Police Have Busy Week

The Police Department reports a busy week last week.

On Monday, August 25th, a burglary was reported at Robinett's Garage, with some change taken and approximately \$15 damage to one window which was broken to gain entry.

On Tuesday, August 26th, a criminal mischief incident was reported, which occurred at a residence on North 5th Street. There was several thousand dollars of damage inflicted to the property during this episode. A suspect is being sought in Tennessee in that matter.

Also on the 26th, a motorist's vehicle was damaged by gravel falling from the bed of a pickup truck. The

vehicle sustained two cracks in the windshield. A suspect in Bangs, Texas is being sought for questioning in that case.

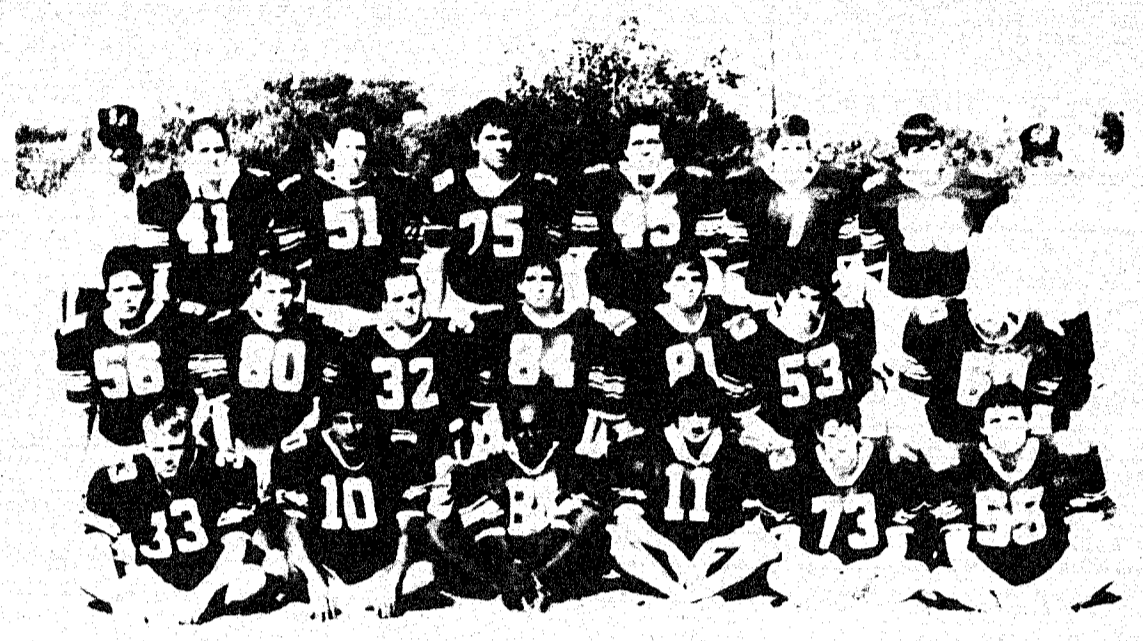

Then on Sunday, August 31st, vandalism to the sheds at the cemetery was reported and also two tombstones being overturned. This case is under investigation by the department.

On Sunday afternoon of the 31st, an incident involving two minor boys shooting pellet rifles in the vicinity

of the 300 block of South 3rd Street was reported. The parents of these boys are hereby warned, that if these incidents continue, the rifles will be confiscated, the parents will be filed on and charges brought against them. There is a city ordinance forbidding such violations, and they will be enforced if this becomes necessary.

Ken Brixey and Chief of Police Craig Terry have worked hard this past week preparing and outfitting the vehicle, are they are very proud of it. It will provide the City with newer equipment and enable the department to provide better service to the City in the future. Checks sent to school and city

AUSTIN—State Comptroller Bob Bullock recently sent checks totaling \$13 million in this year's second allocation of the state's franchise tax on banks to 2011 local taxing jurisdictions.

Taxing jurisdictions in Santa Anna received a total of \$172.62. The Santa Anna ISD received \$7.68 and the City of Santa Anna got \$74.94.

