

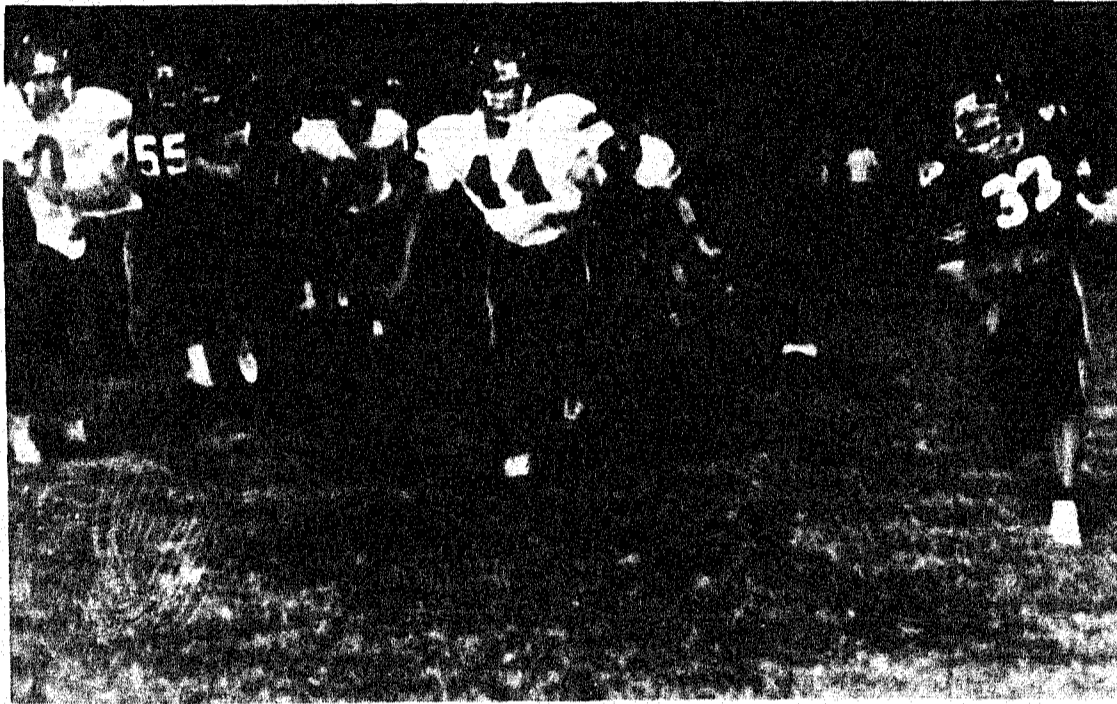

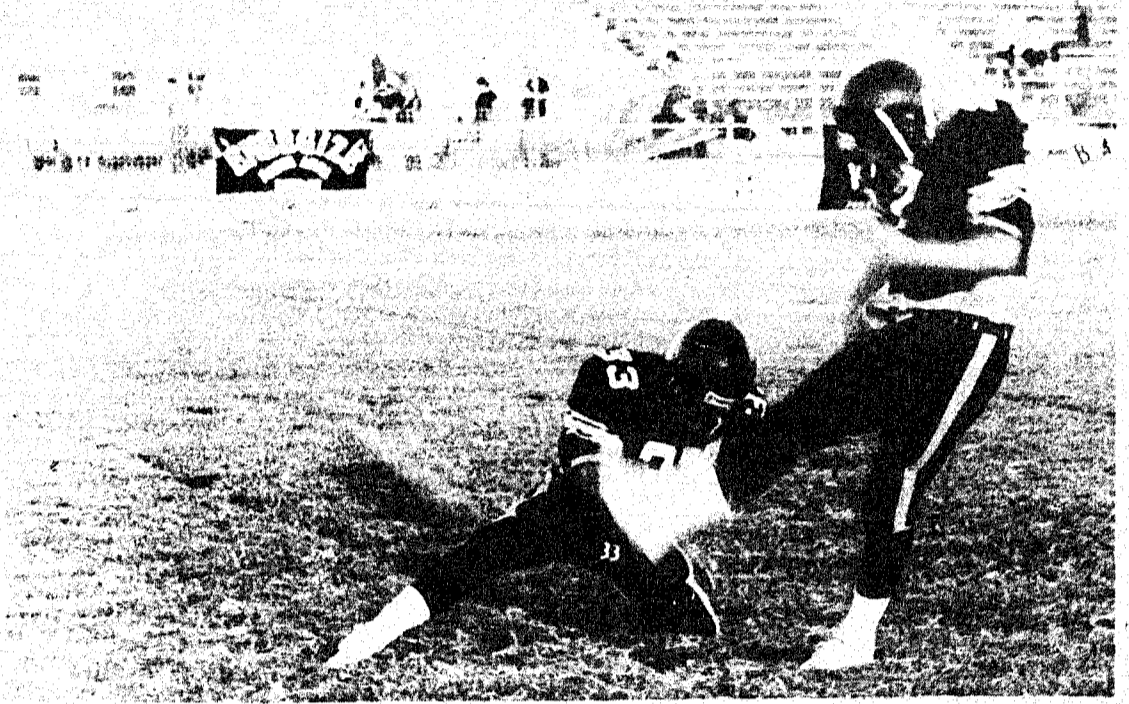

## Board Sets Tax Rate

In their recent meeting, the Santa Anna School Board approved a tax rate of 95 cents per \$100 assessed property valuation for the 1986-87 school year. Of that figure 81 cents will be used for the operation of the school district and 14 cents will go into debt service to pay bonded indebtedness.

There will be no increase in the tax levy although the effective tax rate as calculated by the Coleman County Appraisal District has changed to compensate for decreasing property values due to loss of oil revenues. The Santa Anna ISD has felt a loss of 5 million in evaluation.

The board had delayed the setting of the rate as had other districts ac-

cross the state awaiting action by the legislature that might have a bearing on the rate needed, but felt they had to take action at this time due to the time element for the tax appraisal district to process the needed information for the fall tax statements.

In other action, the board approved the employment of Beverly Houser as kindergarten teacher. The new position was necessitated by the enrollment of 31 students in the kindergarten program. Classes are limited to 22 per class by state law.

Mrs. Houser is a new resident of Santa Anna. She has previously taught in private schools in Oklahoma.

## School Board to Convention

Several Santa Anna School Board members and school administrators will be in San Antonio this weekend for the annual joint convention of the Texas Association of School Administrators (TASA) and the Texas Association of School Boards (TASB), to be held at the San Antonio Convention Center.

Convention members will be learning more about their roles in ensuring a better education system for Texas children. The convention will focus on advancing the philosophy that teamwork is essential for providing quality education at the local level. The theme for the three-day convention is "Our Schools: Our

Future."

Convention participants will have an opportunity to hear gubernatorial candidates Mark White and Bill Clements address educational issues at a luncheon Monday. Other featured speakers include film and television star Hugh O'Brian, founder of the Hugh O'Brian Youth foundation and Art Holst, former line judge for the National Football League.

