COLEMAN, SANTA ANNA COFC SEEK COUNTYWIDE GROWTH

A group of Santa Anna people were in Coleman last week for a joint meeting of directors of the Santa Anna and Coleman Chambers of Commerce. Leading the meeting were Bill Street, Coleman C of C manager, and Richard Compton, C of C president, and Robert Barkley of the Santa Anna Chamber of Commerce.

Purpose of the meeting was to discuss ways in which the two organizations could cooperate in promoting Coleman County. Specific needs cited in which the united effort would help were in promotion of the water system for the south part of Coleman County, encouraging the local route of the proposed Port to Plains highway, and planning of a bi-centennial observance.

It was also suggested that the Coleman industrial committee have a list of available industrial sites in Santa Anna, and that the two groups work together to secure industries for the county.

Plans are also being made to have a county-wide committee to work with the two organizations to promote activities in the smaller towns and communities. Another meeting is slated for June to name the county committee.

Need for promoting the area growth was cited by leaders of the organizations, and cooperation is a necessity for anticipated growth in the area.

Others from Santa Anna attending the meeting were Norman Walters, Rob Cheaney, Ford Barnes, and Barbara Kingsbery, about ten from Coleman were on hand for the meeting.

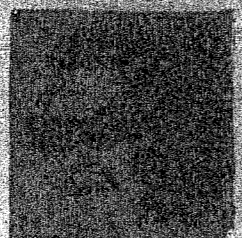

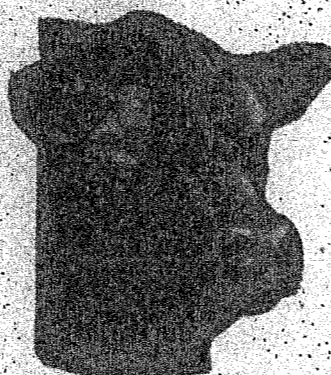

During the past two years certain students of Santa Anna Schools have done a superior job representing themselves, their school and the people of Santa Anna. It is estimated that over a million people have seen these students, but praise for these students both in their performance and in their actions. These students are the Bandsmen of the Santa Anna Bands.

The Newspaper has done an outstanding job reporting the performances and accomplishments of the Santa Anna Bands, but since the Bands compete and perform the entire year their accomplishments may seem small and few between. It is not until all of the accomplishments of the Bands and their members are listed at one time as the true magnitude realized. It is for this purpose and to pay tribute to the young men and women of the Santa Anna Bands that this article is written.

Since, at the present time, most people have never competed in a musical organization we will give a brief explanation on how a Band or a Bandsman wins or loses. When the young musician goes before a judge they receive a Division Rating. The Division Ratings were established by the Music Educators' National Conference and the University Interscholastic League and it is a universal system of judging. When a Band receives a First Division it is considered as Superior, no better performance (First Place). Second Division is considered as Excellent, a few minor flaws in performance. (Second Place). Third Division is considered as Average with some flaws in performance. (Third Place). Fourth Division is considered Below Average with major flaws and needs further instruction. Fifth Division is considered Poor with major flaws and needs much more instruction in the basic fundamentals.

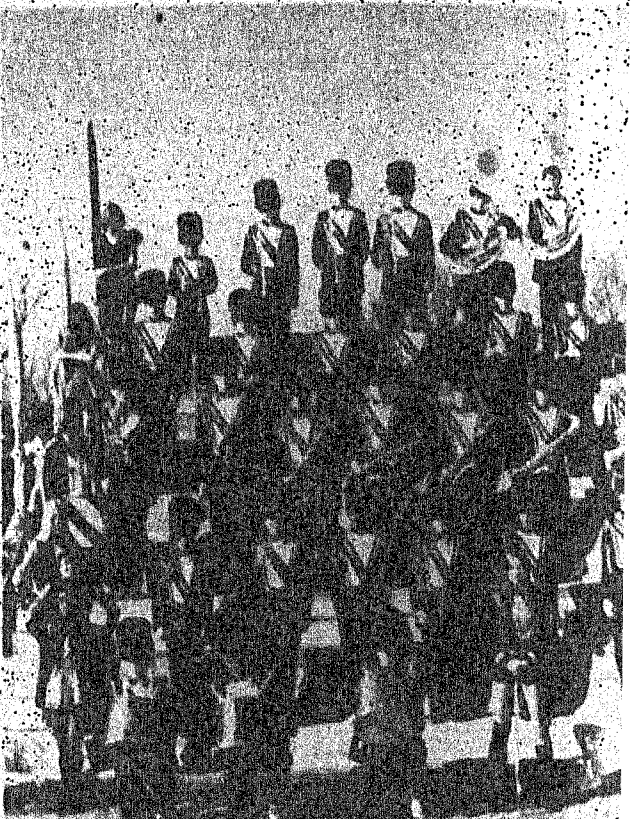

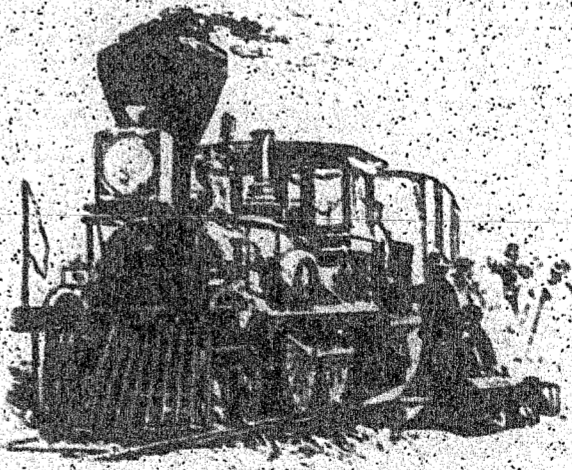
