


Our schools need more educators such as Mr. Holt.

JUNIOR MOUNTIES LOSE TO EAGLES


The Santa Anna Junior High football team lost their final game last week when the Goldthwaite juniors won 22-0. The season ended with a 3-4 tally for the JHS team.



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Better Pastures To Be Discussed By Ag Experts

An intensive program on pasture improvement will be held in the District Courtroom in Coleman on Tuesday November 13, at 7:30 p.m., according to Roger Blackmon, County Extension Agent.

The meeting is open to all stockmen who are interested in pasture improvement. Dramatic changes are taking place at this time, says Blackmon, and producers need to keep abreast of

Speakers will include Dr. Willis Gass, Extension Agronomist, who will discuss establishing and utilizing Coastal bermudagrass pastures; Dr. Bob Steger, Extension Range Specialist will discuss establishing native grasses, such as Kleingrass, as well as native range improvement through brush and week control and other practices.Doug Sellers, Area Range Specialist for the Soil Conservation Service from Brownwood, will speak on the "High Intensity-Low Frequency" Grazing System that is attracting such attention across the state.

In many cases Blackmon observed, producers could get more return from money invested on their own place, than buying or leasing more land.

All local people are urged to attend this seminar.

Fred H. Shields, 71, was pronounced dead on arrival at the Coleman hospital Sunday afternoon at 4:15 after suffering an apparent heart attack. Funeral services for the Coleman County native were held Tuesday, November 6, at Stevens Funeral Chapelin Coleman with burial in the Santa Anna Cemetery.Rev. James Ford, pastor of the Assembly of God Church, officiated at the services.

Mr. Shields was born in Coleman on July 15, 1902. He married Maud French in Whon on October 29, 1922. He had lived in Coleman County all his life and was a member of the Assembly of God Church and a retired grocer.

Survivors include his wife; four daughters, Mrs. Evelyn Gilbert of San Angelo, Mrs. Leona Mae Frazee of Brookville, Ind., Mrs. Evelyn Wright of Fort Worth and Mrs. Lonell Thate of Santa Anna; four sons, Robert Shields of Odessa, Myrl Shields of Brownwood, and Leo and Hollis Shields both of Santa Anna; a sister, Mrs. Minnie French of Texas City ;two brothers, David Shields of Cross Plains and Calvin Shields of Santa Anna; 27 grandchildren and 13 greatgrandchildren.

Mr. Richard J. Goodman, Associate Administrator of the Foreign Agricultural Service, had this to say about our agricultural products.

This burgeoning demand for agricultural products, and the American farmer's ability to supply them, has profound implications not only for agriculture, but for the whole nation.

All of us would do well, from time to time, to remind our city friends that agriculture still is the nation's largest industry, that agriculture's exports, which have grown for four straight years and will increase again this year, now represent over one-fifth of total U.S. exports.

We should point out to those who would put controls on exports that agriculture has become the brightest spot in our national trade picture; and that it contributed a surplus of \$5.6 billion to the nation's trade balance last year when nonagricultural trade was running in

the hole by more than \$9 billion. This surplus, a favorable balance of trade, is the key to the ability to buy freely on the world market. If you want to buy in the world market, you have got to sell in the world market as much as you buy.

Too few people know, or understand, that commercial agricultural exports last year were enough to pay for our imports of coffee, tea, rubber, bananas, and all the other agricultural imports, and leave about \$4.5 billion left over. That was enough to offset the twobillion-dollar oil import defisit, with $$2^{1/2}$ billion more to apply to the imports of compact cars, motorcycles, TV sets, aluminum and other consumer and raw materials that we must have to maintain our standard of living.

As a nation, we are going to need this strong agricultural trade even moré as our dependence on foreign sources increases for the basic materials, such as oil.

THE CRISIS facing the nation is definitely one of the worst in its history. Probably the demonstrations and violence of a few years back has not divided the country as it is now.

There are three things that can happen—none of them good. The President can remain in office and try to pull the country together, which we don't think he can do; he could resign, which would not be good; and Congress could impeach him, however it is doubtful if they can find grounds for such drastic action.

Impeachment would probably be the worst thing that could be fall this country at the present time. It is a frightening prospect. The resignation of Mr. Nixon would be almost as bad. Assuming that the Congress confirms Gerald Ford, who would succeed the President, Mr. Fordis almost an unknown quantity. We know very little about him, and other than his own district he has had little publicity. The most notable quality is his ability to get people together, which is sorely needed at this time.

Our form of government makes us more vulnerable to such happenings than most other countries, but it is still the greatest country in the world, and will stay that way as long as the people are free to act and speak as they please.

The news media has come in for a lot of criticism from the administration and no doubt some of it is deserved. It does seem that many have grabbed every opportunity to publicize the bad rather than the good. But it is the responsibility of the press to give the people all the news, and most try to do just that, and let the chips fall where they may.

It is always a fact that an informed people will find a way to solve their problems, and the present situation is no exception. This era in American political life will go down in history as a hectic time, but, as before, we believe our countrywill pull through and live to see greater and better days.

Co-authoring the handbook with Maddox are Dr. John Sweeten, Extension Agricultural Engineer in animal waste management; and Dr. Dennis B. Herd, Extension beef cattle specialist-nutrition.

The handbook includes broad segments of information on nutrition, feed preparation and storage, animal health, feedlot management, feedlot planning and equipment, figures for feeders, waster management and a section for miscellaneous publications and information, explains the county extension agent.

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
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

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
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Ranger Park Inn Employees Chose J. Carson for November