Over 100 individual sessions will focus on curriculum, school finance, board leadership, school law, personnel issues, public relations, the Texas teacher appraisal system, and program evaluation. Board

members can also attend sessions that will provide credit for mandated training under the Statewide Standards on the Duties of a School Board Member.

Also, participants can see demonstrations of outstanding instructional programs, have the opportunity to attend public relations mini-clinics and view architectural and commercial exhibits.

Planning to attend from Santa Anna, are superintendent Gerald Brister, school business manager, Judy Hartman and board members Terry McIver, Danny Kellar, Gary Absher, and Bill Martin.

## Open Letter

But, we were deprived of that, because we, nor the citizens of the city, were not told where to pick up our dogs; other than the city pound. I drove to where several townspeople told me was the pound; I found pens and feeding dishes, but no dogs, therefore I assumed the city had not started picking dogs up. Maybe he had strayed?

Two days later, out of curiosity, I called the Veterinary. It was too late, our dog had been put to sleep.

I did not believe the city acted in god faith, they did not announce the appointment of a dog catcher, nor did they say where citizens could claim their dogs, other than the city pound. As I stated there were no dogs there. If you, the City, are not going to take the animals there, you should tell the citizens where to pick

## City Receives Tax Check

State Comptroller Bob Bullock recently sent checks totaling \$54.8 million in local sales tax to 1,022 cities that levy the one-percent city tax.

Bullock said the 1986 payments to date were down .5 percent as compared to the payments to date in September of 1985. The decrease in August and September check amounts reflects a downturn in the Texas economy, he said.

Santa Anna's check totaled \$1,312.19, down 6.51 percent from last year's payment of \$2,096.90. Total payments to date equal \$19,969.40 for the 1986 year.

Houston's check for \$8.6 million was the largest, bringing total

payments this year to \$108.3 million, down 5 percent from last year. Dallas' payment was \$6.3 million for a 1986 total of \$79.8 million, a 5 percent decrease.

San Antonio received \$3.4 million, pushing 1986 payments to \$42.7 million, up 2 percent over 1985. Austin's check for \$2.5 million brought total payments this year to \$31 million, a 3 percent decrease.

