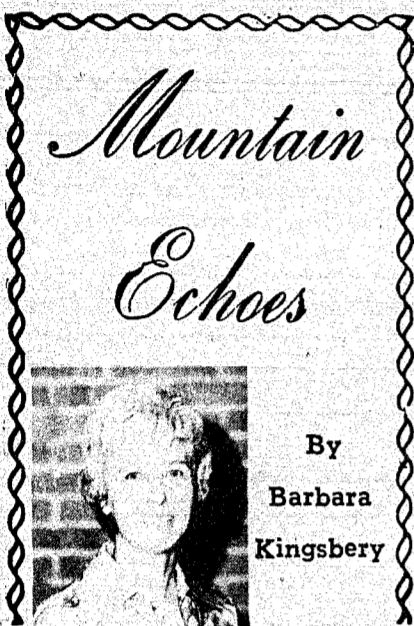

Jimmy Benton will be pianist for the programs and accompany class members in two selections.

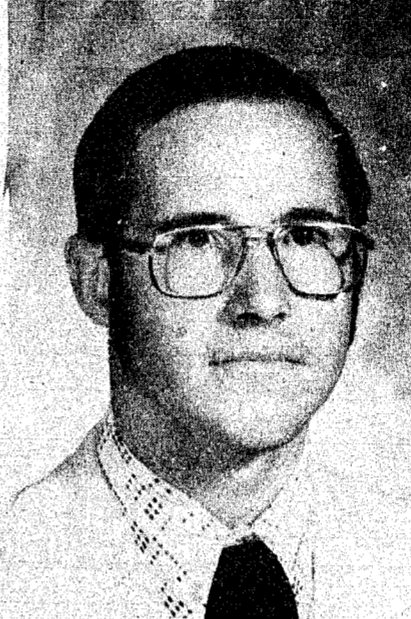

Swimming Classes Rescheduled June 7 - 18

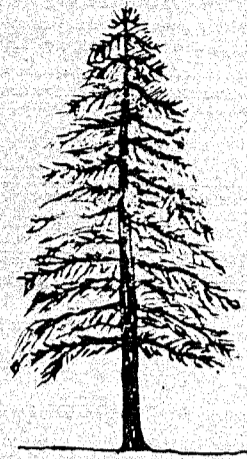
The summer swimming classes for Santa Anna children have been postponed until June 7, according to Mrs. Charles Hosch, coordinator for the local program. Classes for beginners, advanced beginners and intermediates will be held for two weeks, with the three groups to be bussed to the Coleman pool each day. Lessons will last 45 minutes for each group.

Also planned is a class for kindergarten and five-year-old children to be held June 14-25. Parents will have to furnish transportation for that age group, and parents interested are urged to organize a car pool to transport the children to Coleman for the 11 a.m. lesson.

Starting Monday, May 31, is a Water Safety Instructor Aide class where members must be 14 years old or over and hold a current junior or senior life saving certificate or swimmer card.

Instructors for the program are needed, so advanced swimmers are encouraged to take the course and help instruct the children during the month of June. Also available will be basic Rescue and Water Safety classes, adult beginner lessons and advanced life saving.

The Consumer Alert

a student who wants to earn some spending money for the summer by mowing lawns.

But if the solicitor is seeking large yard care jobs that involve considerable sums of money, be cautious. You are protected by the Texas Home Solicitation Act, which allows you to cancel any contract for \$25 or more by midnight of the third business day. If you're dealing with an unscrupulous itinerant, though, your check may be cashed and spent the same day of the transaction, and the yard-care "specialist" may be in the next town by the time you decide you didn't get your money's worth.

If you do deal with an itinerant, never pay for a job in advance, and always inspect the completed work carefully before paying for it.

For assistance with a consumer complaint, get in touch with the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division or your county or district attorney.

AUSTIN—If your yard is the only one on the block that doesn't look like a well-tended park, there may be a variety of reasons. You may be too busy to spend time on lawn and garden care, you may be physically incapable of such strenuous work, you may not have the proper tools and equipment, or you may just not have the inclination.

For whatever reason, many consumers who want the pleasure of having a well-cared-for yard for spring and summer outdoor living turn to professional yard care services.

