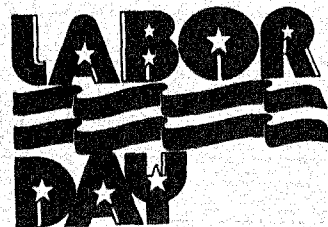

City Council Has Two Called Sessions

Raise Tax Rate

On Tuesday, August 19, 1986 the Santa Anna City Council met in a called session at 7:00 p.m. at the Coleman County Telephone Coop Meeting room. The first item on the agenda was Mr. Billy Don Faries of the Coleman Police Department, who was unable to attend.

Mr. Scott Patterson was then introduced to discuss the General Official Liability Insurance. Patterson informed the council that he had received a bid from Penco for \$500,000 coverage from the Hartford Co. The only exclusion from this policy is landfill and athletic games. The bid is for \$4795.95 for coverage with a \$2000.00 deductible in the Public ENO and possibly \$500 to \$2,000. deductible on General Liability. Councilman Stanley Hartman made a motion for the city to accept this bid from Penco, the Hartford Co. Councilman Joe Taylor seconded and the vote unanimously

carried. Next Mayor Guerrero brought into discussion the tax rate for the City. Councilman Stanley Hartman made a motion we increase the City Tax Rate 3 percent. Councilman J. T. Avants seconded, motion carried with one abstaining, Jim Spillman.

Council then went into executive session. When the council returned to open session it was discussed that the council would not hire an Animal Control Officer until the next regular city council meeting on September 4, so that they may run an advertisement in the paper to take applications.

On August 20, 1986 the City Council met in another called session to discuss personnel. Council met in executive session and when they returned it was stated that all city employees will be under Mr. Rusty Wells command.

Estimated 43 Persons To Die In Traffic

AUSTIN—Officials of the Texas Department of Public Safety estimate that 43 persons could be killed in traffic accidents across the state during the Labor Day period.

The 78-hour period begins at 6 p.m. Friday, August 29 and ends at midnight Monday, September 1.

"During this period, the Department will have additional troopers on duty," Adams said. "We know that some drivers will be determined to violate the traffic laws. DPS officers will be taking enforcement action against as many violators as they can to increase the safety factor for law abiding motorists."

Adams said the final fatality count for the 1985 Labor Day period was 52.

"Twenty-one of the 52 deaths resulted from traffic accidents in which speed or DWI was a contributing factor," Adams pointed out. "That's why our officers will be

Dove Season Opens Monday

The 1986 Dove Season opens Monday, September 1. Many persons believe that the season will open Friday, being that Friday begins the Labor Day Weekend, but that is not the case this time. Dove Season always opens on September 1, regardless of when the holiday falls.

Everyone must have a license; age 17 thru 65 must have a regular hunting license and persons under 17 and over 65 are required to have an exempt license. Licenses are available at many businesses.

The limit per person is 12 per day with no more than 24 in possession per person. Hunting is limited to 30 minutes before sunrise and ends at sunset.

Board Approves Budget

On August 18, 1986, the Santa Anna ISD Board of Trustees approved an operating budget of \$1,324,990 for the 1986-87 school year. The budget for the past school year was \$1,322,127. The approved budget is an increase of only \$2,863 or .2 of one percent. Of local interest, the budget was calculated on a decrease of \$14,040 from local taxes. In 1985-86, local taxes collected totaled approximately \$312,000. Estimates of local taxes for 1986-87 total \$297,960. On advice from the Texas Education Agency and local administration, the board chose not to set the local tax rate. This rate will be set following the conclusion of the Special Session of the Texas Legislature.

Mountaineers & Longhorns In Friday Scrimmage

Last Friday evening the Early Longhorns arrived in Santa Anna to face the Black Magic Mountaineers in what has become an annual scrimmage for both teams. After all was said and done, the Longhorns outscored the Mountaineers, four touchdowns to none.

Early, playing as a Class AAA team for the first time ever this year, knew they were in for a challenge when they faced Class A Santa Anna, a team ranked in the top 10 in their classification in several pre-season polls. In last year's scrimmage the Mountaineers outscored the Longhorns 3-2.

Still, revenge or trying to prove something was not on the minds of either team. Players and coaches on both sides knew that Friday's "competition" was nothing more than a way to prepare for the regular season.

Head Coach at Early, Clyde Evatt,

said after the encounter, "I was impressed with Santa Anna and their coaching staff. They had some good things happen against us and I think they will do well in their district.

As far as statistics were concerned, Early's coaching staff had to be pleased. The Longhorns offense accumulated 337 yards, 297 of which were on the ground. Defensively, Early held the Mountaineers to 111 yards rushing and 53 yards passing.

The Mountaineers running game could never quite get off the ground, primarily due to four fumbles. In addition, Santa Anna passers gave up five interceptions.

