



### Supt. D. D. Byrne Resigns

D. D. Byrne, who has been in the Santa Anna schools for the past 16 years, has resigned. Mr. Byrne was recently given a new three year contract in the Dobbin schools. During his administration the average teacher's salary has been gradually increased from \$720 per year to \$1,431. Many business trips have been made to Austin and other cities in behalf of the schools and not one penny of expenses has ever been paid by the school

district as the school officials always paid their own expenses.

The following courses have been added to the high school curriculum: Texas History, Introduction to Business, Public Speaking, Safety Education, Community Civics, Trigonometry, Shorthand and the Fourth Unit in Homemaking. Vocational reimbursement in Homemaking has been secured. A lunch room program has been inaugurated. A fund was set up for the Ward School that provided for the purchase of playground equipment. A student council was organized in the high school last year that sponsored some very educational

entertainment for the school and the public. The negro school has been accredited as an elementary school. During the war not one unit of affiliation was lost. All teachers, with two exceptions, have held degrees from standard colleges and universities.

In 1939 the school district was forced to default a \$2,000 bond due to lack of funds in the Interest & Sinking Fund. However, that was paid later and this year a \$3,000 bond due in 1951 was paid as well as the current bond of \$3,000 and interest. The School board cooperated with the city in collecting delinquent taxes this year. So there should be a balance of approximately \$5,000 in that fund at the close of the fiscal year.

Mr. Byrne has a B. S. degree from Sam Houston State Teachers College and a Master of Arts degree in Educational Administration from the University of Colorado where he was made a member of the Kappa Delta Pi because of his achievement in education. He has also done additional work in the Graduate School of the University of Texas.

Mr. Byrne has always appreciated the boys and girls in both school for they have been very nice and considerate. He wishes to thank the patrons and other interested citizens for their cooperation and support during these 16 years of service. He also wishes to thank the Santa Anna News for the many favors it has shown him and the school.



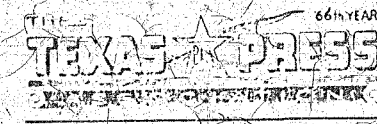

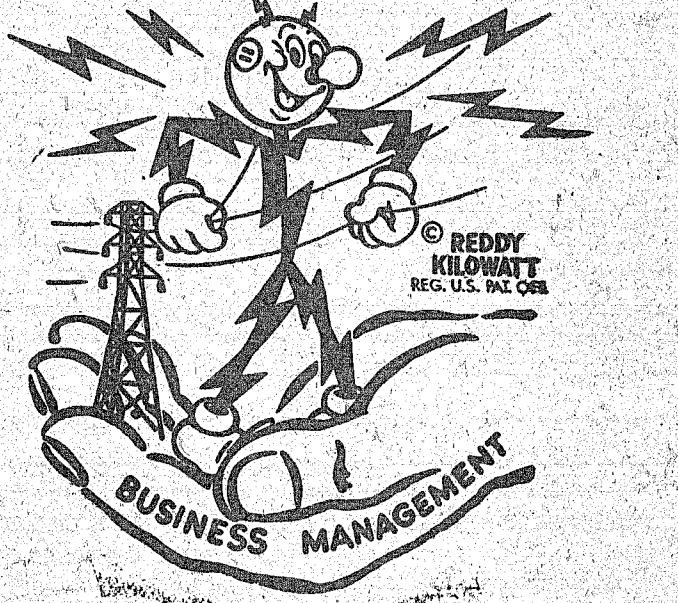

**Improved Uniform International SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON**

**JESUS AND THE SABBATH**

LESSON TEXT—Exodus 20:8; Mark 2:27-28; Matthew 12:1-13. MEMORY SELECTION—This is the day which the Lord hath made; we will rejoice and be glad in it.—Psalm 118:24.

"The Sabbath was made for man," and was ordained of God for the good of man's body and soul. It was intended to be a day of glad fellowship with the Lord.

Since the Sabbath—the seventh day—was essentially one of rest and worship, the principles which surrounded it and directed its life may be applied to our day of rest, which is the first day of the week—the Lord's day.

