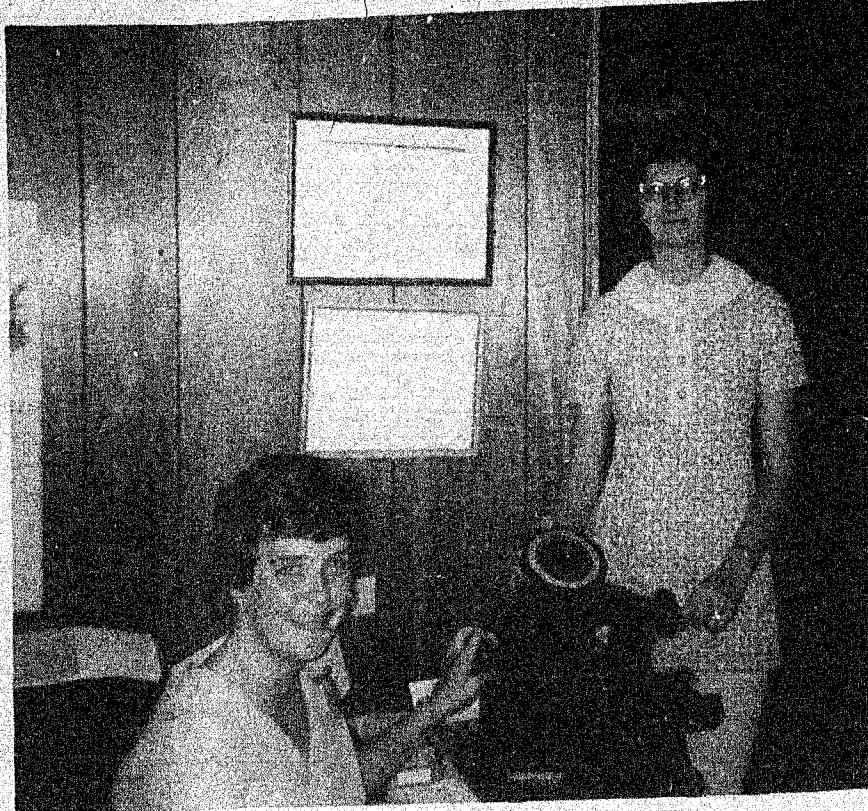
Born in Eugene, Oregon in 1947, Smith was employed with Standard Oil Co. in California. He was a veteran of the Vietnam war and a Baptist.

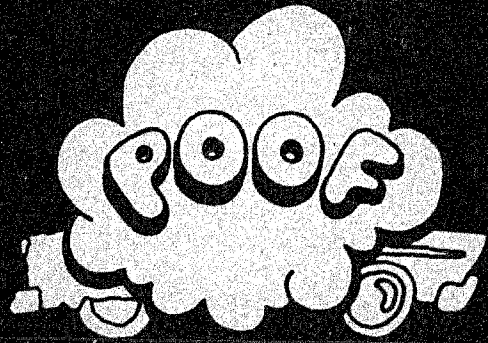

The only other Santa Anna golfer in the tournament was Thomas Wristen.



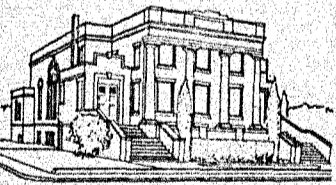

## In Our Opinion

SCHOOL DISTRICTS all over the state are in trouble. They have the problem of having to meet state standards with not enough money to do it.

The Texas State Teachers Association recently made a survey and found 44 per cent of the school districts in the state had to raise more money for operation. Also 75 per cent indicated that they would have to raise more revenue next year.

Already schools have had to curtail some of their instructional programs, and 55 per cent see cutbacks next year.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe worked during the last session of the Legislature for some relief for the schools, but the Legislature had failed to act when they adjourned. Now some are calling for a special session to do something about it, but the governor has refused to call one, saying they showed no interest during the regular session and he don't think a special session is warranted.

One of the problems is that state agencies demand more and more from the schools and the increased costs are not taken care of by the state. That means that either districts must increase taxes or get more state aid.

It would seem that state aid, based on the average daily attendance in the schools, would be an equitable way to spread tax money for education. As it is, based on ad valorem taxes, some districts are much richer than others, consequently their schools have more to offer and a lot more money to get what they want. Yet their pupil load is no more than the poorer schools.

There should be an answer to this question, but we don't believe school consolidation as was suggested by the school study a few years ago is the answer. We still believe that communities deserve to have and operate their own schools.

Property taxes play a large part in the operation of schools, and much has been said about equalization of property values. There is no question that there are cases where this should be done. There are experts in the field of property valuation and they can make a study and place values on all property in a district. Then the board can study their needs, tax rate and assess the property accordingly.

Everyone should pay his fair share in the operation of our schools, and this seems to be the way to do it.