Bullock also sent checks totaling \$25 million to the state's six Metropolitan Transit Authorities. Houston's MTA payment of \$10.2 million brought 1986 totals to \$125.7 million. Dallas' DART check was for \$9.2 million, a total of \$119.6 million for 1986. Austin's Capitol Metro received a \$2.6 million check for a yearly total of \$31.7 million. VIA in San Antonio received \$1.8 million, increasing this year's payments to \$23.4 million. Fort Worth's MTA check for \$404,670 brought the city's total this year to \$6.2 million. Corpus Christi's MTA check was for \$473,628, bringing total payments for the year to \$4 million.

September checks represent taxes collected on sales made in July and reported to the Comptroller's Office by August 20.

## Busy Time For City Police

Thus far this month, things have been busy with several arrests and one major accident with injuries reported by the Policeman Craig Terry.

On September 4, a Richard Diaz was arrested for assault-class A and was placed in the Coleman County jail. On September 8, a theft of aprons and towels occurred at the Santa Anna Laundrymat and that incident is still under investigation. On the 9th, a 17 year old male suspect who also was an escapee of the Brownwood State School was arrested and charged with 3rd degree felony-burglary of an auto and theft. He is currently in the Brown County

jail on those charges and others.

September 14th, a Monique Marie Dreux of Coleman was arrested and charged with D.W.I. At 12:50 pm on September 16, a semi rig failed to stop at the railroad crossing on North 8th (Brady Highway) and was struck by a Santa Fe train. The 54 year old driver, Curtis Beaver, was injured when he was thrown through the windshield and landed on the ground. He was taken to the Brownwood Regional Hospital by Santa Anna Funeral Home Ambulance. Beaver was charged with failure to grant right of way to a train and having no liability insurance.

September 17th a case of vandalism was reported on Ave. C with approximately \$50 damage to a window of the residence. Also on the same day, a juvenile male was

truant from school and the police department picked this subject up and returned him to Mr. Gray at the elementary school for further action.

On the 18th, a minor accident occurred at the intersection of North 1st and Wallis Avenue. Vehicles belonging to a Brownwood man and to a Santa Anna man both received estimated damage of \$1000 each.

On the 20th Sgt. Ken Brixey and Officer Craig Terry arrested a Henry Adam Salazar on charges of D.W.I.-2nd offense, reckless driving, no driver's license and no liability insurance, all stemming from an incident on South 2nd and Avenue C at 8:23 pm. The suspect was placed in Coleman County jail on those charges.

In addition, there have been several citations issued and various other calls have been received for police assistance.

Christian love and perseverance proves what can be done when a few faithful families work for God in Santa Anna, when you consider the Cordero Baptist Church.

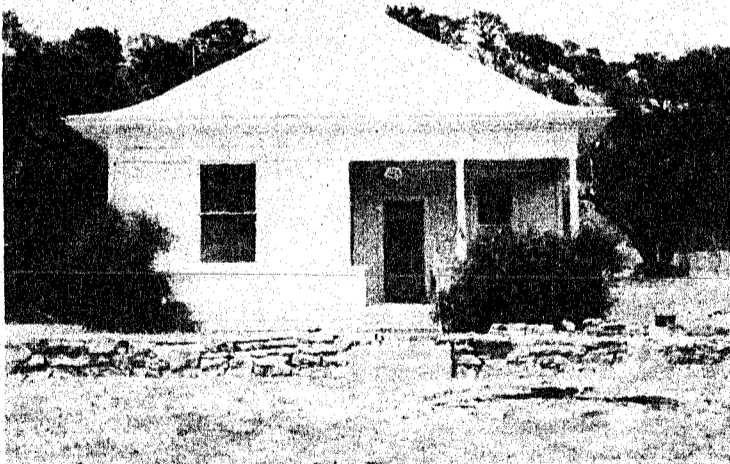
Talking with Valeriano Garza, who was chairman of the building

