Mountaineer Band Rehearsals Start

The Santa Anna Mountaineer Band started rehearsals this week in preparation for the football season. The pre-season practice sessions are held at 7 p.m. each evening at the Band Hall.

Jim Andrews, new band director of the local schools, is expecting about 60 students to be enrolled in the band this year. Any students in the seventh through twelfth grades interested in the band are urged to take part, especially those who have been in band before.

The practice sessions will include both marching and playing, and students should report with their instruments for the practice sessions.

'74 Mountaineer Grid Team

Expecting Successful Season

The 1974 Mountaineer football team started workouts for the fall seasons on Monday, August 12. The first week's practice will be

in shorts and tee shirts as no contact equipment may be issued until Friday, August 16.

The workouts are being held once each day except on Friday when the team will meet at 6 a.m. and again at 5 p.m.

Starting next Monday with the first day of school, the workouts will be at the 3 p.m. period if the weather remains cool. Otherwise the practice session will be held later in the afternoon.

Coach Gene Williams and Coach Jerry Allen had 29 boys out for the team on the first day and expect a few more before the seasons starts. This is an increase of 10 over last year.

Included on the 1974 roster are ten returning lettermen. Among the stand-outs for the team will be Steve Beal, a senior all-district tackle. Hank Wise, a senior who will be playing end. Marty Warnock, a senior who has switched a tailback. Jody Day, a junior quarterback, and Albert DeLoos, a junior halfback.

The team will have many changes in personnel due to the loss of a number of starters from last season. However Coach Williams expects to make a good showing this season as Santa Anna enters Class B competition. Eden is expected to be the leading contender for the Zone Title this

ORDINANCE NO. 282
BE IT ORDAINED By the City of Santa Anna:

That Section 8 of Ordinance No. 183 of the City of Santa Anna, Texas, is hereby amended and shall be hereafter read as follows:

"SECTION 8—Any person allowing any livestock, except horses or cattle, to run at large on City Lake property, in the drainage area, or to drink the waters of either lake or to wade or stand in the water of either lake shall be guilty of a misdemeanor."

No Screwworms In Coleman Co. During July

Screwworm cases in Texas dropped during July due to the dry weather, but infestations are expected to increase since the recent rains.

Coleman County did not have any confirmed cases of screwworms during July according to a release from the Mission center.

Confirmed cases in Texas totaled 546 in July, a drop from the June figure of 628. However there were reports of cases from farther north than before, indicating the annual summer migration of the screwworm flies. One case was reported in Oklahoma.

In the surrounding area, Brown County, Taylor County and Runnels County each had only one reported confirmed case during July.

Local Livestock producers are urged to watch their livestock closely for any infestation and to send suspected samples to the Mission Eradication Laboratory for confirmation.

Everyone in the community is invited to attend and all members of the cooperative are urged to be present at the meeting next week.


Former Pastor Visits Here During Weekend
