As many of you know, we have a new elementary-junior high school principal. His name is Mr. Frank Gray. Mr. Gray and his wife, Kay (Kingsbery) live south of town. Rainfall Report

The official rainfall report for Santa Anna for the month of September stands as follows: On September 1, 0.52 inches; September 2, 1.23 inches; September 5, 1.27 inches and September 7, .10 inches, making the total rainfall for September thus far 3.12 inches.

In July the rainfall was .78 inches, with .16 of an inch falling on the 2nd, .25 of an inch on the 3rd and .37 of an inch on the 22nd.

In August the total rainfall count was .77 of an inch. On August 17, .10 of an inch fell, August 26, .06 of an inch, August 27, .08 of an inch, August 28, .48 of an inch and August 31, .05 of an inch of rain fell.

The average rainfall for the year is 17 inches, and Santa Anna has received 18.94 inches of rainfall thus far this year.

City Council Has Meeting

The Santa Anna City Council met for a regular scheduled council meeting with all members present except Mayor Joe Guerrero. Stanley Hartman, mayor pro-tem was in command in the absence of the mayor.

The minutes of last months meeting were read and approved.

Hartman brought up for discussion the alley between Avenue A and B in the Morrison addition. The plats from the Coleman Court house show that their is a 20 foot alley designated. Councilman Joe Taylor made a motion that the council table this discussion until later, when they could discuss the matter with the city attorney. J. T. Avants seconded and unanimously carried.

C. R. Owen was then introduced to the council to inform the council that he had asked the Mayor for permission to use the maintainer to clean the lot next door to his place, and he had received this permission from the Mayor. Hartman stated that the Council had decided previously that no one but City Employees could use City Equipment with the exception of the snake.

Councilman Taylor let the council know that City Hall had air-conditioning problems. He stated that he had found a used one for \$40 and has received permission from the City to use it for two weeks to make

sure it works properly.

Councilman James Spillman wanted to know if anything could be done to the ditch on Bowie Avenue between the school and the Brady Highway. The children walking to and from school this way have to walk in the street because the ditch is in such poor condition.

Councilman Avants wanted to check and see if anything could be done about the limbs and brush around stop and yield signs around town, such as trimming around them, so that people driving could see them. Also the ditch on the west side of Lee Street needs to be cleaned.

Council then went into executive session.

When the Council returned to open session Councilman Hartman suggested pulling some applications to interview at a later date for Animal Control Officer. Also, on the land acquisition it was decided on a price of \$650 an acre for 28.51 acres with Mr. Pete Cope. A sales contract was drawn up and sent to the state along with a requisition for the money. This sale should be complete within 60 days.

Mayor Pro-tem Hartman stated that employee wages will be discussed at the next council meeting.

Accounts payable was discussed and approved for payment in the usual manner.

WTU Customers Receive Refund

West Texas Utilities customers this month are receiving refunds and also paying less for the electricity they use.

The double-barreled relief comes from a continued decline in the Company's boiler fuel costs, which by law are passed on to the customers. The Company is refunding over \$5 million—an average of about \$11 per customer—in retail revenues collected in excess of actual fuel costs over the past several months. At the same time, the amount charged customers for fuel is being reduced.

The fuel cost refund is the third within about a year for WTU, thanks mainly to the decline in the price of natural gas, WTU's main boiler fuel. A further decline in fuel costs is expected when WTU's new coal-burning Oklahoma Power Station goes on line late this year.

"The cheaper coal should partially offset an anticipated increase in base rates necessary to pay the plant's construction costs," Don Welch of Abilene, vice president and director of customer services, said.

Welch said the new fuel cost factor, which was set by the Public Utility Commission at WTU's re-

quest, brings WTU's standard residential summer rate down below average for investor-owned utilities in Texas.

WTU customers now will pay \$72.59 for 1,000 kilowatt-hours, compared to \$80.01 under the old fuel cost factor, and \$40.55 for 500 kilowatt-hours compared to \$44.26. The average reported by the PUC for eight investor-owned utilities in August was \$76.55 for 1,000 KWh and \$40.72 for 500 KWh.

