Mrs. Ella Hart brought us a list of items shown in the ledger of her late father, G. W. Wynn of Keene, during the year of 1918. The late Mr. Wynn was said to be a meticulous record-keeper, and some of the items listed included the following:

5 gallons cooking oil - \$2.50
100 pounds flour - \$2.15
1 gallon coal oil (kerosene) - 10 cts
Butter, pound - 25 cts
4 bunches shingles - \$1.50
Labor per hour (threshers) - 15 cts.

Mountaineer Band Rehearsals Start

The Santa Anna Mountaineer Band started rehearsals this week in preparation for the football season. The pre-season practice sessions are held at 7 p.m. each evening at the Band Hall.

Jim Andrews, new band director of the local schools, is expecting about 60 students to be enrolled in the band this year. Any students in the seventh through twelfth grades interested in the band are urged to take part, especially those who have been in band before.

The practice sessions will include both marching and playing, and students should report with their instruments for the practice sessions.

'74 Mountaineer Grid Team Expecting Successful Season

The 1974 Mountaineer football team started workouts for the fall seasons on Monday, August 12. The first week's practice will be in shorts and tee shirts as no contact equipment may be issued until Friday, August 16.

The workouts are being held once each day except on Friday when the team will meet at 6 a.m. and again at 5 p.m.

Starting next Monday with the first day of school, the workouts will be at the 3 p.m. period if the weather remains cool. Otherwise the practice session will be held later in the afternoon.

Coach Gene Williams and Coach Jerry Allen had 29 boys out for the team on the first day and expect a few more before the seasons starts. This is an increase of 10 over last year.

Included on the 1974 roster are ten returning lettermen. Among the stand-outs for the team will be Steve Beal, a senior all-district tackle. Hank Wise, a senior who will be playing end, Marty Warnock, a senior who has switched a tailback. Jody Day, a junior quarterback, and Albert DeLeon, a junior halfback.

Ballots for Chamber of Commerce directors were canvassed last week with the ones chosen being Thomas Wristen, O. L. Cheaney, Norman Walters, Rob Cheaney and Barbara Kingsbery. Wristen and O. L. Cheaney will serve one-year terms and the other three will serve two years.

The five directors met Monday afternoon, August 12, and elected Rob Cheaney as president. O. L. Cheaney will be treasurer of the group.

Plans for the year were discussed, and a membership drive planned. It is hoped that each business in Santa Anna will become a member of the Chamber of Commerce and that individuals in town and the surrounding area will also join. Screwworms cases in Texas dropped during July due to the dry weather, but infestations are expected to increase since the recent rains.

Coleman County did not have any confirmed cases of screwworms during July according to a release from the Mission center.

Confirmed cases in Texas totaled 546 in July, a drop from the June figure of 628. However there were reports of cases from farther north than before, indicating the annual summer migration of the screwworm flies. One case was reported in Oklahoma.

In the surrounding area, Brown County, Taylor County and Rusk County each had only one reported confirmed case during July.

Local Livestock producers are urged to watch their livestock closely for any infestation and to send suspected samples to the Mission Eradication Laboratory for confirmation.

The three children will be attending school here. Mr. Hamlin is working at their home redecorating and remodeling the interior. Mrs. Hamlin is employed in Brownwood.

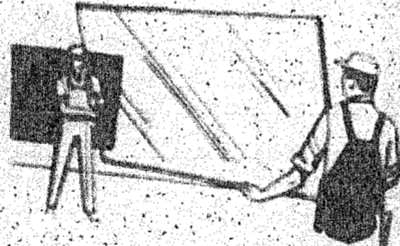
