SAHS FFA Members Awarded At Recent District Meet

The Santa Anna Future Farmers of America chapter had several honors last week when the Coleman FFA District meeting was held in Winters.

Lane Guthrie, son of Mr. and Mrs. M. L. Guthrie Jr., was approved as a Lone Star Farmer. Only two per-cent of the FFA members receive this advanced award. Lane will receive the award at the state FFA convention this summer.

Guthrie, a senior at SAHS, was also nominated for the Red Davidson Scholarship, a \$700 award to the college of his choice. He will compete with other district nominees for the scholarship to be announced May 10 at the Area IV meeting at Tarleton State University.

Cline Smith, a freshman student at Abilene Christian College, was awarded the Star American Farmer Degree from the Coleman District. The award must also be approved at area, state and national levels. Star American Farmers must have been out of high school one year

and maintained outstanding performance in leadership and supervised farming programs.

Rain in S-Anna Very Welcome

The heaviest rainfall since early last fall soaked the Coleman County area during the night Tuesday, more than doubling the previous rainfall total for 1974.

The unofficial total in Santa Anna early Wednesday morning, May 1, was 2.4 inches, which added to the .6 on Monday night gave a three-inch total.

In the Cleveland Community, R. W. Cupps reported 2.3 inches for the two-day total, and in the Buffalo Community Garland Powell reported 2.6.

The largest amount reported was at the Obe Yancy place in the Shields Community where .9 was recorded Monday night and another 3.4 inches Wednesday morning. Other two-day totals included Tricham—3.1; Whon—3.7; and Rockwood 3.6.

Many of the rural residents reported that tanks caught water during the slow rain. Fields, pastures and yards got their first good soaking in over six months. Light showers were still falling Wednesday morning at press time.

The Community Services Center of the Santa Anna Seventh-day Adventist church is observing this week a century of service by such center of the denomination.

According to Mrs. D. W. Danielson, every Seventh-day Adventist church has an organization with its focus on helping the poor or disaster-ridden in its community. These centers give aid to more than a million people each year.

She says: "We serve not only people in Santa Anna, but through our world air organization, Seventh-day Adventist Services Inc., also known as SAWS, we reach out to around 50 countries where disasters of one type or another have occurred."

"Drought-stricken areas, like eastern Africa-Ethiopia, are among those receiving assistance from us," Mrs. Danielson explains. "We have hospitals in Ethiopia, but when the famine struck there, SAWS also sent over a special man to head up the famine struck there."

Materials collected here are processed, given out here as needs arise, some sent to the relief headquarters, and some

are sent to the relief depots in New York and Monterey Bay, California. They also contribute a special offering each year to the SAWS fund.

The local center is on the second floor of Medical Clinic building on Fae Street. Anyone in need may call and they will be given help needed if possible.

