Two From SA Are Named on District Team

Santa Anna High School had two students named to the District 10-A All-District basketball teams last week, one from each the boys and girls teams.

Mark Shambleck, son of Rev. and Mrs. Louis Shambleck, was chosen from SAHS for the boys first team. He is a three-year letterman in basketball and was also a member of the football team where he received honorable mention for All-District as offensive guard. He is a senior student.

Serena Bryan, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Bryan of Rockwood, was chosen as All-District forward. Also a senior, Serena is head cheerleader and active in many school organizations. She has played basketball all four years in high school, lettering each year.

No Gasoline Shortage Here

While much is said and written about the gasoline shortage in urban areas, Santa Anna has no great fuel shortage and none is anticipated, according to most of the local service station owners and managers.

Grady Williams, owner of the Texaco Station, was the only one to close due to lack of gasoline. The station ran out of every grade of gasoline during the last weekend of February. They receive an allotment of fuel based

on their 1972 sales.

Both the Truck Harbor Standard station managed by Fred Woodard and the Santa Anna Skelly Station operated by Vernon Herring ran out of one grade of gasoline during the past weeks, and the EXXON Station operated by Lee Ray Huggins has been out of one or the other grades of gasoline at different times but never completely out of fuel.

Both the Skelly Station and the Standard Station have plenty of diesel although the Truck Harbor was without diesel for over a month during December and January. They are open only 12 hours a day instead of 24 as in former years.

The Arco Station operated by Jim Wells, has closed recently due to illness, but were never without gasoline while in operation. The Self-Serve station at the west end of town and the McCrary Premier Station owned by Luther McCrary have also had all the fuel they needed and anticipate no shortage. Sye Burden of Burden Mobil Station has never run out of gasoline but is closed on Sunday and often closes early on Saturday so that his regular customers will be able to get gasoline early Monday morning. None of the stations are open on Sunday since the shortage began.

Local people find it hard to imagine long lines at gas pumps or a shortage of fuel since there is apparently plenty here.

JHS Track Meet Slated Friday At SAHS Track

The Santa Anna Junior High track teams will open their season Friday when they take part in the Santa Anna JHS invitational track meet.

Events for both boys and girls teams will start at 2 p.m., and the finals will begin at 7 p.m. Thirteen boys teams and nine girls teams are entered in the meet.

The public is invited to attend the track meet Friday. The concession stand will be open during the day, and many out-of-town people are expected to attend.

Scant Rainfall Given for 1974

Rainfall for the Santa Anna area for the first two months of 1974 is almost non-existent. Ray Owen, official rainfall reporter, submitted the February report which gave a scant .40 inch which fell on Wednesday, February 20.

The February total added to the January moisture gives our community just over one-half inch for the year.

The two month total for 1973 was 3.15 inches.

PHIL-MART GROCERY STORE OPENING HERE THIS WEEK

A new business is opening in Santa Anna this week. Robert and David Barkley, owners of Phillips Drug and family center, are opening Phil-Mart food store at the former Purdy Mercantile location.

The Barkleys recently purchased the vacant building and have completely remodeled the interior. New shelves and display areas have been installed, and stocking of the store is underway.

Roy Buse, a former employee at Gaines Food Store, will be manager of the new business. Mrs. Robert Robinett and Mrs. Ezzell Blair, also formerly with the Gaines store, will be employed as checkers.

Other employees will be added as necessary.

The owners of the new business plan to carry a complete line of grocery goods at prices competitive with other stores in the area. It will be several weeks before the store is completely stocked, but they will open for business as soon as the first stock arrives.

The Barkley brothers have enlarged their present business during the past year to provide a drygoods and variety line and a dining facility. The new venture is to further provide good shopping facilities to residents of the entire Coleman County area.

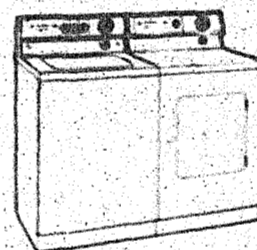

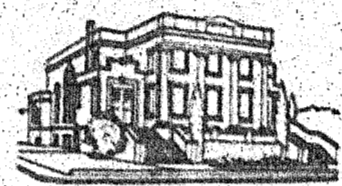

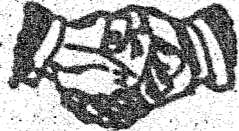
