FIVE BURN TO DEATH

Minimum 7.4 Degrees Below Zero At 8 A. M. Shatters All Figures Kept By Officials

Official records, which cover a 30-year period, were shattered here Wednesday morning when temperature dropped below zero and continued falling until a minimum of 7.4 degrees below had been reached at 8 a. m.

Since April 1902 official records of temperatures have been kept. Until Wednesday four degrees below zero in 1911 was the lowest on record. The only other record of below zero weather was three below in January 1929.

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The thermometer fell from four degrees above to two below zero between 12:30 and 1:30 a. m. Wednesday and remained below zero until 9:30 a. m.

Snowfall totaled eight-tenths of an inch, representing precipitation of .58 inch to 7 a. m. Wednesday.

At 7 a. m. Wednesday temperatures at stations on the Dallas-El Paso railway were: Guadalupe, 14 below; El Paso, 1 above; Wink, 7 below; Big Spring, 8 below; Sweetwater, 7 below; Abilene, 3 below; Santo, three below; Fort Worth, 5 above, Dallas, 1 above.

Prospects for a fruit crop were improved by the extreme cold said Fred Keating, superintendent at the government experiment farm.

Classes in the Junior high school building here were dismissed for Wednesday due to inability of the heating system to provide sufficient heat. Classes were held in other school buildings as usual.

Temperatures here fell from 48 degrees at 6:30 p. m. Monday to 5 degrees 24 hours later and from 48 degrees at midnight Monday to 4 degrees at midnight Tuesday.

Range of temperatures for 24 hours ending at 6 a. m. Wednesday was 71 degrees, from 65 above to six below.

Record-breaking cold prevailed in many parts of Texas bringing casualties to cattle, damage to early fruit, and suffering among the destitute.

No section of the state was spared. From the Panhandle to the Rio Grande valley and the Gulf coast, thermometers registered a new low mark.

From seventeen below at Lubbock, figures ascended to thirty above at Brownsville. Generally clear skies indicated Wednesday there would be no immediate addition to a light fall of snow or ice accumulated during the last 36 hours.

It was five below zero, only a degree above the all-time low, at Abilene. Live stock was suffering.



## Former Austin Broker Defendant In Suit For Recovery Of \$946,000

EDINBURG, Texas (UP)—O. O. Norwood, former Austin bond broker, had been named defendant in a suit to collect portions of an alleged shortage of \$946,000 in funds of the Edinburg Consolidated Independent School District.

The suit is the third attempt of attorneys of the school district to recover funds allegedly taken without cause from the district.

Norwood is defendant in an action seeking \$232,840 in connection with the sale to him of two issues of the Edinburg school district bonds totaling \$2,700,000.

It alleges Norwood agreed to purchase a bond issue of \$1,000,000 in 1928 at par plus a premium of \$94,000. The suit declares that the Edinburg State Bank & Trust Company, district depository at the time, paid Norwood \$194,000 and that the difference has not been paid back despite the fact the payment was unauthorized. The payment, accounts in September, 1932.

The same suit makes him defendant in action asking payment of \$88,640, an amount representing a premium allegedly promised to have been paid by him when he purchased a \$1,700,000 bond issue in 1927. The petition alleges Norwood withdrew the entire issue from the state comptroller's office in Austin on an order of two of the school district's officers and that other officials of the district were not advised of this action.

Two other suits seeking repayment of school district funds named administrators of the estate of the late Sheriff A. Y. Baker and the banking company were dismissed because of the statute of limitations.