Established, reputable, professional yard care services can be a boon to the homeowner, our Consumer Protection Division attorneys have learned. In many cases, they do a better job than the novice who lacks specialized equipment and who may not know how to select and apply fertilizers and pesticides properly.

Consumers who are considering such services can choose those which specialize in jobs such as

lawn maintenance, tree trimming, lawn and tree spraying, and landscaping, among others. There are total-care services and those which offer either year-round maintenance or service only during warm weather months, too.

However, our Consumer Protection attorneys caution homeowners considering such services to investigate carefully before committing themselves to a contract for work, or for advance payment for a job.

As with all such contract work, it's important to decide what you want done, then get at least three estimates from different firms or individuals. You should get recommendations from friends or relatives who have used such services, or check with the Better Business Bureau to determine the reputation of a firm you don't know.

If you're entering into a contract for a continuing service, be sure it spells out precisely what work is to be performed for what length of time and at what total cost per month or year. If you are contracting for a one-time-only major job, be sure that the dates work is to be started and completed are included.

Our attorneys urge consumers to exercise care when dealing with itinerant yard care specialists who solicit business door-to-door. Often this may only be

EASY FRESH PEACH COBBLER

- 1/2 cup butter, melted
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 2 tsp. baking powder
- 2 cups peeled, sliced peaches
- 1/3 cup sugar
- 1/2 tsp. cinnamon

Combine butter, 1/2 cup sugar, milk, flour and baking powder in a 2-quart baking dish. Put peaches on top. Combine 1/3 cup sugar and cinnamon. Sprinkle on top of peaches. Bake in preheated 375-degree oven for 40-45 minutes. Best when served warm. Yield: 4-5 servings.

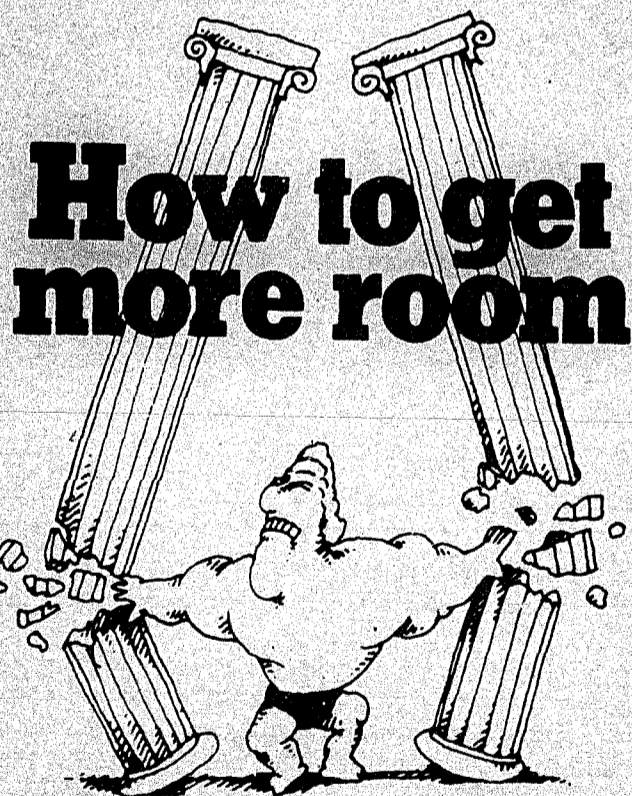

A LITTLE LEAGUE STORY

The following story has been copied in several newspapers including the May 25 Abilene Reporter News. The article is about a Little League umpire named Donald Jensen, who was struck in the head by a bat thrown by an irate fan. The article was written from his hospital bed while being held for overnight observation after the incident.

The timely article might give some thought to the "unsung heroes" of the Little League program.

UMPIRING FOR FUN

"I am an umpire. I don't do it for a living, but only on weekends for fun. I've played baseball coached it and watched it. But somehow nothing takes the place of umpiring.

"Maybe it's because I feel that deep down I am providing a fair chance for all kids to play the game without disagreements and arguments. With all this fun I've had, there is something that still bothers me about my job. Some of you folks don't understand why I'm there.

"Some of you feel I'm there to exert authority over your son. For that reason, you often yell at me when I make a mistake or encourage your son to say things that hurt my feelings.

