SAHS Freshman Is Winner Of Phillips Cup

Mike Ballard, son of Mr. and Mrs. Hershell Ballard, was recipient for the third consecutive year of the Phillips Cup, the scholastic award for high ranking boy from the seventh through ninth grades. Mike had an almost-perfect grade average of 99.4 for the past year.

Local Day Care Center To Be Closed Friday

Santa Anna JHS, HS Athletes Win Class B Easter Seal Award

When Coach Anthony Strother and the Mountaineer athletic teams collected funds for the Easter Seal Society last March, they gave no thought to winning any award or recognition. They were enthusiastic about aiding a worthy cause and joining with other athletes in the State to raise money for the Easter Seal High School Football Boys Lily Day for Crippled Children. The team members solicited donations throughout the town one day and collected a total of \$135 for the fund.

When tabulations were made in

the State office in Dallas, the Santa Anna youths had collected the most money of all Class B schools and were eligible for a State award. Michael D. Lee, Regional Director with the organization, and J. T. Myers, Coleman County representative were in Santa Anna May 26 to make the presentation to Coach Strother. The large trophy was donated by Frito-Lay, Inc. of Dallas.

Coach Strother expressed his appreciation for the award and noted that the efforts of the local students showed the high quality of the individuals and the cooperation of the community with school projects.

Over 10,000 handicapped people in Texas benefitted from the Easter Seal Foundation, receiving treatment, equipment, education and other aid during the past year.

The drive by the athletic teams will be an annual event, Coach Strother said, and the high school and junior high athletes will be striving to win the top award again next year.

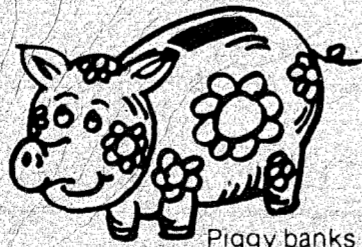

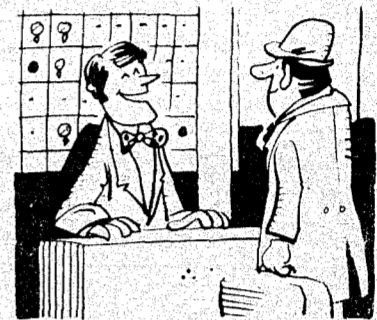

Summer Schedule Announced For S-Anna Library

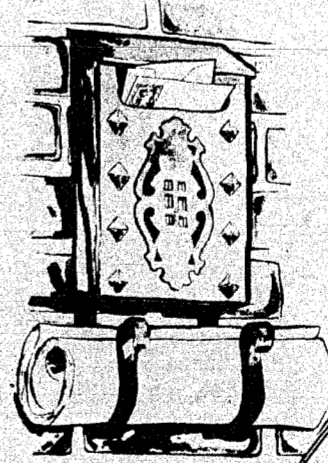

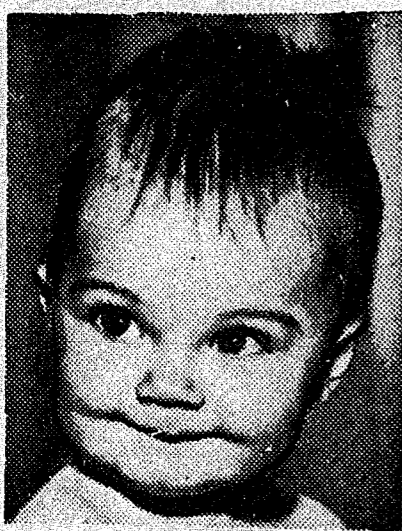

The Davenports have two children, Frances, now Mrs. Jerry Beard of Earth who is a former homemaking teacher. The couple have a daughter, Melissa Beth, aged two. A son, Eugene is now plant engineer in Cities Service in Ulysses, Kansas. He and his wife have a daughter, Jennifer Lynn, also two years of age. Eugene and Frances are both graduates of Texas Tech University.

Mrs. Davenport plans to enjoy housekeeping and helping her husband with the farm and ranch work.

Another Santa Anna teacher, Dwight Hudson, resigned this year after ten years on the junior high faculty. He was science teacher and coach. He will be devoting his time to his farming and ranching interests.

She states that the largest overseas enrollment is in the Far East—108,000 students. In 1974 the church graduated 219,000 students worldwide. This comes from 140 different Adventist correspondence schools.

In North America the two best-known schools are associated with broadcast operations—the Voice of Prophecy (radio) and Faith for Today (television) both located near Los Angeles. The Voice of Prophecy school, under the direction of H.M.S. Richards Sr., pioneered the Adventist work in Bible school study by mail with the first such unit in 1941.

The Voice of Prophecy may be heard over KSTA Coleman every Sunday morning at ten o'clock. Faith for Today comes over KRBC from Abilene each Sunday morning at nine-thirty.



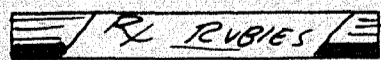
