## R. C. Smith Receives Area Distinguished Service Award

Mr. R. C. Smith, Santa Anna school superintendent, was awarded the Distinguished Service award to school administrators at the Area IV FFA convention in Stephenville on May 14. The meeting was held at Tarleton State University, and is given to the superintendent who is outstanding in supporting the F.F.A. chapter and the agricultural program in Area IV.

Composed of 78 schools, the area includes Wichita Falls, Abilene, Brownwood, Ballinger and Stephenville.

Mr. Smith assists with fund-raising drives for the local chapter to be used for buying premium animals at the county sale; he schedules teacher work days on the local and county show days so that the students will not miss classes while involved in the show activities. When the agricultura department of the school needs any supplies or equipment, he manges one way or another to acquire what is needed.

His influence has spread to youngsters outside the FFA and the community. He is a Director General of the University Interscholastic League, he belongs to and upports the Parent Teacher organization, the Santa Anna Livestock Association and the Booster Club, and is a member of the local Lions Club.

Mr. Smith will be honored at the State Vocational Agriculture Teachers' convention at Fort Worth in August.

## School Board Meets May 11

The regular meeting of the school board on May 11 concerned the five-year accreditation plan for the school, which the State Auditor has approved. Also, the school calendar for next year was completed, with classes to start on August 19.

A new policy on the consideration and treatment of cases involving drug use in the school was defined, and the paving of the parking space between the new gymnasium and the other buildings was proposed. The board voted to put up three of the unneeded buses for sale on bids.

The resignation of Mrs. Mattie Beth Davenport was accepted, and Sharon Cheaney was employed, going from Title I status to regular teacher. Mrs. Karen Riley will be employed as Title I teacher. Bruce Smith of Brownwood was employed as assistant coach, and he will also teach Remedial English in grades 7 through 12.

## Swimming Classes To Begin May 31 In Coleman

The summer swimming program for Santa Anna children will be held again this year with Mrs. Charles Hosch coordinator for the local group. Dates of the lessons will be Monday, May 31 through Friday June 11.

Children who are non-swimmers or beginners and who have had at least one year in school (excluding kindergarten) are eligible to attend. They will be transported by bus to the Coleman Pool each weekday at a nominal charge.

About 60 children were enrolled in the class last year, and that number is expected this year.

Qualified instructors are needed for the Santa Anna and Coleman classes, and anyone interested in working with the children is asked to contact Marianna Jones in Coleman.

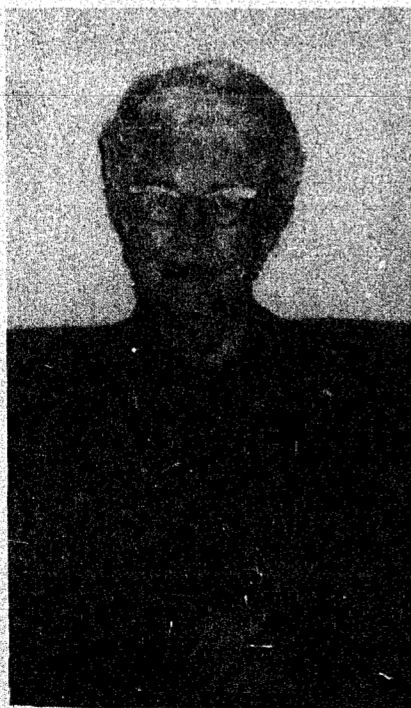
## Mrs. Newman Awarded Pin For 50 Years OES Membership