WTU's average rate for an entire year now are even lower. Including both summer and winter rates, the 12-month average would be \$68.84 for 1,000 KWh and \$38.67 for 500 KWh. The summer rates run from May 1 through October and were established by the PUC to encourage energy conservation during hot weather.

Coal deliveries are now being made to the Oklahoma plant, which is nearing completion eight miles southeast of Vernon. WTU's share of the plant's generation will be equal to about one third of the Company's total existing generating capacity, which comes from eight major gas-fired power stations.

School Enrollment Given

Enrollment at the Santa Anna schools during the first week of school is close to that of last year's with a total of 416 students enrolled; 127 students in high school and 289 in elementary and junior high.

The 1985-86 year ended with 404 students enrolled. For the 1986-87 year there are 18 seniors, 26 juniors, 33 sophomores and 50 freshmen

enrolled in the high school.

In the elementary and junior high classes there are 31 students in kindergarten, 36 in first grade, 26 in second grade, 31 in third grade, 41 in fourth grade, 37 in fifth grade, 35 in sixth grade, 23 in seventh grade and

29 in eighth grade. There are two sections of kindergarten, first, second, third, fourth and fifth grades.

Tax Board Meeting

Collier Watson, CPA, presented the audit report for the Coleman County Tax Appraisal District during the Monday, September 8, meeting of the group. Watson gave the Tax District high marks for the bi-annual financial report and offered few suggestions or changes for the accounting system.

The 1987 budget was adopted with a total of \$230,942 set for operating expense for appraisals and collection of taxes for the county, school districts and cities within Coleman County. With the consolidation of

Mozelle ISD and Talpa-Centennial ISD there are now eight taxing entities represented.

The new budget is an increase of approximately \$14,000 over 1986,

which will cover an increase in appraisal of mineral, utility and commercial property provided annually by the Thomas Y. Pickett Company, and payments on the computer syster purchased for the Tax

District this year. Another added expense is liability insurance for the directors and staff members of the District.

Since its organization six years ago, the district has kept within the budget and ended each year with an

excess of funds.

In a report of tax collections, Chief Appraiser Bill Jones noted that col-

lections are about normal for this time of year, with delinquent taxes being paid on property in the county. He also reported on-site appraisals are being done in the rural areas by qualified members of the staff. These appraisals will be completed

during the next two months to cover new structures, additions or changes that will affect property valuations in the county.

Other routine business was conducted by the group during the regular session. Chairman Barbara Kingsbery presided at the meeting that was attended by all members, Jake McCreary, Lang. C. Martin, Dwight Nanny and Billie Wright.

The next meeting of the group will be Monday, October 13, with the public encouraged to attend.

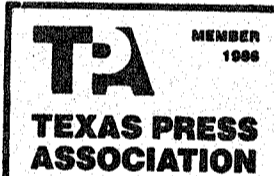

Eppler Receives Meritorious Service Medal



Captain Dwight Eppler has been awarded the Army's Meritorious Service Medal, first oak leaf cluster, for exceptionally meritorious service as Assistant Professor of Military Science in the University of Louisville Cardinal Battalion from 1983 to 1986. The medal was presented to Captain Eppler by Dr. Donald Swain, President of the University of Louisville, in a ceremony on August 22.

Captain Eppler helped establish the newest Army ROTC Battalion in the United States and served as the Training and Operations Officer, Commandant of Cadets, and MS III Instructor for the Battalion. He also

established the Ranger Team, an extracurricular team training in dismounted infantry and unconventional warfare tactics. During the three years he served with the battalion, he planned and executed at the US Army Ranger School at Eglin AFB, Florida. The battalion received accolades on its training program from General William Richardson, Commander of Training and Doctrine Command, during a visit to the unit last year.

Presently, Captain Eppler is completing a Master's Degree in Educational Psychology and Counseling at the University of Louisville and will be a counselor at the University Counseling Clinic this fall in addition to his graduate work and advisory position to the Army ROTC Battalion. Upon graduation in December, he will be reassigned to MacDill AFB in Tampa, Florida, and has been tentatively designated as the Special Security Officer of Central Command Headquarters.