The Mountaineers and head coach Galen Privitt will continue two-day workouts this week before traveling to Goldthwaite Friday for a scrimmage against last year's Class A state champions, now competing in Class AA.

Reduced Lunches Available

The Santa Anna School serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for 75 cents or 65 cents depending on grade and breakfast for 40 cents.

Children from families whose income falls within the level shown scale below are eligible for either FREE or REDUCED-priced meals priced at 40 cents for lunch and 30 cents for breakfast.

To apply for free or reduced-price meals, please fill out an application as soon as possible, sign it, and return it to the school. Please answer all questions on the form. An application which does not contain the following information cannot be processed by the school: (1) The total household income and the type of income it is (Such as wages, child support, etc.) OR your food stamp case number if your household is on food stamps, (2) names of all household members, (3) social security numbers of all household members 21 years old or older of the word "NONE" for any household member who does not have a social security number, and (4) the signature of an adult household member.

VERIFICATION: the information on the application may be checked by the school or other officials at any time during the school year.

REPORTING CHANGES: If your child is approved for meal benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by more than \$50 per month (\$600 per year) or when your household size decreases.

REAPPLICATION: You may apply for benefits at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a decrease in household income, become

unemployed, or have an increase in family size, fill out an application at that time.

FOSTER CHILDREN: If you have foster children living with you, they may be eligible for these benefits. If you wish to apply for these benefits for them, please contact the school and they will help you complete the application.

NONDISCRIMINATION: Children who receive free or reduced-price meal benefits are treated the same as children who pay for meals. In the operations of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age, or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

FAIR HEARING: If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the result of verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have the right to a fair hearing. CONFIDENTIALITY: The information you provide will be treated confidentially and will be used only for eligibility determinations and verification of data.

HELP WITH APPLICATION: If you have any questions or need help in filling out an application form, please contact Betty Tucker at the school cafeteria. You will be notified when the application is approved or denied.

(These guidelines should be used by the school to determine eligibility for free or reduced price meals and should be provided to the parents for public release.)

Misdemeanor To Ride Upon Sidewalks

It has been brought to the Police Department's attention that youngster's are riding bicycles upon the sidewalks in the downtown area. Officer Craig Terry has learned of several incidents of near misses and frightening of citizens because of this and he would like to let the citizens know that it is a violation of the law to ride upon the sidewalks. To do so is a Class C misdemeanor with a fine of \$1.00 up to \$200.00, depending upon the seriousness of the offense. If the child injures someone, the parent is held responsible for damages and this needs to be curtailed as soon as possible by these youngsters.

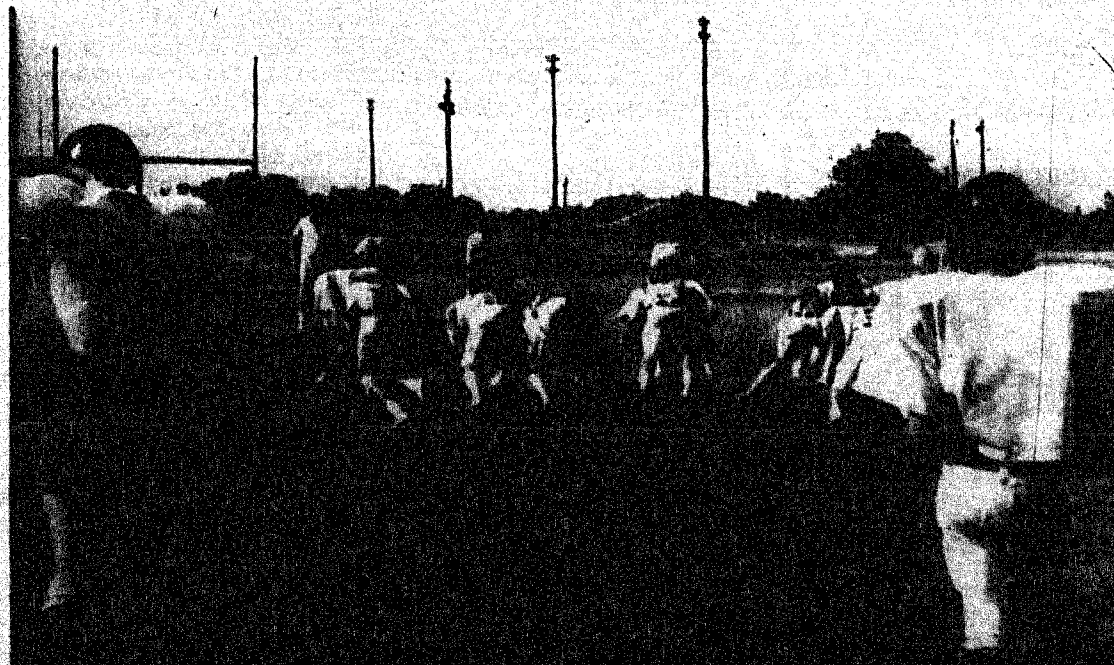
The police department would like to urge all parents to advise and instruct their youngsters in the proper bicycle safety and attempt to enlighten them about the various laws in the Texas Motor Vehicle Code pertaining to rider of bicycles.

