

School Hours Changing Here With Start of Savings Time

Supt. Cullen Perry has announced that the Santa Anna schools will change their hours starting next Monday, January 7, after Daylight Saving Time goes into effect. School will start at 9:25 each morning and close at 5 p.m., keeping the same "suntime" as before. The time of the daily sessions will be changed. to an earlier hour later in the spring

Many of the school buses start

their routes about daylight at the present time, and starting an hour earlier would be a hardship on most families, especially those in the farthest parts of the school

Mr. Perry stated that the class schedule may be changed to make adjustment for the new hours, and perhaps changes made so that school can be dismissed earlier than 5 p.m.

Precinct Two

Commissioner In 1974 Race

Jake * McCreary, Commissioner of Precinct Two, has filed for re-election to the office for the third term. McCreary was the first candidate to announce to the NEWS, and so far the only candidate in the precinct race.

One race has developed in the County political arena as Louise Thompson is seeking the District Clerk post held by incumbent Tode Hensley.

Three county officials have announced their retirement at the end of their present terms and are Ralph Brown, commissioner of Precinct 4: County Judge Frank Lewis; and County Treasurer Monte Gideon.

Other candidates who have announced for election or reelection include John Sprinkles, tax assessor-collector: Walter Holt, justice of the peace for Precinct 1; D. H. Williams, County School Superintendent; Rondoe Horton, county treasurer; Hap Aston, commissioner of Precinct 4: Glenn Thomas, County Clerk; and Pete Skelton, County Judge.

McCreary, a Rockwood native, was appointed to fill the commissioner's post vacated by Thomas Wristen in 1966. He has been elected to office for two full terms, the first a two-year term and the second a four-year term.



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Vehicle Tags Are Available Through Mail

AUSTIN--Owners of some 8.4 million motor vehicles in Texas will have some important mail coming their way early in January.

Registration renewal applications will be put in the mail shortly after the holiday season by the Motor Vehicle Division of the Texas Highway Department.

The same quick and easy method made possible by modern computer technology will be in effect this year as it has been in the last few years.

Vehicle owners can save time that used to be spent waiting in long lines at county tax offices throughout the state by ordering their 1974 license plates by mail.

All that must be done is to send the entire three-part application by mail to the county tax assessor collector inthe owner's home county, enclosing the registration fee plus \$1 for each vehicle to cover handling and mailing.

You may apply for license plates by mail after January 1. However, county tax offices won't mail plates until after February 1. Owners should allow at least 30 days from the time they apply for the license plates to be returned.

In person registrations will begin at county tax offices and, in some counties, at substations on February 1. Even though the automated registration application procedures have speeded up the process, waiting lines will grow progressively longer as the April 1 deadline approaches.

It will be greatly appreciated if you will publish the total vote of property owners for and against the proposal to issue bonds during the recent school bond election in the Santa Anna Independent School District. Unless the laws have been only recently changed, it should be illegal for non-property owners to vote in a bond issue election where the interest and principal for the bonds would be paid from ad valorem real estate taxes.

Although non-property owners were allowed to vote in the recent bond election (it is illegal to refuse this right), they cast their ballots separately and were counted separately. Votes of nonproperty owners cannot be majority approve an election, but a majority of non-property owners can defeat a tax or bond election.

In the December 15 election, 355 property owners voted; 205 were for the tax issue and 140 against, 207 were for the issuance of bonds and 144 against.

Non-property owners voting in the election totaled 37. Those voting for the tax issue were 32, and voting against were 5; for the bond issue were 33, and voting against were 3.

CJC Extension Classes Start On January 15

Cisco Junior College has announced that six night extension courses along with one Saturday morning class will be offered in Goleman during the spring semester of 1974. The courses will all be fully-accredited college academic work, scheduled at various times during the week so that a student could take as many as twelve hours work in the program.

Courses to be offered are **English 123 (English Composition** and Rhetoric) and Psychology 223 (Applied Psychology) on Monday evenings, Sociology 223 (Social Problems), Spanish 114 (Beginning Spanish), and Accounting 224 (Principals of Accounting) on Tuesday evenings-- with labs for Spanish and Accounting on Thursday nights, Government 213 (American National Government) on Thursday nights, and Sociology 213 (Principles of Sociology) on Saturday mornings. Night classes will meet from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m. and the Saturday class will be held from 8:30 to 11:30 a.m.

Registration will be held at Coleman High School on January 15 from 6:00 to 7:00 p.m.

Cisco Junior College's statesupported tuition rates will apply to the Coleman extension courses as well as to all other extension programs offered by the college. Total costs for tuition and fees are \$46.75 for three hours, \$52.00 for four, \$57.50 for six, \$89.25 for nine, and \$109.00 for twelve hours. The Spanish class carries an additional \$5.00 lab fee.

CJC officials have encouraged people in the general area of Coleman who want to earn some college hours to take one or more courses in the Coleman program. "Combat the energy crisis by taking college courses near home." they said.

A number of Santa Anna people have taken advantage of the extension program since it's beginning about a year ago.



Cotton Harvest About Finished In Community

Cotton harvest in the Santa Anna area has almost been completed according to William Brown, manager of the Santa Anna Co-op Gin. The dry weather has helped the harvest this year, and all cotton should be brought into the gin this week if the weather remains good.

About 1100 bales have been ginned in Santa Anna this season, compared to under 1,000 last year. Also, ginning continued through April last season as the fields were too wet to harvest during part of the winter. Some cotton was never harvested last season because of the wet weather.

Cotton is bringing from 50 to 56 cents per pound this year compared to 21 to 23 cents last year. The cotton is above average this year with no "below grade" ginned here so far.

Danger rides the school bus . injuring more than 3,500 school children each year in school-bus accidents. In a single year some 75 children die in school-bus acci-

Billions can be spent in designing and building new buses, but Howard C. Mofenson, chairman of the American Academy of Pediatrics Committee on Accident Prevention, suggests spending what money is available to improve the buses now in use. He recommends padding seat rails and hiring an sdult (in addition to the bus driver) to menitor the children on the bus, supervise them as they get on and off and enforce a "no standing" rule. According to Mofenson, it's unrealistic to expect one person to be able to drive and supervise a busicad of

children. Parents can help, too, says the National Safety Council, by encouraging their children to 1. Leave the house early so they don't rush into an accident 2. Use handrails. 3. Take their seats quickly 4. Keep books, lunch pails, etc. out of the aisles. 5.

Avoid horseplay that could distract the driver il. Eat breakfast. and finish homework at home. (Spilled food can cause slips; a sudden stop may cause a child to jab himself with a pencil or pen.) 7. Stand away from the bus as it pulls away and cross at least 10 feet in front, where the driver can see them.

And the family our . . Very few parents, when driving with their children, lock car doors, seat children in the rear, and use seat belts. This was the conclusion of a telephone survey of 162 parents by researchers at the University of Rochester School of Medicine. Roadside observations of children in possing cars conarmed the findings of the telephone poll, which showed that fewer than one-lifth of parents insisted on safety practices in cars. Why the concern? Each year nearly 6,000 children under 15 are killed and 258,000 are injured in automobile accidents.




