Nine proposed constitutional amendments will be voted on Tuesday, November 6. Absentee voting is now underway at the Coleman County Courthouse and will continue until a few days prior to the election.

Included in the amendments are proposals for annual sessions and salaries for State legislators; homestead protection and tax exemption for single adults; conservation and reclamation districts; probate jurisdiction of district courts; Bonds and Veteran's Land Fund; tax levies for cities; and non-profit water supply corporation tax exemptions.

Voters should take time to study the proposed amendments and vote on these proposals.

Heavy Rainfall Soaks SA Area

Heavy rains fell in the Santa Anna area last week with Rockwood receiving the most reported in the community. Parts of the Rockwood area had about seven inches during the three-day period from Thursday to Saturday.

The official gauge in Santa Anna had a total of 3.75 inches of rain which included .95 on Thursday and 2.80 on Friday. Another half-inch recorded on Friday, October 5, brings the total for October to 4.25.

Unofficial reports from the area gave about five to six inches of rain on Thursday and Friday. Some of the rainfall was heavy enough to fill lakes and tanks in the community besides being beneficial to grain fields and pastures.

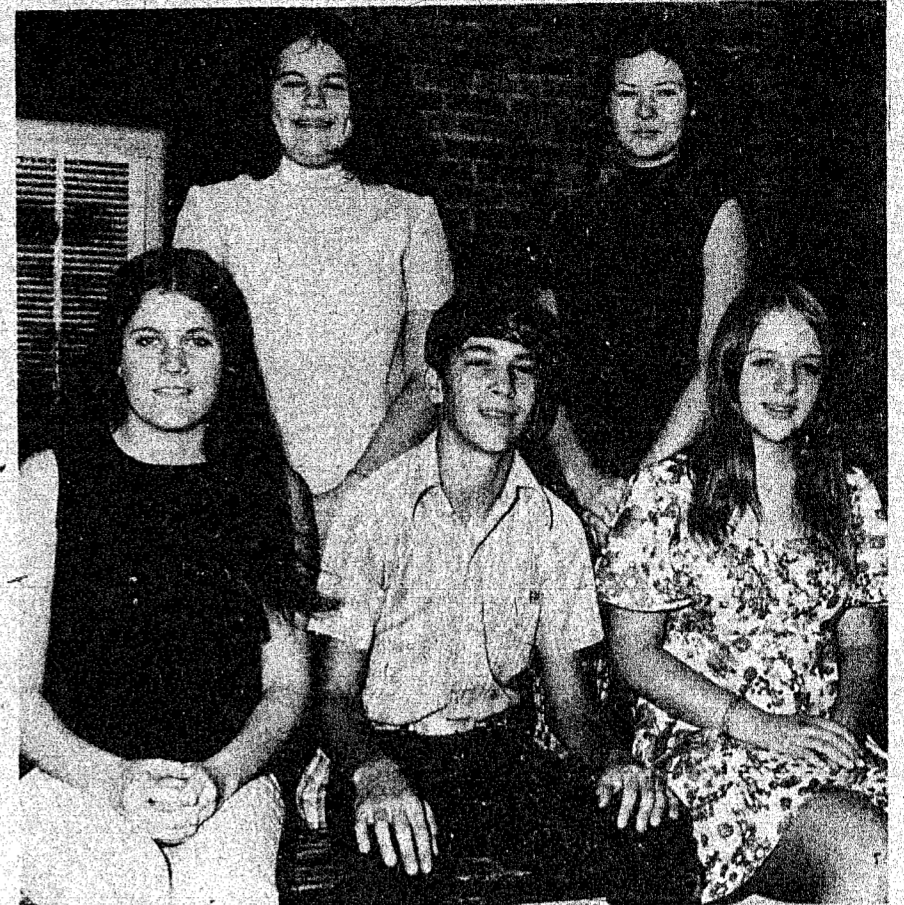
The October rainfall brings the total for 1973 to 27.35 inches.

