are four teachers in elementary school, five in high school, and one as school secretary-bookkeeper.

Mrs. Donnie (Janet) Neff will be teaching second grade this year. The Midland native taught sixth grade at Midland last year. Mrs. Ken (Coyita) Bowker will teach third grade; and Mrs. Rob (Sharon) Cheaney will be Title I remedial teacher for grades one through five. Mrs. Bowker has taught in recent years in the Centennial school, and Mrs. Cheaney taught last year in Houston. Mrs. Dwight (Dee Dee) Hudson, a recent graduate of Howard Payne College, will be teaching special education in elementary school.

New faculty members in high school will be Rebecca Pauley, business subjects; Gene Williams, head coach and social studies; Jerry Allen, assistant coach and math; Kathleen Allen, complementary education and Houston Jolley, County cooperative counselor.

Mrs. Stanley (Judy) Hartman will be school secretary and bookkeeper.

Other high school faculty members include Floyd Marshall, principal; Cynthia Maedgen, English; Winnie McQueen, homemaking; Billy Riley, vocational agriculture; Steve Nickel, band and physical education.

Elementary school personnel includes R.C. Smith, principal; Sue Newman, kindergarten; Dorothy Harris, first grade; Mattie Beth Davenport, fourth grade; Nadean Harris, fifth grade; Joan Jones, Dwight Hudson and Ruth Dodson, junior high.

Elementary school aides are Mrs. Pat Smith and Mrs. Sharon Greenlee.

Mrs. Edna Wells will serve again as school nurse under the county cooperative program. Custodians are Loyd Taylor and Carlton Baker.

Bus drivers for the school district are Allene Rutherford, Delma Blair, Claude Langford, Sybil Dean and Darrell Ashley. Lunchroom personnel will be Mrs. Eudell Copeland, Thelma Upchurch, Opal Langford and Gladys Wardlow.

The only position not yet filled is high school library clerk. Applicants are being interviewed this week and the post is expected to be filled this week.

Faculty members end their three-day in-service program Thursday at Robert Lee and will have an additional work day in their classrooms Friday.

Stanley Hartman, president, urged all parents and other interested people to attend the meeting next Monday night.



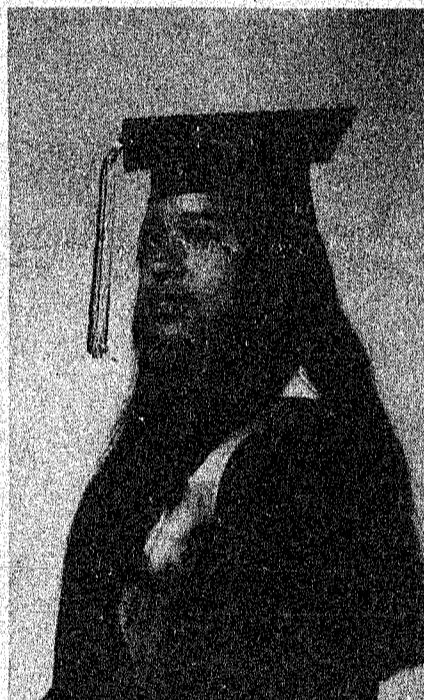

Fish Netting Is Underway At City Lake

Supervised netting for fish is being done at Lake Santa Anna this week with the captured fish being released in near-by Lake Sealy where there is more water. On the first day of netting, two large fish were captured and released in the larger lake. The two fish totaled about 40 pounds.

In order to make Lake Sealy a good fishing spot, rough fish were killed last fall and the lake later re-stocked with hybrid perch and yellow cat fingerlings. Stocking with bass has been delayed until next spring due to a shortage at the fish hatcheries.

Water level in old Lake Santa Anna is getting rather low so it was decided to try to move some of the fish.

After seeing the two large fish, a number of local fishermen were out at the two lakes trying their luck.