The second item of discussion is that there is beginning to be an increasing number of abandoned and deserted vehicles upon the city streets and a campaign is under way to correct this problem. After due notice has been given to vehicle owners, these vehicles will be towed away at the owner's expense and impounded. After certain legal proceedings, these vehicles will be sold at public auction or destroyed. The police department wishes to ask that all citizens having such vehicles, please cooperate and join with the

City and help to make a much nicer looking community with the removal of these vehicles.

On Friday morning August 22, at 9:37 a.m., Sgt. Ken Brixey, Chief Craig Terry and reserve officer James Morris and Paul Martin, Jr. executed a warrant of arrest on Richard Diaz of Santa Anna for theft. Subject was taken to Coleman County Sheriff's Office and arraigned, booked, and placed under \$1,000.00 bond by County Judge Skelton. Also on Friday morning, City Judge Rod Musick issued a warrant of arrest for Henry Salazar for Failure to Appear on several traffic tickets in the amount of \$350.00. This subject had been arrested earlier that morning by Coleman County deputies and also the Coleman Police Department had outstanding warrants on him. City Judge Musick issued his warrant and the additional charges were lodged against the subject at that time by the Judge's office here.

Once again the police department wishes to urge all citizens of Santa Anna to contact us about the neighborhood watch program so that they can get the necessary personnel here to present the program to the public. Please go by the City Hall or the police department and either sign up for the program or contact us about it. We would truly like to establish such a program here and it takes the citizen's to do so, so please help our community be a better and safer one to live in.

Funeral services were held at 10 a.m. on Wednesday, July 30, 1986 at

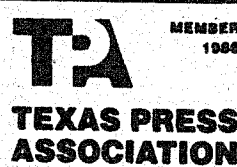

Girls in the program wore identical dresses of red, white, and blue. The boys wore blue trousers with white shirts and red bow ties.