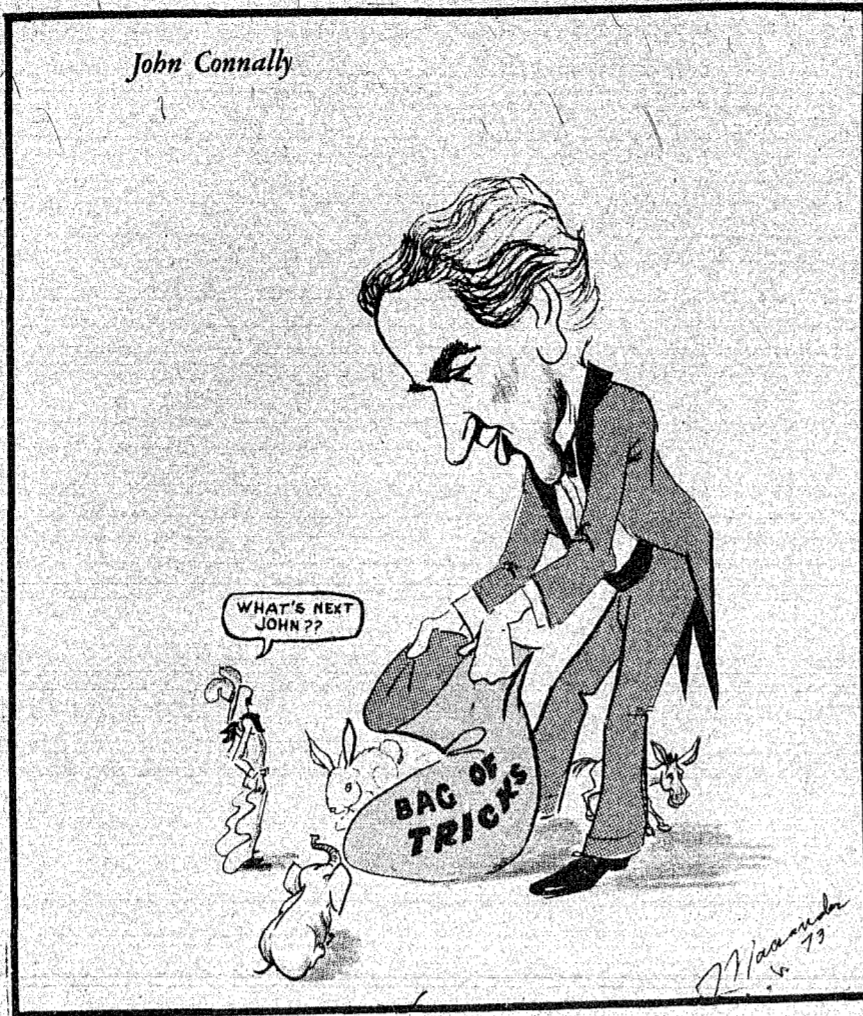

SAISD Building Program Studied at Board Meeting

The Santa Anna Independent School District Board of Trustees met twice last week. M.L. Guthrie, Jr., president, presided at both the regular monthly session and at the called meeting on Thursday night.

At the Tuesday night meeting routine bills and accounts were approved for payment and the budget reviewed. The board studied the bonding of the tax assessor-collector and agreed to work with the other schools in the county on the assessing and collecting of the school taxes.

The new school bus safety laws were studied, and estimates requested on the repair of the elementary school roof.

It was announced that R.C. Smith has been named to the Region XV Drug and Narcotic Committee, and that Cullen Perry is a member of the Region XV Joint Committee on Education.

On Thursday night the Board met with the school architect, Stanley Brown of Dallas, and studied proposed plans for a new gymnasium and remodeling plans of some of the present buildings.

Mr. Brown had several plans

for a gymnasium, plans for the remodeling of the high school building, and tentative plans for a new home making department. The school board will present the estimates of the proposed improvements to the school fiscal agent for a study of financing.

A complete presentation of plans and proposed bond issue will be made by the school board at a later date.

The next meeting of the group will be on Tuesday, November 13.

