## Police Report

Santa Anna Police Officer Craig Terry would like to remind all of us that the school season is drawing near and would like to take this opportunity to say a few words about it, and the school zones, etc., a bit early.

"The Police Department will be working these areas with radar and they will be strictly enforced in order to help protect our youngsters from harm. I want to urge all motorists to exercise all due caution when approaching the school areas, and to be extra careful in watching for young people that are walking, riding bicycles, and getting out of vehicles," says Terry. "Please make an extra effort to avoid one of our young people being hurt, because sometimes they just don't pay close enough attention as they should, and dart into the street without looking."

Officer Terry reports that there has been several thefts of weapons since the first of August. A rifle was taken from a pickup on Wallis Avenue; a rifle taken from a pickup

at a residence on Bowie; and a handgun taken from a pickup at another residence on Bowie. Also taken were several sets of weights and related

equipment, from a building on the Brady Highway, which were being used by local youngsters to help them get ready for football. Officer Terry also received reports of two instances of gasoline being removed from vehicles in the Southwest part of town. Anyone having knowledge of these crimes, is urged to contact the Police at 348-3147, or see the police in person.

Officer Terry would also like to express his appreciation to all citizens for the excellent response to the Residential House Check program that the police department started recently.

One final item, is that the police department is interested in citizen response to the interest in a Neighborhood Watch program. This program has had excellent results in

other areas of Texas and has reduced the crime rate considerably in most towns and cities that have set up such a program. All interested citizens are urged to contact the Santa Anna Police Department, P.O.

## Santa Anna Trustees Plan for School Year

Final plans for the new school year were discussed by the Santa Anna Independent School District Board of Trustees when they met in regular session at the school office on Tuesday, August 12.

The local policy on student attendance was reviewed and changes were adopted by the board to be included in the 1986-87 school policies. The revised rules will be given to students and parents upon enrollment for the new year.

Also adopted by the group were policies regarding teacher appraisal and career ladder selections which will be made a part of the record.

The board approved the purchase of a new vehicle for the school and will trade-in a 1984 vehicle now in use. It was agreed that the local school will participate in the Region KV Math-Science Cooperative and

the Media Services during the coming year.

A review of the school improvement project was given, showing the renovation of the elementary school building was done at a cost of just under the budgeted amount of \$20,000. The remodeling was completed during the early part of the summer, with the cost paid from local funds.

The 1986-87 budget was reviewed, with the public hearing set for Monday at the school office. All interested persons are urged to be present for the meeting to review the proposed budget before adoption.

In other routine business, bills and accounts for the month were approved for payment and minutes of the last meeting read and approved. Bill Martin, president, led the business session.

