Mountaineers Close Season; Eden to Represent Zone

The 1974 football season ended for the Santa Anna Mountaineers Friday night as they were defeated by the Eden Bulldogs 26-13 in a hard-fought game at Eden. The victory for the Bulldogs gave them a berth in the zone play-off this week to determine the champions of District 6-B. Valley Mills is the East Zone winner. Eden had a perfect 5-0 district tally and Santa Anna was left 3-2 and 5-3 for the season.

The Eden team took a 15-0 lead in the first period and held at 15-0 score at halftime. Santa Anna scored again in the fourth quarter, then Eden made their final TD for the 26-13 total.

Bad snaps from center on punting situations cost Santa Anna two touchdowns. Jody Day scored the first Mountain TD, and Jay

Weathers made the second score. Hank Wise kicked the conversion point for the 13 total.

Santa Anna Man To Be Honored At Baptist Camp

A resolution passed at a recent meeting of the Heart of Texas Baptist Encampment trustees named the large tabernacle building at the site the "Emzy Brown Tabernacle" in recognition of the faithful leadership and service of Emzy Brown of Santa Anna. Brown is a leader and deacon at the First Baptist Church.

Mr. Brown was instrumental in the organization of the Heart of Texas (District 16) Baptist Brotherhood which founded the camp at Lake Brownwood in 1938. The first meeting of the Coleman County Brotherhood took place at Richardson Crossing on Home Creek southwest of Santa Anna in 1937, and the district group was formed from the county association. It was the first district men's group in the State.

The large rock tabernacle building is the center of the camp complex located on 28 acres at Lake Brownwood. The camp is now a year-around installation used by several thousand people each year. The district organization is composed of 11 associations covering a large section of central Texas. The camp is being operated this year on a budget of \$118,000.

Emzy Brown has served on the Board of Trustees of the camp since its beginning, including two terms as president. He is current president of the group.

A sign will be installed soon on the tabernacle with the new name.

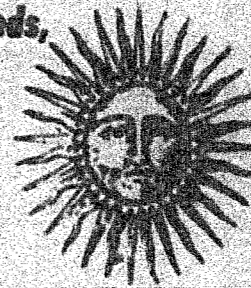

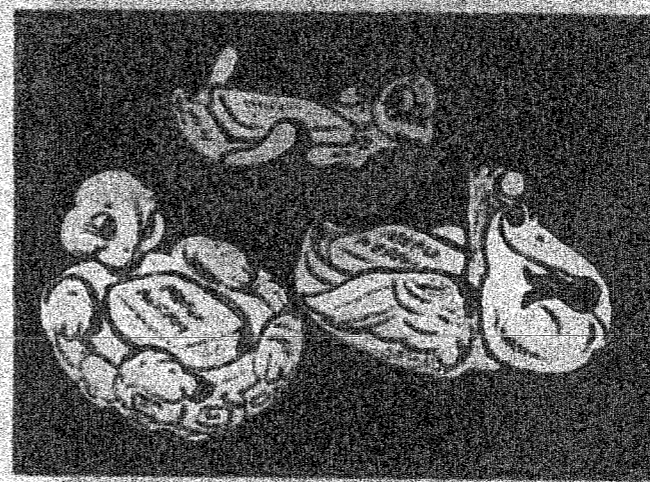

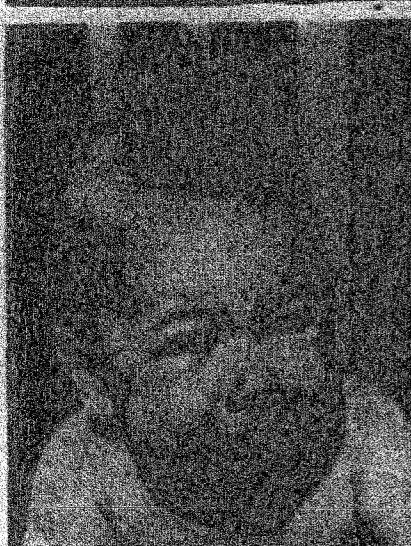

Postmaster John C. Gregg is reminding postal customers that effective Sunday, November 17, the U. S. Postal Service will discontinue delivering mail on which there is no postage.