In Our Opinion

A LOW EBB in confidence in the present administration was reached last week when Vice President Spiro Agnew resigned. This was the second time in the history of this nation that a vice president had resigned his office, but the earlier resignation came because of differences between he and the president.

Agnew's resignation came after his plea of no contest on charges of evading income taxes, and an agreement that other charges would be dropped.

The no contest plea will be accepted by many Americans as an admission of guilt, and following Watergate, did nothing to improve the popularity of the administration with the general public.

Some will argue that such things have been going on in political circles for decades, and that the present group were just unlucky in getting caught, but we can't go along with that. No doubt there has been a lot of things happening in the previous administrations that never came to light, but with the Nixon administration it seems that it has attracted people whose moral values were just not high enough.

It would seem to us that this will be a great blow to Republican hopes in 1976. If the Democrats can come up with a candidate that the people can stomach, then they should be a shoo-in next election.

The President's selection for Agnew's successor was well received by both political parties. Gerald Ford is not a controversial man. He has served in the House for many years has gained the respect and admiration of his own party as well as many of the Democrats. Polls by the news media showed that he would have no trouble with confirmation. He has worked hard for the Republican party and there have been no hints of any questionable action on his part with the exception of one unreported campaign contribution, which Ford says was given to the party and not used in his campaign.

Another asset for Ford is his declaration of no political ambitions further than where he now is. He indicated he was not interested in the presidency, but serving most of a term as vice president might change his mind. Should he serve the rest of the term as vice president and still maintain the respect of his party, he might well be considered in 1976.

Most Texans would have liked to have seen John Connally named to the spot, but we feel that he was wise not to consider the post. Too many Democrats would like to cut Connally down after his switch to the Republican party, and getting him confirmed might have been difficult. Many people still put party above country.

But, considering ability as a leader, Connally had about all the requirements needed for filling the post.

1976 just doesn't look like a good year for Republicans in the presidential contest, unless The Democrats flub like they did in 1972.

Let's hope we have at least one candidate in 1976 that the people can really support, and not have another "lesser of the evils" choice.



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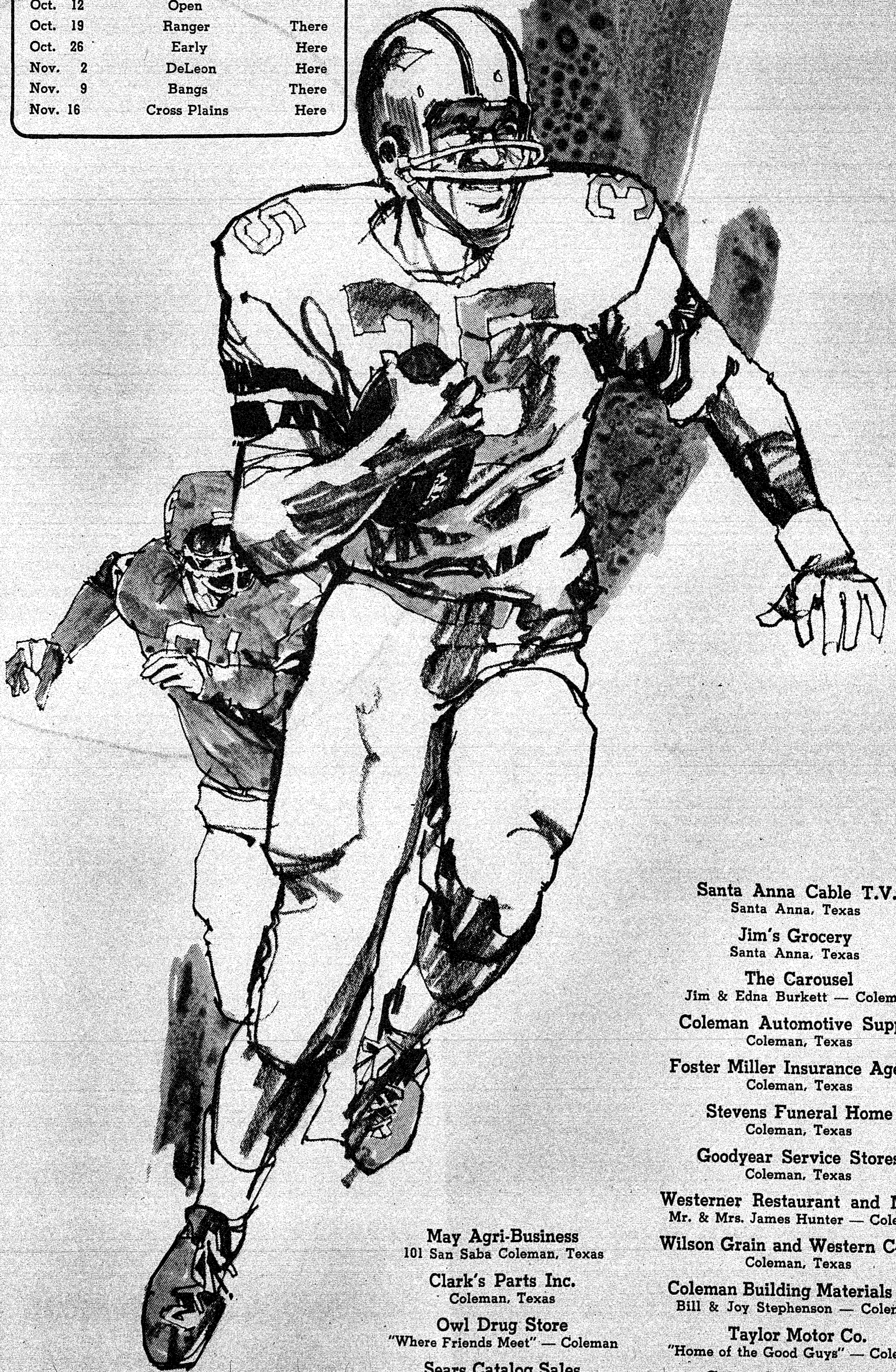