## Coleman County Telephone Cooperative Annual Meeting Saturday

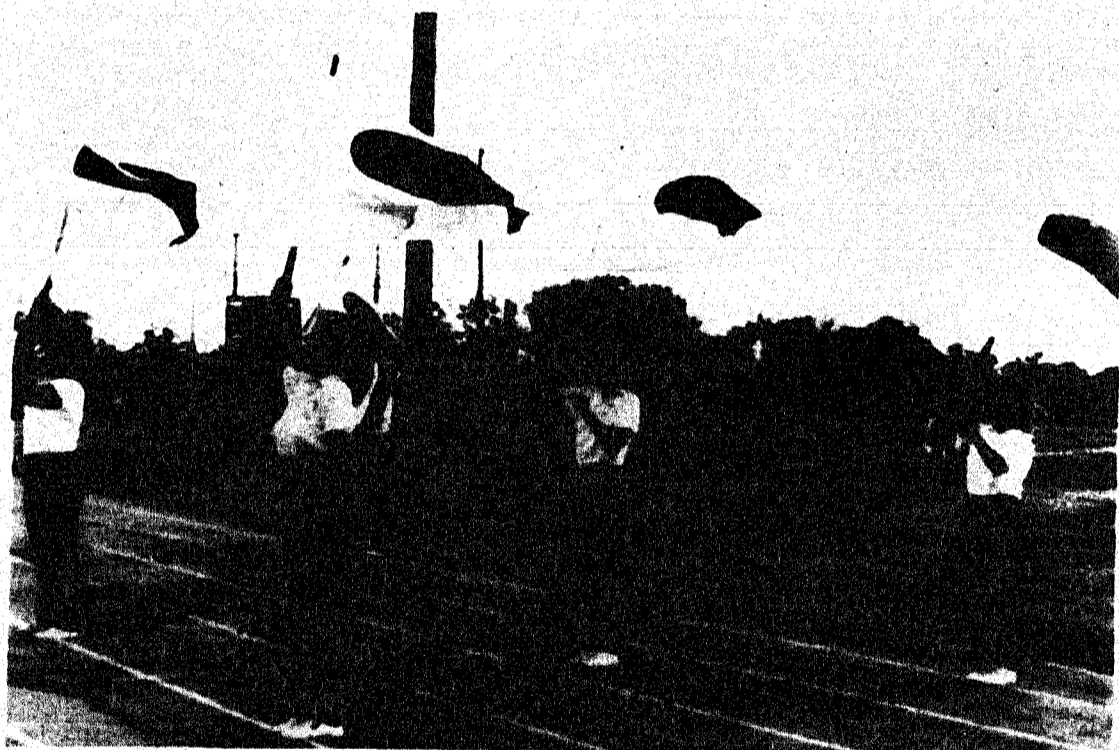

## Teachers require teamwork

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following letter to the editor was submitted by Dale Freeman and the letter is run as it ran in the Dallas Times Herald on Friday, August 8, 1986)

### To the Editor:

As a veteran teacher of 15 years who has been assigned to one of the most naturally integrated high schools in Dallas, I would like to comment on the reported need for all teachers and administrators within the Dallas Independent School District to be "sensitive."

I, too, am greatly concerned about our failure rate, our low scores, our prejudices and, most of all, our future in education.

However, I must applaud those teachers and administrators who have been sensitive to students' needs but who always seem to come off looking as though they are robots who delight in chalking up failures.

On the contrary, I have observed most of my colleagues to be caring, sensitive people who begin each school year with great expectations but who often end up being disappointed by the "insensitivity" of many parents and, most of all, by hundreds of students who seemingly find no real reason for learning.

I have observed master teachers using the best materials and teaching techniques, counseling students individually, offering tutorial help, arriving early, staying late — often to be faced with total indifference on the part of some students.

I often have enrolled students four weeks into a semester because the parents were either too busy or too unconcerned to see that their child attend school, get

the right supplies, get to bed before midnight and possibly receive one or two decent meals a day.

The main goal in life for many of my past "failing" students appears to be to have a pickup truck or a fast-moving car, a good-looking girl or guy by their side, some music in the tape recorder, some good food, drink, clothes and a little pocket money.

For many young people today, that spells "success." The idea of reading, studying or doing homework is really a "drag," so they refuse to do it. Thus they fail.

However, in spite of this attitude, I find myself eager for the new school year to begin. I find myself greatly encouraged by the many students who do want to learn and rise to the challenge set before them.

Parents, you must help us. We teachers, administrators and school board members cannot educate your children without your cooperation and without all of us working together. Parents, hold your children responsible for their actions — in all areas of life!

Let me say I never have known a teacher who entered the teaching profession to fail students — never! I personally agonize when a student doesn't rise to become all he can become and who doesn't even make an attempt to pass my class. Most teachers certainly are not in the classroom for the money.

Could it possibly be that we teachers actually do care about our students and their futures? Could it be that most have been "sensitive" to their needs all along? I think so. We just need help from home! I am excited about the 1986-87 school year. It could be the best year ever, if we all work together.

## Thoughts From Our Pastors

Nothing else is quite as basic to the Christian movement as the personal witness of one Christian to another human being. The late D. T. Niles from Ceylon has been frequently quoted as saying, "Evangelism is nothing more than one beggar telling another beggar where to find bread."

