In Our Opinion

It's an energy-hungry world, yet Mid-Texans have experienced only eye strain from reading about it.

But this winter could be a different story. Texas Power and Light Company has sent out warnings that power curtailment is impending for the winter.

Lone Star Gas Company, has taken a wait and see attitude as the company official usually recline to speculate on the power shortage. But recent reports indicate the world is using more natural gas than is being produced.

Some rural Texans will feel the first bite of the energy crisis this winter as the cost of LP gas shoots skyward. Area dealers of butane and propane have warned that they can not meet the demands for the fuels this winter.

Why the problem?

The reasons are numerous and complex with no easy solution in sight.

The Arab oil squeeze is one of the immediate problems. The Mideast war has led to an Arab oil production cutback, but this is only a recent addition to mounting problems of the Middle East holdout on fuel energy.

Even with a quick Mideast peace and full production restored in that area, there would still be a shortage in the United States.

It started in the early 1960s when Americans stepped up their guzzling of fuel. In the last 10 years, Americans have used 30 per cent of the world's energy consumption, and the U.S. has only six per cent of the world's population.

It is unbelievable, but as we used more fuel, we produced less with producers locked in a war with environmentalists.

According to a recent report from the Associated Press, a warning went up in 1968. "That was the year when for the first time we found less natural gas than we used," says Joseph Swidler, chairman of New York State's Public Service Commission.

Government officials ignored Swidler's warning as more environmental restrictions were placed producers. By 1971 crude oil production in the United States was far below standard. We short on refineries and no new ones were being constructed in '71.

Recently, some restrictions were lifted, and new refineries are now on the drawing board, but it is going to take time before supply catches up with demand.

So in the near future, Mid-Texans as well as the nation will be on a leaner fuel diet—highway speeds will be lowered along with thermostats.

SA ASU Coed In 'The Company'

Boots Walker, a senior English major at Angelo State University, is a member of the group of Alpha Psi Omega members who are entertaining San Angelo area clubs and organizations.

Called "The Company", the honor drama fraternity students are seeking to promote dramatic activities and to raise funds for a drama scholarship each year.

In their performances the group perform an improvisational "Living Newspaper" taking current headlines and material from news papers and adapting it to the stage in lively dramatization.

Among the pieces presented at the first appearance last month were "Dear Abby", "Ann Landers", Erma Bombeck, Watergate developments, sports page and soap opera.

Dr. Ramymond Carver, chairman of the ASU Fine Arts Department, is the group's sponsor. The cast is rotated among members of the fraternity so that at least four members take part in each performance. The performances give experience for the members as well as aiding the scholarship fund.

Miss Walker, daughter of Mrs. Alice Louise Walker and the late Add T. Walker, has appeared in a number of ASU theatrical productions. She is a drama minor at ASU and scheduled to graduate next spring.

JHS Basketball Starts Monday For Boys, Girls

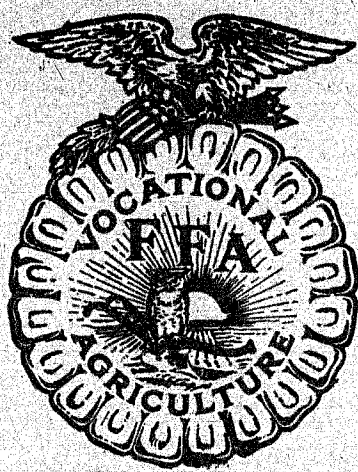
R.C. Smith, coach for both the girls and boys junior high basketball teams, has submitted the schedule for the seventh and eighth grade teams.

Miss Ginger Rodgers was at the register which was on a table centered with a memory candle. Rice bags were red and white.

