BILLY BURR FAMILY To Give Program Here

### Special Program Planned Tuesday At Local Church

The Reverend Billy G. Burr, an Assemblies of God missionary to Kinshasa, Zaire, will be guest speaker Tuesday, May 4, 7:30 p.m. at the Assembly of God Church in Santa Anna, the Reverend James Ford, pastor has announced.

Mr. Burr and his wife, Sue, have ministered in Zaire four years. During that time they were involved with the International Correspondence Institute and "Le Cours Biblique Mobile," a short-term Bible study program. Mr. Burr also taught at the Assemblies of God Bible school in Kinshasa.

Prior to their missionary appointment to Zaire, the Burrs were active in evangelism and youth work in Liberia. In cooperation with Good News Crusades, the Assemblies of God Foreign Missions mass-evangelism program, Mr. Burr established an "Action Night" for youth converts. Regular Bible study classes which grounded new believers in the faith were coupled with a Saturday night witnessing program and helped to give the Liberia Assemblies of God the solid group of young people it has today.

Mr. Burr also engaged in gospel literature distribution, personal witnessing by the youth groups, and mass-evangelism rallies.

The Burrs attended Southwestern Assemblies of God college in Waxahachie, Texas, where Mr. Burr received his B.A. degree. They also helped found the Dallas teen Challenge Center, where they ministered to disconcerted youth and drug addicts.

The 11th Congressional District in Coleman County includes part of all four precincts, running from Santa Anna to Valera, and including portions of the Novice, Glen Cove and Lake Coleman areas.

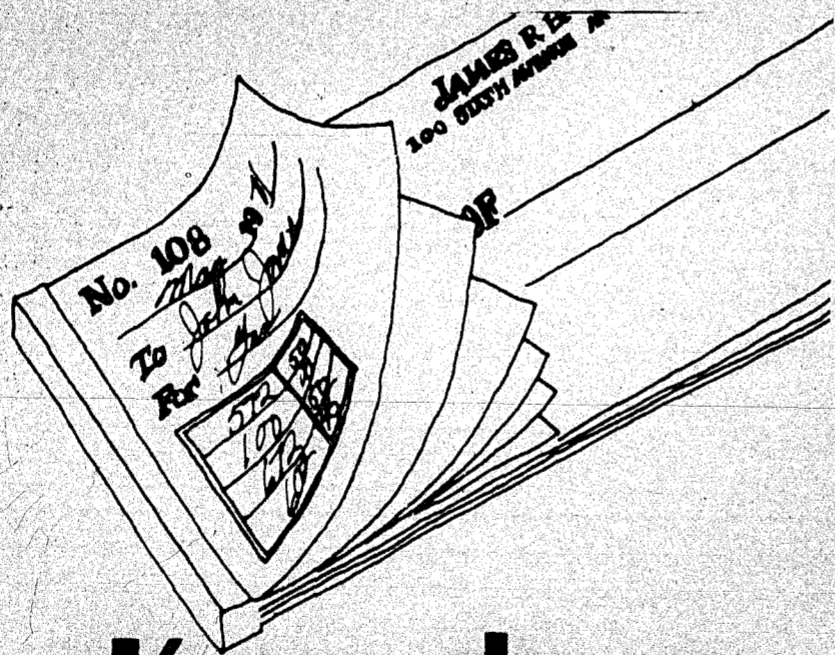

### Grant Jones Makes Statement To Voters

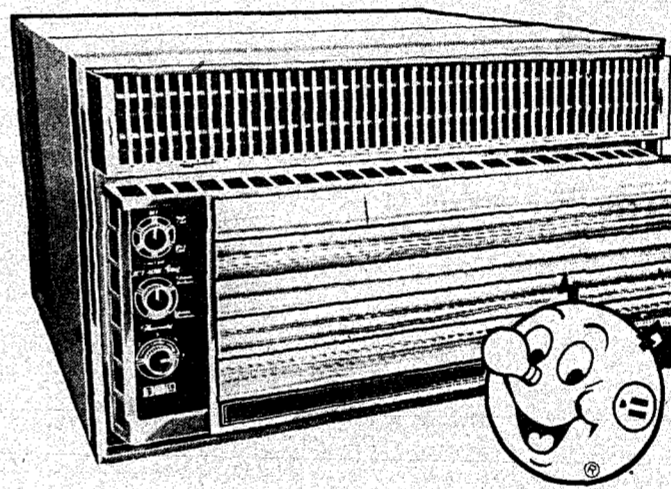

## Hunter Orchid Hobby Described in Story

(The following article was in the monthly publication of the Texas Water Quality Board of Austin, written by Carol Mann. Hunter is the son of Mrs. Lee Hunter of Santa Anna)

Remember not so long ago when corsages were "the thing" for almost every event—dances, football games and Easter Sunday? Well, as it was then, the orchid has reminded the Cadillac of flowers.

For 18 years Brownlee Hunter, Field Support, has raised these exquisite sprays and at this time of the year his greenhouse is absolutely alive with the various colors of orchid blooms.

An amazing fact about orchids (at least to an ignoramus on the subject like this writer) is that they do not grow in soil. In the jungles growing wild, they attach themselves to the trunks of trees, feeding on decaying bark. In domestication these exotic blossoms are planted in redwood or Ponderosa pine chips or deposited in tree moss and fed a special nutritional mixture.

For those of you who never have seen orchids growing they do so on long shoots, blooming from the side, with the shoot continuing to lengthen with more blooms.

For the smaller orchids, like the symbidiums, sometimes 20 blossoms bloom from the same stalk.

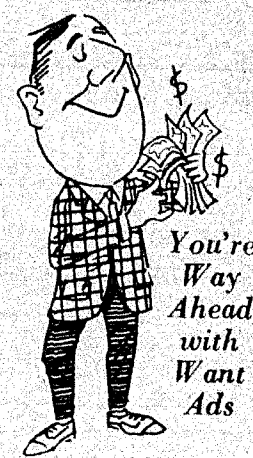
Some of the nice things associated with raising their own orchids are that the Hunters now have the luxury of giving them to friends who visit, providing the flowers for their children's friends' weddings and making arrangements for the altar of their church.

Hunter began this fascinating hobby about 18 years ago when his second daughter made her

appearance into the world. His boss' wife brought the Hunters an orchid plant from her abundant greenhouse and Hunter and his wife, Dorothy, have been hooked on them ever since, now propagating more than 20 species.

Just like prize race horses, orchids bought from reputable suppliers can be traced back in lineage for many generations and also like fine animals, one of the goals of breeding orchids is to improve the species with each generation.

Members of the Heart of Texas Orchid Society, the Hunters are a real credit to their association with their greenhouse chock full of orchid blooms, some of which were grown from seed. During the summer months Brownlee and Dorothy set out many of their plants in their back yard for further enjoyment while relaxing on the patio.

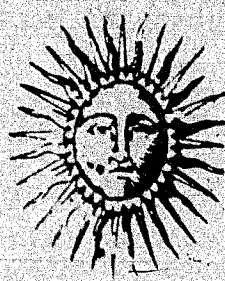

Dr. Wayne Hayenga, will be the featured speaker at the Agricultural Finance Seminar to be held in Coleman in the Willie Room of the Coleman County Electric Coop. at 2:00 p.m., Thursday, April 29th.

Dr. Hayenga has his Bachelors and Master's Degree from the University of Illinois and his Ph. D. from Michigan State.
