#### <u>City Council Has Two Called Sessions</u> Raise Tax Rate

On Tuesday, August 19, 1986 the Santa Anna City Council met in a called session at 7:00 p.m. at the Coleman County Telephone Coop Meeting room. The first item on the agenda was Mr. Billy Don Faries of the Coleman Police Department, who was unable to attend.

Mr. Scott Patterson was then introduced to discuss the General Official Liablity Insurance. Patterson informed the council that he had recieved a bid from Penco for \$500,000 coverage from the Hartford Co. The only exclusion from this policy is landfill and athletic games. The bid is for \$4795.95 for coverage with a \$2000.00 deductable n the Public ENO and possibly \$500 to \$2,000. deductable on General Liability. Councilman Stanley Hartmen made a motion for the city to accept this bid from Penco, the Hartford Co. Councilman Joe Taylor seconded and the vote unanimously

carried.

Next Mayor Guerrero brought into discussion the tax rate for the City. Councilman Stanley Hartman made a motion we increase the City Tax Rate 3 percent. Councilman J. T. Avants seconded, motion carried with one obstaining, Jim Spillman.

Council then went into executive session. When the council returned to open session it was discussed that the council would not hire an Animal Control Officer until the next regular city council meeting on September 4, so that they may run an advertisement in the paper to take 'applications.

On August 20, 1986 the City Council met in another called session to discuss personnel. Council met in executive session and when they returned it was stated that all city employees will be under Mr. Rusty Wells command.

#### Misdemeanor To Ride Upon Sidewalks

#### **Police Report**

It has been brought to the Police Department's attention that youngster's are riding bicycles upon the sidewalks in the downtown area. Officer Craig Terry has learned of several indicents of near misses and frightening of citizens because of this and he would like to let the citizens know that it is a violation of the law to ride upon the sidewalks. To do so is a Class C misdemeanor with a fine of \$1.00 up to \$200.00, depending upon the seriousness of the offense. If the child injures someone, the parent is held responsible for damages and this needs to be curtailed as soon as possible by these youngsters. The police department would like to urge all parents to advise and insturct their youngsters in the proper bicycle safety and attempt to enlighten them about the various laws in the Texas Motor Vehicle Code pertaining to rider of bicycles. The second item of discussion is that there is beginning to be an increasing number of abandoned and deserted vehicles upon the city streets and a campaign is under way to correct this problem. After due notice has been given to vehicle owners, these vehicles will to towed away at the owner's expense and impounde. After certain legal proceedings, these vehicles will be sold at public auction or destroyed. 

#### **Mountaineers & Longhorns**

#### **In Friday Scrimmage**

Last Friday evening the Early Longhorns arrived in Santa Anna to face the Black Magic Mountaineers in what has become an annual scrimmage for both teams. After all was said and done, the Longhorns outscored the Mountaineers, four touchdowns to none.

Early, playing as a Class AAA team for the first time ever this year, knew they were in for a challenge when they faced Class A Santa Anna, a team ranked in the top 10 in their classification in several pre-season polls. In last year's scrimmage the Mountaineers outscored the Longhorns 3-2.

Still, revenge or trying to prove something was not on the minds of either team. Players and coaches on both sides knew that Friday's "competition" was nothing more than a way to prepare for the regular season.

Head Coach at Early, Clyde Evatt,

said after the encounter, "I was impressed with Santa Anna and their coaching staff. They had some good things happen against us and I think they will do well in their district.

As far as statistics were concerned, Early's coaching staff had to be pleased. The Longhorns offense accumulated 337 yards, 297 of which were on the ground. Defensively, Early held the Mountaineers to 111 yards rushing and 53 yards passing.

The Mountaineers running game could never quite get off the ground, primarily due to four fumbles. In addition, Santa Anna passers gave up five interceptions.

The Mountaineers and head coach Galen Privitt will continue two-aday workouts this week before traveling to Goldthwaite Friday for a scrimmage against last year's Class A state champions, now competing in Class AA.

#### **Reduced Lunches Available**

The Santa Anna School serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for 75 cents or 65 cents depending on grade and breakfast for 40 cents.

Children from families whose income falls within the level shown scale below are eligible for either FREE or REDUCED-priced meals priced at 40 cents for lunch and 30 cents for breakfast.

To apply for free or reduced-price meals, please fill out an application as soon as possible, sign it, and return it to the school. Please answer all questions on the form. An application which does not contain the following information cannot be processed by the school: (1) The total household income and the type of income it is (Such as wages, child support, etc.) OR your food stamp case number if your household is on food stamps, (2) names of all household members, (3) social security numbers of all household members 21 years old or older of the word "NONE" for any household member who does not have a social security number, and (4) the signature of an adult household member

unemployed, or have an increase in family size, fill out an application at that time.

FOSTER CHILDREN: If you have foster children living with you, they may be eligible for these benefits. If you wish to apply for these benefits for them, please contact the school and they will help you complete the application.

NONDISCRIMINATION: Children who receive free or reduced-price meal benefits are treated the same as chidren who pay

#### Estimated 43 Persons

#### To Die In Traffic

AUSTIN-Officials of the Texas Department of Public Safety estimate that 43 persons could be killed in traffic accidents across the state during the Labor Day period.

The 78-hour period begins at 6 p.m. Friday, August 29 and ends at midnight Monday, September 1.

"During this period, the Department will have additional troopers on duty," Adams said. "We know that some drivers will be determined to violate the traffic laws. DPS officers will be taking enforcement action against as many violators as they can to increase the safety factor for law abiding motorists."

Adams said the DPS deeply appreciates the positive response shown by Texas motorists to the safety belt law.

#### Dove Season Opens Monday

The 1986 Dove Season opens Monday, September 1. Many persons believe that the season will open Friday, being that Friday begins the Labor Day Weekend, but that is not the case this time. Dove Season always opens on September 1, regardless of when the holiday falls.

Everyone must have a license; age 17 thru 65 must have a regular hunting license and persons undcr 17 and over 65 are required to have an exempt license. Licenses are available at many businesses.

The limit per person is 12 per day with no more than 24 in possession per person. Hunting is limited to 30 minutes before sunrise and ends at sunset.

#### Board Approves Budget

On August 18, 1986, the Santa Anna ISD Board of Trustees approved an operating budget of \$1,324,990 for the 1986-87 school year. The budget for the past school years was \$1,322,127. The approved budget is an increase of only \$2,863 or .2 of one percent. Of local interest, the budget was calculated on a decrease of \$14,040 from local taxes. In 1985-36, local taxes collected totaled approximately \$312,000, Estimates of local taxes for 1988-87 total \$297,980. On advise from the Texas Education Agency and local administration, the board chose not to set the local tax rate. This rate will be set following the conclusion of the Special Session of the Texas Legislature.

VERIFICATION: the information on the application may be checked by the school or other officials at any time during the school year.

REPORTING CHANGES: If your child is approved for meal benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by more than \$50 per month (\$600 per year) or when your household size decreases.

REAPPLICATION: You may apply for benefits at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a decrease in household income, become for meals. In the operations of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age, or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

FAIR HEARING: If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the result of verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have the right to a fair hearing. 
CONFIDENTIALITY: The information you provide will be treated confidentially and will be used only for eligibility determinations and verification of data.

HELP WITH APPLICATION: If you have any questions or need help in filling out an application form, please contact Betty Tucker at the school cafeteria. You will be notified when the application is approved of denied.

Funeral services were held at 10 a.m. on Wednesday, July 30, 1986 at