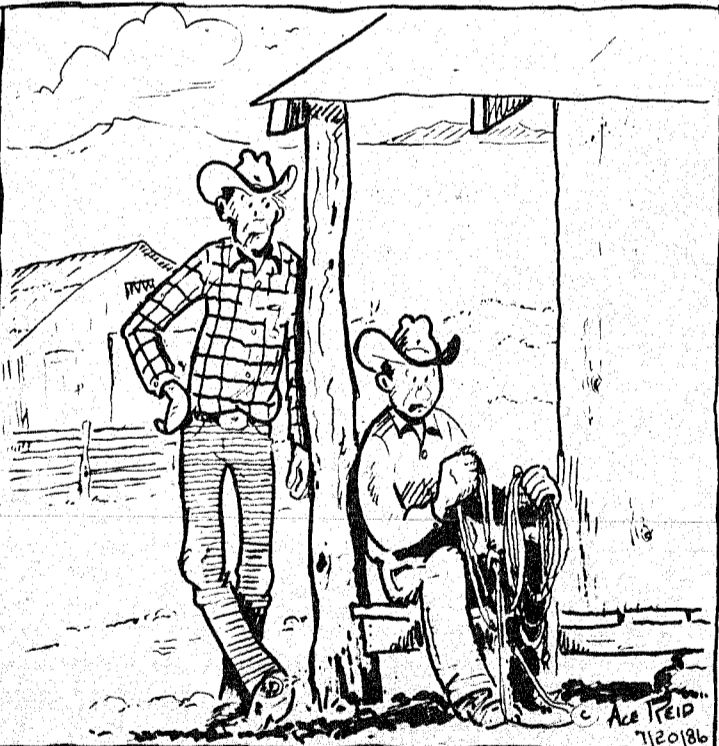

David Tucker and Reece McIver scored touchdowns, and a stifling Santa Anna defense took care of the rest Friday night as the Mountaineers shut out the Jim Ned Indians, 13-0.

Tucker opened the scoring midway through the second quarter, hitting paydirt from seven yards away. James Hartman kicked the extra point.

Although Santa Anna dominated the game, it would stay 7-0 until McIver added an insurance

touchdown in the fourth quarter. Santa Anna rushed for 320 yards, with McIver picking up 162 yards in 27 carries and Tucker donating 78 yards in 11 carries. Rex Harper also accounted for considerable yardage, with one long gain being called back

on a penalty. Jim Ned, now 0-3 on the year, managed just five first downs and 102 yards of offense. Santa Anna's second straight vic-

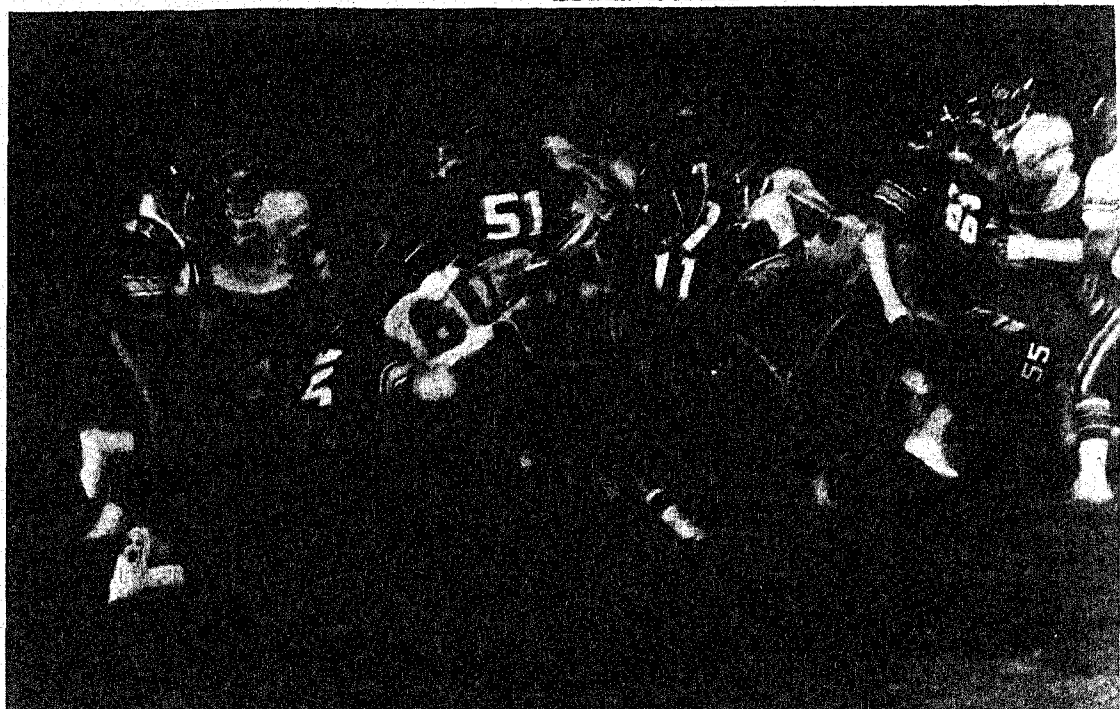

**Jr. Mounties Open Season With BANG!!**

The Santa Anna Junior Mountaineers opened their football season with a bang last Thursday against the Jim Ned Indians.

The Mounties received the opening kickoff and quickly established their dominance of the game. On the first play from scrimmage, Herbert Jackson ran 47 yards for a touchdown.