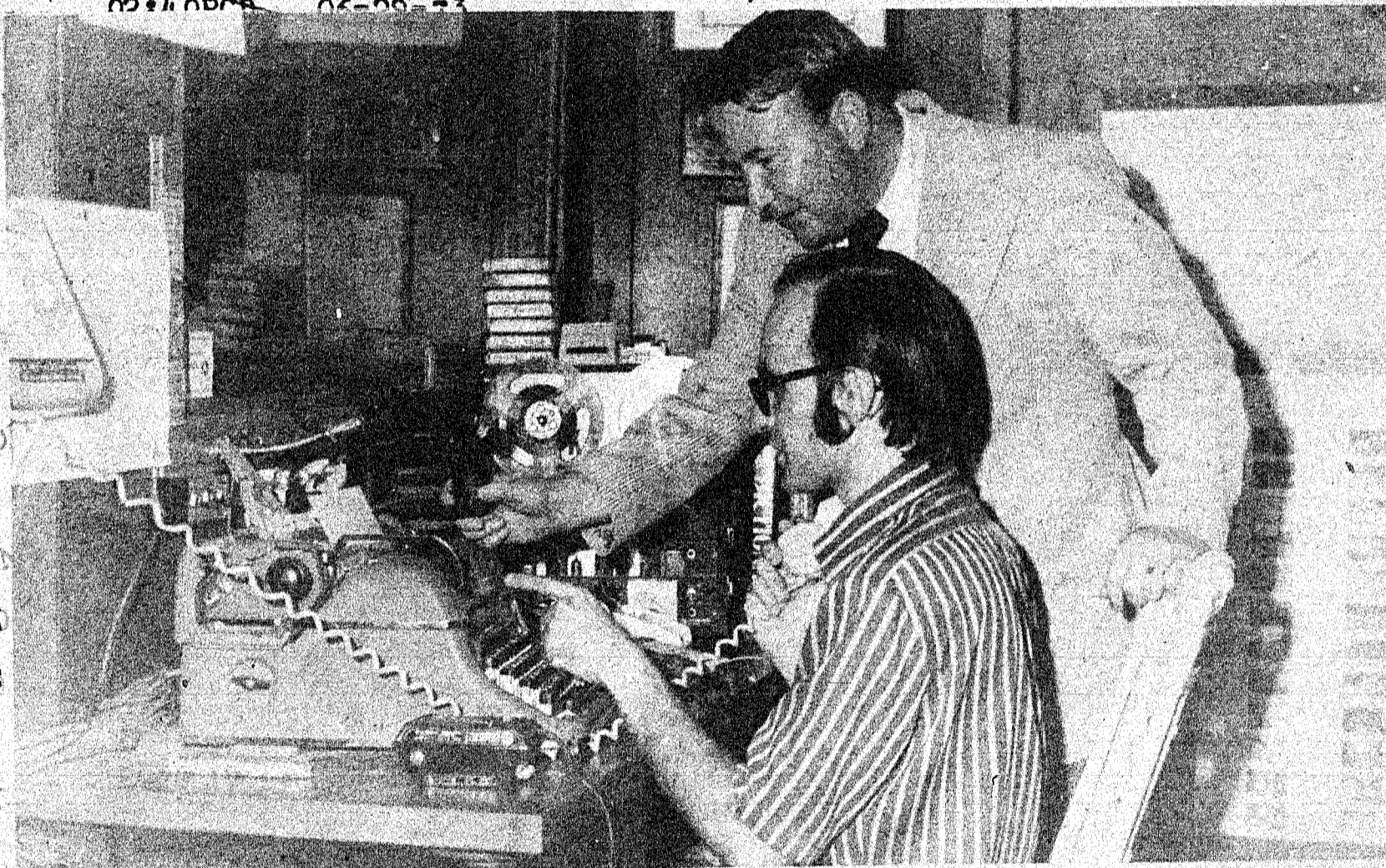

In order to schedule his other classes and take part in athletics, Marty works at the local service

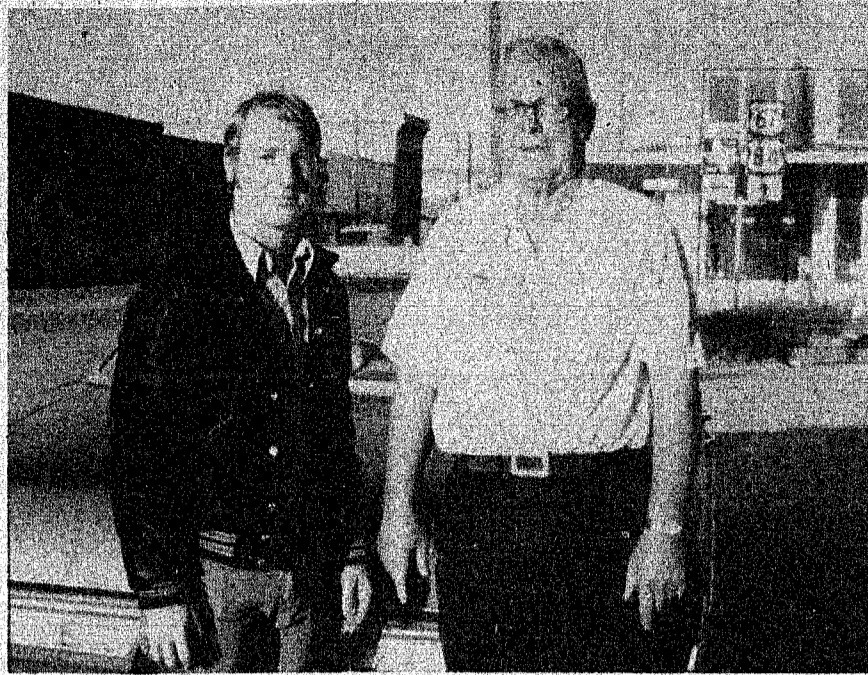
station from 6 to 9 a.m. each weekday morning. He does all the jobs associated with operation of the service station under the supervision of H.A. (Sye) Burden, owner.