Somehow in the multitude of activities and interests that demand our attention within the Church, we seem forget that the joy of sharing our faith is the privilege of every Christian. No matter how many persons may be employed by the Church, they simply cannot take this task from each individual Church member. If we believe the Gospel is Good News, surely we must find some way to communicate this Good News the vast number of person who live as if there was nothing but war, crime, violence, destruction, corruption and evil to talk about.

If I had one wish for the Church it

would be that the wonderful people who worship and work in our congregations could be genuinely motivated to exercise the privilege of inviting another person to follow Jesus Christ. In another Church Paper which comes to my desk each week, I found the following suggestions for those who will develop this dimension of their faith:

  - Have phone.....Will call
  - Have pen.....Will write
  - Have interest.....Will come
  - Have car.....Will bring
  - Have money.....Will tithe
  - Have voice.....Will sing
  - Have concern.....Will pray
  - Have conviction.....Will share
- It is my prayer that more members of our Churches will find the joy and blessings of bringing other persons to trust and obey Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior.

## Paul: A Man Of Faith

Three little boys gave their definition of faith. One said, "Faith is taking hold of God." The second said, "Faith is holding on to God." The third said "Faith is not letting go."

Paul took hold of God, took Him at His Word and followed Him. Paul held on to God in the good times and in the times of trial and persecution. Paul wouldn't and didn't let go of God even if it would have saved his life.

If faith was so important to Paul then it must be important to our times. If it is so important then "What is FAITH?"

I believe faith is acceptance, affirmation, and action. It involves the intellect, the emotions and the volition or acts. Faith is being receptive to a plan, assenting to that plan and surrendering to that plan of action. For the Christian it is the beginning, the middle and the end of the life of faith.

Faith is because the Master said it. A schoolmaster gave three of his pupils a difficult problem. "You will find it very hard to solve." But there is a way. After repeated attempts, one of them gave up in despair. "There is no way!" The second pupil was smiling and unconcerned. "I know it can be done, because I have seen it done." The third worked on, long after the rest had given up. His head ached and his brain was in a whirl. Yet as he went over it again and again and again he said without faltering, "I know there is a way, because the master has said there was." Here is faith, that confidence that rests not upon what has been seen but upon the promises of God. That is ACCEPTANCE.

Dr. Raymond Edman said it for affirmation. "Faith is dead to doubts, blind to impossibilities, knows nothing but success. Faith lifts its head and hands up through the threatening clouds, lays hold of Him who has all the power in heaven and earth. Faith makes the uplook good, the outlook bright, and the future glorious." That is affirmation. Faith is the ear which refuses

to be troubled longer by questions and suspicious doubts but listens in simplicity to what Jesus says. Faith is the eye gazing upon the wealth and the love of the Savior. Faith is the hand receiving the Divine gift and taking hold of the promises. Faith is Forsaking All I Trusts Him. That is AFFIRMATION.

A minister was crossing the Atlantic on a freighter. The captain called his attention to two compasses. The lower compass was affected by the steel in the framework of the ship. "The pilot steers by the higher compass," said the captain.

That is the way it should be as we steer our lives through the stormy seas. The compass of feeling is affected by the changing winds of time and circumstances, and may dash us upon the rocks. The compass higher up—the compass of faith—points steadily to the changeless One.

That is ACTION. "I pray for faith and thought it would strike me like lightning. But faith did not come. One day I read 'Now faith comes by hearing and hearing by the Word of God.' I had closed my Bible and prayed for faith. I now began to study my Bible and faith has been growing ever since." Dwight L. Moody.

That is ACCEPTANCE. It is strange we trust each other and doubt the Lord. We take the word of man and yet distrust His Word. If we could only remember God means what He says.

Yes, Paul was a man of faith. He accepted the Word, he affirmed the Word and he put feet to his prayers. At the end of his will Patrick Henry stated: "There is one thing more that I would like to leave my family—Christian faith. With that they would be rich if I didn't leave them a shilling. Without that they would be poor had I given them the whole world."