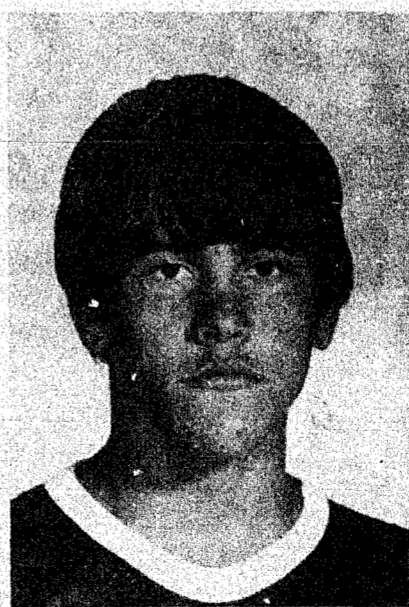

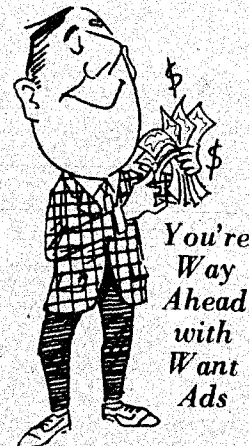
### Mission Program Held at R-Wood

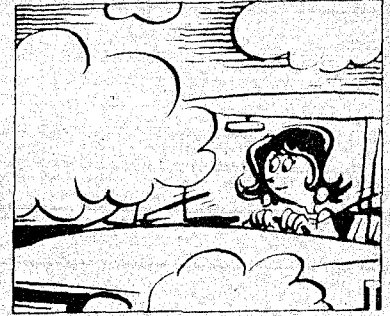


## HIGHWAY SAFETY

### DRIVING IN FOG

If you're in a fog about what to do when you're out driving in one, here's some advice from the experts.

If you are driving on a high speed expressway and thick fog rolls in, get off as quickly as possible. You'll be safer from rear-end collision on lesser roads.



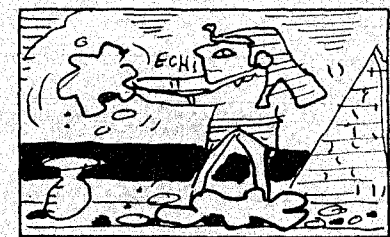
MUCH DENSE FOG is merely a fine accumulation of mist on your windshield.

Turn on your windshield wipers. Much "dense fog" is merely a fine accumulation of mist on the windshield and you'll probably find that much of the fog is not as dense as you thought it was. If your wipers streak, squirt washer fluid on the windshield. This should wash away any oily accumulation. If streaking continues, replace the rubber refills the next time you're in a service station.

Turn on your lights even in day fog. Without them your car is invisible to anyone coming from behind at high speed. In addition, your headlights will help other motorists "see" you.

Many drivers have asked what speed to drive in a fog. Here's a good rule of thumb: If you can see six car lengths ahead and no more—20 to 30 mph maximum. If you can see two car lengths and no more—10 to 15 mph maximum.

Remember, driving safety is up to you.

A nominating committee for the club was appointed by the vice president. Donna Bradley, Emily Deal and Bernadine Watson will secure names for the future officers.

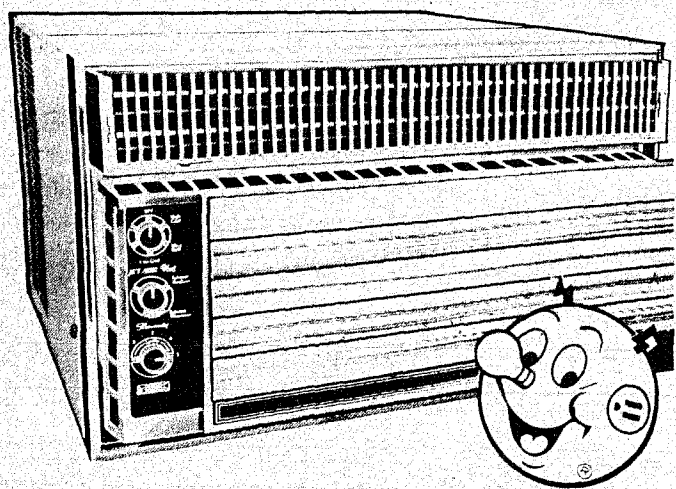

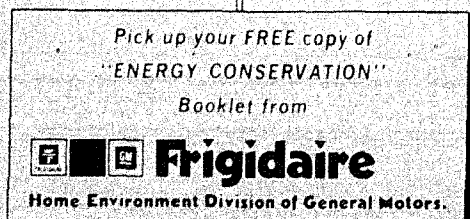

## Rockwood Farmer/Rancher Outstanding Conservationist

Charles Greenlee of Rockwood was recognized Thursday by the central Colorado Soil and Water Conservation District as the outstanding resident conservation farmer-rancher for 1975. Greenlee operates 1414 acres of rangeland, pastureland and cropland on which he signed a district agreement in 1967 before graduating from Texas A&M University.