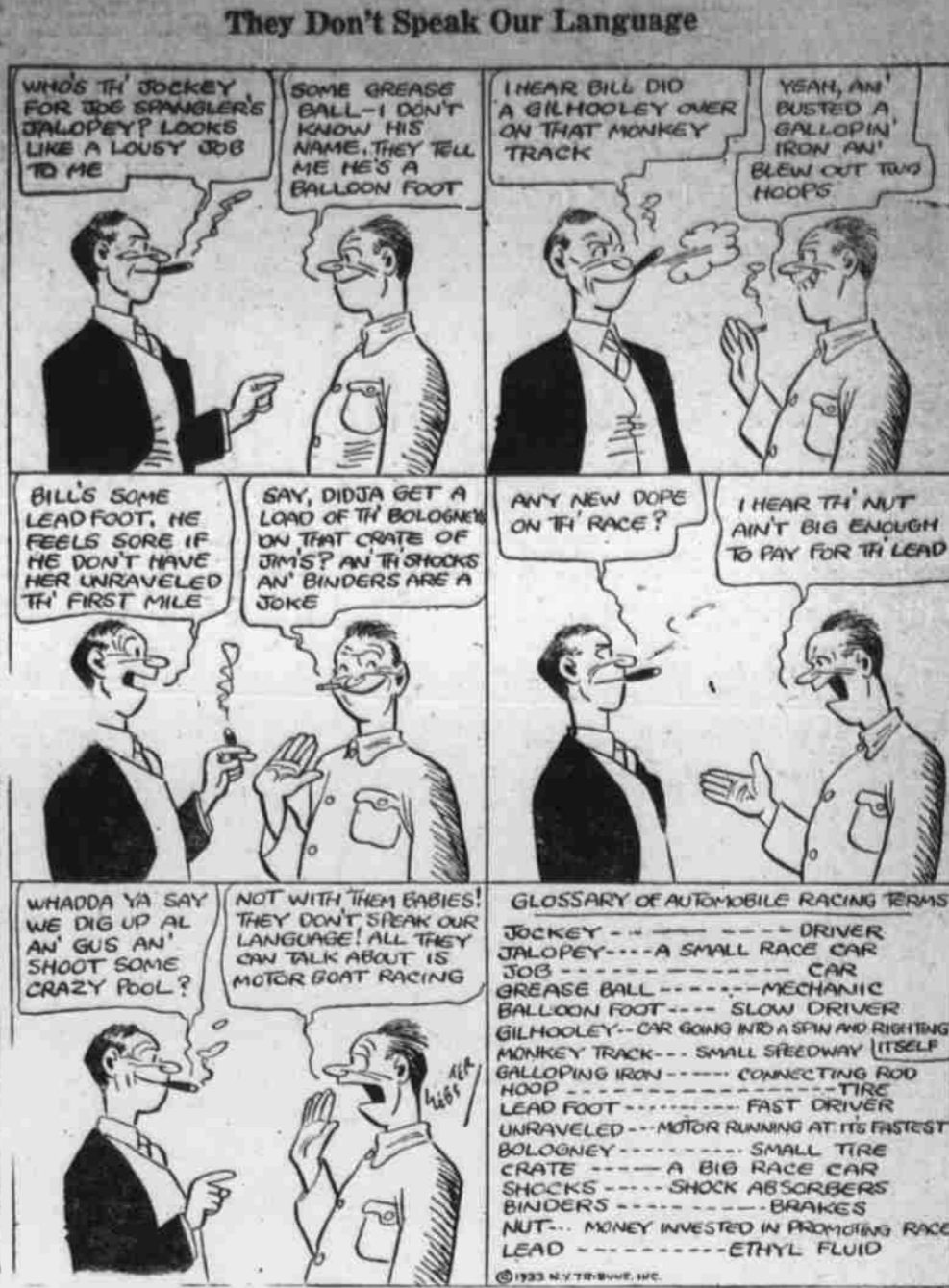

(CONTINUED FROM PAGE 2) Official thermometers at Denison and Olney registered one degree below although those exposed to the north wind at Denison dropped to a minus seven. With the thermometers standing at zero and no indication of rising, Texarkana was gripped in the most severe winter of the past three years. The Sunshine Special of the Texas and Pacific, west bound, arrived two and a half hours late on account of heavy snowdrifts in north Arkansas and Missouri. Dallas and Fort Worth lowest was two above. San Angelo reported three above. As the weather man marked down the temperature at Houston he expressed opinion that possibility of a rise to the freezing mark was remote. No serious delay to vehicular traffic developed although many motorists chose to leave their automobiles in the garage. Lubbock's reading at 7:30 a. m. was seven below the previous all-time minimum at the state experiment sub-station. In city proper it was twelve below and the sun shining. Live stock was only slightly hurt since most of the south plains cattle are feeders. Midland, which eleven below, experienced the coldest weather since 1908. Only twice in recent years had the mercury dropped below zero. Pampa and Amarillo had ten and eight below, respectively. As the temperature crawled above the zero mark for the first time in 36-hours, Amarillo had reason to believe the peak of the storm had passed. Cattlemen were checking losses but so far no serious inroads on herds had been reported.

