Miss Bryan, a spring graduate of SAHS, was a cheerleader, member of the annual staff, first vice-president of the FHA chapter, member of Beta Club and a former captain of the Mountanette Drill Team.

An active member of 4-H, Leann was a district winner in the dress revue last year and modeled her winning outfit at the State Fair of Texas. She has also had winning entries in the "Make It Yourself With Wool" contests.

Leann is attending the Coleman extension classes of Cisco Junior College this summer and will attend Tarleton State University this fall.

Duane, a senior student at SAHS, has participated in athletics while in school. He is a member of FFA and is an officer

of the Beta Club.

The nation-wide Who's Who program recognizes outstanding high school students for their achievements in academics, athletics, school and community organizations and church activities. ### More Good Rain Soaks Our City In Past Week

The immediate area of Santa Anna has received fine rains during the month of July, totaling 6.50 inches at the official gauge in the east part of town.

The rain fell on ten of the 31 days during the month, with the largest single 24-hour total being two inches on Sunday, July 8.

Other measurements of over one inch were on Thursday, July 12 and last Thursday, July 26.

The recent rains have been very scattered with some areas of the community having had no more than an inch or two during the month. Many areas are still in need of stock water and moisture for the fields and pastures.

The July total brings the 1973 rainfall to 18.35 inches in Santa Anna. The seven month total for 1971 was only 4 inches, and in 1972 measured less than ten inches.

### Athletic Coaches Named For 1973-74 School Term

The Santa Anna High School has selected two athletic coaches for the coming school term.

Troy Gene Williams, 25, has been hired as head coach for SAHS, and Jerry Edwin Allen, 24, will serve as assistant coaches. Both will also teach several academic classes.

Mr. Williams is a graduate of La Vega High School and has a BS degree in history and physical education from Angelo State University. He served two years at Lampasas High School as assistant football coach then spent the past year at A&M Consolidated High School at College Station as head baseball coach and assistant football coach.

Mr. Williams is married and his wife is a graduate of the University of Texas with majors in math and science. They have no children.

Allen is a graduate of Duncanville High School and attended University of Texas at Arlington, East Texas State University, and got his degree in math and physical education from North Texas State University. He has one year experience coaching and teaching at Lewisville High School.

Mrs. Allen has her bachelor degree from Texas Women's University and has just completed her masters degree from NTSU with math and English majors. She has been named library clerk at SAHS to replace Loeta Pope who resigned the position.

The only position not filled for the new school year is that of school secretary, and that is expected to be filled this week.

Teachers will report for work on Monday, August 13, and classes will begin for local students on Monday, August 20.

The new Mountaineer edition is out earlier than in many years, and students are urged to be on hand to pick them up on either of the two days.

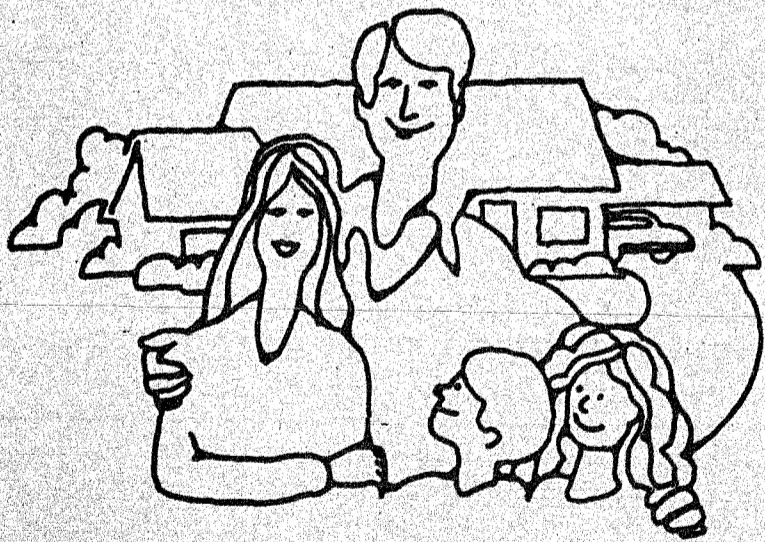

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## In Our Opinion

THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES last week voted by a majority of five, to continue the foreign aid program. We are glad to report that our new Congressman Bob Poage voted against the bill.