Immunizations Set Here May 6

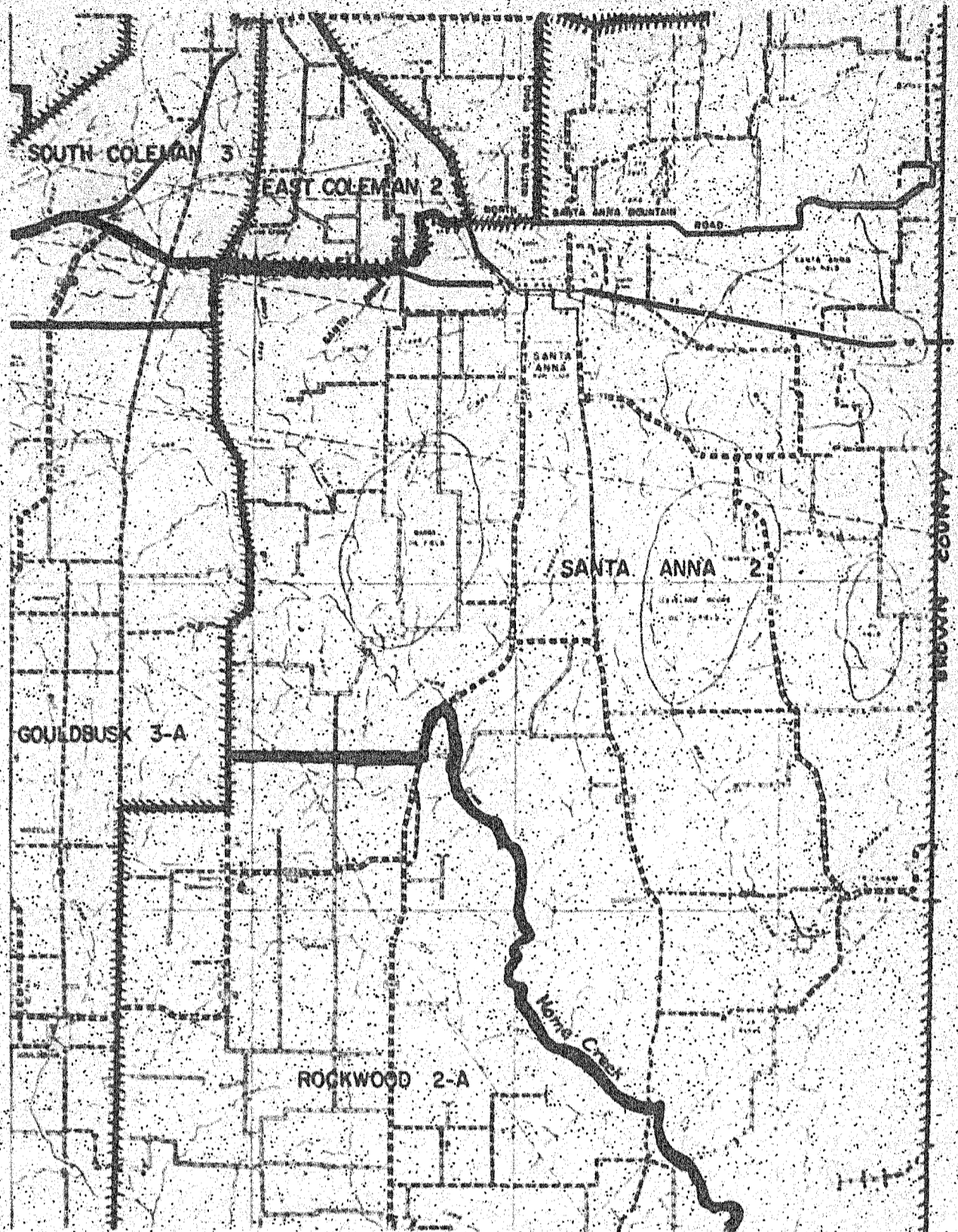

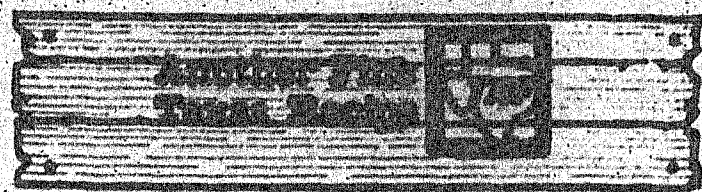

| 2 cups chopped leftover roast beef | 1/2 tsp. black pepper |

Chop garlic, pepper and onion finely and cook in skillet with melted butter until wilted. Add remaining ingredients and cook slowly for 15 minutes. Put 2 cups chopped leftover roast beef in bowl and add enough sauce to moisten well. Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Roll pastry on floured board to thickness 1/8 inch. Cut into 9-inch squares and put mound of filling in center of each. Brush edges with water, then fold into triangles and seal edges together with a fork. Bake on cookie sheet for 15-20 minutes or until brown. Serve with remaining sauce.

