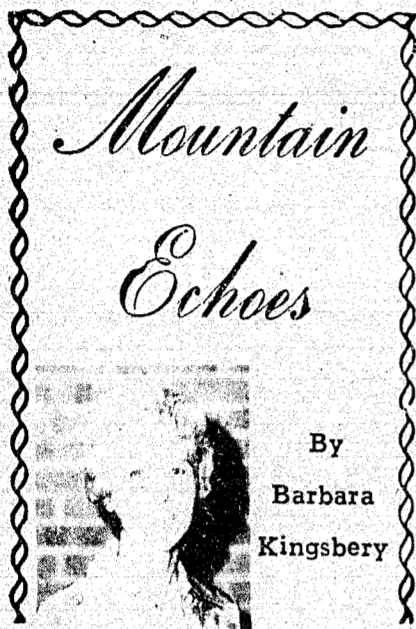

S-ANNA YOUTH LOSES LIFE IN DROWNING MISHAP SUNDAY

Tragedy struck the community Sunday afternoon when a Santa Anna eighth grade student, Clarence Baker drowned in a stock tank at the Gene Boiven ranch seven miles northeast of Santa Anna. The accident occurred about 5:30 p.m. as young Baker and his brother, Joseph, and a friend, Wayne Kuykendall, were near Baker's father at another tank.

According to Justice of the Peace Walter Holt of Coleman, the death was accidental. Santa Anna firemen pulled the body from the tank about 6:30 p.m. where he was pronounced dead. The boy did not know how to swim and apparently stepped into a hole of water six or seven feet deep. Rescue attempts by those at the scene failed.

Born January 10, 1962 in Antioch, California, Clarence was the son of Mr. and Mrs. M. D. (Bunk) Baker. The family moved to Santa Anna in 1962. He was a member of First Christian Church.

Funeral services were held at First Christian Church Wednesday, March 3, with the pastor, Rev. Anthony Thibedeaux, and Rev. W. M. Price of First Baptist Church, officiating. Burial was in the Gouldbusk Cemetery under direction of Henderson Funeral Home.

Survivors are the parents; two brothers, Leon and Joseph Baker of the home; and a number of aunts and uncles.

Edith Dodson, Jeanette Strickland, Donna Bradley and Anita Cupps, wives of active members of the department, were named new members, bringing the VFD roll to 22 and fulfilling the membership requirements. The four are active members of the VFD Auxiliary and have had some previous training with equipment and procedures.

The four new members will undergo several weeks of training with the equipment and will be on call with other regular members as drivers and to man the trucks.

The move to have a co-ed department has been under discussion for several months, and other women may be added to the roster in later months.

The Santa Anna VFD meets twice each month for training and maintenance of equipment, and have made numerous calls to fires in recent weeks.

With the new additions, the VFD members may be referred to as "firepersons".

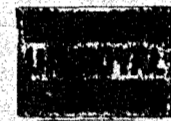

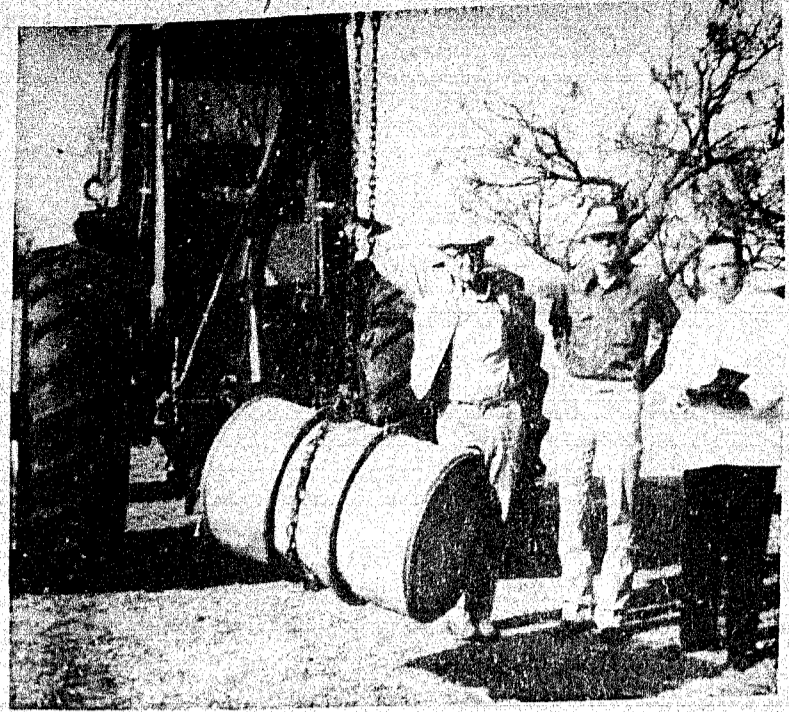

"Farm Bureau Week" Underway This Week in Coleman County

March 1-6 1976 has been proclaimed "Farm Bureau Week" in Coleman County by County Judge W. W. (Pete) Skelton.