Time was, immediately following World War II, when foreign aid was justified, but conditions have changed today. Many of the countries to whom we extended aid are more prosperous today than we are, and a change of policy was called for several years ago. It is inconceivable that we should send money to foreign countries and yet, according to the President, we don't have enough to allow grants for local items such as upgrading a sewer plant or water system for small cities, yet we send money abroad for that very thing.

The status of the American dollar in foreign exchanges should be enough to convince us that we need to keep our money at home. The more we send out the more problems exist in foreign exchange.

Some time back a bill which would prevent the President from impounding money appropriated by Congress and at the same time limits the total expenditure of the government. That would put the "bee" on both the President and Congress as far as spending is concerned, but would also release funds for urban improvements already voted by Congress which would include Farmer's Home Administration grants, such as the Brookesmith water project and also the Environmental Protection Agency grants for such things as sewer systems and other things that are polluting our streams. Bangs is an example of that need. The town has outgrown its sewer disposal plant and is ready to build a new one. However a grant for such purposes by the federal government is holding up the project. Many of the small towns in the area have just such problems.

So why should we send our tax money to some foreign country who don't need it any worse than we do. We learned a long time ago that we do not buy friendship from foreign nations. They will take our money and turn on us at the first opportunity.

The Farm bill is in conference committee and lacks only a few items of agreement. Cong. Poage is chairman of the committee, but doesn't expect a bill that will please everybody. "There ain't no such animal."

If you disagree with what Congress has done, there is one way to let them know—write. Of course you may not carry much weight with those of whom don't represent our district, but at least you can voice your opinion and let off some steam.

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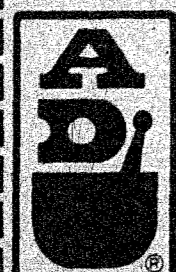

Harrison, an appliance salesman, waltzed so strenuously at a company party that he suffered a fatal heart attack. Was his widow entitled to collect workmen's compensation for his death?

The company said no. "Obviously, he was not at work when he was dancing," the company reasoned in a court hearing.

But Mrs. Harrison pointed out that the party had taken place on company premises, under company sponsorship, as part of a company contest--and that all the company's salesmen were expected to show up.



The court decided that the dancing had indeed arisen out of the job, and granted the widow's claim. The court said the party was simply the company's way of inspiring its employees to greater effort.

Workmen's compensation laws generally cover accidents that occur in the course of employment. As a rule, courts have included any recreational activities that are closely connected with the job.

This is especially true when the company plays an active role in the event.

Thus, in a case arising out of a company picnic, the court granted compensation for an accident largely because of the participation of the company president. It seems he would use these occasions to present special prizes to employees and to give them pep talks about "our one big family."

Still, not every recreational occasion is covered. In another picnic case, a woman employee was hurt during a foot race. But when she sought compensation, the company pointed out

- 1) that it paid only part of the cost of the picnic;
- 2) that the picnic was held on a non-working day, away from the company premises, with no pressure on anyone to attend; and
- 3) that the company had nothing to do with the arrangements.

The court decided it would be stretching language to call the woman's injury "an incident of her employment." Result: no compensation.

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## ASCS NEWS

In order to assure adequate supplies for domestic and export markets, the Agricultural Secretary has announced that there will be no governments set-aside of land for 1974. The effect of this announcement will be to free farmers to go all-out to produce feed grains, soybeans, wheat and cotton. This announcement will also permit farmers to begin making plans for 1974 crops.

There will be no set-aside of land in 1974 for feed grains, wheat or cotton.