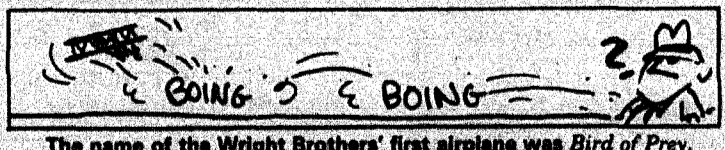

## No Charging At School Lunchroom

Betty Tucker, Santa Anna Independent School District Food Service Director has stated that due to the excessive amount of unpaid lunchroom charges at the Santa Anna Cafeteria in the past years, there will no longer be any charging allowed. Students may pay daily, weekly or monthly to the School Cafeteria, Kindergarten through 8th grade, 75 cents daily, \$3.75 weekly, or \$15 monthly; 9th thru 12th grade, 85 cents daily, \$4.25 weekly, or \$17.00 monthly; Teachers, \$1.45 daily, \$7.25 weekly or \$29.00 monthly.

The School Cafeteria asks that all parents and students please cooperate with the local school system on this item as not to leave the teachers or school officials on the spot.

There will also be no charging for reduced lunches.

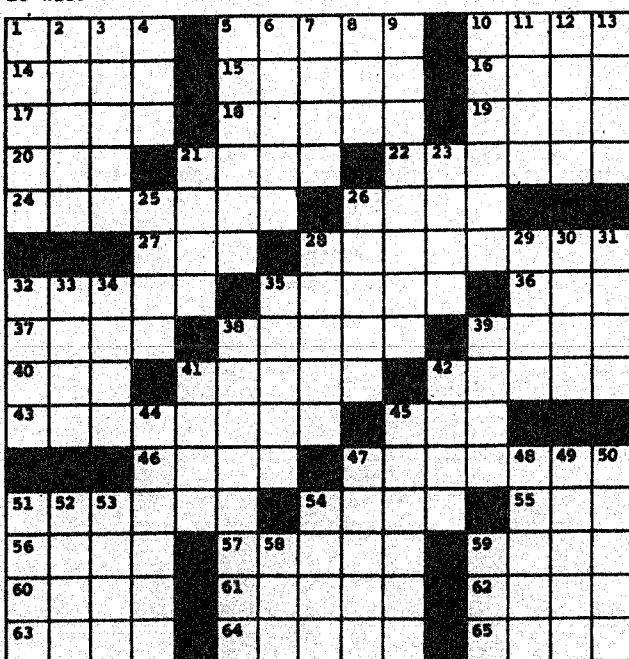

ABILENE—Classes at Hardin-Simmons University will begin Tuesday, Sept. 2 with registration for students not pre-registered and validation for registered students Monday, Sept. 1.

Sept. 1 at 9:15 a.m. senior students will begin the registration process in Mabee Physical Education Complex on the HSU campus. Freshman, sophomore and junior students will begin registration at 10:00 a.m.

Sept. 4 HSU will officially inaugurate the beginning of another school year with its annual convocation ceremonies in Behren's Chapel.

Graduate and postgraduate students may register any time Sept. 1 after 9:00 a.m. while intercollegiate students from ACU or McMurry College may register in the Registrar's Office.

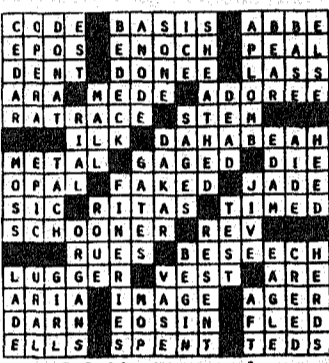
A—You have the right to apply for an apportionment while he is incarcerated. Any apportionment that you may be awarded will be discontinued and his full benefits will be restored upon his release.

Q—What does VA consider as a veteran's income for purposes of the eligibility assessment procedures?