Captain Eppler is a 1971 graduate of Santa Anna High School. He attended the University of Texas at Arlington, receiving both a Bachelor's degree and a Regular Army commission in Military Intelligence in 1975. His wife, Debbie, and two children, Chris and Jennifer, reside with him in Louisville, Kentucky.

Dwight is the son of Mrs. A. D. Eppler of Coleman, Texas, and Debbie's parents, Mr. and Mrs. David McReynolds, reside at Lake Brownwood.

Historically Speaking

As we come into Santa Anna, as Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Lowe, Grady, Connie, Thelma and Nell did in 1926, coming from the Eureka Community, he bought lot 309 on Block 11, from R. L. Todd, and built a home, the only residence on the Block; Lowe home faced West on North 2nd Street.

A Skating Rink was operating on the corner lot to the south; one night there was a big shoot-out; too much Beer and cans all around-Mr. Lowe got up a petition and had the Rink moved to Coleman. The City Hall was built on this lot in 1927.

A Tent Show was running between the City Hall and the Lowe home, so, Mr. Lowe bought the two lots from Mrs. J. W. Parker and built two houses.

The Calaboose was moved from back of the Drug Store to a lot back of the City Hall; it had a fire whistle above it that blew every day at 12 noon. There was a curfew bell, in the late 40's, on top of the Calaboose, ringint at 10 p.m. each night for all children off streets.

As we go across North 2nd to Block 12, we find the famous Melton Hotel; Mrs. Melton built homes for her daughter and family, the W. I. Mitchells, and son, Harvey Melton and family; Mrs. Melton had a nephew, Harry Harvey, living with her, who did all of the cooking. The Melton house faced South on Avenue B, and the Harvey Melton and the Mitchell houses faces East on North 2nd Street.

Block 12, was known to the neighborhood as "Meltonville," only three houses on the block.

As we study the Old Melton Hotel, we learn the family moved to Santa Anna in 1886 and opened the Melton Hotel on Wallis Ave; her husband passed away in 1907 and she operated the Hotel to 1916, when it was moved to Block 12; the Mountain City Apartments are now located on the original site.

Mrs. Melton was born in England February 9, 1849. The London Fog caused health problems; at the age of 16, she went to Australia with friends, later coming to the USA.

where she married Benjamin H. Melton in Waller County, Texas, moving to Santa Anna in 1886, opening the Hotel.

Thelma Lowe Lowry remembers the whole family had the evening meal with Mrs. Melton and remembers Mrs. Mitchell always went out and called the children in for supper; it is remembered Mary Alice Mitchell always kissed her grandmother before going out on

dates, indicating a closely knit family.

The Harvey Melton home was bought by Frank Crum, who lived at 702 Ave. A, in the late 40's for his uncle, Horace Turner.

Our deepest respect goes to these people who built our Town.

The Harvey Melton house is pictured as happily at home at 704 Avenue A, with green lawns, flowers and trees.

PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 4, 1986

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 15 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among the counties in which the property of the railroad is located for purposes of property taxation, and would delete the requirement that the Comptroller participate in making the allocation. To comply with both statutory and constitutional law, the apportionment currently is being made by the State Property Tax Board in conjunction with the Comptroller.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among counties for purposes of property taxation."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 33 proposes a constitutional amendment that would replace the constitutional requirement that the subject of a bill be expressed in its title with a mandate that each house of the legislature adopt rules of procedure that would require the subject of each bill to be expressed in its title in a manner that gives the legislature and the public reasonable notice of that subject. Determining compliance with the rule would be the responsibility of the legislature. Currently, a law is invalidated if a court finds its caption is defective. The amendment would provide that past and future enactments may not be held void on the basis of an insufficient title.