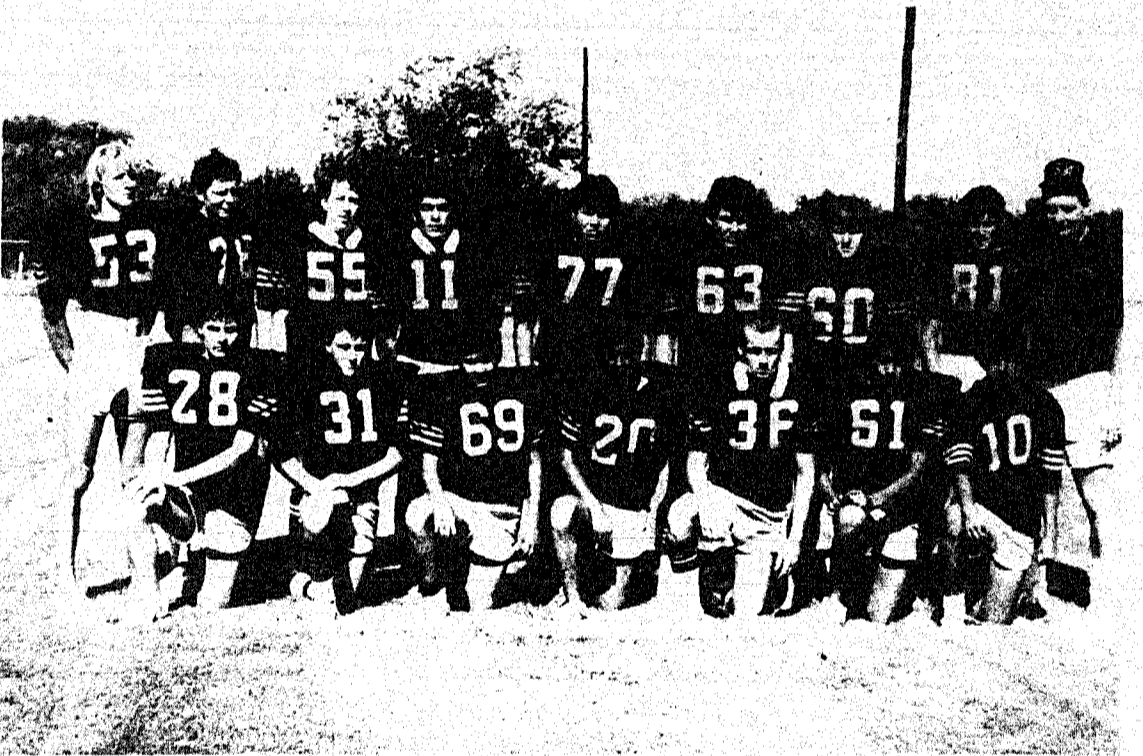
Taxing jurisdictions in Harris County received \$5.2 million. The Houston Independent School District received \$2.1 million and the city of Houston got \$1.5 million. Payments to taxing units in Dallas county totaled \$2.6 million. Dallas ISD's payment was \$1 million and the city of Dallas received \$806,336.

Tarrant County checks totaled

\$415,409 and total payments in Bexar County were \$851,367. Travis County taxing districts received a total of \$270,406 and El Paso County's checks were for \$353,833.

The Legislature in 1984 brought banks under the franchise tax for the first time and allocated receipts from the tax to cities, counties, school districts and other local taxing units where banks are located.

Banks are taxed at the same rate as other Texas corporations. Previously, bank stocks were subject to local property taxes. The Legislature exempted the stocks from property taxes, substituting the new bank franchise tax. Collections are prorated among local taxing units based on their tax rates.

Drivers Cautioned As Schools Open

Last year in Texas there were 1,228 accidents involving school buses, with seven fatalities and 323 non-fatal injuries. Schools are about to open again, and drivers are once more being cautioned to be unusually attentive in and around school zones and school buses.

An increasing problem in recent years has been drivers who either ignored or were unaware of the law restricting vehicles from passing a school bus while the bus is loading or unloading children. Children often cross the street in front of the bus, and a car that's trying to pass may not see them coming.

The problem became so bad two years ago that the Texas Legislature considered requiring buses to have mechanical arms at the driver's window that would extend into the traffic lane while the bus is stopped. At present, buses in Texas have flashing lights at the front and back of the vehicle when stopped, as well as signs noting that vehicles are required to stop for the buses.

