Dwight Eppler Takes Training For Airbourne

Dwight Eppler, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. D. Eppler of Rockwood, completed Airborne School at Fort Benning, Georgia recently. The training included three weeks of training and five parachute jumps from a C-141 jet aircraft and a C-130 prop aircraft from 1250 feet.

Eppler, a senior student at the University of Texas at Arlington and a member of the UTA Reserve Officer Training Corps, reported to Fort Riley, Kansas June 14 for six weeks of advanced training in tactics and weapons.

Dwight is a 1971 graduate of Santa Anna High School. His wife, a native of Abilene, is also a student at UTA.

All Bids Exceed Bonds For School Improvements

Contractors' bids on the proposed school construction project exceeded the \$600,000 bond issue, and the proposed improvement project has gone back to the architect's drawing board for revisions and cuts.

At the Tuesday, June 4, meeting of the School Board the lowest bid on the improvement project was \$833,125. Two of the bids were over one million dollars.

Stanley Brown, Abilene architect, will make revisions in the plans and bids will be again called for. First to be revised is the physical education building which will probably be decreased in size. Plans to remodel air condition and carpet the auditorium will be cut from the plans, and other changes made to cut the total cost.

The school board agreed to go ahead with the re-roofing of the high school building as more damage to the walls and ceilings is done with each rain. Lumber decking underneath the tile roofing has rotted away in several places along the front of the

building. Classroom remodeling will also be started soon.

Haney and Silvey Construction Company of Abilene was low bidder on the project. Four other major companies also submitted bids for the extensive project.

Some of the contractors present stated that the proposed project could have been built at the \$600,000 figure last year, but costs have almost doubled in recent months and more increases are expected.

Following the meeting with the contractors and architect, the school board went into called session.

Another meeting is planned for Thursday night (tonight) for the regular monthly session to consider plans for the remodeling project. It will take several weeks for the architect to complete the amended gymnasium plans and get new bids on the project.

School board members and administrators will plan for priority projects in the improvement program, and make changes to meet the school financing schedule.

His ministry has included being pastor of the Baylord, New Mexico church from 1963 to 1967; St. James Methodist Church in El Paso from 1967 to 1969; and associate pastor of the Hurst UMC from 1969 to 1971; and Aldersgate Methodist Church the following year.

Native Santa Annan Rodger Collins Succeeding in Show Business

The lights may not be very bright, but the welcome was warm in Santa Anna for a native son who is now becoming widely known as a rock singer and entertainer.

Rodger Collins Jr. of San Francisco, California visited recently in Santa Anna with his grandmother, Mrs. Hannah Collins, and other relatives for two weeks. He came here to be with his grandmother who has been ill.

The son of Rodger and Mary Oliver Collins, Rodge Jr. was born in Santa Anna and attended

school here before moving to California at the age of 12. He has been in the entertainment field since 1960 when he entered a talent contest on a dare after friends saw him singing doing pantomimes while instructing a class of swimmers. He became a professional entertainer in 1960 and had had his own rock band since 1967.

Collins' top record, "She's Looking Good", has sold over two and one-half million copies since being recorded in 1967. It is one of 22 singles and one album to his credit. He also shared music credits in the motion picture "Black Girl" including being co-writer of two of the songs in the movie. He records under the Fantasy label.

Besides being a singer, Collins plays the guitar and other musical instruments. He and his band travel all over the United States and recently played at the Hilton International in Las Vegas on the same bill with Elvis Presley and Redd Foxx.

Collins has returned to California to continue recording an album of songs which he wrote and arranged. He is also involved with record production which records songs later produced by major record companies. Another project is the

organization of a non-profit corporation to encourage and aid young unknown or unemployed entertainers and musicians.

The Santa Anna native is also active with the Cycle Cell Anemia Research and Education Foundation, a blood disorder that strikes Black people.

Collins' latest record, "You Sexy Sugar Plum," is currently being heard on Radio Station KBWD in Brownwood.

Mrs. Allison was born at Bangs and Mr. Allison was born in the Niwot community southeast of Santa Anna.