Firemen, Called Out Thrice In Cold Find Nothing To Be Done

After comparative inactivity during more than a month of balmy weather, city firemen have been sired out three times since the cold wave descended on Big Spring. Tuesday at 6 a. m. an alarm was turned in for 501 Johnson, but firemen found only harmless steam arising from windows. Wednesday at 6 a. m. a car fire was reported but the blaze was extinguished before firemen arrived. Half an hour later a call to 308 Gold was answered when an oil stove gave signs of exploding. No damage was done.

Extreme Cold May Be Made Blessing For Trees, Shrubs

Directions For Taking Advantage Of Freeze Are Given Cold weather at this time may be a blessing for those raising cold weather greens and fruit trees, said W. S. Ross, local nurseryman, Wednesday. Directions for taking proper advantage of the extreme cold were given as follows by Mr. Ross. Throw up a mound with surplus soil surface for eight or ten feet around the shrub or tree. The mound should be eight to twelve inches in height to prevent thawing as long as possible, thereby keeping the tree dormant. The EQUAL method should be used with flower beds as much as possible. The mound should be left unmolested until April 1. The mound will serve to keep moisture away from trees, lessening danger of freezing until after danger of such temperatures has passed for the season. These directions do not apply to newly planted shrubs or trees, as they need moisture to live and cannot absorb enough to cause damage by freezing. Do not prune roses or grapes until after March 15. Prune all other plants except blooming plants any time. Blooming plants should be pruned after their blooming period is over, to induce new growth for the next blooming period.

Woodward, here to practice for the Interstate Tournament which opened Wednesday, broke 46 out of a possible 50 targets from the 22-yard mark to win the tenth race on the Elliott sliding handicap cup. The veteran, who lives at Houston, Tex., was accompanied by his son, Harley, another fine gunner. Second place in the handicap went to E. J. Son of Oklahoma City and Dutch Sonniman of Blue Mound, Kan., when both broke 45. Son shot from 18 yards, Sonniman from 17. E. F. Woodward, veteran trapshooter, has completed a number of times in Big Spring and Sweetwater, where he has many friends.

Senate Ousts Barry 53-17

Ramifications Of Case May Lead To Further Probing

WASHINGTON — Culminating one of the most unusual incidents in American legislative history, the senate Tuesday night removed its veteran Sergeant-at-Arms David S. Barry, for writing a magazine article accusing some members of congress of bribe taking. The ouster order was adopted by an overwhelming vote of 53 to 17, despite angry charges from the minority that the senate was following a "disgraceful" and "ridiculous" procedure. Those supporting the dismissal said if Barry were not removed the country would believe his assertion was true. Bitter statements shouted in high pitched voices intermingled with sharp irony and soft humor during a tempestuous three and one-half hour debate preceding the vote. Galleries Crowded Several times the crowded galleries were warned they must be silent, and twice the senators themselves were called to order for infractions of preliminary rules. The day's little man about whom all the fuss centered waited quietly at his home for the verdict, already suspended after his drama-filled trial last Friday in which he played the leading role. He insisted throughout, up to the final hearing, earlier Tuesday, that he had been attempting to defend the senate from a general belief in congressional corruption, although he acknowledged he had no proof of his accusation. Despite Barry's dismissal, the ramifications of the spectacular case foreshadowed possible further congressional action. The senate judiciary committee, which earlier Tuesday recommended removal, will meet Thursday to consider a resolution looking toward libel action against the dismissed officer and publishers of the magazine, the New Outlook. And on the house side, Representative Patman (D. Texas), introduced a resolution for an investigation by a joint committee of Barry's statements as well as other charges of congressional bribery and lobbying. Twenty-three of the 56 men who signed the Declaration of Independence had attended college.

Favorable Report Made On Phone Rate Bill

AUSTIN (UP)—The house committee on municipal and private corporations voted 7 to 5 to give a favorable report to a bill to regulate telephone rates. Under the bill, the railroad commission would be empowered to appoint experts to aid cities in their rate contacts with telephone companies. A tax of one-fourth of 1 per cent of gross income would be levied on the companies to pay for the cost of regulation.