To emphasize the importance of stopping for these buses, the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation has produced public service announcements with Texas singer-songwriter Jerry Jeff Walker as its spokesman.

Walker, the 44-year-old author of the classic, "Mr. Tambourine,"

believes in the message he offers in the television commercial.

"It's important to note that stopping for those flashing red lights is not just a courtesy, it's the law," Walker said. "That means stopping whether you're behind the bus or approaching it from the other lane."

The law states: "The driver of a vehicle upon a highway inside or outside a business or residence district upon meeting or overtaking from either direction any school bus which has stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging any school children shall stop the vehicle before

reaching such school bus when there is in operation on said school bus a visual signal such as specified in Section 124 of the Act, and said driver shall not proceed until such school bus resumes motion or is signaled by the school bus driver to proceed or the visual signals are no longer actuated. A violation of this subsection is punishable by a fine of not less than \$50 nor more than \$200."

In addition to Walker himself, his daughter Jessie, son Django (named for 30's-era jazz guitarist Django Reinhardt) and 10 other children from the Austin area took part in the PSA production. The Austin ISD supplied a brand new bus for the spots.

September 30 Last Day To Apply For Crop Insurance

GEORGETOWN—September 30 is the last day to apply for crop insurance for barley, oats and wheat in Coleman County, Texas according to Ardell Kalmbach, a representative of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC).

Recently a new crop insurance plan, called Actual Production History (APH), became available to farmers for specific crops. It is designed to promote actuarial integrity and fairness on a producer-by-producer basis. "Using your own farm records or other available sources of information, an APH yield is determined for each crop produced. The higher your individual APH yield, the more insurance protection you are offered," explained Kalmbach, "and the lower your premium rate."

Since no one crop insurance policy is best for every situation, individual and financial needs must be considered before buying insurance.

"To find out more about the program, contact an authorized insurance agent," urged Kalmbach, "as the deadline to apply for crop insurance is September 30."

Time To Get Pneumonia & Flu Protection

The American Lung Association of Texas is reminding people 65 years of age and older that it is time to get their 1986 immunization against pneumonia and flu.

Safe vaccines exist, but are under utilized, particularly against pneumonia.

Older persons and people with chronic diseases are less likely to fight off pneumonia and its complications. Studies show that the death rate due to bacterial pneumonia for people 64-74 years of age is two-and-a-half times higher than the population as a whole. For those 75-84 years old, the rate is ten times greater.

The centers for disease control recommend vaccination against pneumonia for adults 65 years and older and for adults with chronic illnesses like lung and heart diseases, Hodgkins disease, liver and kidney disease, alcoholism, and other ailments that increase the risk of

pneumonia.

Medicare pays for such immunizations. In the long run, immunization will substantially reduce the \$63 million now paid to Medicare to treat pneumonia in the elderly.

The American Lung Association is the oldest voluntary health agency in the United States. Originally founded in 1904 to combat tuberculosis, today, the Association, its 139 affiliated Associations throughout the country and its medical section, the American Thoracic Society, is dedicated to the control and prevention of all lung disease and their related causes including smoking, air pollution, and occupational lung hazards. Abilene-Taylor County Health Department. The Health Department charges a fee of \$5 to test a sample. These tests can tell you if your water is safe for human consumption. There are some important considerations when taking and sending these samples. They are: First, follow correct procedure in collecting the sample. Next package the sample carefully to avoid damage. Next, be sure to collect and send sample on the same day. Also, try to take the sample in the afternoon that you mail it. The reason for sending the sample late in the day is because the sample must be tested within 30 hours after it is collected. Also, send the sample on Monday, Tuesday, or Wednesday—send it on these days because any sample that is not received before Friday, will not be tested.

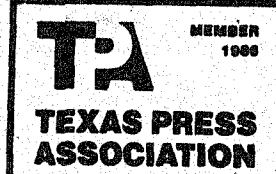

Thoughts From Our Pastors

In the fifteenth chapter of John, verses 1-8 we have the lesson of the vine. I have always been interested in things that grow and the way it is done. The Vine, which Jesus likened himself to, received help from the Father as the husbandman. A vine, as we know, must have its roots down in soil to grow.