Dove Season Opens Sept. 1

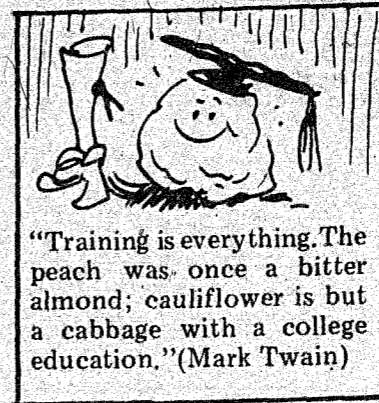

Dr. L. Simmons New President Of Institute

A unique and bold departure in Southern Baptist educational institutions has been initiated in El Paso. It is a regional school for the training of church and denominational leaders and Christian workers. The school has been incorporated under the name "International Baptist Bible Institute".

Dr. Loyd R. Simmons, former president of Grand Canyon College in Phoenix, Arizona and immediate past president of California Baptist College in Riverside, California, has been elected president of the new institute.

Dr. Simmons, a graduate of Howard Payne College and Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, is married to the former Queenie Gregg of Santa Anna. While in HPC he served as pastor of the Whon Baptist Church and has returned here on several occasions as evangelist for revivals and for other special occasions.

The new school is owned by a corporation of Southern Baptist individuals and features day and night classes for its students who will have no requirements for intrance such as age or previous academic standing. The curriculum will include Bible study and courses related to church and denominational work.

Rev. R. Elmer Dunham, former pastor of the Santa Anna First Baptist Church, is a member of the school's faculty. He recently resigned a pastorate in El Paso to take the post.

Founders of the school felt the need for a Southern Baptist training center to be located between Fort Worth and the California coast.

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Food Assistance To Be Changed On November 1

The first food stamps in Coleman County will be issued November 1, 1973. But before the statewide food stamp program is implemented here there is much work to be done.

Commodities is the food assistance program currently operating in this county. The 62nd Texas Legislature appropriated \$7.7 million for a statewide food stamp program to replace all county food stamp programs and commodity food distributions. By November 1973 the 254 counties in Texas will be operating the statewide program administered by the State Department of Public Welfare.

Before the first stamps are issued here, extensive preparation must be completed. Current commodity recipients will be notified that food stamps will replace the present food assistance program. Most commodity recipients should be eligible for food stamps also as well as others who might not receive commodity foods.

Certification for food stamp eligibility will begin at a later date. All persons who don't make much money or who are unemployed are encouraged to apply at that time. Welfare recipients aren't the only ones who can qualify for food stamps.

Local issuance offices will sell the food stamps to all who are certified eligible to receive them. Participating households will be able to buy their stamps at the issuance office nearest them and at their own convenience. The long waiting lines which are now a problem at commodity distribution centers should be eliminated.

Food stamps, which can be used for the purchase of most foods and food products, will be accepted by many of the local grocers. Payment is made by tearing the necessary amount of food stamps from the coupon book at the time of purchase. Tobacco, alcoholic beverages and imported items can not be purchased with food stamps.

Grocers can deposit food stamps just as they do money. Local bankers then send the stamps to the United States Department of Agriculture of redemption.

Food stamps are good for everyone. The community enjoys increased economic activity, new jobs are created and low-income households are able to eat more and better food.

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In Our Opinion

THE HIGHWAY BILL was finally passed and signed by the President and consequently the Texas Highway Department can turn loose on many projects in the state.

The highway trust fund, which was set up from money received from vehicles travelling on the nation's highways, was the target of a group who wanted to divert a substantial portion of it to mass transit systems. Consequently the bill stalled in conference committee and it was a long fight to get a good bill as we finally got.

Texas' Senator Lloyd Bentsen and Congressman Jim Wright were on the committee and we will have to give them credit for a hard fight to save the trust fund for highway construction, even though they did have to make some compromise to get the bill out of committee.

No money from the trust fund can be used for any form of mass transit for the first year. In the second year communities will be allowed to use up to \$200 million of the fund for the purchases of buses, and in the third year, up to \$800 million.

No doubt that there is a need for mass transit in cities and pressure from the Environmental Protection Agency over the pollution of automobiles is putting cities on the spot. They are going to have to use some type of mass transit for commuters or else the automobile manufacturers will have to come up with non-polluting automobile engines.