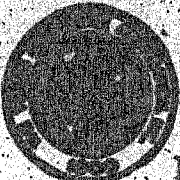

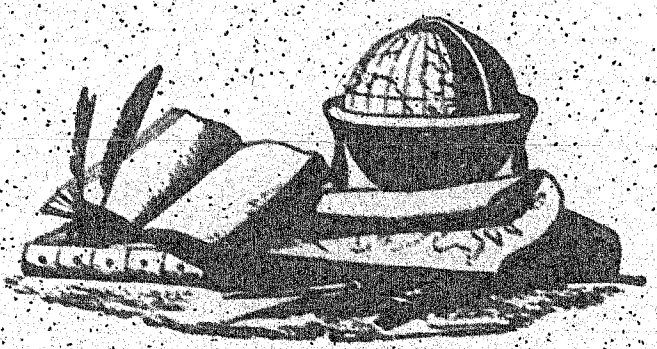

The Saturday evening activity will start with a sandwich supper at the annex at 7 p.m. Sunday services will be at the usual times followed by a fellowship dinner at the annex.

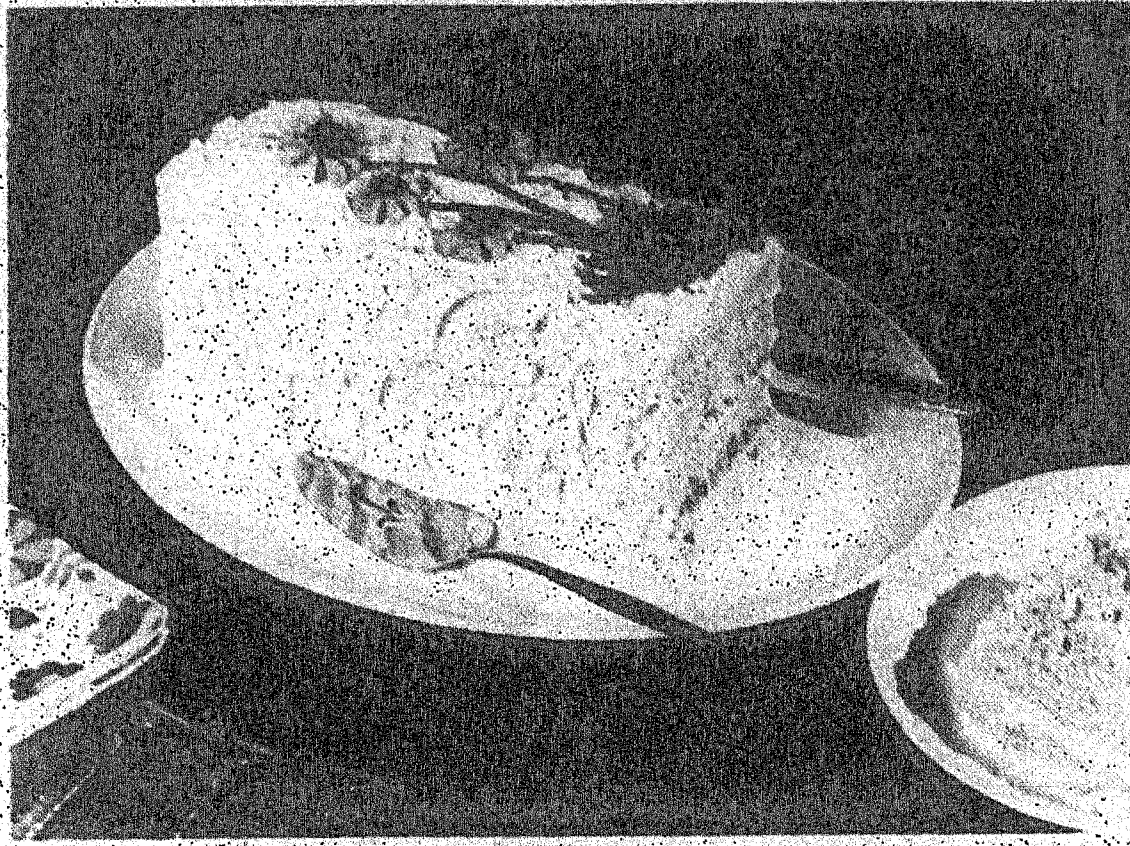
It is hoped that a number of people from other churches will take part in the weekend activities, and all are welcome to attend any or all of the programs.