Then Jesus likened us to the branches. The branch is very dependent on the Vine to grow. It can only live as long as it is attached to the Vine. "Man cannot live by bread alone but by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God." Matthew 4:4. Jesus is saying here that man is very dependent on Him, probably even more than we realize.

The purging of the branch is what we would call pruning to remove excess growth in order to produce more fruit and fruit is what we want. The branch needs to be more than a shade. The more strength the branch gets from the vine, the more fruit it can produce.

In the fourth verse Jesus says, "Abide in me and I in you as a branch cannot bear fruit of itself." I heard an illustration one time that

was about Jesus abiding in us and us abiding in Him. It went like this: A lady was knitting socks in earlier years and when she had finished them it was time to dye them so she got a pot of water and brought it to a boil. Then she put in the socks and stirred, dropped in the dye and poked them up and down in the dye. After a period of time the socks were in the dye and the dye was in the socks. When the socks were removed, the dye was still in them.

Jesus says in the 7th verse, "If ye abide in me" and I want to call attention to the little word "if". It's a very small word with so much importance to it, indicating that we have a responsibility to do our part. Then Jesus said, "my words abide in you." There is so much power in the words of Jesus. Power to change you. Power to cleanse you. Power to make us an overcomer. The Word must be in us. Then it gives us permission to ask in prayer for our needs and wants. With a promise that it will be done. That is a real blessing for us so if you do not remember anything else, remember verse 7. It can be used often with good results.

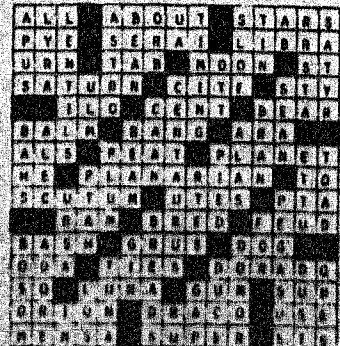

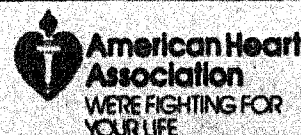

Improving leadership and citizenship are two of the greatest benefits of 4-H club membership. Above all, 4-H is educational. 4-H explores everything from rabbits to rockets, from canning to camping, from square dancing to veterinary science. 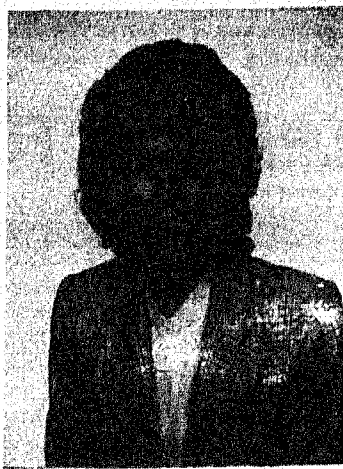

ed youth activities were not as involved in vandalism as those young people who did not have after-school hour activities.

Not all youngsters who participate in youth activities are perfect, but the studies show that teenagers involved in youth activities tend to commit more of the Halloween-type pranks as opposed to more malicious acts.

Young people commit acts of vandalism in order to gain status and prestige, or they see vandalism as a "game" or "contest."

By participating in extra-curricular activities, teenagers have a chance to learn new skills, to gain status and to develop good feelings

about themselves.

In such an environment a youth can grow into a responsible person who does not have the need to vandalize property.

Participating in after-school activities takes time for both the students and the parents who may have to drive them to meetings and practices or serve as chaperones.

Some after-school activities may also involve extra costs or interfere with the family schedule, but the inconveniences seem less important when parents recognize the importance of after-school activities in encouraging their teenagers' positive self-development.

