Should all of these articles be eliminated?

It must be admitted that a gun is the most convenient form of lethal weapon. It kills at a safe distance. But the attempt to confiscate guns or
any other weapons which might be used for criminal acts is definitely not the solution. What would a drunk do if all his beer were eliminated? Probably he would turn to some other alcoholic beverage or brew his own. Likewise, a person prone to using a gun for killing is