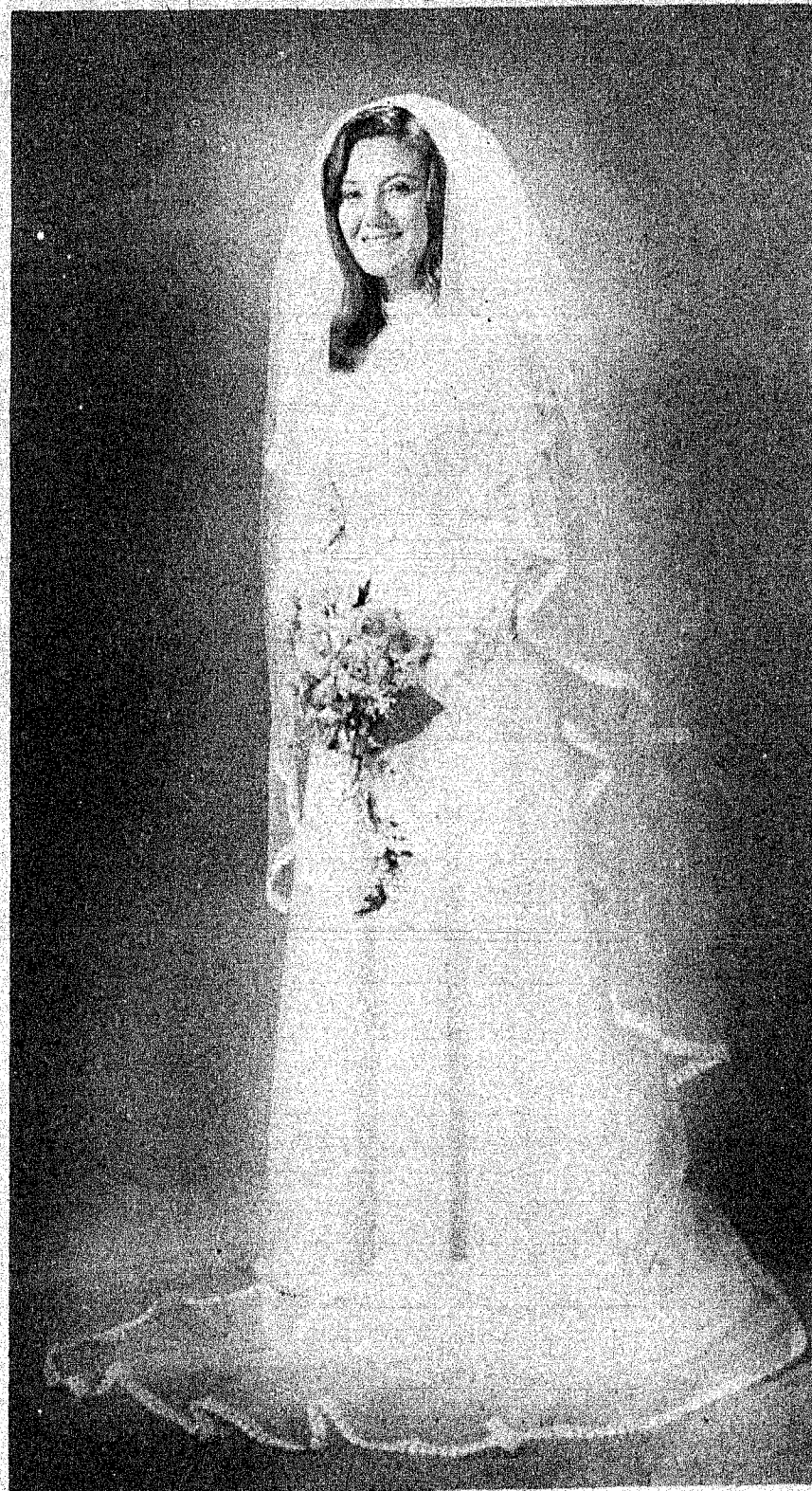
For the wedding trip to Tennessee and Arkansas, the bride wore a beige dress and jacket ensemble and red accessories and a red rose corsage.
