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

The Santa Anna Mountaineers won their homecoming game over the Rising Star Wildcats last Friday night and brought their district tally to 3-1. They took the victory by a 26-13 score.

Albert DeLeon, Jody Day and Jay Weathers scored the touchdowns for the Mountaineers, and Hank Wise kicked two of four extra points. The game was a close one for three quarters, then the Mounties added two TDs in the fourth quarter.

The Rising Star attack was led by Mackey Elliott and Danny Munguis. They are now 1-3 in district play.

There are no retail sales at the manufacturing plant which is located at the former Corner Drug building. Phil-Mart is the only Santa Anna business selling the jackets and windbreakers.

The company is presently looking for a larger building in order to expand to meet the increasing demand. The company opened here earlier this year and manufactured hunting blinds during the first several months.

An accident near Roswell, New Mexico last Wednesday took the life of David Lynn Cupps, 19, of Santa Anna. The young man, driver of a truck for Martin Dairy of Trickham, was accidentally electrocuted while attempting to put a tarp on a load of hay. The accident occurred at noon New Mexico time.

Funeral services were held at Henderson Funeral Chapel in Santa Anna Friday, November 1. Bill Dodgin, minister of the Northside Church of Christ, and Rev. Howell Martin of Trickham officiated at the services. Burial was in the Cleveland Cemetery.

A lifetime resident of the community, David was born in Brownwood on January 7, 1955, the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. V. Cupps of the Cleveland Community. He attended school in Santa Anna, graduating with the class of 1973.

ASCS NEWS

Balloots will be mailed to all known wool and lamb producers in Coleman County to enable them to vote in a national referendum on a proposed new agreement for the advertising and promotion of wool.

The mail referendum being held Nov. 4 through 5 will enable producers to vote their approval or disapproval of a new agreement between USDA and the American Sheep Producers Council (ASPC) which provides for the USDA to withhold a part of any wool payments of any wool payments that might be made to producers to finance advertising and sales promotion programs by ASPC for wool and lamb. The withheld funds would also be used by ASPC to develop and disseminate information on product quality, production management and marketing

improvement for wool and sheep.

Wool and lamb producers will be mailed an explanatory statement about the proposed new agreement along with the ballot. The new agreement is similar to one approved by producers in 1971. If approval is voted, payment deductions of up to 1-1/2 cents a pound on shorn wool and 7-1/2 cents a hundredweight on unshorn lambs would be made, the same as the maximum deduction rates for the 1966-72 period. Since no wool payments were made for 1973 marketings, there were no deductions for that year.

The neutrality of the U. S. Department of Agriculture on the proposal being submitted to wool and lamb producers is emphasized. Its sole interest is in conducting a fair and impartial referendum.

Anyone may vote who has owned sheep six months old or older for at least thirty consecutive days during 1973. Votes may be cast by

individuals, corporations, or partnerships. Any producer who is not already known to the county ASCS office is urged to come by or call in order to receive a ballot and explanatory material. The Coleman County ASCS office is located at 119 West Street.

Any eligible producer may vote in the referendum, without regard for race, color, sex, religion, or national origin.