"How many of you really understand that I try to be perfect? I try not to make a mistake. I don't want your son to feel he got a bad deal from an umpire. Yet, no matter how hard I try, I can't be perfect. I counted the number of calls I made in a six-inning game today. The total number of decision, whether on balls and strikes or safes and outs, was 146.

TRYING TO BE PERFECT

"I tried my best to get them right, but I'm sure I missed some. When I figured out my percentage, I could have missed eight calls today and still got about 95 percent right. In most occupations that percentage would be considered excellent. If I were in school that grade would

receive an A for sure.

"As I sit here writing this letter, I am no longer as upset as I was this afternoon. I wanted to quit umpiring behind the plate for a pitcher who pantomined his displeasure at any call on a borderline pitch that was not in his team's favor.

"For two innings the manager watched this. When the kid returned to the dugout to bat in the top of the third, the manager called him aside. In a voice loud enough that I was able to overhear, the lecture went like this: 'Listen, son, it is time you make a decision. You can be an umpire, an actor or a pitcher. But you can be only one at a time when you are playing for me. Right now it is your job to pitch. And you are basically doing a lousy job. Leave the acting to the actor, the umpiring to the umpire, or you won't be doing any pitching here.

Now what is it to be?"

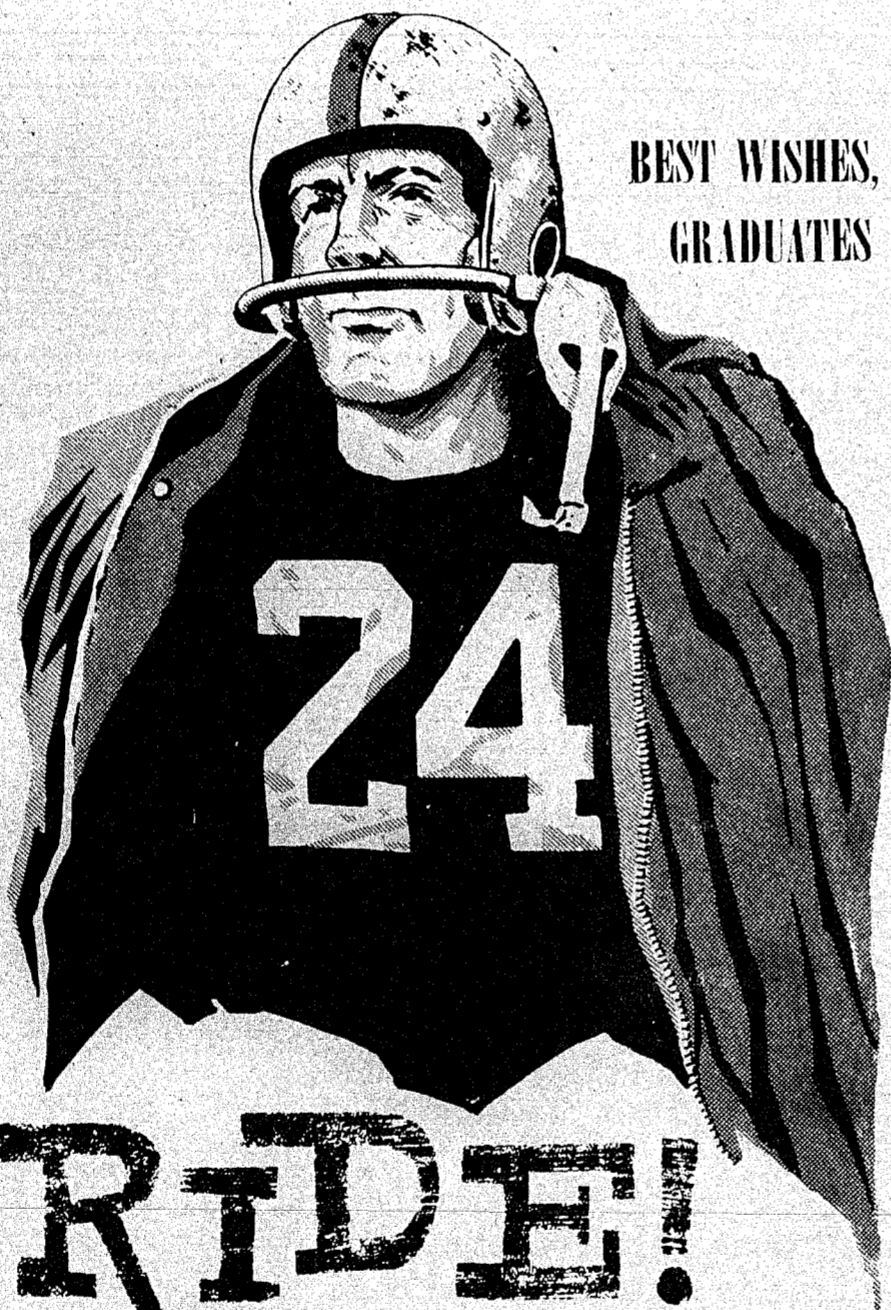
"Needless to say, the kid chose the pitching route and went on to win the game.