The maintenance of an established conserving base will not be required as a condition of eligibility to receive price support or program payments. Counties shall discontinue all conserving base work and adjustments for 1974, exception: Conserving use requirements

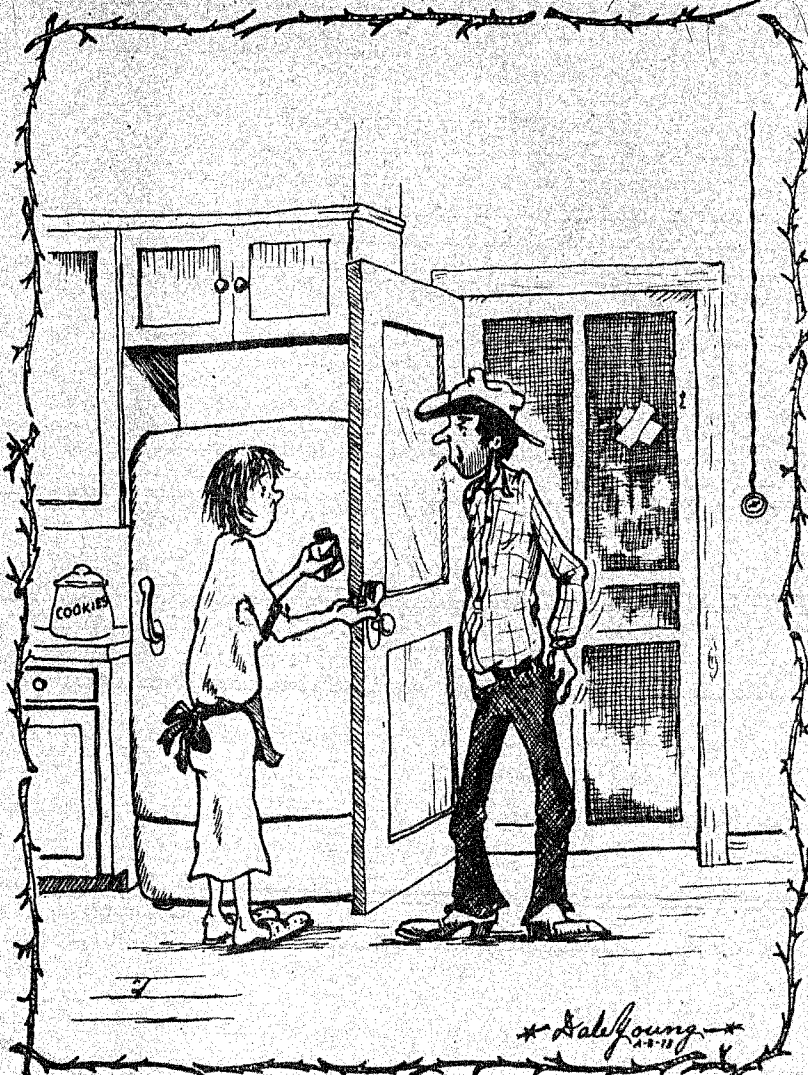
will remain in effect for CCP or CAP agreements which are not terminated.

Producers with existing CAP and CCP agreements which continue through 1974 and subsequent years will, at their option, have the opportunity to terminate such agreements. Specific instructions for handling CAP agreements which may be terminated will be contained in another news article.

Set-aside and conserving base requirements remain in effect through 1973.

National Farm Safety Week, which begins Wednesday, July 25, is a good time for farmers in Coleman County to examine their farming operations and eliminate unsafe practices.

Each year, thousands of farmers and ranchers are killed or critically injured in accidents that could have been prevented if basic safety precautions had been observed. This is one of the major

reasons President Nixon designated July 25-31 as National Farm Safety Week.

All farmers are urged to consider ways in which they can incorporate safer practices into their work at home and in the fields. In addition, community

leaders, private organizations, and radio and TV announcers are asked to assist in providing safety information to farmers. Posters, slide sets, and other methods of presenting information will be used.

In addition to this project, the Department of Agriculture is continuing its year-around farm and home safety program. Topics chosen involve major aspects of farm safety. The emphasis changes each month; for instance, the July campaign features falls. Information on falls includes tips on household repairs and danger areas such as bathtubs and stairways.

