The rodeo game-- mentally rewarding

"When you are losing, it can be the most depressing sport in the world, but when winning, it can be mentally rewarding," said David A. Davis, as he described the rodeo game.

Davis, who resides in Brownwood, is a steer wrestler who averages two or three rodeos a week.

"Rodeoing began with me as a hobby in junior high school during FFA shows, but now, I do it because it is fun and it gives me something to look forward to each weekend," Davis

explained.

"I didn't get started early enough, really, because the competition is extremely tough now. One needs to start at the age of 4 or 5," Davis said.

"Good bulldoggers are made not born," he added. "There is always somebody capable of beating you."

According to Davis keeping a good mental attitude is one of the most important factors in being a winner. "If you are winning and doing everything right, it is easy to keep a position attitude; however, if you are getting all of the bad breaks and losing, it is also easy to slip into a negative attitude," he explained.

"You have to be able

to think clearly to be good in any event," Davis continued.

Davis admitted that he could make good money just playing the rodeo game, and he

"would like to be able to rodeo full time." "But I am not going to put myself in the position to where I have to depend on it," Davis remarked, "because that takes the fun out of it."

He does, however, plan to continue it as a part-time job as long as he is physically able.

The hardest thing about making the rodeo circuit, in Davis' opinion, is the driving back and forth.

Cadet Eppler is a student at the University of Texas at Arlington and a senior this fall.

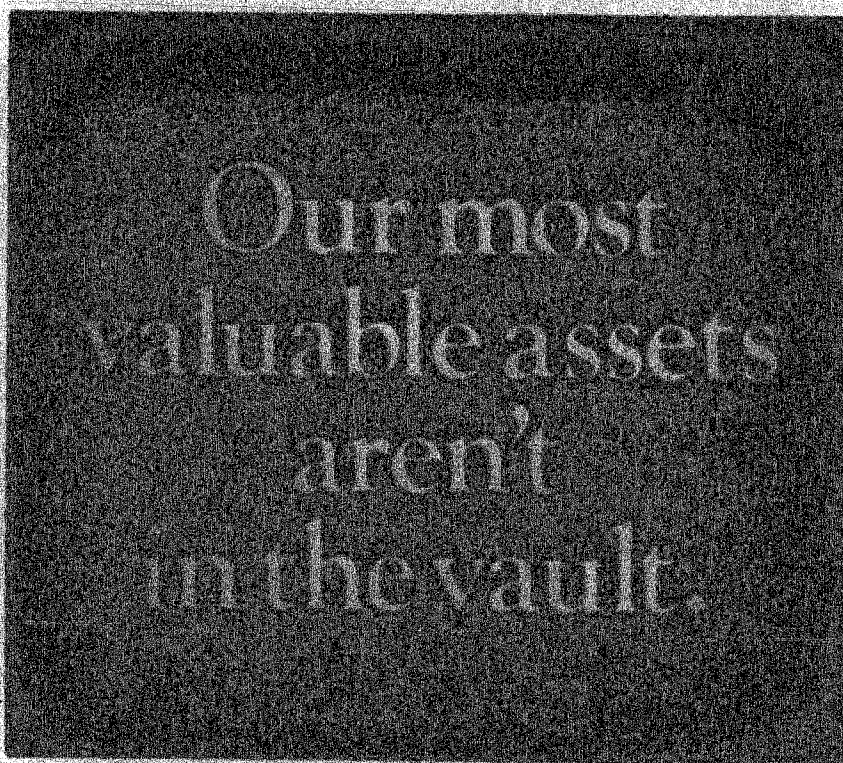

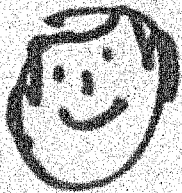

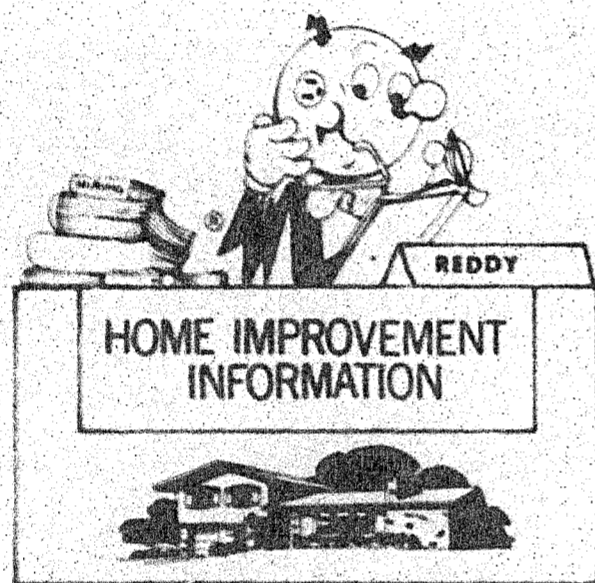

EXPANSION UNDERWAY AT MEDICAL CENTER

The Ranger Park Medical Center in Santa Anna is undergoing an extensive building program with two new additions now underway. A large clinic building is located west of the present hospital building, and another wing is being built on the north of the nursing home structure.