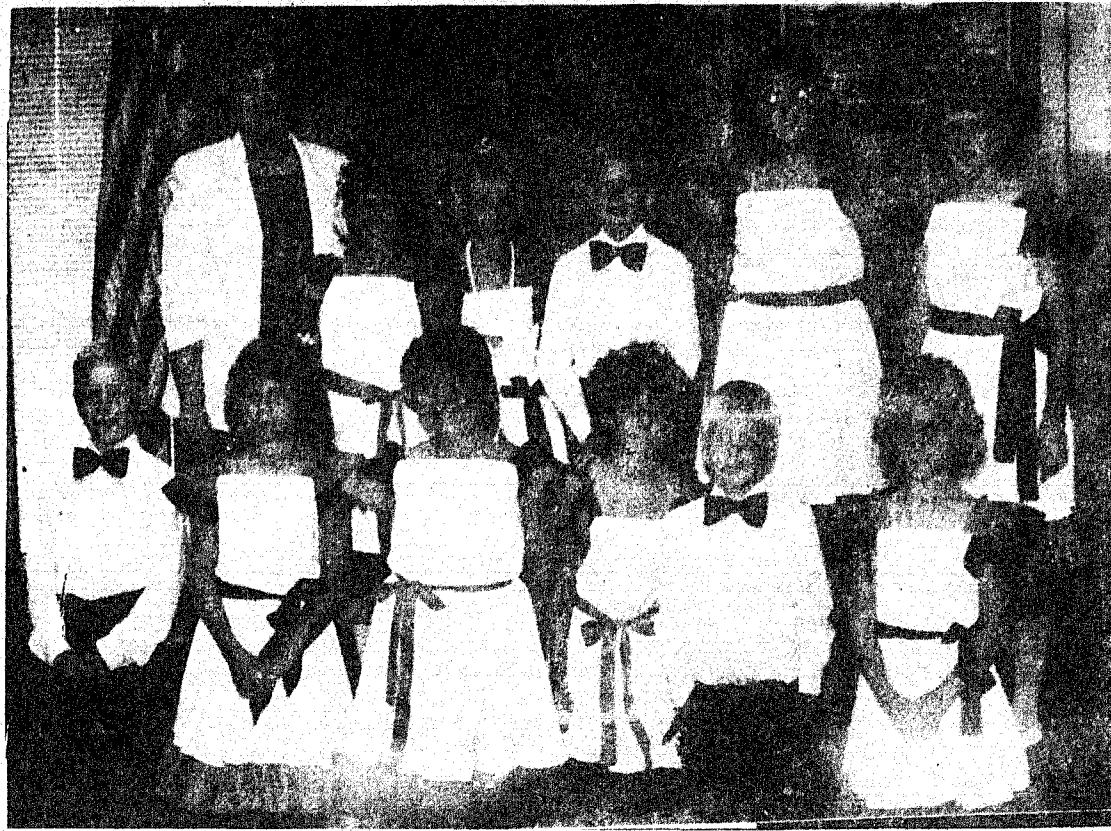

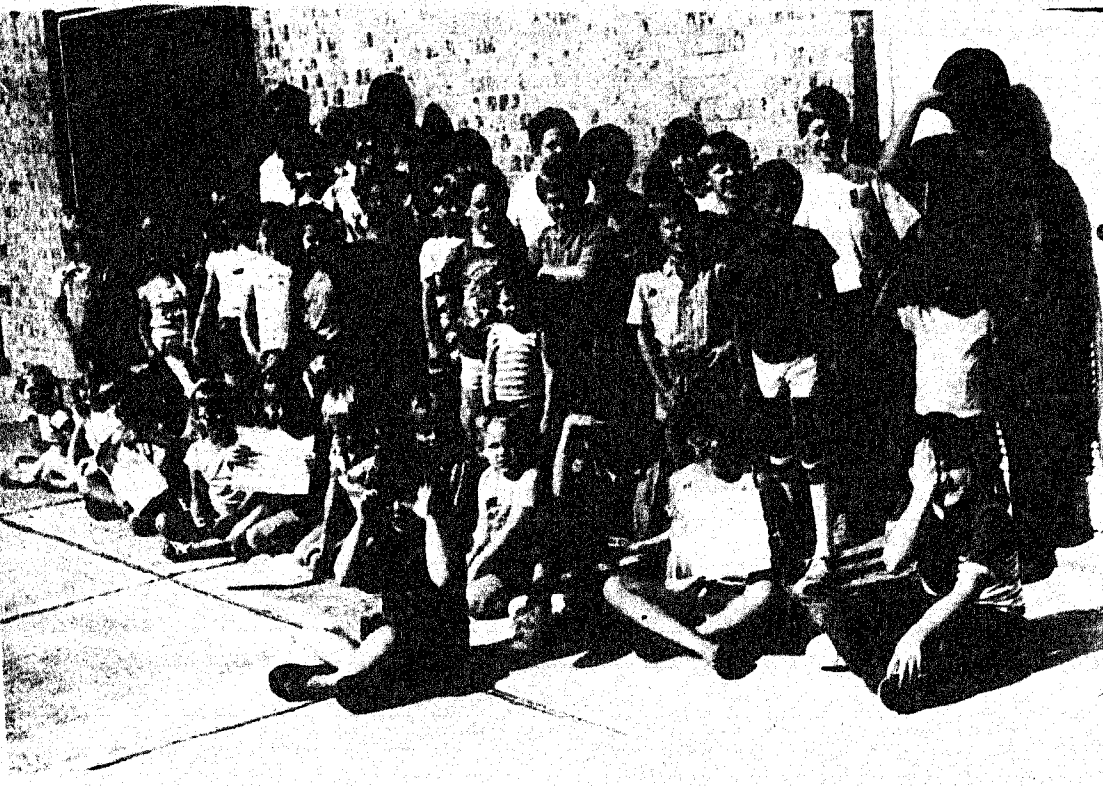

SOCCER

The big news is that soccer players in the Under 6 division and in the Under 8 division will be playing in a learning situation for experience only this year. It's called non-competitive and all participants will receive the same award at the end of the season.

The Coleman County Soccer Association Board voted to abide by the state soccer rule making the Under 6 group non-competitive. The state rules allow local associations to make the decision regarding the Under 8 group. The Coleman board opted for the learning experience rather than the competitive one for them.

There are also some state rules concerning the number of players on the field.

Using these rules the board then set minimum and maximum number of players on each team. In the Under 6 division, there will be a maximum of 10 team members, a minimum of 8, and 5 players on the field during games. In the Under 8 division, there will be a maximum of 12 members, a minimum of 10, and 7 players on the field. In the other age groups the maximum on a team is 18, the minimum is 14, and 11 players on the field.

John Clark, president of Cen-Tex Soccer Association (of which Coleman County is a member), spoke to the board at their last meeting about the referee clinic on August 21, the need for clear rules concerning discipline, the upcoming "local" tournaments, and state rules.

The first gasoline pump was manufactured in a barn by Sylvanus F. Bowser of Fort Wayne, Indiana. That was in 1885. On September 5th of that year the first pump and tank were delivered. The tank had marble valves, wooden plungers, and a capacity of one barrel.



A flat or partially flat truck tire should not be re-inflated unless it is properly inspected first.