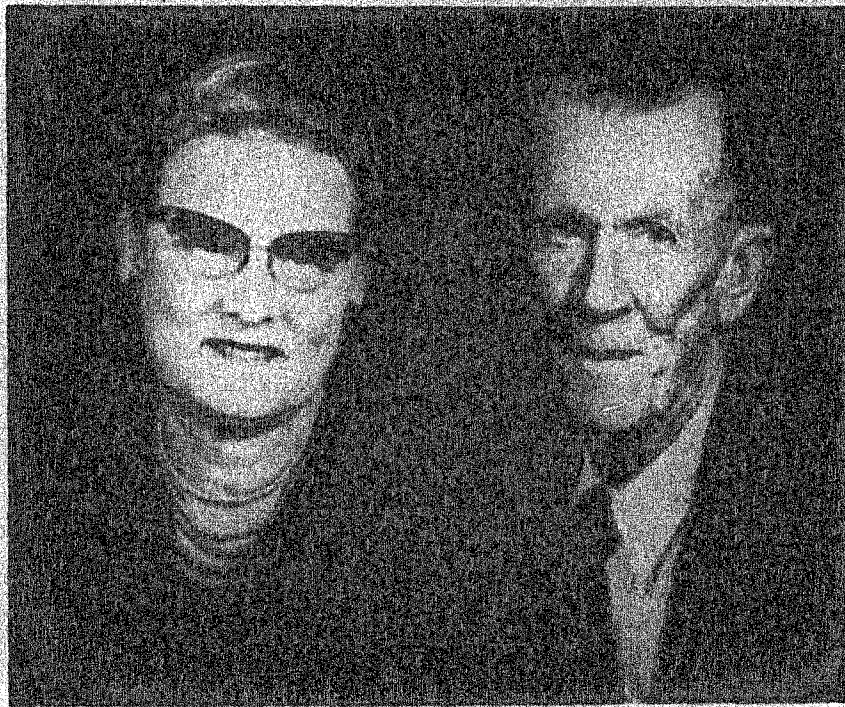

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THE TIME FOR THANKS AND A TIME FOR THOUGHT

Please Excuse the delay in the publication of my thank you note to the voters of Coleman County, but I felt that I should wait until the final outcome of the Primaries so it would not seem that I was trying to influence anyone in this election. I consider my political obligations very important to the community and my family, I feel that the statements that will follow my thanks are necessary to fulfill my obligations to the voters who gave me their votes of confidence.

I sincerely extend my heartfelt thanks to the voters who supported me in my quest for the office of County Judge of Coleman County in the past May 4th Primary, and I can assure them that my primary interest in the office was for the People of Coleman County, and I sincerely hope that they voted for me because they felt I was a "good ole boy".

The following statements are made with candor. I felt that they should have been made during my campaign for the Judge's office, but I am sure that the voters would have said "well, ole John is just throwing mud to gain some votes", although when one is telling the truth he is not slinging mud, so now that I do not have anything to gain by telling the truth; maybe some of the voters will re-evaluate the importance of our electoral system and the importance of each Candidate being thoroughly qualified for the office that he or she seeks; because really, the elected offices of a County are of vital importance to every tax-payer in the County in one way or another.

Considering the facts of Politics in Coleman County, did you know that there were at least five willful violations of our state election laws and code in the past May 4th and June 1st primaries and that the election judges of the precincts where these violations occurred could be and should be fined a minimum of \$500.00 for each of the violations occurring in their voting precincts? The polls are supposed to be a place where a voter can cast a Secret ballot, therefore, the elections should be conducted in a manner prescribed by state laws, and not just a place where people get together and discuss who they want to vote for; these decisions should be made before a person goes to the polls, no-one should be able to look over your shoulder and see how you voted, when one can do this it is not a Secret Ballot. Did you know that there are specific qualifications set forth in the Texas Election Laws for the office of County Judge?

For those of you who are interested, I can furnish you with the specific violations, the chapter, article number and the page on which it can be found in the book of Texas Election Laws.

I think that the qualifications of any candidate should be paramount and should befit the office that he seeks; if this were the case, then a voter could be assured of a qualified person no matter for whom he voted, even if it were a "good ole boy". I think the only exception to this rule should be when none of the Candidates for a particular office are qualified for it, in this case, one should vote for the Candidate Whom he or she honestly believes will make the most honest effort to fulfill the duties of the office that he or she seeks.

I don't believe that the taxpayer should have to foot the bill for someone else to do the work of an elected official unless the work load is such that the elected official is unable to do it all. If the official is a drunk or has so many outside interests that he is unable to carry out the duties of his office, then he should be removed from that office, and above all he should not be re-elected because you feel sorry for him or because someone else has done a good job of taking care of his office through his last term in office. "A candidate should consider what he can do for the office he seeks, not what the office can do for him".

I believe that any and all elective office holders should base their business and or political decisions on what will best benefit the majority of their constituents and not simply because it is or will be Politically expedient. Incompetence in any job is a direct result of not being qualified for it in the first place and I know of no job nor office for which being a "good ole boy" would qualify a person. You most certainly would not hire a person to take care of your children nor run your business or your farm or ranch simply because he was a "Good ole Boy" you probably would require him to have the qualifications for the particular job. A person would not go to a Commissioners' court to hire a Plumber nor should he go to a Plumbers' meeting to