Gregg said the plicy was instituted because of the high costs to the department in an attempt to deliver such mail. Officials estimated that such costs total about \$18 million annually.

After November 17 letters mailed without postage will be returned to sender if there is a return address, or to the dead letter office.

Since it is possible to inadvertently forget to put a stamp on a letter or the stamp could come off prior to cancellation, mailers are urged to include a correct return address on their mail, Gregg said.

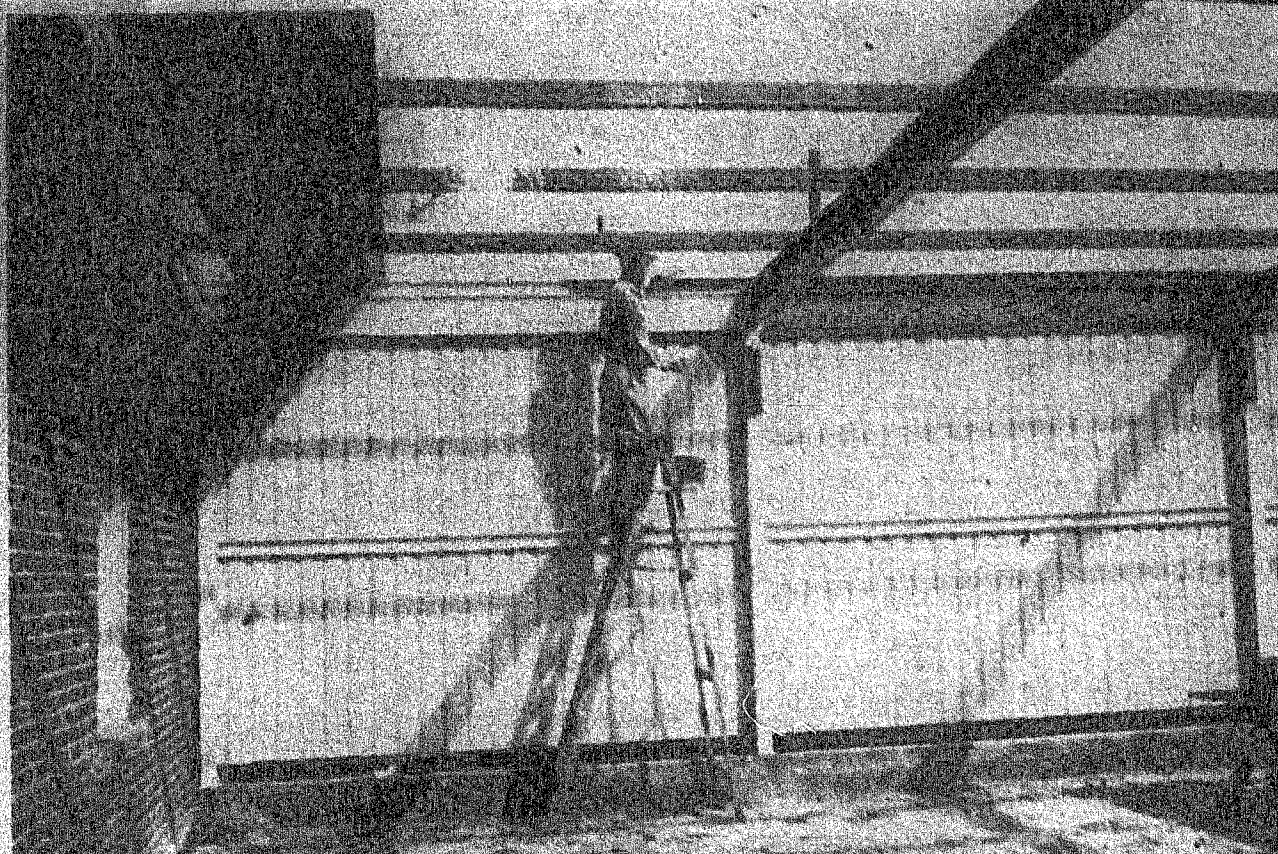
