## For Pecan Weevil

The time is approaching when home owners and commercial pecan growers should be on the lookout for
the pecan is an insect that attacks our weevil is an insect that attacks our pecan
nuts while they are in the doughing or gel stage. You see the result of their work when you harvest your pecans and find a $1 / 1 /$ inch hole in the sheel. This hole is created by th
weevil's larva which feeds on the meat of the pecan then makes a hole and it drops to the ground where it stays until it becomes an adult. The adult weevil is a brownish weevil about \%/ inch long, while the females
snout will be as long as her body. stout will be as long as her body.
These insects can cause significant damage to the pecan nuts if not controlled. The pecan weevil emerges from the ground in late August or eariy September. This usually hapeman Count the weevili will emerge 3rd. To control this you will need to
spray 5 to 10 days after the weevils emerge Most commercial pecean or-
chards will spray 3 times starting chards will spray 3 times starting August 25 , then once every 10 days
for 3 sprayings. Home owners will ior sprayings. Home owners will need to spray once around
September $4 t h-12 t h$, and this will control the majority of these pests The reason for one spraying versus three is because of economics. When spraying for weevils' you can use a
product called Sevin 80 S . With this product called Sevind 80 . With this
you use 2 to 3 pounds per 100 gallons of water. Another concern when spraying for weevils is the control of aphids. You can control aphids with a product called Zolone-use 111