Coleman County Farm Bureau is having a special membership enrollment drive during this period as a part of a statewide effort to exceed last year's total of 180,470 member families. Coleman County ended its 1975

year with 975 members. All 210 county Farm Bureaus will be seeking to show a gain in membership for the fourth year in a row.

Victor Cardinas of Coleman is president of the local county Farm Bureau. Membership Chairman is Charles Greenlee of Rockwood. Membership captains will also include Louis Pittard of Gouldbusk.

The county president said farmers and ranchers need an organization more than ever before.

"Farmers and ranchers need a stronger organization to help solve problems in marketing, agricultural public relations, taxation, farm exports, as well as other matters affecting net incomes," Cardinas said.

Part of the proclamation issued by Judge Skelton reads:

"Agriculture is becoming more important to the economy of Coleman County, our State and Nation. Many of our citizens are dependent directly or indirectly upon agriculture for their livelihood. All consumers benefit from the productive efficiency of modern agriculture.

"Farmers and ranchers have learned to promote their industry through organization. Four out of five agricultural producers in this Nation who belong to a general farm organization are members of Farm Bureau.



56 Years Ago In The NEWS

The following stories are from the May 21, 1920 issue of the NEWS:

Wednesday afternoon the streets were crowded with men, women and children, to greet the Dallas Boosters.

The Santa Anna Chamber of Commerce had a display arranged on a wagon in the middle of the street, containing a specimen of all the oils, silica, sands, coal, oars and the other numerous natural resources.

The visitors were welcomed to our city by W. J. Johnson. These gentlemen were surprised at the wonderful possibilities of Santa Anna. And expressed themselves freely in regard to the progressiveness of our citizens and town.

The Dallas visitors did not expect Santa Anna to give them any entertainment; their special train carrying full provisions of every character.

Coleman and adjoining counties were visited with good slow rains for the past week. The lakes are all full and the streams are running at full speed. This country is in fine condition. The farmers are all busy planting cotton and feed stuff. A general air of prosperity prevails over the country.

Rapid development of the Gladys Belle properties 3-1/2 miles northeast of Santa Anna is now being made, and the interest over the state is now greater than ever before as a consequence of the bringing in of the Pope well a few days ago.

Santa Anna has had hundreds of visitors during the past week or ten days as a result of the Pope Well. The hotels, rooming houses and homes are crowded. Visitors are coming from everywhere to see the new wells and leases are going up.

Many prosperous deals have gone through this week. The building formerly occupied by L. L. Shield has been leased for a year, for an oil exchange. All property has advanced accordingly. Several new businesses are contemplating going in.

The closing exercises of the Santa Anna Schools was held at the Methodist Church last Friday night, when the church was crowded from the balcony to the doors, and numbers were forced to leave on account of not even having standing room. The girls Glee Club welcomed the audience with a very appropriate song. The salutatory was delivered by Miss Eudora Garrett and the valedictory by Miss Nettie Turner.

The commencement address was delivered by Dr. C. W. Thompson, president of Daniel Baker College of Brownwood.

Coleman, Rockwood and Santa Anna Independent school districts are increasing assessments and tax rates to provide larger salaries for teachers next year, according to County Supt. J. C. Griffin. In Coleman and Rockwood the lowest salaries paid teachers was \$16.25 per week, while carpenters received \$48 and \$50.

The Santa Anna High School track team returned from Austin Sunday after winning second place in Class B meet in the state. The Ferris High School took first place over Santa Anna by only two points.

Santa Anna will go to Class A next year, and coach Earp promises to either take first place or make the one that does go some.

Little Miss Buna Myers was the winner of the gold necklace contest of last week Santa Anna News. The necklace was donated to the Fire Company by Comer Blue Jeweler and sold in the Bazaar at the picnic. W. J. Johnson bought it the last time and turned it over to the News to be given to the most popular young lady under 10 years old. Little Miss Buna received more votes than anyone else.

Emphasis Set For "Home Week" By Adventists

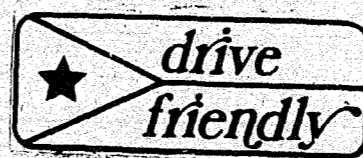
Peter Durichek teacher in the Adventist Church School, will be the speaker in the Santa Anna-Coleman Seventh-day Adventist church next Saturday morning.

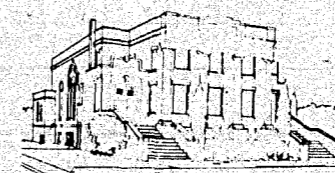