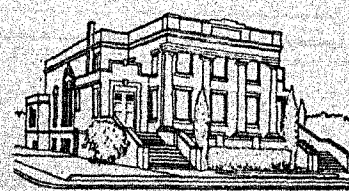
Bus operations in the cities have consistently lost money and if they are to continue to operate, they will have to be subsidized by the cities or the federal government.

The bill, by postponing the use of highway funds for mass transit, will give the Congress time to come up with some solution to the problem, possibly setting up a trust fund for mass transit, like the highway trust fund.

The mass transit includes both bus and rail transportation, and, like the bus companies, the railroads claim they cannot meet operating costs with passenger service.

As long as people insist on driving their cars to and from work, the transit people will continue to suffer losses. We are a spoiled people and we want what is most convenient for us, regardless of the expense. No doubt it costs urban dwellers more to drive their own cars, but they like it that way.

One thing is sure, there is not enough money in the highway trust fund to build highways and mass transit systems both—so one or the other has to suffer unless Congress comes up with a solution.

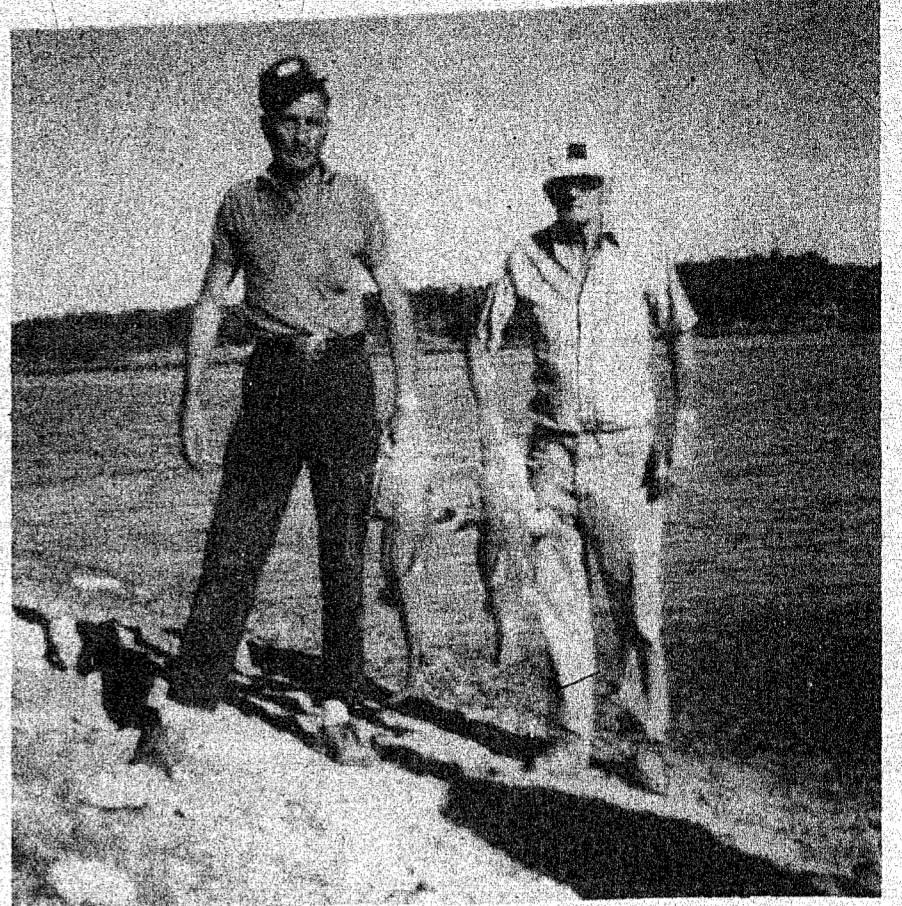

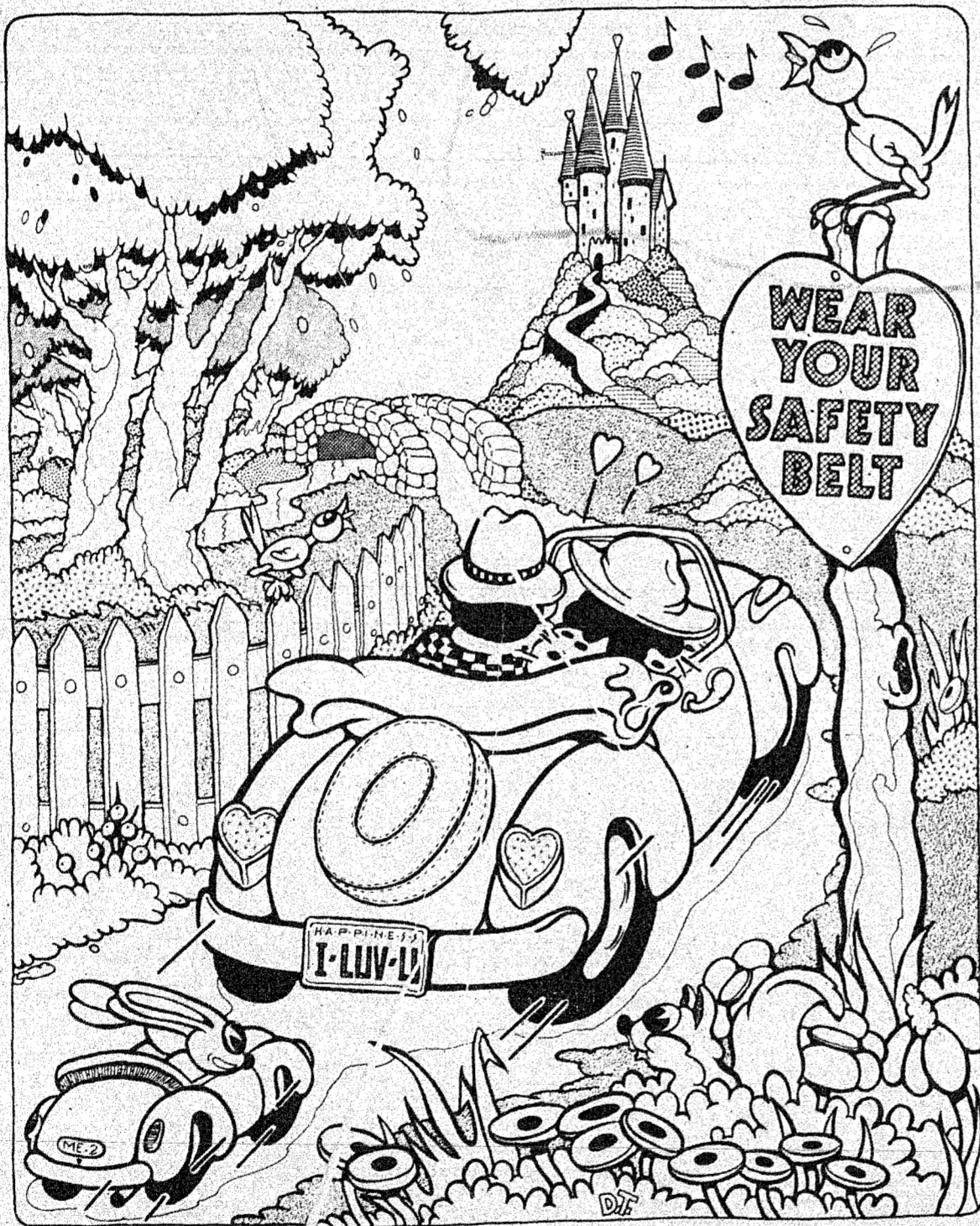
Mrs. Soward, 83, Buried Aug. 15 In Comanche

ASCS NEWS

The Agriculture and Consumer Protection Act of 1973 is a four year bill designed to attract the farm production that is needed to meet domestic and foreign demand for food and fiber. It accomplishes this by creating a favorable climate within which farmers may respond to market signals that indicate consumer demand and produce the crops that are needed at home and abroad.