That word "rest" sounds a little strange in this busy world of ours, and yet it is an important one. It means quiet for the struggling one, calm for the troubled, repose for the weary, cessation of labor for the worn-out one.

God in his infinite wisdom saw that without rest man would soon destroy himself, and he made provision for one day in seven when labor should cease and man should be free for that recreation of soul and body which should fit him for the labor of the week.

**I. A Day of Holiness (Exod. 20:8).** God gave his people a holy day to balance up their days of labor and to bring blessing to their souls. On that day he decreed that they should come apart from their labors, turn from secular interests and turn their hearts and minds to the unseen and the eternal. Man would become so engrossed in the things of this world that he would soon forget; therefore, God commands him to stop and worship. That should be sufficient to cause his people to "remember" the day "to keep it holy."

Notice that the day of rest was to be not only for the family, but also for servants and for visitors. The employer who unnecessarily operates his factory or office on Sunday violates this commandment. Note also that the man who is to rest on the seventh day is supposed to work on the six days. Some neglect to do both.

This matter of keeping the Lord's day holy is one which has tremendous implications in the lives of our children. Many men and women who have had built into their own characters the stalwart virtues nurtured by family attendance at divine worship have not only forgotten their own continuing need, but are destroying the interest of their children in church attendance.

It is serious enough to go astray in one's own life, but to lead one's children astray is an appalling responsibility. Let's keep the Lord's day as a holy day.

**II. A Day of Helpfulness (Mark 2:23-25).**

The formalists of Christ's day, the Pharisees, had overlooked the heart of God's law and the holy living which it was intended to produce, and had bound up even the observance of the sabbath (which was intended to be a day of rest and gladness) in such a mass of technical "thou shalt not's" that it was a day of fear.

The accusations against the disciples because they had taken and eaten grain was not on the ground that they had stolen, for the law (Deut. 23:25) guaranteed that right to the one who passed through his neighbor's field. The Pharisees contended, however, that the disciples had worked on the Sabbath in picking and hulling the grain.

God's laws are helpful laws, and it is only when men pervert them, or add to them their own traditions and interpretations, that they become burdensome to anyone who is God-fearing and obedient.

**III. A Day of Healing (Matt. 12:9-13).**

Jesus made it clear that healing of the body (yes, and of the soul) was most appropriate on the Sabbath day; in fact, that is the very day for it.

The healing of the man with the withered arm revealed that back of the Pharisees' professed concern for the Sabbath was a real hatred for Christ. It is an appalling thing that in the house of worship on the very Sabbath day, these men, outwardly so religious, were plotting against our Lord.

Jesus cuts across human hypocrisy and hatred to declare that the true keeping of the Sabbath is to do the work of God. No work of necessity (like plucking the grain) or of mercy (like healing the withered

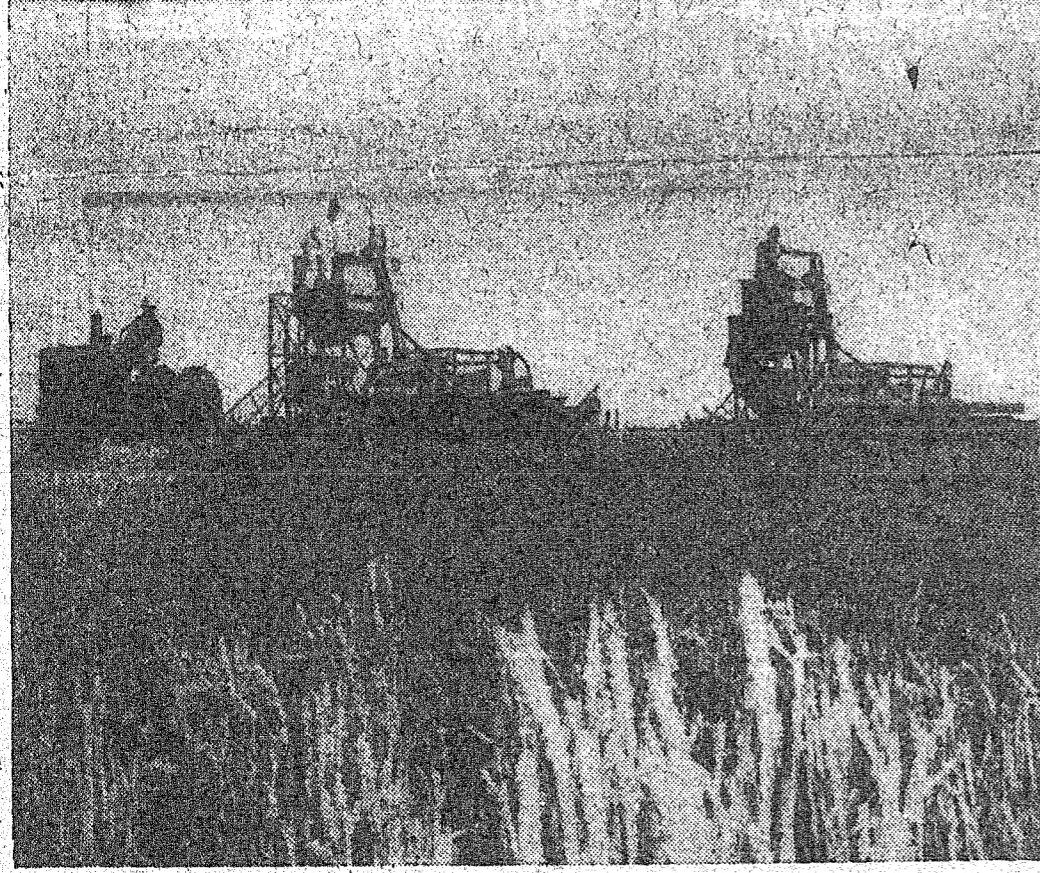

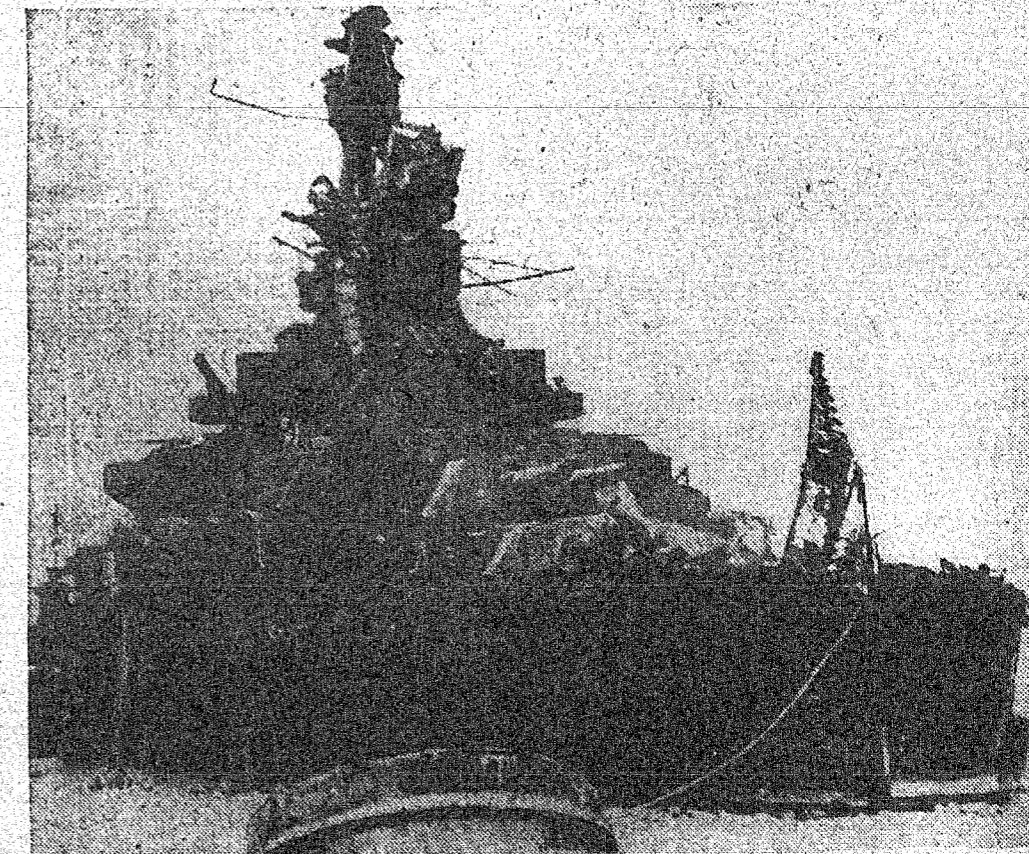

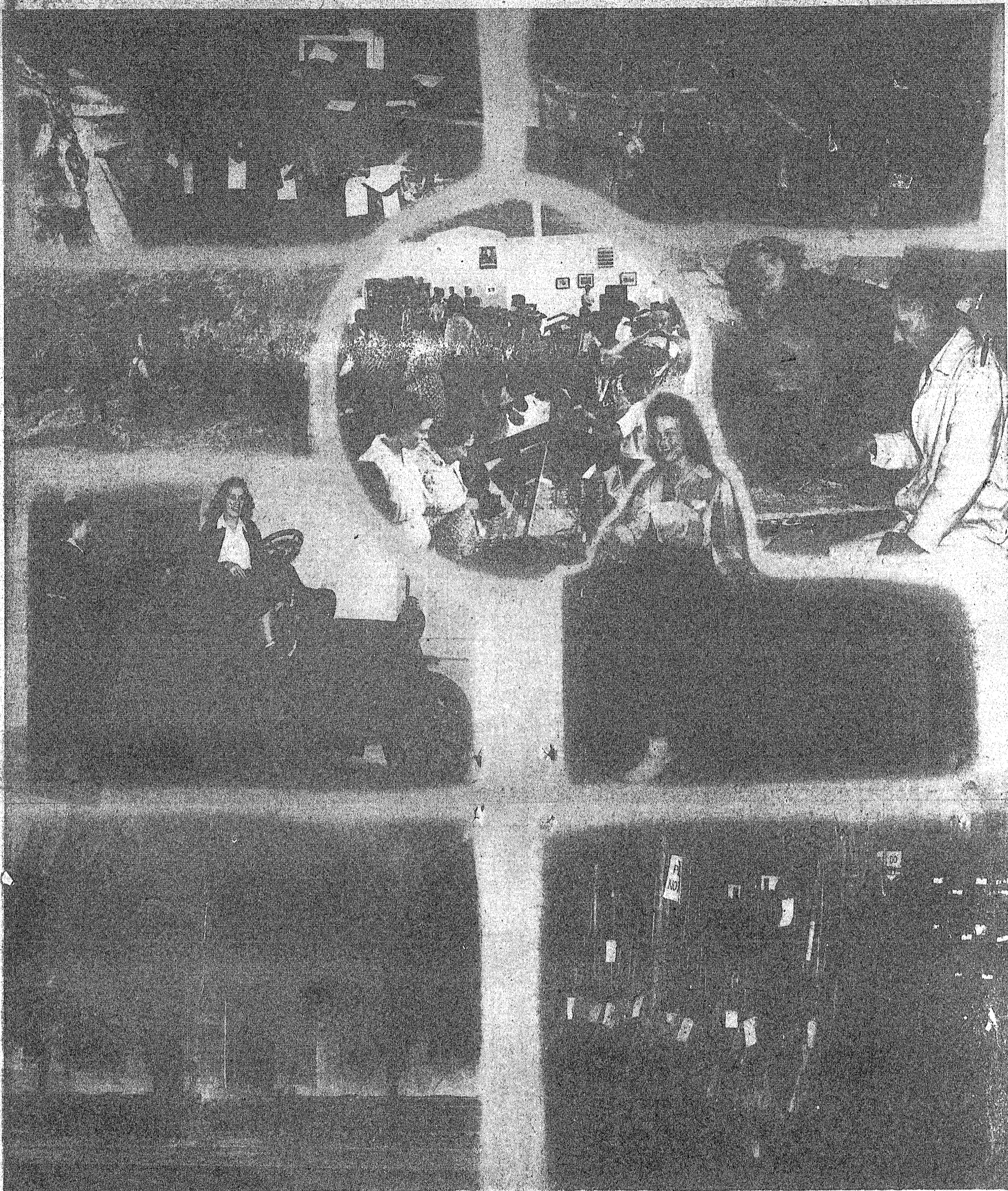

### Boyer Ideas Lead to Choice Of Life Work

SONORA, TEX. (WNS)—T. Puckett started publishing a newspaper at the ripe old age of 7. This was his first newspaper, one page, mimeographed affair. Now he's publisher of the Devil's River News. During the time between the mimeographed sheet and the Devil's River News, he's gone to college, married, and kicked around on several metropolitan papers as police reporter and photographer.

Clay entered this world April 16, 1914, in a place in North Carolina called Buncomb County. He wasn't a Southerner for very long, however, for his parents moved to Houston when Clay was two months old.

He went to school in San Antonio, graduating from high school there. He then went off and on to the University of Texas from 1932 to 1939, majoring in journalism.

He met Miss Mary Jack King of Marfa, Tex., in journalism class and continued the acquaintance to the point of marriage on July 19, 1938. The newlyweds honeymooned in Mexico.

While going to college "off and on," he secured a job on the Austin Tribune, and was stuck on the police beat. He also worked in the same capacity on the San Antonio Express. "The only thing that ever bothered me in police reporting was the injury or death of a kid," Puckett said.

Puckett purchased the Devil's River News on Oct. 18, 1940. The paper was 50 years old to the day when he bought it.

From Sept. 19, 1942, to March 6, 1946, the Sonora publisher served in the Marine Corps.

### Order Is Given For Construction On Highway 194

DIMMITT, TEX. (WNS)—John E. H. Ivey has ordered construction of the right-of-way gap of approximately 1 1/2 miles on Highway 194 to connect Hart and Dimmitt. The stretch, which runs between Hart and Dimmitt, will cost approximately \$135,000 to pave. At the completion of the gap in Highway 194 north of Dimmitt is the Deaf Smith County line. Highway 194 will be a direct route from Plainville to Hereford until the gap south on Highway 194 and west on Highway 194. The Deaf Smith County line is approximately 12 miles from Hart and Dimmitt. The distance around the present stretch of Highway 194 is approximately 12 miles.

### Deep Well Irrigation Proves Profitable to Parmer County Farmers

(Condensed from the Friona Star) FRIONA, TEX. (WNS)—Deep well pumping pays off under proper management, says Lee McClure, Parmer County Agent. Management in all irrigation involves knowing when to water, and how much in relation with the rainfall received, McClure stresses. It is impossible to determine how much crop a well will water, since rainfall is variable. In Parmer County, in dry years, a 1,000-gallon well can water only 100 acres of row crop, while at other times it can handle the 100 acres of row crop as well as 40 acres of alfalfa. Irrigation interest is increasing here. In 1945, thirty-two wells were operated, and this year 12 more have been added, with others awaiting deep pumps. Most of the wells in this county are located in the southern and eastern parts, on the south side of the Amarillo highway, with about a third on the north side of the highway. Cost of installation varies from \$4,000 in the east and south, where water is found at 150 to 200 feet, up to \$6,000 or \$10,000 in the north portion, where wells generally run a good deal over 200 feet. McClure cites Lubbock experiment station figures, which show an increase on hegar of 39.3 bushels per acre during a period of three years under irrigation. The amount of water required for this increase was nine acre inches. (an acre inch is 27,154 gallons of water) applied during March, July, and August. August 15 is the most profitable time to irrigate. (Continued on Page 7)

### Plan College in Sweetwater Area

SWEETWATER, TEX. (WNS)—Avenger Field, located on land belonging to the city of Sweetwater, and once the home of the WASP, may become a junior college to serve this area. Four counties, Mitchell, Scurry, Fisher and Nolan, have organized to secure this property as a junior college. The organization is composed of county school superintendents, chamber of commerce managers, and one business man from each of the four counties, with R. E. Gracey, of Roscoe, as general chairman. Avenger Field during the war was used for educational purposes. As a result, facilities include a well-built administration building, barracks, recreation hall, and other permanent buildings, which will serve proposed purposes. The college will be organized to serve a radius of 60 miles.

### Historical Relics of Southwest Continue To Attract Thousands to Canyon Museum

CANYON, TEX. (WNS)—The Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum continues to be the number one attraction of West Texas. Tourists, school students, incidental visitors and museum students have swarmed to this building, situated on the West Texas College campus more than 500,000 strong since it opened in 1933. Many have visited the exhibits two or more times. Each second visitor agrees he saw more on the repeat visit than on the first "port of call." Exhibits continue to be more interesting; contributions to the historical headquarters of the Southwest continue to be more authentic, more colorful and more attractive to the thousands who stalk along cases, murals and booths carrying items no person could reproduce or replace. Curator Boone McClure declares those who visit the museum for the second or third time are more interested in historical details; are more eager to make notes, and many question the historical and geographical settings which make the exhibits so attractive. McClure loves to have such people challenge his files. His records, according to officials of the Smithsonian Institute, are complete and accurate. This museum is rated as one of the outstanding institutions of this area. In fact, larger museums have tried, without results, to purchase many of the specimen McClure displays. Now that the museum is enlarging the building, adding a three story addition to the modernistic front visitors see in Canyon, one cannot help but ponder over the question where all of the items are going to be stored. There are items portraying the entire history of the Southwest from millions of years before history was written, up to the boom-days of the late 20's. There are pictures worth millions of dollars to the collector; murals money could not buy; replicas of pre-historic reptiles and bones, stones of the region on which no jeweler would dare test his authenticity in setting a value. There are guns from the beginning-of-time to the present era; there are automobiles, printing presses, trappers' equipment, oil well shooting equipment, designs of dresses, clothes, hats, shoes and other essential items needed by our hardy forefathers. Each item in this building of treasure is historical and priceless. The WPA added many priceless documents to the museum's archives of historical data. Here one may browse for days and months, resting of historical events which made West Texas and the Southwest so colorful in American history. And as rapidly as the museum is able to accommodate the materials, the late Judge James D. Hamlin, of Farwell, is permitting the museum to receive and display his collection. This outstanding contribution to the public, conservatively valued at \$100,000, includes paintings by old masters, complete suites of furniture representing continental and colonial designs, large services of sterling silver, English bone and china, jewelry made by craftsmen of every continent, and extensive artifacts, photographs, paintings, and other materials tracing history from early Indian culture to modern times. This collection will be housed on the second floor of the new addition as soon as the unit is completed. The O. T. Nicholson (Shamrock, Tex.) collection is the most recent large addition to the museum collection. (Continued on Page 7)

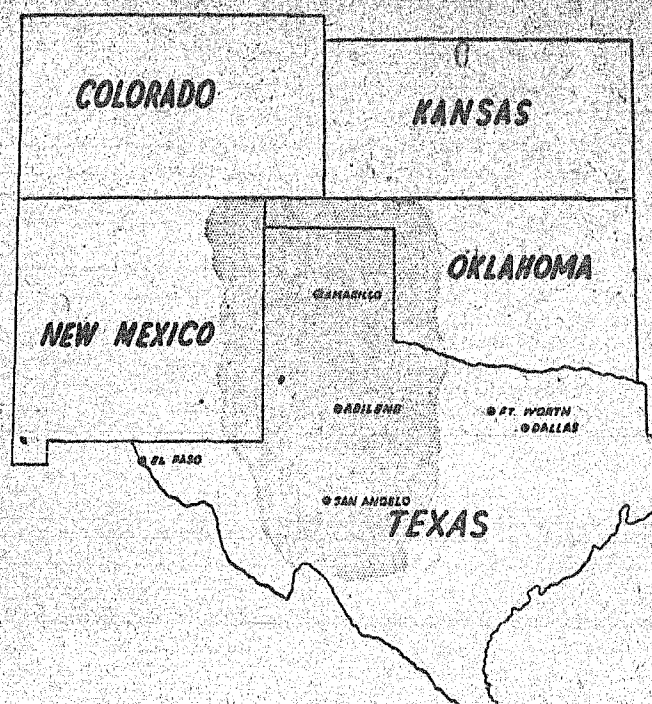