The clinic building, planned to house offices for Dr. Filemon Cabansag and one other doctor, contains 3,500 square feet of space. Constructed of concrete tile and steel, the exterior will be of whitestrick and include a covered driveway at the entrance.

Included in the building are offices, examination rooms, offices for the hospital administrators and a chapel. The building has been under construction for about two months and completion is anticipated in another two months.

At the back of the present nursing home facility a 16-room addition is almost complete. The new addition also contains a large lobby for patients use and an office. Each of the rooms is large enough to accommodate two patients but will be available for those preferring private rooms. Each room is equipped with private telephone and each has a private bath.

The new addition also has the automatic fire alarm and sprinkler system as the other buildings. One large kitchen and dining facility serves both the hospital and nursing home and also provides dining facilities for employees and visitors.

The medical facility is privately owned and operated by Dr. Cabansag, a native of the Philippines. "Dr. Fil", as he is called here, moved to Santa Anna from Eden in 1970. At that time the Ranger Park Inn nursing home

hospital. A proposed addition, joining the present hospital and the new clinic building, would add new operating and delivery rooms and storage space, converting the present surgical portion to hospital rooms for 16 beds.

Dr. Cabansag is practicing alone here but is assisted by his brother and sister-in-law, Dr. Remedios Cabansag and Dr. John Cabansag, who have their offices in Brownwood. The hospital patient load varies from season to season and day to day. The nursing home operates at near capacity most of the time.

Another facility being constructed at the Ranger Park site is a helicopter landing pad located in front of the new clinic building. The pad would provide a place for helicopters to land to transfer patients needing specialized care or to bring doctors to the local facility in case of emergency.

About 100 people are employed at the local medical facility. Sidney Tucker, son-in-law of the Cabansags, is administrator.

Mrs. Cabansag, a registered nurse, is director of nursing at the medical center.

Santa Anna is fortunate to have the large medical center in the community. It is one of the largest privately-owned medical facilities in the area, especially in a town so small. The new addition will not only to replace the inconvenient clinic location at the old Santa Anna Hospital building, but will also provide facilities to take care of anticipated growth in our area.

SIGN-UP AND CERTIFICATION DATES EXTENDED

The final dates for sign-up and certification of crops under the feed grain, wheat, and cotton programs has been extended. Notice has been received in the ASCS office that the extension will continue for an indefinite period of time.

Producers must report crop acreages in order to keep from losing part or all of their program allotments. Also, a signed intention to participate and certification of program crops must be made to be eligible for a possible deficiency or disaster payment.

DISASTER PROGRAM

A reminder for producers to file a failed acreage request at the ASCS office before grazing, baling or plowing a program crop (maize, hegari or cotton). You must make the request in order to be eligible for a disaster payment. The crop must also be appraised by the ASCS office before grazing, baling, or plowing.

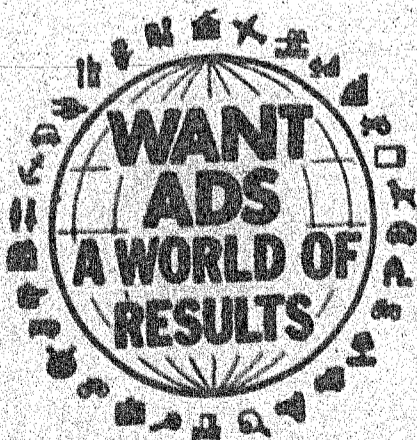
EQUADOR VISITORS

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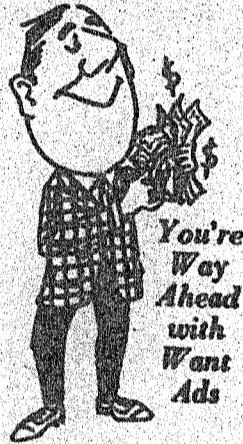

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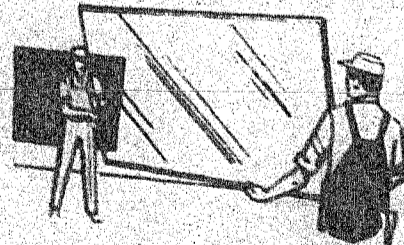
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50 Years Ago ... in The News