"When the game was over the kid followed me to my car. Fighting his hardest to keep back the tears, he apologized for his actions and thanked me for umpiring the game. He said that he had learned a lesson that he would not forget.

"I can't help but wonder how many more fine young men are missing their chance to develop into outstanding ball players because their parents encourage them to spend time umpiring rather than working harder to play the game as it should be played."

Donald Jensen, a man who liked to umpire for the fun of it, died of a brain concussion the following morning resulting from the blow of that same baseball bat.

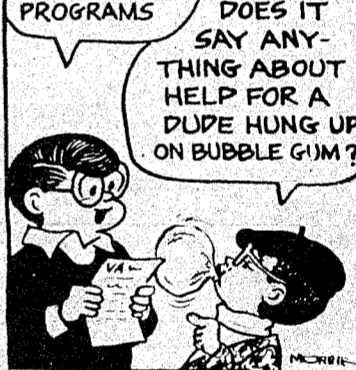

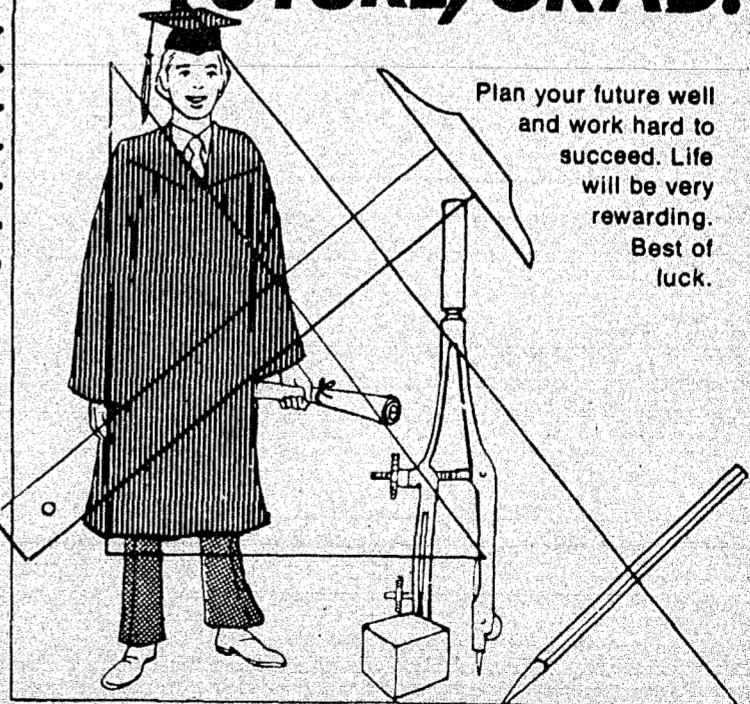

Coleman County Reports Case Of Screwworms

Area livestock owners are reminded that the annual northward migration of screwworms has begun, with at least one case reported in Coleman County during the past week. Other cases have been noted in Menard, Runnels, Taylor and San Saba Counties in the past two weeks.

Dr. M. E. Meadows Jr., director of the USDA Screwworms Eradication Program, urges livestock owners to watch animals carefully for signs of worm infestation and send samples to the APHIS laboratory for identification. Free postage paid sample kits are available from County Agents, veterinarians, livestock inspectors or from the Mission headquarters.

Dr. Meadows recommends spraying livestock with Co-Ral or Korlan, and to treat or carefully watch navels of newborn animals and other wounds.