With technical assistance from the Soil Conservation Service, provided through the Central Colorado, SWCD, and financial assistance from the GPCP, this young man has planned and applied a complete Resource Conservation Plan.

Fifty-three acres were so critically eroded, they required shaping and seeding. Each of the five rangeland fields were rootplowed to control the brush invasion and seeded to native grasses on 945 acres.

Brush was left on the steeper slopes and rocky areas for Wildlife Habitat. His deer population has increased from about six deer in 1967 to about ninety now on the place, with 14 good bucks harvested in 1975. The turkey have increased from 25 to about 450, and 28 toms were harvested in 1975. Quail have increased from 10 coveys to 40 or 50 coveys on the place now with some harvested from each covey in 1975. Some of these increases can be attributed to self feeders located at various places over the ranch.

The seven ponds constructed for livestock water have also been managed for fish, and with about 1 1/2 miles of Colorado River frontage an average of 1200 pounds of fish have been harvested each year. Over 30,000 feet of cross fences were constructed to facilitate management of the grasses on the rangeland, four pastures which were established to coastal bermuda, Kleingrass and weeping lovegrass, and three cropland fields.

All of this is grazed when available and the supplemental irrigation on the pasture and cropland have made it possible to double crop some acres each year. With only a small amount of seasonal labor, Charles and his family have managed these resources to increase the yields and carrying capacity from 30 animal units to one-hundred one cattle units, and five hundred lambs or two hundred fifty yearling muttons in good years.

Greenlee usually harvests about 5000 bushels of oats and 180,000 pounds of milo. He also bails an average of 6000 bales of coastal, Kleingrass, sudan, and or oathay each year. He has weaned 100 calves weighing an average of 675 pounds from these 101 cows since his plan was completed. Greenlee does most of his farm and ranch equipment repair in a shop that he constructed. Mrs. Greenlee teaches school in Santa Anna and still finds time to can or freeze much of their food from the family garden.

The rangeland is sprayed every other year to control weed and it appears to be very effective in controlling growth of brush.

Elected a director of the Farm Bureau, Greenlee still finds time in his busy schedule to attend and assist in conducting, share courses, tours and field days on

conservation and mangement. He was one of the first to adopt 18' rows for grain sorghums and minimun tillage practices.

Part of the ranch is leased for hunting and fishing each year to supplement his income and to obtain a better balance of his wildlife resources.

Greenlee was honored Thursday, May 6, and presented a plaque from the Coleman Lions Club.

Also recognized was Bob Beckham of Abilene, an absentee owner.

The Greenlees are parents of two children, Cindy and Jeff, both students in junior high.

Several fence charger stories found their way to my door this week; I wonder why? It seems there are chargers that are plugged into an electric circuit and are much more powerful than the kind that uses a battery. These come in handy when you have livestock that are hard to confine, especially if you flip the regulator switch from "normal" to "increase."

If you happen to be the proud owner of one of these beauties, you are permitted to watch the antics that take place the first time the trouble-makers discover the power of these contraptions. If you intend to watch, you had better do it the first time because it usually doesn't take but one dose to effect a cure. If you can watch with a straight face you have pretty good will-power.

There are some exceptions however, and one was an old cow who thought the fence had never been invented that she couldn't

outsmart. Three times she charged the monster, and as many times she was unceremoniously dumped in an undignified heap ten feet from the fence. On the fourth try she mustered all the smart she had. ### Child Abuse is Serious Threat

Child abuse is one of the leading causes of infant mortality in the United States, according to the Child Abuse Listening Mediation, a nationwide organization and the study of its prevention is one of the projects of a high school group at Santa Anna, with Mary Densman chairman.

It is felt that the family needs help, not punishment, and taking the child away from the parent is not always the answer. This evil can occur in affluent families as well as those of low income. The abuse may be physical neglect, or it may be emotional or sexual. The neglect may simply be failure to provide love and affection, or it may include insufficient food, clothing, medical care, education or guidance. One of the chief causes of poor grades, bad behavior and emotional troubles in children is often simply lack of supervision and interest on the part of the parent, and failure to require the child to meet respectable standards.