This bill provides in part as follows:

A \$20,000 limitation per person on all commodities of wheat, cotton, and feed grains. There will be no set aside requirements for wheat, cotton and feed grains for the 1974 crop year. The secretary may set the set aside as high as 28 percent of the base or allotment. Farms with conservation bases are not required to maintain them for 1974.

Farmers must plant at least 90 percent of their allotments and bases.

Cost shares are authorized for conserving practices on set-aside.

Crops of oats, rye, barley, wheat, cotton, and feed grains may be substituted for each other.

If disaster occurs preventing the farmer from planting or harvesting at least two thirds of his normal crop, payments will be made at the rate of one third of the target price times the yield times the allotment. Payment will make up the difference between the percent harvested and the normal farm yield.

For Wheat, loans at a \$1.37 bushel. Target price of \$2.05 a bushel adjusted in 1976 and 1977 crop years. Wheat yields are established by using best four of the past five years. Authentic records of production must be presented otherwise your current yield will be used and adjusted by the County Committee to the approved county yield.

For cotton, the 1974 National Allotment is 11,000,000 acres. This represents about a eleven percent increase. Target price is .38 cents per pound, escalates for 1976 and 1977. The loan level to be announced November 1st of preceding year. Skip-row practices currently in use are extended for the next four years. There are provisions for insect eradications.

For Feed Grains, the base will be set by January 1974. The target price not set at present time.

For Wool and Mohair, the guaranteed prices remain at .72 cents for Wool and .80 cents for Mohair.

Accent on Health

With summer heat scorching Texas, there is the possibility you could become a victim of sunstroke or heat exhaustion during the blastfurnace weather ahead, advises the Texas State Department of Health.

The combined effects of the sun, exercise, heat and excessive perspiration with water and salt loss can produce serious symptoms and may even be fatal.

Exposure to excessive heat may result in heat exhaustion, heat stroke, and heat cramps, with heat exhaustion being the most common. In exhaustion cases, the persons temperature is approximately normal; in stroke, it is high. Most likely to be affected are the aged; the obese, the very young, alcohol addicts, and those suffering from any disease that impairs the strength of the entire body, say state health officials.

Sunstroke is caused by over exposure to the hot sun while heat exhaustion is due to prolonged exposure to high temperature indoors or outdoors. In sunstroke the body overheats. Usually the victim has a severe headache and everything looks red to him. Often

the victim becomes unconscious.

Heat exhaustion is caused by prolonged heat and high humidity, but it is very different from sunstroke. The victim is usually conscious but weak and dizzy. His temperature falls instead of rises and he feels cold and clammy.

In either case, call a doctor at once. The victim should be moved into the shade or a cool place and any tight clothing loosened.

Simple, common-sense precautions will nearly always prevent these conditions. During hot weather:

Don't expose yourself to the heat when you don't have to.

Don't go out in the hot sunshine without a hat.

Don't wear heavy or tight clothing.

Don't exercise strenuously in the sun or heat.

Don't exercise just before or after meals.

Don't overeat.

Don't overindulge in alcoholic drinks.

On sultry days, keep the air circulating to help the evaporation of perspiration. Keep shaded windows open and use an electric fan.

Profuse perspiration helps cool the body, but it draws fluids and certain chemicals away. If you perspire freely, you may need extra water and salt. Drink water often throughout the day, one glass at a time. The amount of salt needed depends on how much you lose through perspiration. Office workers probably get enough in their food, but others doing heavy labor may need salt tablets periodically or a quarter of a teaspoonful of salt dissolved in a glass of water every hour.

Elderly people are prone to develop heat stroke. It may appear in them on hot days during such apparently mild activity as a walk. But they are not the only victims.

Heat cramps usually involve the abdominal muscles or the limbs. Loss of chemicals in profuse perspiration precedes the cramps. The condition may be associated with heat exhaustion. Heat cramps usually respond better to firm pressure than to vigorous kneading.

Remember, the aging, the very young, alcoholics and people with heart trouble are easily affected by sun and heat.