A—Social security, including supplemental security income; U.S. Civil Service retirement; U.S. Railroad retirement; military retirement; unemployment insurance; any other retirement; total wages from all employers; interest and dividends; workers' compensation; black lung benefits; and any other annual income for the calendar year preceding the veteran's application for care including income of the spouse and dependents. Personal property is excluded.

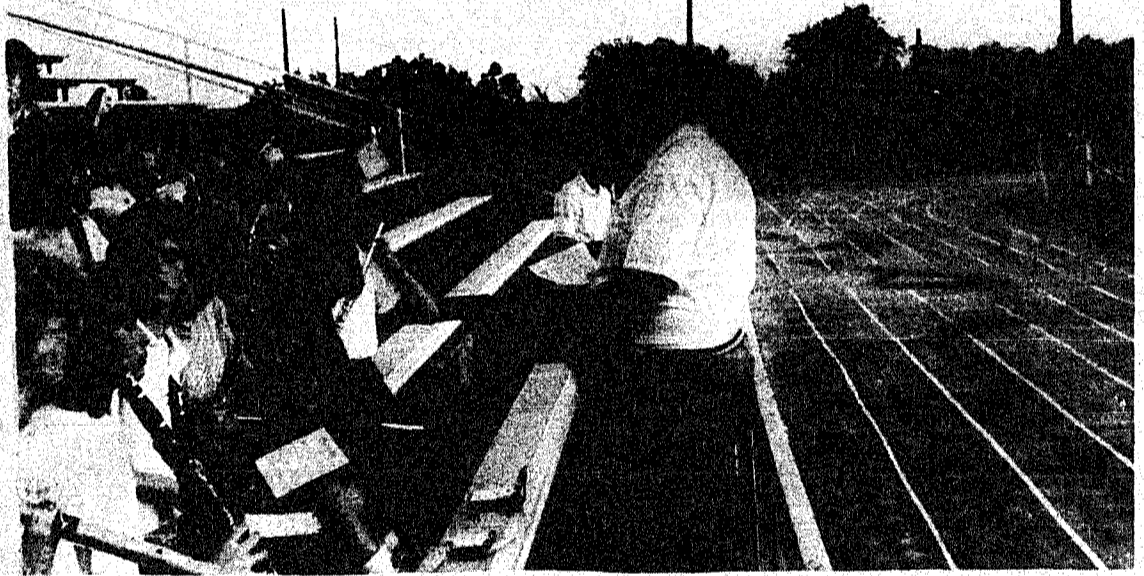

**"Lean For Life Program Helps with Weight Loss**

"Know yourself," means that anyone wanting to lose weight should take inventory of why he or she is overweight, what kinds of foods and eating habits contribute to being overweight, and how much weight to lose for good health. By keeping an accurate diary of everything he or she eats, complete with the time and circumstances of each item, such as a bowl of ice cream while feeling depressed, the individual will be able to identify tendencies to eat too much food. Such tendencies are easier to change when they are clearly recognized.

"Eat smart" is making a habit of eating nutritious foods in sensible quantities. Many people who are overweight pay too little attention to the nutritive values of the things they eat. An inexpensive pocket-sized calorie counter booklet lists the number of calories and other items in the more common types of foods. Nutrition information on food labels gives specific numbers of calories, sugar, salt, and cholesterol per serving. These are two ways weight conscious individuals can learn more about what they eat.

"Get moving," means to begin and maintain a regular exercise routine. Exercise is essential for using extra calories and for burning stored body fat. It is wise for a person choosing an exercise program to consult the family physician first. Whatever the exercise, it should be started slowly and increased to a 20-30 minute session, at least three times a week. Pick an exercise program that will be fun for you.