Be On Lookout For Pecan Weevil

The time is approaching when home owners and commercial pecan growers should be on the lookout for the pecan weevil. The pecan weevil is an insect that attacks our pecan nuts while they are in the doughing or gel stage. You see the result of their work when you harvest your pecans and find a 1/8 inch hole in the shell. This hole is created by the weevil's larva which feeds on the meat of the pecan then makes a hole and it drops to the ground where it stays until it becomes an adult. The adult weevil is a brownish weevil about 3/8 inch long, while the females snout will be as long as her body. These insects can cause significant damage to the pecan nuts if not controlled. The pecan weevil emerges from the ground in late August or early September. This usually happens after a rain, although in Coleman County the weevil will emerge between August 27 and September

3rd. To control this you will need to spray 5 to 10 days after the weevils emerge. Most commercial pecan orchards will spray 3 times starting August 25, then once every 10 days for 3 sprayings. Home owners will need to spray once around September 4th-12th, and this will control the majority of these pests. The reason for one spraying versus three is because of economics. When spraying for weevils' you can use a product called Sevin 80 S. With this you use 2 to 3 pounds per 100 gallons of water. Another concern when spraying for weevils is the control of aphids. You can control aphids with a product called Zolone-use 1 1-3 pints of this per 100 gallons of water. These products will help you control these insects.

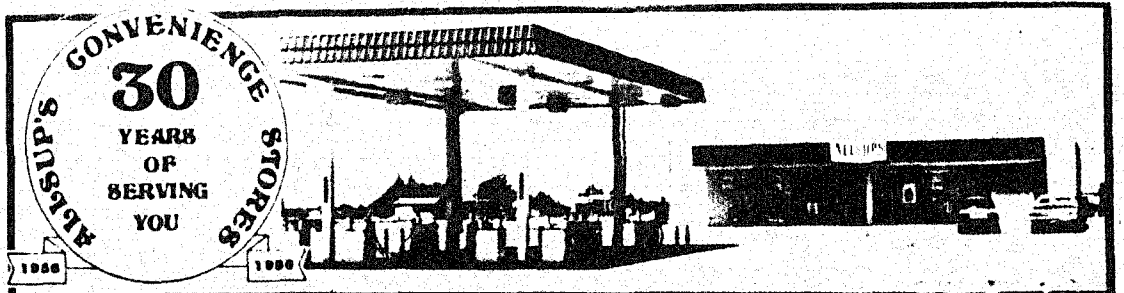

VA News

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Following are representative questions answered daily by VA counselors. Full information is available at any VA office.)

Q-Who is eligible for treatment at the Vet Centers?

A-Veterans who served on active duty during the Vietnam Era may be provided counseling to assist the veteran in readjusting to civilian life. Application for counseling may be made at any time.

Q-How does a veteran qualify for the annual clothing allowance payment from the VA?

A-Any-veteran who is entitled to receive compensation for a service-connected disability for which he or she wears or uses a prosthetic or orthopedic appliance, including a wheelchair, may qualify. The VA must determine that the appliance wears out or tears clothing before the allowance may be paid.

Q-If a person who is eligible for Survivors and Dependents Educational Assistance benefits marries, how is eligibility affected?

A-The marriage of an eligible child will be no barrier. The remarriage of a surviving spouse will terminate entitlement unless the marriage is ended by death or divorce.

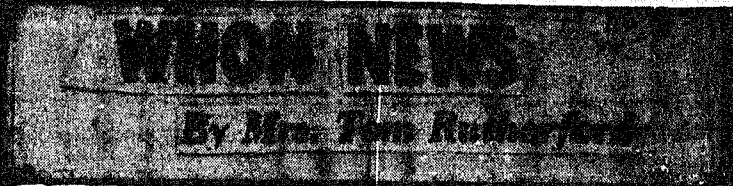

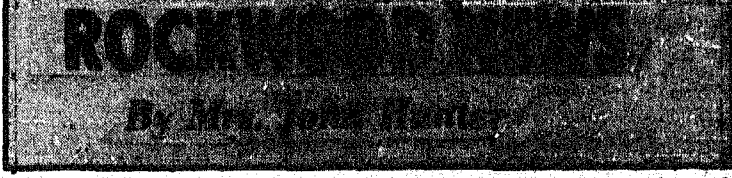

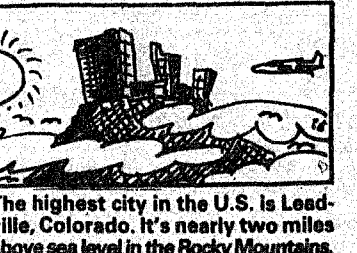