The amendment also would eliminate the suggestion that the state's laws be revised every ten years, and instead would provide for continuing revision of state laws.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment requiring each house to include in its rules of procedure a rule that each bill contain a title expressing the bill's subject, and providing for the continuing revision of state laws."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the Legislature to authorize any county, city, town, or other political subdivision to use public funds or credit to pay insurance premiums on nonassessable life, health, or accident policies. Due to the prohibition in the constitution against the lending of credit and granting of public money, political subdivisions currently are prohibited from becoming shareholders in associations such as mutual insurance companies, in which policyholders are shareholders. A nonassessable mutual insurance policy does not allow a company to raise capital by assessing the policyholder an extra amount on a pre-

mium. This amendment will allow mutual insurance companies and stock companies to bid for life and health group policies of political subdivisions. Public liability will be limited to the payment of premiums specified in the contract.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing political subdivisions the opportunity to engage in and transact business with authorized mutual insurance companies in the same manner as with other insurance companies."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would repeal the prohibition against branch banking by state banks and would allow state banks and national banks domiciled in this state to establish and operate banking facilities at locations within the county or city where they are domiciled. The amendment would also authorize the Legislature to permit a state bank or a national bank domiciled in this state to engage in business at more than one place if it acquires a failed state bank or national bank domiciled in this state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide that a bank may offer full service banking at more than one location within the city or county where its principal facility is located, subject to limitations and restrictions provided by law."

