Our community would welcome a good rain. We do have a little prospect of moisture this Monday night we hear thunder and there are rain clouds in sight.

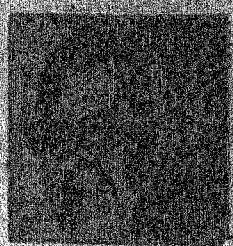

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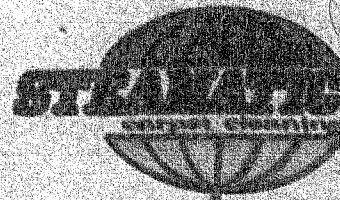
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Eddie Hartman New President Of SA Boosters

County Ranchers Asked to List Hunting Leases

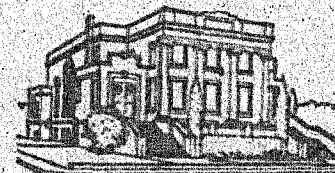
Ranchers and landowners are being urged to contact the Coleman Chamber of Commerce office if they have any land available for lease to hunters for the 1974-75 seasons.

Emergency Loans Now Available To Producers

Financial assistance to livestock and poultry producers under the Emergency Livestock Credit Act will become available this week through a new loan guarantee authority of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), a rural credit service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Mr. Thomas E. Hill, FmHA County Supervisor, said agency will be prepared to implement the recently-enacted law by guaranteeing up to 80 percent of possible loss on loans made by legally organized lenders to livestock and poultry producers.

Under terms of the act, the loan guarantee program will be in effect through July 25, 1975. It may be extended for 6 months beyond that date if the Secretary of Agriculture determines that it is needed to help the livestock industry obtain sufficient credit.

The law calls for loans to be made by banks or other legally organized lenders. Hill said interested producers are urged to make applications to, and complete loan arrangements with lending institutions. The lender in turn will ask FmHA for a loan guarantee if one is required. The lender in turn will process the application, close the loan and service it.

The maximum loan to any single borrower that can be

guaranteed by an FmHA guarantee is \$250,000. Loans will be repayable in 1 to 3 years, although renewal for 2 years may be authorized. Interest rates are determined between borrower and lender.

Hill said the agency is authorized to guarantee up to 80 percent loss a lender may incur on loans to bonafide farmers and ranchers who breed, raise, fatten or market beef and dairy cattle, hogs, sheep, goats, chickens and turkeys. A majority of the borrower's income must come from the operation, and a majority portion of the borrower's time must be devoted to the livestock or poultry production.

In the case of a corporation or partnership, assistance can be extended only when the majority partners or stockholders are primarily engaged in the livestock or poultry production. FmHA guarantees will be made only when the bonafide farmer or

rancher cannot obtain financing without a guarantee. Loans may not be used to expand operations. Hill said the county FmHA office serving the area where the borrower's livestock or poultry operations are conducted will handle requests from lenders for guarantees, or supply information on the loan guarantee program.

The FmHA Office serving Coleman County is located in the Rhone Building in Coleman.

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Oil Prices, Reserves Criticized By White

AUSTIN—Major oil companies should either reduce retail gasoline prices or produce more middle distillate fuels for farmers, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White said recently.

"Reserves of gasoline and crude oil are up nearly 10 percent over a year ago," the commissioner said. "Storage facilities are growing short but diesel fuel so essential for production and transportation is costing farmers and truckers double and triple over the prices of last year."

White noted that the American Petroleum Institute has revealed a cutback in gasoline production by refiners because "they are just not able to sell all of their products" at present prices.

"This crude oil now being withheld from gasoline refining should be diverted to middle distillates for agriculture at reasonable prices," White declared. "There is also a severe shortage of petroleum-based fertilizers and current prices are 'astronomical'."

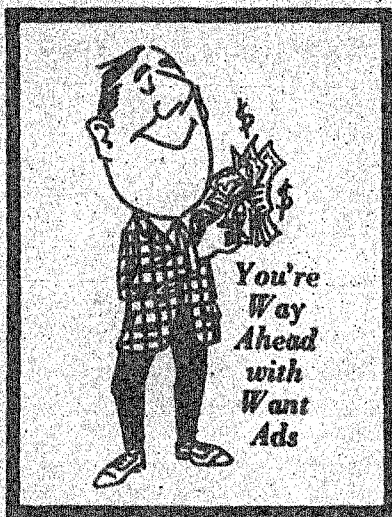
White said high petroleum prices are reflected directly in high food costs. "Until

fuel and fertilizers are available at reasonable levels, we won't be able to relieve much of the pressure on food prices," he said.

"It is hard to refrain from being critical when we read that second quarter oil company profits are up by 30 to 50 percent over last year, representing multi-millions of dollars," said White. "Then to learn that crude oil is being stockpiled rather than converted to less profitable agricultural fuels."

White cited the API report that gasoline production has been reduced some 3,360,000 gallons a day since July 1 "due to lack of demand at current prices." Meanwhile reserves are growing and storage facilities are strained.

White's remarks were addressed to the Petersburg Lions Club.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN, Tex. — Battle lines are drawn for the State Democratic Convention here September 17.