Technological advances have brought with them an increased potential for injury. Coleman county producers should familiarize themselves with safe farming operations and encourage their neighbors to follow certain basic rules of safety.

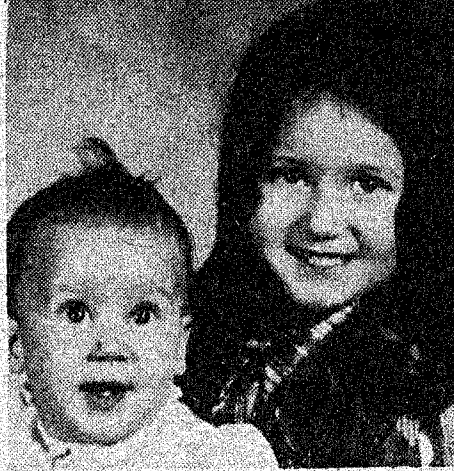

When young Tommy refused to eat his stew his parents argued. His father wanted to march the 5-year-old off to bed. His mother offered to buy him a toy if he'd eat at least half. They were both wrong, says Lee Salk, Ph.D., a New York pediatric psychologist. The child should be asked to at least try a bite, says Dr. Salk. "But if his opinion is very negative, it would be more reasonable for the mother to offer an acceptable substitute."

Author of "What Every Child Would Like His Parents To Know," Dr. Salk believes children should have some say in decisions that involve them—whether it concerns what to eat, what time to go to bed, or what clothes to wear. And the child should begin learning the process of making a decision around the age of two, which is also the time of toilet training.

Parents must, of course, help. They can, he says, by giving their children choices, such as: "Would you like to sit in this chair or would you like to sit in that chair?" "When you do this," says Dr. Salk, "You are helping them learn to make decisions." — and just as important, you are showing respect for their feeling."

When it comes to setting a time to go to bed, parents shouldn't just announce a bedtime rule and then try to enforce it, he explains. Ask the child, for example, if he wants to get up and play with his friends the next morning. Then explain that in order to do this, and feel well, he has to get a certain amount of sleep — and ask him what he thinks of that. If the child knows you will take his feelings into consideration, the likelihood is that you can strike a compromise.

"Children will believe you when you explain the consequences of their acts, if you haven't told them convenient and self-serving lies," says Dr. Salk. "But if you haven't earned your child's trust in the early years of his life, when the important moments come later, then he may not listen to you — even when you're telling him the truth."

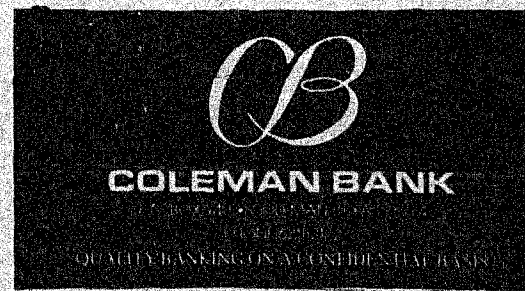

## Egg-Size Tomatoes In Offing

Egg-size tomatoes that provide as many slices as larger varieties — but cost less — may crop up in supermarket egg cartons in the next few years.

A new elongated version of dwarf tomatoes is currently under development at a Gainesville, Fla., agricultural research station.

Because of their compact size, more than six times as many of the new plants can be put on an acre than conventional varieties. This means higher per-acre yields and the possibility of once-over mechanical harvesting and mechanized handling.

Since the smaller fruit is less subject to crushing during handling, researchers believe it could be harvested with less expensive and sophisticated machinery than that now being used.

Research to develop the new species was stimulated by the threat to Florida's \$100 million tomato industry from imports originating in countries where workers' daily wages approximate hourly minimums in the United States.

Agriculturists point out that elimination of the Florida tomato business would further increase the nation's balance of payments deficit and put more pressure on the American dollar and the economy as a whole.