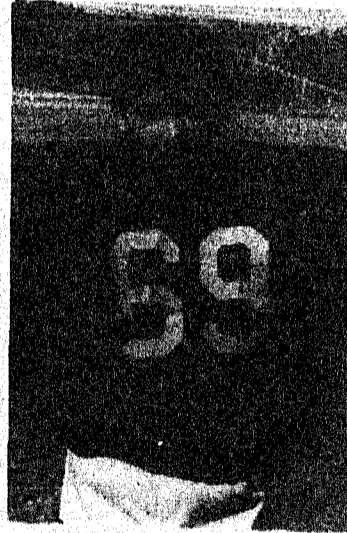

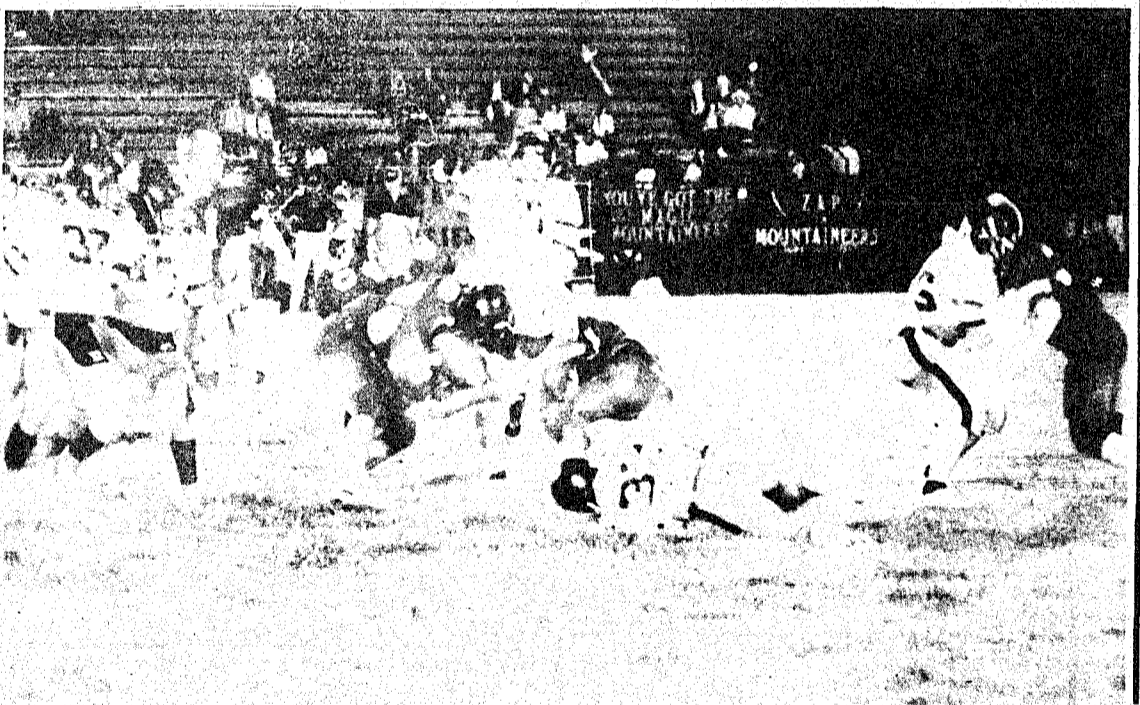

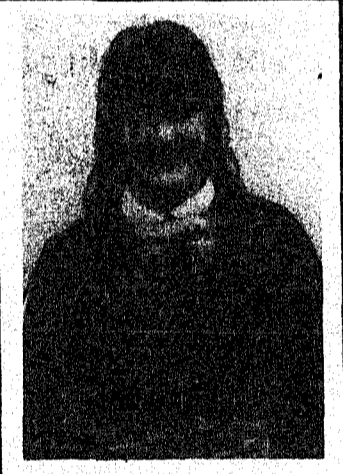

A large group of fans braved the rain to support the Mountaineers at

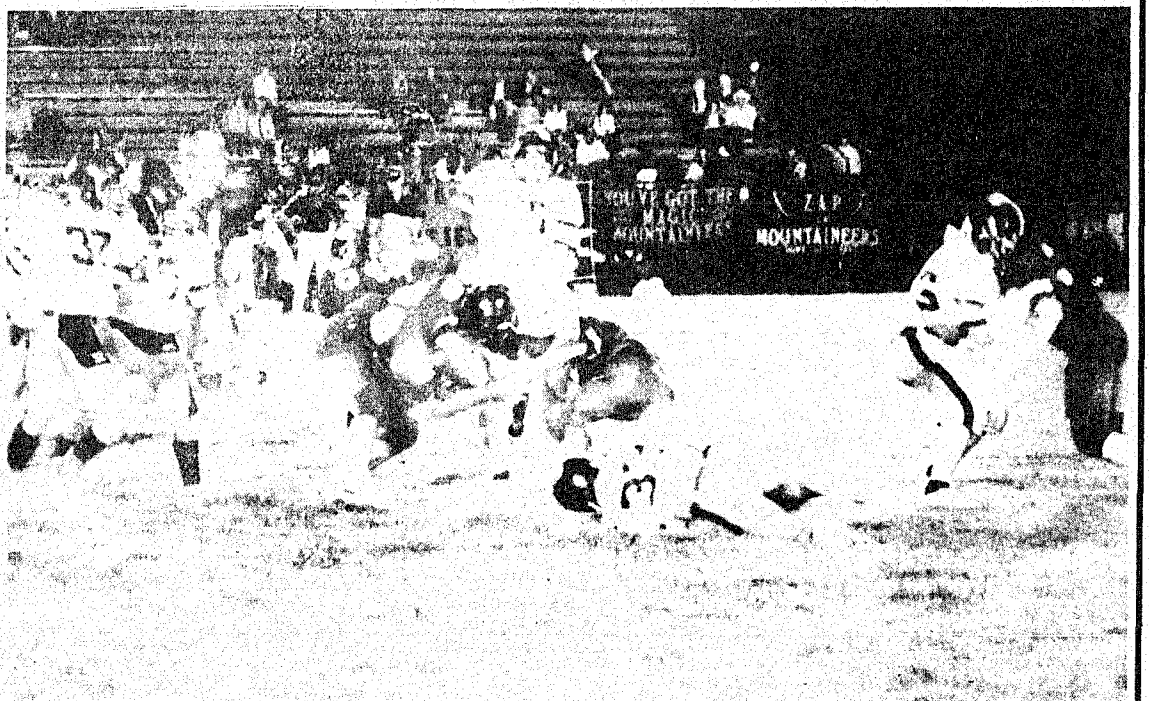
Bangs last week and everyone is urged to show up at the local stadium and support the team in their opening home game.

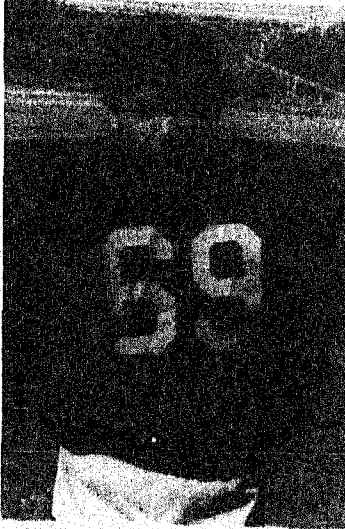

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
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ADDITIONAL SAFETY TIPS:
