OPA a week ago, After much disågreement between the foreign ministers of the Big Four during the past week, Molotov, Russian foreign minister, agreed to issue invitations for a 21 nation conference to meet in Paris on July 29 and to draft recommendations by the meeting. The invitations are

to be sent to 21 nations who at the peace conference were to prepare the treaties for the Axissatellites, Italy, Hungary, Romania, Bulgaria and Finland

There was growing suspicion that Molotov, after agreeing at last to hold the conference July, 29, was using every tactical de-vice to force postponement of the conference plan.

At a plenary session, July 9, Molotov bitterly attacked the proposed American 25 year treaty to enforce Gérman disarmament. The attack was made only a few hours after the invitations were sent for the 21 nation peace conference.

OPA enemies and some of its supporters/piled up new proposals to exempt particular commodities from the price controls administration leaders hope to put back into operation before the end of this week. The new proposals all added up to a new batch of troubles for demo leader Barkley of Kentucky.