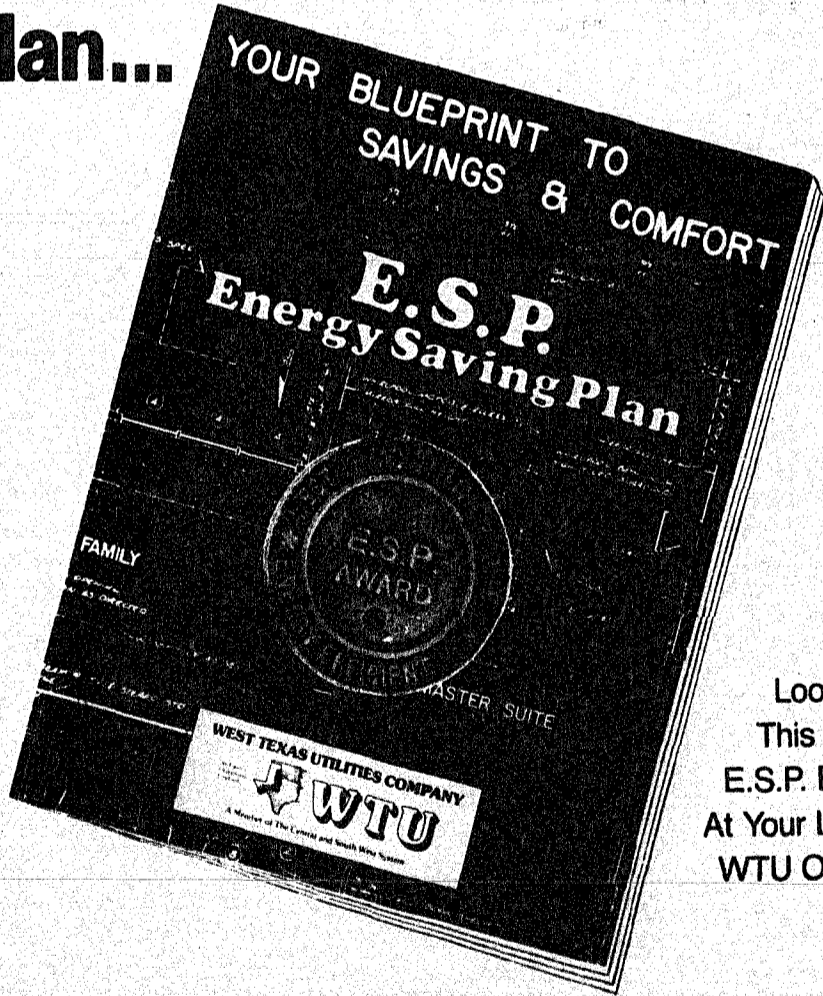
"Get together," the fourth part of the weight-loss program, stresses the cooperation of friends and family members. Persons closest to the individual who wants to lose weight can offer support and encouragement by serving or sharing low-calorie foods compatible with the individual's diet, and by joining in exercise sessions. These four elements of the Lean for Life program are flexible and for a good reason. The TDH Lean for Life advisory Committee, which designed it, wanted to recommend the basic elements all overweight people need to help them become slimmer and healthier. The program acknowledges that each individual's weight problem is unique.

Maintaining the proper body weight for the best of health is hard work. Just ask anyone who is overweight or obese how many times he or she has tried to lose weight by eating and exercising properly in order to feel healthier.

Overweight is defined as excess weight up to 20 percent more than the individual's desirable weight. Obesity is excess weight beyond 20 percent of desirable weight.

Determining what body weight is desirable varies from person to person. There are a number of ways to calculate how much a person should weigh, some more accurate than others.

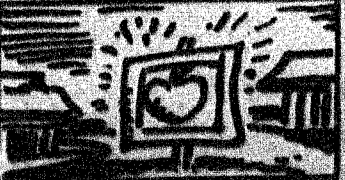

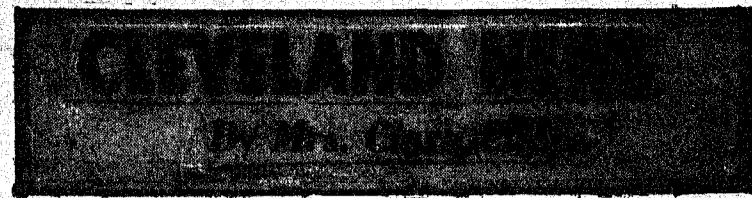