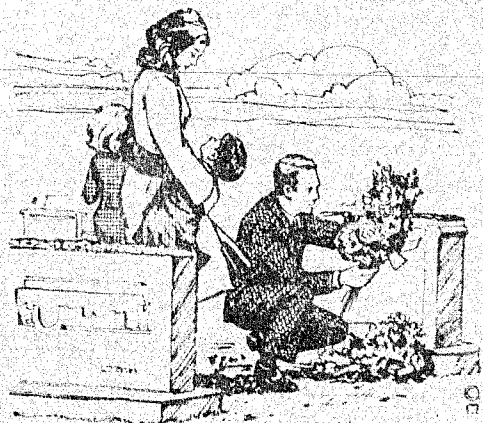
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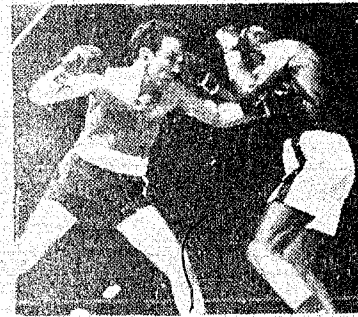

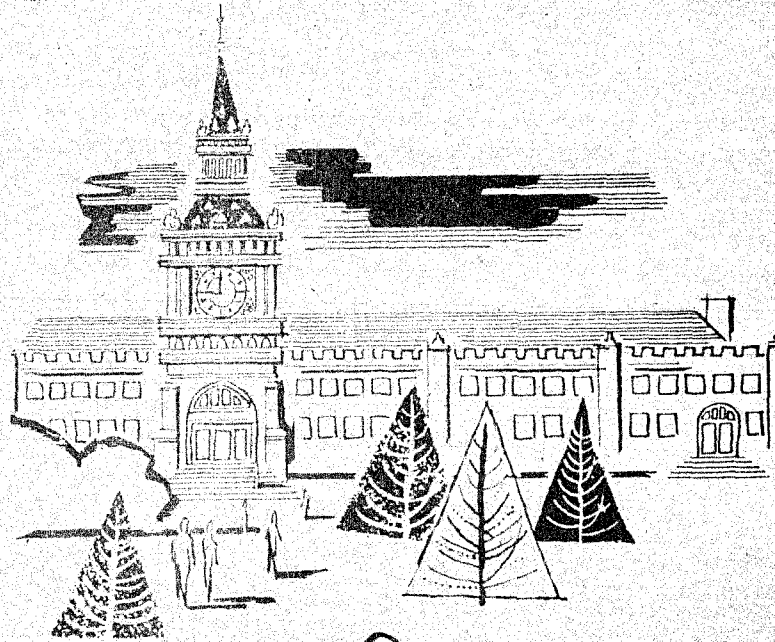

Local Soldier Now In Germany

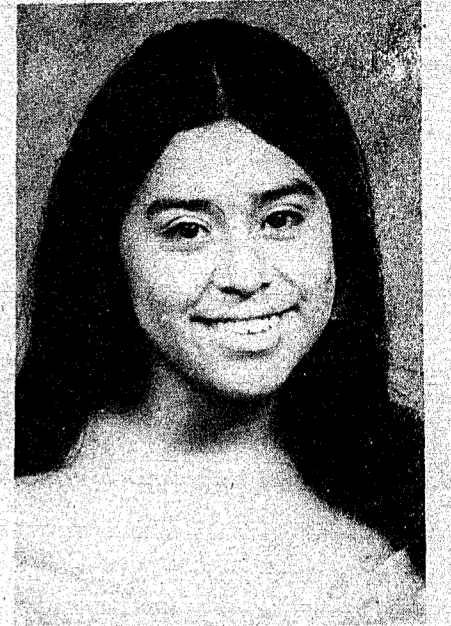

JACQUELINE LOYD

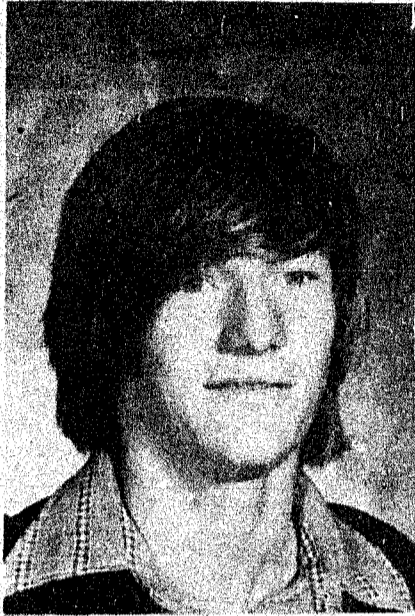

While attending Santa Anna Jr. High, I was a twirler for one year and drum major for one year. My eighth grade year I was chosen Football Sweetheart.