Liberal delegates, although apparently outnumbered, asserted their intentions at a recent meeting in San Antonio to claim their full share of convention plums.

— First, they made clear, they will fight for proportional representation on the State Democratic Executive Committee, the party's policy-making and house-keeping body in Texas.

— Second, they are demanding their share of the 76 delegates to the national Democratic mid-term mini-convention in Kansas City next December.

— The liberals also made preparations for expressing their views on the party platform, resolutions and rules.

— Finally, they indicated they may challenge Gov. Dolph Briscoe's choice for SDEC chairman and other top committee officers. Choices of incumbent governors for these posts traditionally have gone unchallenged where they have majority control of conventions.

The "open party" Democrats at the San Antonio session adopted a platform committing themselves to a state party organization that will support Democratic candidates and principles at all levels rather than "promoting the policies of incumbent governors."

Bob Bullock of Austin, Democratic nominee for comptroller, is being urged to oppose incumbent SDEC Chairman Calvin Guest of Bryan, Governor Briscoe's choice for a second term.

Meanwhile, the national Democratic charter commission broke up in anger when party regulars and reformers clashed over reform measures in the proposed Democratic constitution.

GOVERNORS TO MEET — Governors of the southern states, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands will meet near here September 8-11 to discuss a wide range of problems, including economy and energy.

Governor Briscoe is host to the Southern Governors Conference which will meet at Lakeway, a luxury resort on Lake Travis 20 miles northwest of the Capital City.

About 300 reporters will join the 18 governors and their staffs for the three-day business meeting, and the social rounds of tennis, golf, sailing and parties.

Gov. Melvin Evans, governor of the Virgin Islands, is chairman of the Southern

Governors Conference for 1973-74.

INSURANCE JARGON HIT — The State Board of Insurance is declaring war on "the fine print, double talk and gobblede-gook" in insurance policies, according to Board Chairman Joe Christie.

Christie said the average policy holder cannot understand policy jargon, and recent tests show Einstein's theory of relativity is more readable than an average hospital insurance plan.

Christie said efforts will be made in the next session of the legislature to improve "the readability factor" of insurance policies. He recommended that other state agencies give some attention to similar readability problems involving documents over which they have jurisdiction.

No-fault auto insurance will be another subject for legislative consideration in 1975, Christie told Texas Bankers Association at a conference here. He said a recent study on the subject by the Lyndon Baines Johnson School of Public Affairs will

be of major help to lawmakers.

AG OPINIONS — The University of Texas must give a legislator access to files on UT land leases, but may keep confidential land appraisals and sealed bid contents, Atty. Gen. John Hill held.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded:

• Records of a city's exercise of licensing authority over electrical installations is public information and should be disclosed.

• Police supplementary reports of accidents, including witnesses' statements and photographs, although involving possible litigation against a city, are part of the official record and are not excepted from disclosure.

• A faculty member who fails to exercise the option to participate in the optional teacher retirement system does not have the right to a second opportunity to exercise that option on returning to teaching in Texas after terminating previous employment and leaving the state to seek an advanced degree.

• Whether a water pump and irrigation casing are fixtures within terms of taxation depends on facts in a particular case.

• An individual who is not a registered engineer may not display or use membership in or certification by an association using the term "engineer" in its name in his professional or business activities.

COMMITTEES NAMED — State Democratic Chairman Calvin Guest named an election advisory committee to plan statewide rallies and ex-

tensive voter registration and get-out-the-vote campaigns to help Democratic nominees.

A pre-election statewide telecast is also under consideration for the party's nominees.

Members of the committee include all statewide Democratic nominees, Guadalupe County Democratic Chairman Lem Allen, Travis County Chairman Ken Wendler, Midland County Chairman Vann Culp, Tarrant County Chairman Estil Vance, Swisher County Chairman R. T. O'Daniel.

Also Democratic Congressional Candidates — Bob Krueger of New Braunfels, Jack Hightower of Vernon and Mike McKool of Dallas and seven members of the State Democratic Executive Committee.

SCHOOL AID APPROVED — Seven Texas school districts and four regional education services centers will receive a total of \$191,091 in federal funds to develop modern planning, budgeting and program evaluation techniques in 1974-75.

The grants will go to El Paso, Galveston, Birdville, Wazahachie, Irving, New

Caney and Lockhart and to ESC regions in Edinburg, Corpus Christi, San Angelo and El Paso. A second round of grants totalling \$79,699 will be awarded later this fall.

SHORT SNORTS

A Houston federal court decision held unconstitutional a requirement that campaign literature contain both the name of the person paying for it and identification of the printer or publisher who prepared it. The state will appeal.

Texas Republicans generally expressed disappointment that National GOP Chairman George Bush of Houston did not get the vice presidential nomination, although most had no objection to Nelson Rockefeller.

Joe Bill Watkins is resigning as executive assistant to Attorney General Hill, and will be succeeded by David Kendall. Watkins will return to law practice in Houston.

Governor Briscoe has asked Armstrong County be added to the list of counties designated as disaster areas due to prolonged drought in Central and West Texas.