hire a County Commissioner; unless of course he had other specific qualifications that would qualify him or her for the office. We know that County Commissioners work with County Judges, but I'm sure that this fact does not supply the necessary experience to qualify a commissioner for the job of a County Judge. There is a world of difference in the scope and responsibilities of the job of a County Judge. There is a world of difference in the scope and responsibilities of the two offices; the Judge has to pinch hit for a commissioner at times, plus a multitude of other responsibilities that have no connection what-so-ever with the commissioners court, and above all, the County Judge should be a man who will not quit in the middle of a term, no matter how rough the going gets, any elected official who has walked away from his responsibilities and the confidence that the voters have placed in him by resigning from the office before the finish of the elected term should certainly not be given the chance to do so again. An office holder should always think of the people who put him in that office and consider what he can do for the office and not what the office can do for him. He should not be a person who would quit school or college because he couldn't hack it; then ask the County tax payers to pay him to learn what he should have learned in school. An incomplete course in law or anything else is "kinds" like a road that ends abruptly, it just won't take you anyplace. He should not be a person who has never been a success at anything that he undertook or who has depended on the good name and monetary backing of someone else, and if he is a school teacher with no other qualifications, then he should stick to school teaching. A county should elect Commissioners who will respect other elective offices (they were elected also) and men who have the inestinal fortitude to tell another elected official that they intend to cancel his insurance or cut his salary (for no reason) and not elect those who will do these things then lie about it and deny it was done. Furthermore, Commissioners, who will tell the men who work for them who not to vote for certainly should not be elected. The American people have the most powerful weapon in the world (The Vote) it can change the whole United States if it is used wisely, and the whole country can change (without the will of the people) if it is not used wisely. There are almost 6,000 registered voters in Coleman County (there should be many more) and just barely over 3,000 voted in the past Democratic primary elections. This is a pitifully few votes when one considers the importance of County Government as a whole. Our County Government (all the elective offices) is like a machine; it cannot function properly with even one useless gear or a gear that does not know what it is supposed to do, so when we vote, lets vote for a gear that knows what and how to do it's job, and not just for a "good ole boy".

I have heard people say that if a candidate did not think enough of his or her vote to ask for it, then he wouldn't get it, yet these same people will vote for a candidate in state or national elections who they have never seen and certainly the candidate could not ask them for their vote personally; in these cases they (the voter) ascertain from what he or she says on T.V. or what he puts in the paper whether or not he is qualified for the office that he seeks, because they know not if he is a "good ole boy". I have heard people comment that a candidate did not dress the way they thought they should, but did they ever stop to think that a terrible pile of junk can be covered up with a nice paint job or a pretty outside wall; so you see, it is not the outer part of a man or woman by which you should judge them, but the inner part. I even heard people make the statement that they would vote for a man simply because his opponent was a woman and they felt that a woman should not hold a public office. I feel that any person who would not vote for a woman simply because she was a woman even though she was a well qualified candidate certainly does not care about the well being of the office involved.

It was not and is not my intention to offend any particular one in the foregoing statements, but if the shoe should happen to fit anyone, I'm sure they will know how to wear it. In case anyone should want to know anything about the statements I have made, please feel free to call me at any time; give your name and I will gladly make clear to you any part of my statements.

Again, I want to thank all of those who voted for me and expressed their confidence in me by doing so.

The recently labelled brut child abuser in the name of religion, Brother Lester Roloff, was in Brownwood Monday night for a rally in the Brownwood Coliseum.

Roloff explained that he has been verbally assaulted, sent to prison, and had the doors of three of his institutions for the helpless and hopeless shut.

"The fight we fight tonight," announced Roloff "is a Bible fight." "If we let them close Christian homes, then they will try to close our churches."

Currently, as a result of a Supreme Court ruling Roloff's homes have reopened.

Present with Roloff at the rally were girls from the Rebekah Home. They sang and gave testimony to the way their lives have been changed from bitterness and hopelessness to happiness and hope through the work of the home.

"We are working with tomorrow's criminals today," related Roloff. "It takes more than a psychiatrist to solve these kids problems—they need the Saviour." Many of the girls had been involved in witchcraft, mental depression, and suicide attempts. But, now they are intellectual standouts and different personalities.

The battle for these children's homes has taken Roloff to the Supreme Court of Texas where he has had to fight for religious liberty and freedom and separation of church and state. "The church has never needed a state head, and the state has never needed a church head," stated Roloff.

The welfare department has not represented the children in the opinion of Roloff, and they closed three of his institutions because of the legality of a license. "They (the Welfare Dept.) are trying to

make it impossible for the church to run its homes, camps, etc. with such demands as 1 worker for every 8 girls, requiring superintendents to have a degree and 15 hours in social studies, to have a personal exam before the welfare board, to obtain a solicitation permit to raise money even when the homes charge nothing for entrants, to give kenacial audit to the board, and to go by diets set by the welfare board.

"They are against Bible discipline," related Roloff.

The hope of America's future is in the salvation of today's youth and the young people "are

everywhere today except listening to the gospel" he said.

All of the entertainment provided today has not met the needs of the young people," he added.

"America today is a dope nation and an undisciplined nation in a society which is morally, socially, financially, and spiritually bankrupt," announced Roloff and it is because "we have forgotten how to live simple lives of faith."

In textbook cases of yellow journalism, Roloff has been slandered with such accusations of beating children with metal tipped leather straps, and of picking up a little girl by the dress.

Roloff has filed a claim against the Texas Observer Publishing Company, the Houston Post Company, The Chicago Daily News,

Last year 3,100 people stayed at the beach. Permanently.



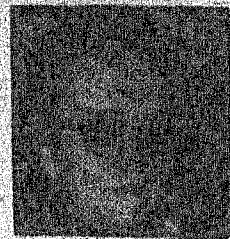
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Trickham News