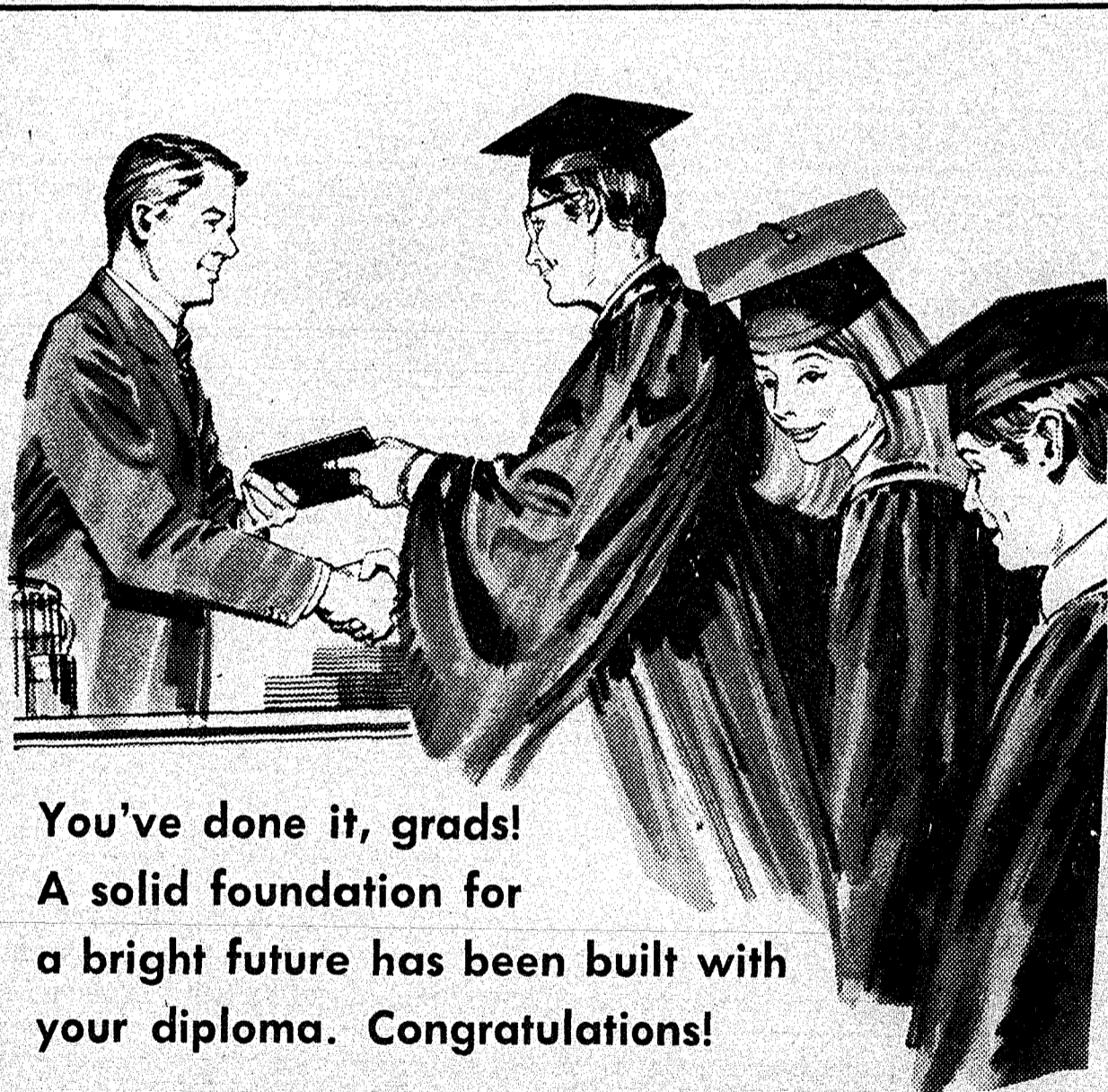

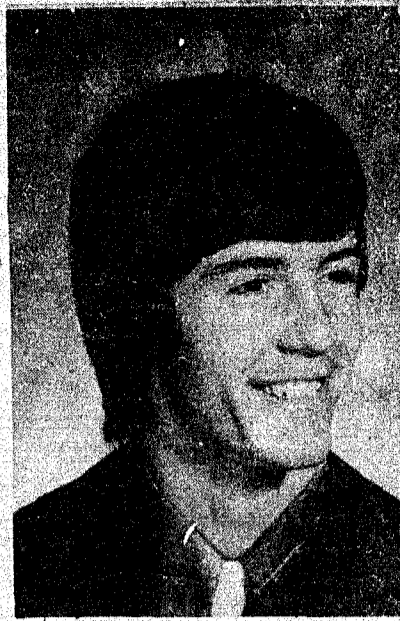
After eighth grade graduation I realized I was to go into High School.

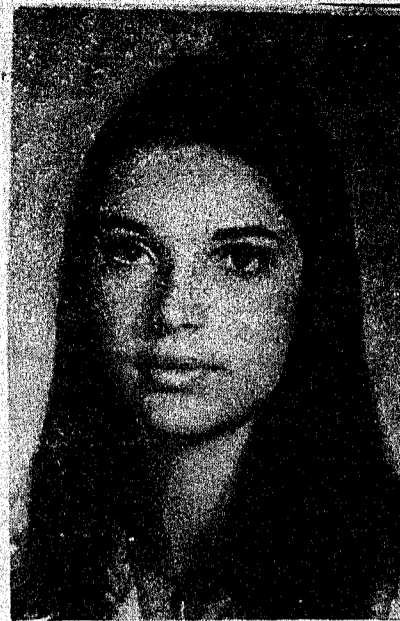
My sophomore year I moved up a little. I played on the A team in football and basketball. I made the all-district band that year and also went to Regional in track and tennis.