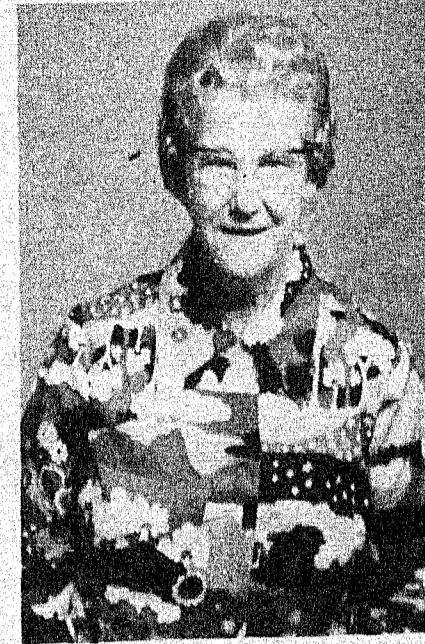

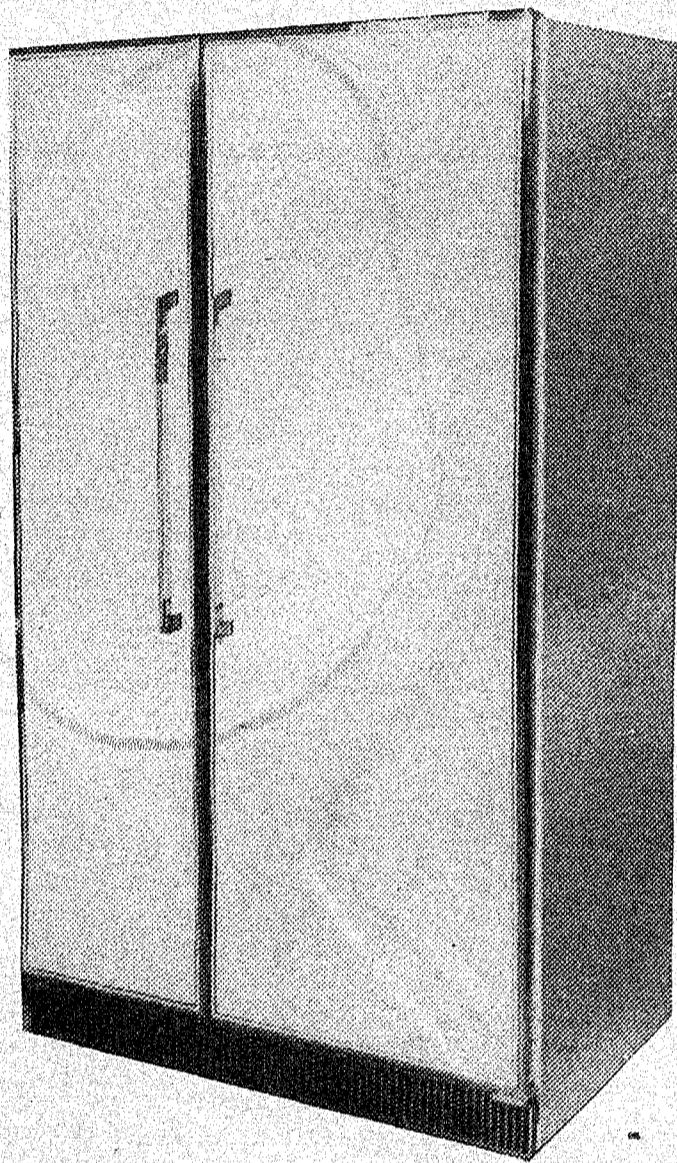

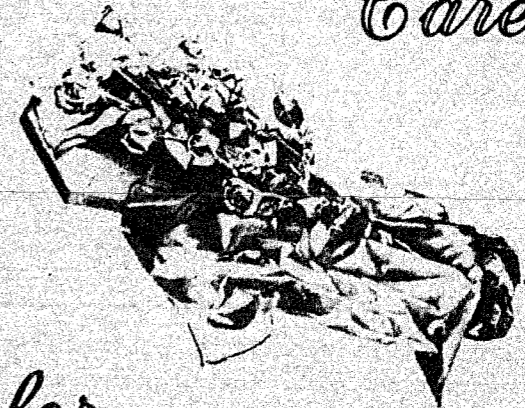

## Clothing Center Provided Help In Many Areas

More than 1.9 million pounds of clothing poured into the East and West Coast Welfare depots of the Seventh-day Adventist church last year, according to a report received by the Santa Anna-Coleman church.

The clothing which finally arrived at the coastal depots represented thousands of man (or woman) hours of sorting, mending, cleaning, ironing and otherwise processing the garments turned in to local societies, like the one operated by the local welfare center located on Fae street. "Not every garment turned into us passes our inspection," according to Mrs. D.W. Danielson, the Community Service leader in this area.

Mrs. Danielson points out that not all clothing is sent on to the New York or California depots either. The leader states, "We have needy people right here in our own area that we are glad to take care of, and they get first attention. During July, August and September 366 garments were handed out to those in need in our own area."

The clothing is sorted according to size and whether it is summer or winter weight clothing, or men's or women's. When it goes to the depot it is packed in boxes especially provided for that purpose.

The local clothing center is located at the old Santa Anna Hospital building and is open each week as a community mission project of the Seventh-day Adventist Church.