Many parents are unprepared to meet the stresses of child training and to cope with the child's need for an authority. Discipline does not mean punishment, it means training, it means regular rules combined with kindness. The most vital need of a child is approval and admiration for the successes he achieves, however small. To deal capably with the child abuse evil, the parent must be re-trained, a new attitude taken, and both parent and child must be taught self-respect and friendliness for each other.

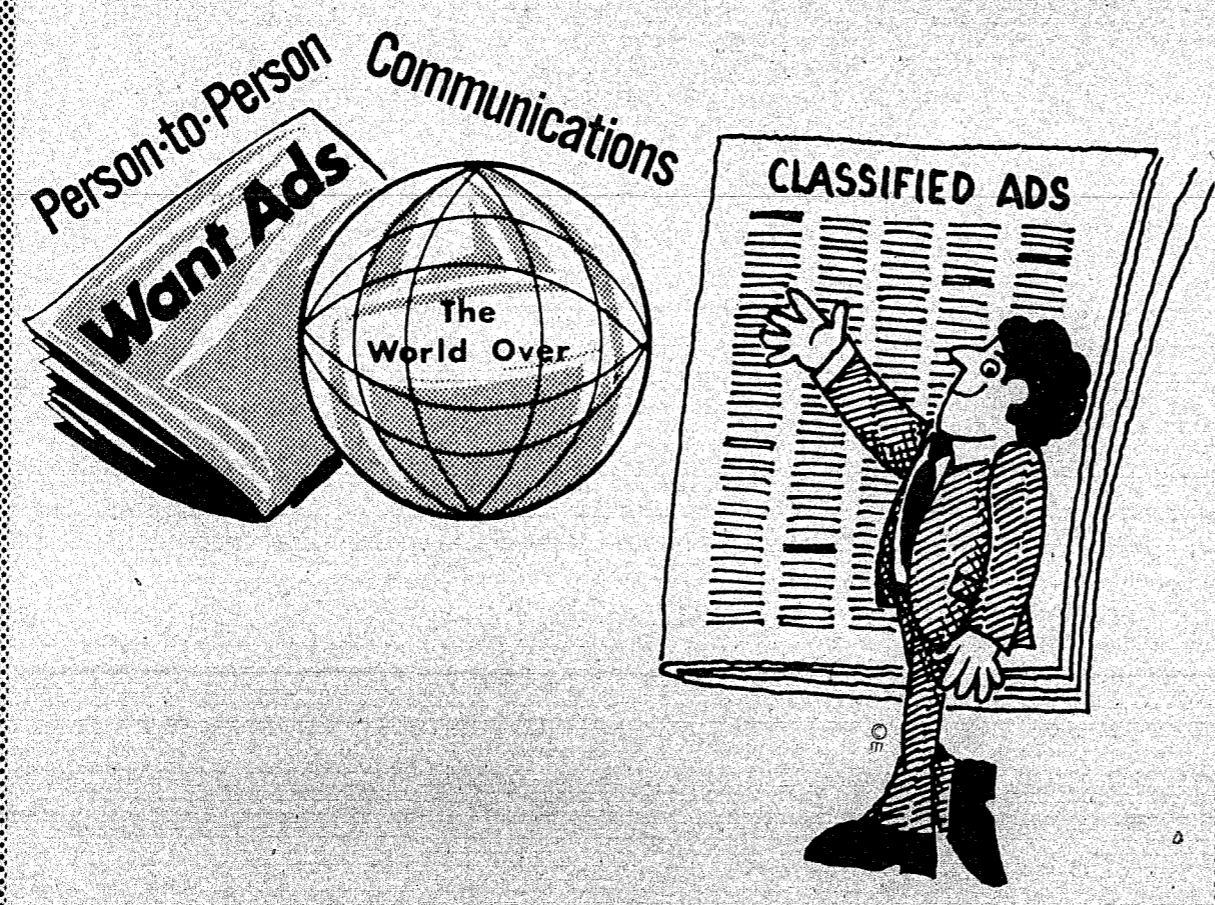