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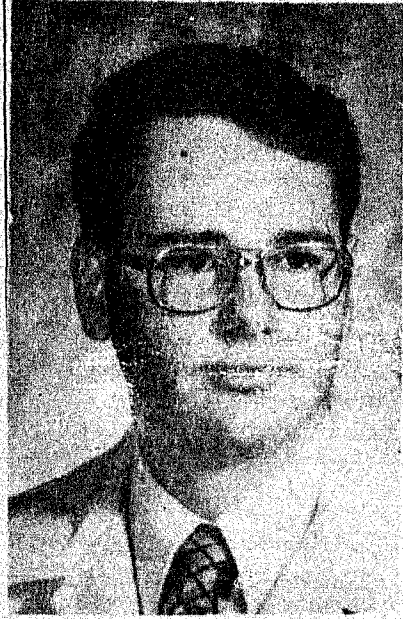

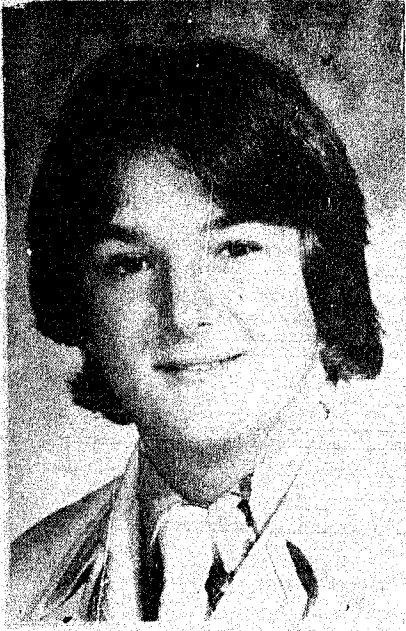

During elementary school, I never accomplished much as far as extracurricular activities. My junior high years soon became more exciting, and I soon became ready for the different and more enjoyable life of high school.

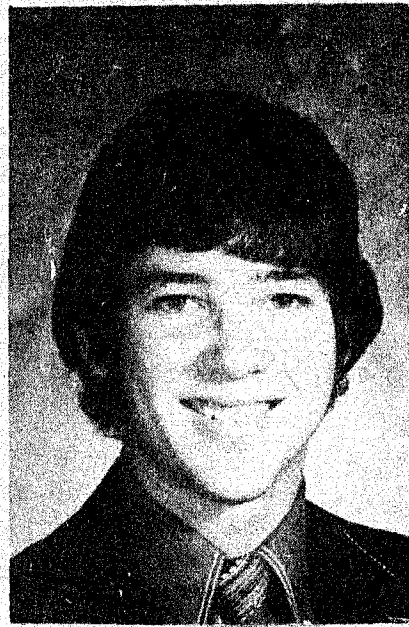
Santa Anna High School didn't offer all the subjects and organizations that larger schools did, but the curriculum (as I found out) kept me quite busy and also sufficiently educated.

more friendly here, than in any other school I have ever gone to. It seems to me that this year was the longest year that I have ever attended school, but I know it is nearly over.

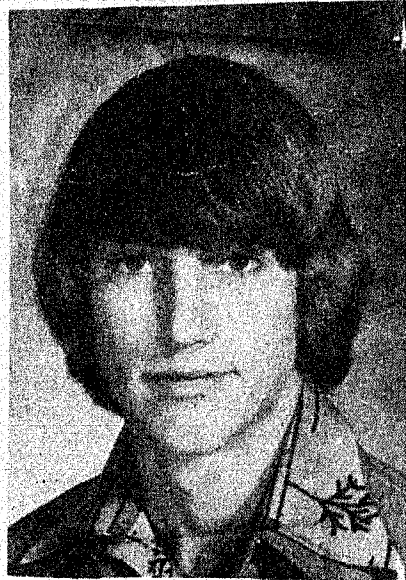


VICKI KUYKENDALL

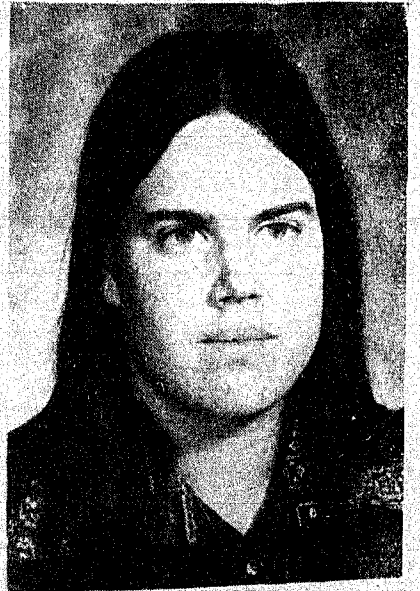
SARAH ESTES

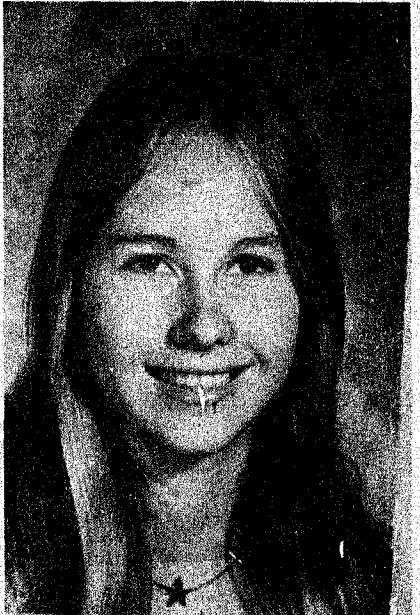
DANNA PELTON

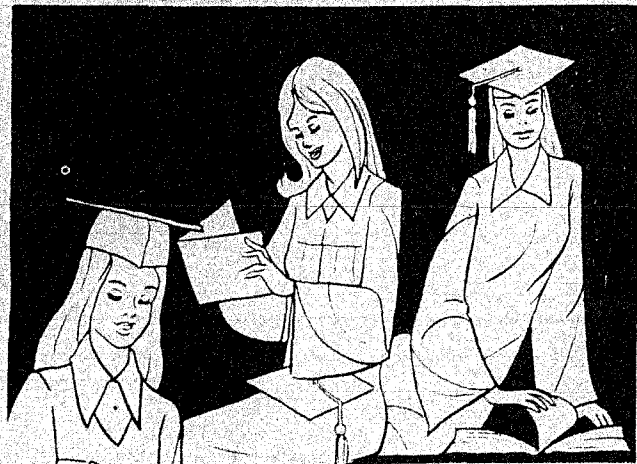
